SPORT AND RECREATION

Asian Cup Planning and Preparation

- 1. Please list the names of the persons on the Asian Cup Steering Committee?
 - (a) Were any Labor Councillors, Labor State or Federal Members invited to be on the Committee?
 - (b) If not, why not?

The purpose of the Asian Cup Steering Committee is to oversee planning, leveraging, and coordination associated with NSW Government's hosting obligations for the AFC Asian Cup 2015. Membership is based on representation from organisations that have a role in delivering the event, or maximising the benefits to NSW that can be derived from hosting it. These organisations include:

- 2. What provision is the government making to transport people from Sydney to Broadmeadow station?
 - (a) Will there be extra trains?

This is a matter for the Minister for Transport.

3. The walkway between Broadmeadow Station and Hunter Stadium needs work. Will the Government be providing funding for extra street lighting and footpath improvements to ensure safety and wheelchair accessibility?

Footpaths and lighting are local government responsibilities and the Local Organising Committee and Newcastle Council are working together to ensure the matches in Newcastle are a success.

Stadia Funding

- 4. Will the NSW Government continue to commit to funding regional suburban stadiums such as Parramatta, Brookvale and Wollongong Stadium for capital works?
 - (a) What is the current budget allocation for the 2014/15 financial period?

5. How much has the Government allocated to maintenance and grounds upkeep in the (2014/15 budget) for Parramatta Stadium, Brookvale Oval, Wollongong Stadium, Leichardt Park, Kogarah Park and Campbelltown Stadium, Newcastle Stadium, Blue Tongue Stadium at Wyong, and Cronulla Stadium?

I am advised:

Pirtek Stadium in Parramatta, WIN Stadium in Wollongong and Hunter Stadium are NSW Government venues and are operated by Venues NSW which is a statutory authority. In 2014-15 maintenance and upkeep are funded from earned revenue.

The other stadia listed are local government venues with the exception of Remondis Stadium which is owned by the Cronulla Sutherland Leagues Club. The maintenance and upkeep of those venues is the responsibility of local government and the Leagues Club respectively.

6. What is the current budget allocation for Alliance Stadium at Moore Park?

- (a) Does this include capital works funding?
- (b) Does the State Government provide maintenance funding?

I am advised:

Allianz Stadium is operated by the Sydney Cricket and Sports Ground Trust. In 2014-15 maintenance and capital works are funded from earned revenue.

7. What is the Government doing to increase sport participation in light of recent reports that children in NSW are increasingly becoming obese?

Information on current initiatives by the Office of Sport to support participation is available on agency websites and in annual reports.

The Office of Sport is also working in partnership with key agencies in the prevention of obesity in NSW through projects identified in the Healthy Eating and Active Living (HEAL) Strategy 2013 – 2018.

8. What is the Government doing to ease the burden of increasing registration, uniform and equipment costs for parents and their children to participate in sport throughout NSW?

9. Can the Minister list the programs the Government has implemented to promote sporting participation to multicultural communities throughout the state?

The funding for the upgrade of Lambert Park was a 2011 election commitment.

- 12. Given the plans for Sports House at 6A Figtree Drive, Sydney Olympic Park to be redeveloped, where will the tenant associations be relocated to once the redevelopment commences?
 - (a) What associations are presently located within Sports House, Sydney Olympic Park?

I am advised:

The Office of Sport is currently working with Government Property NSW to secure office space for the sporting associations currently located in Sports House.

POLICE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

Police

- 13. What plans does the Minister have to build a Police Station in the Wallsend electorate?
 - (a) If there are none, why not?
 - (b) How does the Minister plan to address poor response times from Newcastle Local Government Area to the western suburbs of Newcastle to suburbs such as Maryland.

I am advised:

While there are no plans to reopen stations closed by the previous Government, the residents of Wallsend electorate continue to be well served by police officers from Newcastle City and Lake Macquarie Local Area Commands.

- 14. Does the Minister plan to open Beresfield Police on a daily basis?
 - (a) If not, why not?

I am advised:

The appropriate allocation and tasking of policing resources within a Command is achieved, on a daily basis, using the intelligence-based identification of crime trends.

Fire and Rescue NSW

15. Why are some services frontline and some not?

This question was answered in the Hearing by Commissioner Mullins and myself.

- 16. In the hearings the Commissioner said that fire stations are sometimes TOLed for planned leave, such as maternity and long service leave. You also close them for sick leave so what are you doing for those areas that take less sick leave? It's my understanding that metro areas, for example, use less sick leave, and in some cases use less on average than the 87 hour target imposed in 2008. If sick leave has reduced by 15%, how much does it need to reduce further, and which zones or areas are already there?
- 17. Are you TOLing zones where sick leave is below 87 hours on average and if so where?

With regards to 16 and 17, I am advised:

Fire & Rescue NSW has been implementing a number of strategies designed to maximise the attendance of permanent firefighters at work, and therefore minimise firefighter shortages. Coupled with policies to reduce unplanned absences, Fire & Rescue NSW has also taken selected fire trucks and their crews temporarily offline since November 2012. This is an extension of a formal policy introduced under the previous Government in 2008.

Selected fire trucks and crews may be taken temporarily offline when there are insufficient personnel available to maintain a safe and effective crew. These decisions are made by experienced senior Fire and Rescue NSW commanders. Decisions as to whether a fire truck can be taken offline temporarily are only made after careful consideration of a range of risk factors facing the community at that time. Fire trucks are never taken offline on Total Fire Ban days, when major incidents are in progress, or for other operational reasons.

- 18. With reference to FRNSW being able to meet the labour expense cap cuts, and having in fact cut more than required- the cuts get progressively more steep, so how will you find the additional savings this year, and into the future?
 - (a) What are your plans to reduce your expenditure specifically?
 - (b) Has the Minister approved any specific measures?

Government savings targets are about ensuring agencies use allocations in the most effective and efficient manner.

If comparing the 2013-14 allocation to the 2014-15 allocation, Fire & Rescue NSW's total expenses budget has actually increased by almost 3 per cent.

- 19. The Commissioner mentioned that a number of areas in Sydney had fire stations built in the times of horse and cart- are you saying some areas of Sydney are over-serviced, and if so, where are they?
 - (a) If they aren't over-serviced, then how can you remove firefighting resources?

Determining the adequacy and levels of service are operational matters for the Commissioner.

- 20. In answers to questions in the hearings the Commissioner has said that access to SAM was restricted as a result of bullying of senior staff and that he was considering reinstating access at the end of each shift. Isn't it the case that without access to SAM staff have no real-time access to information on TOLing?
 - (a) Wouldn't it be better to deal with accusations of bullying through normal disciplinary procedures?

I am advised that staff have the access to SAM that they require to perform their duties.

- (a) There are extensive processes in place to deal with allegations of bullying.
 - 21. Minister do you accept responsibility for the losses experienced by business owners in the electorate you represent after the Kingswood factory fire due to your policy of keeping fire stations temporarily off-line?

Moving permanent firefighters and trucks around Sydney is a standard Fire & Rescue NSW practice that is governed by proven risk management principles. Operational decisions are made by experienced senior commanders on a day to day basis to ensure that appropriate response coverage for the community is always maintained.

Each fire truck and its crew is a mobile resource. Each truck is part of a large network of fire stations and trucks that are available to respond wherever they are needed. Decisions as to whether a fire truck can be taken offline temporarily are only made after careful consideration of a range of risk factors facing the community at that time.

22. Minister under your Government the TOLing policy now impacts major 10/14 stations. 10/14 stations are put in the community because the area is deemed to require 24 hour permanent protection, when you temporarily close one of these

stations is that an indication that you think that staffing level could afford to be downgraded?

Staffing levels at stations are an operational matter for the Commissioner.

23. Minister do you think it is acceptable that because of your labour expenses cap Lane Cove station has been closed 25 times between 1 March 2014 and 31 July 2014?

Firefighters and trucks are not always at their base station. Moving permanent firefighters and trucks around Sydney is a standard Fire and Rescue NSW practice that is governed by proven risk management principles.

24. Is it acceptable that Ingleburn Station has been closed 35 times or Macquarie Fields 20 times?

Firefighters and trucks are not always at their base station. Moving permanent firefighters and trucks around Sydney is a standard Fire and Rescue NSW practice that is governed by proven risk management principles.

Rural Fire Service

25. How many new or refurbished tankers will the RFS be supplying in 2014?

(a) What is the average age of the fleet now?

Allocations under the 2014 Rural Fire Fighting Fund will be determined later this year.

- (a) The average age of the fire fighting fleet is currently 13 years.
 - 26. Minister in a recent answer to a question on notice from me you indicated that a site had been selected for the new Chifley Zone fire control centre, when will it be built?

Bathurst Council is project-managing the construction, with completion expected late 2015.

27. In that same answer you indicated that the average age of the fleet in the Chifley Zone was 15 years old, why is it so much older than the State average?

Each Rural Fire District has a fleet replacement plan based on budget allocations and District priorities.

- 28. Commissioner what involvement will the RFS have with people who want to take advantage of the laws the Government recently introduced to allow more clearing near their homes?
 - (a) Will you be providing advice and / or monitoring?
 - (b) If not who will be?

The NSW Rural Fire Service provides advice through its website, along with more tailored advice to landowners and councils via email and telephone in both headquarters and through district offices.

- 29. How many community fire units currently exist in NSW?
 - (a) How many have been put in place over the past two years?
 - (b) Were there any community fire units in the areas in the Blue Mountains affected by last season's fires and were they effective?

I am advised:

597.

- a) 6.
- b) Yes. Research on community fire unit effectiveness has been undertaken and shows many homes were protected and further spread of the fire was halted by community fire unit members.

It should be noted that the CFU program is a Fire & Rescue NSW initiative. The NSW Rural Fire Service has been involved since 2010. To date the NSW Rural Fire Service has 108 Community Fire Units within NSW. Of these, 47 were put in place in the past two years.

- 30. How many RFS staff have been put on performance management in the last three years?
 - (a) How many staff have been dismissed following performance management processes?

NSW RFS Policy on Employee Work and Professional Development Planning and Review requires all staff to have work plans and personal development plans in place. This framework is being reviewed in line with the new provisions of the

NSW Public Sector Performance Development and Capability Frameworks as set by the Public Service Commission.

In the last three years (August 2011 - August 2014) two staff have been dismissed from employment and one staff member (included in the earlier figure) was relocated to other duties during management of unsatisfactory performance.

The Office of Sport was established on 1 July 2014 and a logo has been designed for the agency's branding within own resources.

Venues NSW and WIN Sport & Entertainment Centres are public trading enterprises, and have had new logos developed since 2011

NSW SES: Nil. The NSW SES does engage the services of aircraft (fixed wing and helicopters) during flood events to provide operational responses such as evacuation, resupply and flood reconnaissance.

POLICE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES

113. What is the current number of police with criminal convictions?

As at 26 August 2014, 436 officers had criminal convictions.

114. Of the total number of police with criminal convictions, how many were preemployment convictions and how many were post-employment convictions?

I am advised:

Pre-employment convictions: 294 as at 26 August 2014. Post-employment convictions: 148 as at 26 August 2014.

The total of these two figures does not correspond to the answer given to Q.113 above, as an officer may have a conviction for both pre- and post-employment.

- 115. What is the total number of officers currently suspended from the NSW Police Force?
- 116. How much do these suspensions cost per week?
- 117. What entitlements are payable to suspended members?
- 118. How many suspended officers are currently receiving housing allowances or subsidised accommodation?

With respect to questions 115 to 118, I am advised:

Officers who are suspended are dealt with in accordance with clause 51 of the *Police Regulation 2008* and the Premier's Memorandum No 94-35.

86 police officers were suspended from the NSW Police Force as at 26 August 2014.

119. What consideration has been given in the last 12 months to changes to support and training related to police psychological injuries?

The NSW Government invested an additional \$15 million to improve welfare programs and the NSW Police Force is also investing its own resources recognising the importance of keeping officers healthy.

The NSW Police Force now has over 79 activities and initiatives in place to:

- o promote wellbeing and prevent injury
- o improve injury management
- o and rehabilitate and redeploy injured officers.

In addition, the Self Harm Prevention working group has been established to further examine the issue.

120. Given the unreliability of drug dog indications as indicating the actual presence of drugs, what consideration has been given to winding back these programs entirely?

Law enforcement agencies, customs and immigration, and corrections facilities all around the world use detection dogs to locate illegal drugs. NSW Police Force's drug detection dog operations are intelligence-based and target locations where it is suspected illegal drugs may be found. Police deploy drug detection dogs to those locations to both locate and deter drug possession and distribution. The Government and the NSW Police Force believe that the dogs perform these functions exceptionally well and intend to continue to use them into the future.

- 121. Since 1 January 2012 have any drug detections stemming from drug detection dog indications been dismissed in the courts due to police being unable to prove sufficient information existed to 'suspect on reasonable grounds'.
 - (a) If so, how many?

Court outcomes are a matter for the Attorney General.

122. What is the total annual budget for the police media unit?

I am advised:

The annual budget for the Police media Unit in 2014-15 is \$3,019,817.

123. Why is this information not included as a separate line item in the budget?

NSW Budget Papers are prepared in line with standard accounting and statistical standards. This is also consistent across Australia Government jurisdictions.

124. As at 1 July 2014 how many FTE staff were employed in the police media unit?

As at 1 July 2014, the Police Media Unit had 9.38 FTE sworn and 14 FTE unsworn staff.

125. As at 1 July 2013 how many FTE staff were employed in the police media unit?

As at 1 July 2013, the Police Media Unit had 10.38 FTE sworn and 15 FTE unsworn staff.

- 126. Will your office approve a review of the ex-gratia application by former police officer Berrick Boland?
 - (a) If not, why not?

Mr Boland had been advised that the previous Minister for Police and Emergency Services decided not to make an ex gratia payment in his favour. Mr Boland has also been advised that this decision will not be reviewed.

127. Inconsistent figures appear to have been provided regarding the number of searches in 2011 that resulted in finding an indictable quantity of drugs between QON 5774 and QON 5363 – what is the reason for this discrepancy?

The Computerised Operational Policing System (COPS) is an operational, not a statistical database and over time there have been a number of different ways to record an event. This can result in differing statistics, particularly for historical data.

128. What is the correct number of searches in 2011 following a positive indication by a dog that resulted in finding an indictable quantity of drugs?

452.

129. In the Ombudsman evaluation of the drug detection dogs program the proportion of searches following a drug dog indication that led to a successful prosecution for supply was identified as 0.19% (for the period February 2002-February 2004). In answers to QON 5774the advice was that successful prosecution rate rose to 2.95% of searches in 2009 led to a successful prosecution for supply. What is the explanation for this 1585% increase?

Court outcomes are a matter for the Attorney General.

- 130. Following QON 5774 are there other kinds of locations other than the 3 identified in the answers?
 - (a) If so, where are they?

The NSW Police Force provided statistics for the location types requested in QON 5774. Approximately 80% of all drug detection dog searches are conducted in such locations. The full list of location types in which searches have been conducted over the past year is:

- o adult entertainment
- o business / commercial
- o carpark
- o education
- o health
- o industrial
- o law enforcement
- o licensed premise
- o marine transport
- o outdoor / public place (incl. road / street / footpath)
- o public transport

- 131. What location type do outdoor music festivals fit within for the purposes of recording drug dog operations?
 - (a) Why is data no longer recorded for these separately (as it was at the time of the Ombudsman's report)?

There is no location type for "outdoor music festivals". In some cases, such as the annual Tamworth Country Music Festival, a NSW Police Force operation is created that may allow for separate recording in the system. It is not possible to create a location type for outdoor music festivals, as locations are also used for other events.

- 132. Excluding the Review of the Police Powers (Drug Detection Dogs) Act 2001 undertaken by the NSW Ombudsman, have NSW Police commissioned, conducted or participated in any evaluations of the use of drug detection dogs in general drug detection operations in NSW?
 - (a) If so, what was the details, timing and frame of reference of each evaluation?

Drug detection dogs are a highly visible tool used by the NSW Police Force to successfully combat drug dealing and possession. Drug detection dogs are effectively used by police to indicate the presence of illicit drugs or recent contact/possession.

- 133. Has the use of drug detection dogs in general drug detection operations in NSW had an overall impact on the availability, price or purity of drugs?
 - (a) What evidence is there of these impacts?

The NSW Police Force employs numerous strategies to detect, deter, and prevent drug related crime; of which drug detection dogs is but one. Given the range of factors that would impact on availability, price or purity of drugs, the impact of drug detection dogs alone on those factors would be difficult to measure.

The NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) provides statistics and analysis on a broad range of crime and policing matters. I note that BOCSAR recently released crime statistics that show in the 24 months to June 2014, amphetamine possession increased by 16.1%. This is likely due to increased detection by police.

Emergency Services

- 134. Why hasn't the PWC Investigation report into the sacking of Tara McCarthy been made public?
- 135. What steps have been taken to implement the PWC Investigation report into the sacking of Tara McCarthy?

This is a matter for the Public Service Commission.

136. What protective measures do the NSW SES, Minister for Police and Emergency Services and the NSW Public Service Commission have in place to protect whistle-blowers?

Questions regarding the Public Service Commission should be directed to the Premier. However, public interest disclosures are managed in accordance with the *Public Interest Disclosures Act 1994*.

- 137. What is the current status of the Fleet Project?
 - (a) Is this project on schedule, if not why not?

The NSW SES Fleet Project is in year two of its five year transition, with over 60 percent of vehicles transitioned to NSW Government ownership. The project is on track to commence delivery of Light and Medium Storm Damage vehicles in financial year 2014-15.

- 138. What is the current status of the Unit Support Program?
 - (a) Is this project on schedule, if not why not?

The NSW SES Unit Support Program is being implemented as agreed and is on schedule.

139. What is the current status and usage of the "Corporate Management Reporting" system?

The NSW SES uses the Corporate Performance Management System (CPM) to track organisational performance across the Service.

140. What measures has the Commissioner and the Senior Executive Group taken to address bullying and harassment in the NSW SES?

The NSW SES has introduced a new Code of Conduct and Ethics (April 2014) including a Statement of Values.

The Statement of Values is the centrepiece of Service-wide training about to be delivered, which is a respectful workplace training program for every member, whether staff or volunteer. A new Bullying and Harassment Policy will be released later this year.

A conduct management system is in the process of being adopted. This system will assist in determining how each grievance/complaint will be addressed, either through local management action, grievance resolution or conduct investigation.

- 141. Since January 2011, has the NSW SES, or the State Government, been required to refund any commonwealth government grant money due to poor accounting, recordkeeping or reporting by the SES?
 - (a) If so when, and how much money?

I am advised that the NSW SES is not aware of any instances where the State Government has been required to refund any Commonwealth grant money due to poor accounting, recordkeeping or reporting by the NSW SES.
