Inquiry into registered nurses in New South Wales nursing homes

I am writing in response to your letter to Dr Cusack seeking information about the education and practice of registered nurses and enrolled nurses. The Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia (NMBA) regulates the professions of nursing and midwifery. One of the functions of the NMBA is to register nurses and midwives who are safe and competent to practice. The NMBA achieves this through the establishment of the requirements for initial and ongoing registration and the publication of standards, codes and guidelines that set the expected level of practice.

Under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law as in force in each state and territory (National Law) there are two divisions of nurse; registered nurses and enrolled nurses that are regulated by the NMBA. The NMBA does not regulate Assistants in nursing or other non-regulated employees that work in Residential Aged Care Facilities and as such the response to your questions does address these employees. The responses to your specific questions are included in Attachment A. With regard to your questions about the number of registered nurses and enrolled nurses trained in each year, this is not data that the NMBA collects and I recommend that you contact education providers for this information.

Since the introduction of the National Law in 2010 there are no longer enrolled nurses with or without medication endorsement. Enrolled nurses who are not educationally prepared to administer medications have a notation on their registration that states 'Does not hold Board-approved qualification in administration of medicines'. This means that these enrolled nurses are not permitted to administer medications. Registered nurses and enrolled nurses are required to work within the relevant Drugs and Poisons legislation in the state or territory in which they are practising.

A program of study leading to registration as an enrolled nurse is separate from, and **not** part of, the program of study leading to registration as a registered nurse. The breadth and depth of the education of a registered nurse and an enrolled nurse are quite different. As a result the role expectations and scope of practice of a registered nurse and an enrolled nurse are different. The NMBA Enrolled Nurse Standards for Practice require enrolled nurses to be supervised by a registered nurse.

Each program of study for registered nurses and enrolled nurses is approved against the relevant NMBA-approved accreditation standards and designed to meet the relevant NMBA standards for practice (also known as competency standards), that is the Enrolled Nurse Standards for Practice or the Registered Nurse Standards for Practice.
