Q. 1 JOINT PIC / NSWCC INVESTIGATIONS

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: Historically, since the formation of the PIC how many joint investigations has the PIC conducted together with the Crime Commission?

Mr PRITCHARD: Historically I would not know from the time the commission started. I have been the commissioner for two years. There have been no joint investigations during my time as commissioner. We share resources, but we share resources with like agencies such as the ICAC in any event. Mr Bradley may correct me because he might have a longer corporate memory than I do in that sense, but I think Florida may have been the last joint investigation the PIC or the Crime Commission did. As I said, certainly there have been none during my time in the past two years as commissioner.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: Mr Bradley, is that in fact the case, that Florida was the last one?

Mr BRADLEY: Yes, but it was not styled as a joint investigation under the legislation. I think we had a memorandum of understanding and it was called a joint pursuit of allegations or something like that. It was not a formal joint investigation in that sense. I am not sure, by the way, that Florida was the last. I just cannot remember in the sequence where they lay, but I think there was one after Florida. I will take it on notice, if you wish, to provide a more precise answer. It is a matter that is in the public domain.

ANSWER:

I am advised by the Police Integrity Commission that Operation Florida was the last joint investigation.

Q. 2 USE OF TASERS

Ms SYLVIA HALE: Yesterday a newspaper reported that taser stun-guns have been used in four incidents in the past 11 days despite assurance from police that the public would never see an officer fire one. Is it correct that there have been four incidents in the past 11 days?

Mr SCIPIONE: I will take that on notice because in fact it may well be that there could be more.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me that records indicate Tasers were used on 4 occasions between 2 October 2008 and 14 October 2008.

Q. 3 TRAINING RE TASERS

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: Where does the supervisor at Broken Hill or the supervisor at Wagga go to be trained?

Mr SCIPIONE: I will take that on notice because I do not know where the training centre might be. Certainly I can provide that advice to you.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: They will have to travel.

Mr SCIPIONE: It depends. It may well be that we might roll that out in the region.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: That is a lot of rolling out. It looks to me like there is a degree of uncertainty in relation to policy because a lot of it seems to be being made up as we go along, not by you, but I suspect in terms of the rollout. Are the requalifications every year?

Mr SCIPIONE: Correct.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: In addition to the requalification for a firearm every year? That is, two lots of requalifications for the use of—

Mr SCIPIONE: It may well be that it is part of the same process like it is with the spray. It is something that they would put into their mandatory training requalification.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: But of course people from Broken Hill would not travel all the way to Dubbo to requalify for a firearm so surely they are not going to travel all the way to Dubbo to qualify or requalify for a taser.

Mr SCIPIONE: That is why I said I will take it on notice and let you know where they will be qualifying.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me that supervisors from Broken Hill and Wagga have been trained locally - ie. in Broken Hill and Wagga respectively - and will re-certify annually at their normal local training locations.

Q. 4 CONFISCATED TASERS

Ms SYLVIA HALE: When I was much younger no policy was in place for police to carry weapons other than truncheons. Since then police have been armed and we have seen a proliferation of weapons throughout the community. Rather than preventing their spread throughout the community it seems to me that it has been encouraged. Have any tasers been confiscated that have been found to be wrongly in the possession of a non-member of the New South Wales Police Force?

Mr SCIPIONE: Yes.

Ms SYLVIA HALE: How many have been confiscated?

Mr SCIPIONE: I would have to take that question on notice. There has been a large

number.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

A search of the Computerised Operational Policing System has revealed 38 occasions in which police located Prohibited Articles/Weapons where the Object type was listed as Electric Stun Gun. However, it should be noted that this system is operational, not statistical, and does not record the actual number of such weapons confiscated. Other incidents such as robberies in which such weapons may have been seized may also not be recorded as such.

Q. 5 WEARING OF POLICE ID AT CLIMATE CAMP

Ms SYLVIA HALE: I remember the questions that were asked at the last estimates committee hearing. I remember you suggesting that the former tags, because of the pins, had been used as offensive weapons. I recall asking you to give me some instances of where that had occurred but you were unable to do so. Moving on from that, can you explain why, on 13 July this year, at the climate camp outside Newcastle, it was possible for three members of the New South Wales Police Force to be photographed not wearing any form of identification? I am more than happy to hand you the three photographs. Will you undertake to the Committee to investigate the circumstances and to explain why those officers were not wearing tags?

Mr SCIPIONE: I will take that on notice. I am concerned to see a photocopy of a photograph. I would rather have something genuine, but I am certainly happy to take it. Anyone is entitled to make a complaint; such a complaint will be given due consideration and will be thoroughly investigated. On the basis of that, I am happy to take that advice. I assume that should we need to contact you for further information, witnesses and the like, we can get the information from your office.

Q. 6 FOI APPLICATIONS

Ms SYLVIA HALE: I now refer to freedom of information [FOI] applications. How many applications to access police information pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act were determined by the New South Wales police during the year 2007-08?

ANSWER:

I am advised that this information is published annually in the NSW Police Force Annual Report.

Q. 7 DELAYS IN PROCESSING FOI'S

Ms SYLVIA HALE: I would also like to know whether you or the Minister, or both of you, received a letter in late February or early March from the New South Wales Combined Community Legal Centres Group regarding delays in the processing of freedom of information applications?

The Hon. TONY KELLY: Well, I was not the Minister for Police then. So I certainly did not.

Ms SYLVIA HALE: Commissioner, have you any recollection?

Mr SCIPIONE: I certainly have not got any advice to that effect here with me. So, I will take that on notice and make sure that we provide it to you.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

Records indicate that such a letter was received at the Public Affairs Branch on 22 February 2008. Regrettably, the correspondence was mislaid and not received by the FOI Unit. It has now been recovered and a response is being prepared.

Q. 8 PROHIBITED WEAPONS REVIEW

CHAIR: Order! If no other Government member has a question, I have a question for Mr Tree. It is in relation to the prohibited weapons review. I understand that submissions closed last month for that. When do you anticipate that the review will be finalised? Did you accept late submissions? Mine was late.

Mr TREE: I am sure we did. Our standard practice is to accept late submissions on any reviews the Ministry undertakes. We will be assessing the submissions and we will take late submissions. As to when the review will be completed, I would imagine it will take us some months, but we will come back with a suggested time frame.

ANSWER:

I am advised that the review is due to be finalised in 2009.

Q. 9 NUMBER OF ATTEMPTED ABDUCTIONS

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: Commissioner, do you remember saying on 26 September, in reference to the number of alleged abductions/stalking events, that the New South Wales Police Force had received 30 reports of alleged attempted abductions in the past seven days compared to a total of 20 for the previous six weeks. Do you recall that, sir?

Mr SCIPIONE: Yes, I do.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: We have been monitoring reports, both in the media as well as in the police media that since the end of August and early September our list now runs to 67 events over that time. Is that consistent with the figures that you have?

Mr SCIPIONE: I do not have the current figures here, Mr Gallacher. I am happy to take it on notice and come back to you on that, but I have not got those current figures as of today.

The Hon. MICHAEL GALLACHER: What do you have with you?

Mr SCIPIONE: In fact, the figures I have are not even as current as those that you have quoted. They particularly relate to 2007 and are based on the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research [BOCSAR] figures. I am happy to take those on notice and make sure that we get that information to you. What I have is that there were 247 abduction attempts in Sydney in 2007, according to BOCSAR statistics.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

The total number of attempted abductions recorded in the Computer Operational Policing System in the 6 week period from 30 August 2008 to 10 October 2008 is 34, including 6 incidents determined by police not to have occurred.

Q. 10 NUMBERS OF FIREARMS

The Hon. ROY SMITH: Earlier my colleague Ms Sylvia Hale referred to the proliferation of weapons—referring to firearms—in our community. All the statistics I have seen from the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research in relation to firearms crime suggest that that is not the case. All the statistics I have seen show that the number of firearms in the community has been declining for many, many years. Is there evidence that there is a proliferation of weapons in the community, compared to previous years? Is there an increase or a decrease?

Mr SCIPIONE: I do not have any advice with me. I am assuming that you are talking about firearms when you mention weapons, as opposed to other weapons.

The Hon. ROY SMITH: Yes.

Mr SCIPIONE: Non-firearm. I would have to get that advice. I do not have that here with me. Certainly, at this stage trends with regard to offences that have been committed using firearms have generally remained stable. Indeed, if you were to consider robbery with a weapon that is not a firearm, that has fallen significantly; there has been a 17 per cent reduction over the past 24 months. In terms of the actual numbers of firearms that are seized, I need to take that on notice. Certainly at this stage we continue to work to take illegal firearms out of the community on the basis that they are being used to commit crimes. Before I could make a comment with regard to these trends I would certainly like to see the data. I will take that question on notice.

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

The question did not state a specific timeframe. However, statistics provided by the Firearms Registry for the past 3 years show the following increases or decreases in the numbers of registered firearms over the previous year:

2006 : 2.71% increase 2007 : 4.85% increase

2008 : 2.37% increase (1 January – 27 October)

I am advised by the NSW Police Force that it is not possible to estimate the actual number of illegal firearms at large at anyone time in the community. However the

NSW Police Force actively purses a number of law enforcement strategies designed to target illegal possession of firearms.

QUESTIONS FROM MS HALE

Failure to wear badges

- 1. Are you aware that regulations number 73 and 74 of the Police Act regulation specify that police officers must wear identification, either as a name or number?
- 2. Why were some police not wearing badges identifying them by name or number at the Climate Camp protests?
- 3. How many complaints about the failure to wear identification badges have been received by the NSW Police in the last 12 months?

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

- 1. Yes.
- Name tag compliance for Public Order and Riot Squad (PORS) police was enforced at the Climate Camp operation. It is unclear from the photo supplied whether the PORS officer is wearing a name tag, as the plastic sleeves on the type of protective overvest worn in the photo sometimes reflect and obscure the tag.

Mounted Unit police at the Climate Camp were wearing riot vests over their uniform shirts which obscured their name tags. This was brought to the attention of the Commander of the unit who rectified the situation by having the officers place the badges on their outer vests.

All Operational Support Group police at the Camp had their name plates on at the beginning of the shift. The officer depicted in the photograph subsequently put his leather jacket on due to cold weather and unfortunately did not have a name badge on his jacket.

QUESTIONS FROM MS HALE

APEC Excluded persons list

- 4. How the people on the excluded persons list who were members or had attended meetings of Greenpeace or Mutiny, but who had no known history or convictions for any violent act, deemed to be "potential leaders of violent or unlawful activity during APEC 2007" as Mr. Daley, a Police spokesperson, said?
- 5. Did the Commissioner of Police list people based on group affiliation alone? If not, what intelligence did he base the listing on that those on the list were "leaders of violent or unlawful activity"?
- 6. The criteria for listing on the excluded persons list related to violent, rather than unlawful, activity. Was the listing of those with no prior convictions at all beyond the scope of section 26 of the APEC Meeting (Police Powers) Act?
- 7. Was the APEC excluded persons list more about intimidating people who wanted to demonstrate about issues, such as the United States invasion of Iraq or Australia's failure to sign the Kyoto Protocol, than about protecting visiting heads of state?

ANSWER:

4-7. The NSW Police Force has advised me:

The Excluded Persons List was about protecting visiting heads of state and the community.

The Commissioner was satisfied all persons listed met the test set out in section 26 of the *APEC Meeting (Police Powers) Act 2007* based on previous charges and related intelligence.

Section 26 of the Act contains the criteria and refers to "... persons who would pose serious threats to the safety of persons or property (or both) in an APEC security area during the APEC period". Such a threat includes unlawful activity as well as violence.

QUESTIONS FROM MS HALE

Fleet Cars

- 8. What is the percentage of hybrids in the car fleet associated with the Arts portfolio?
- 9. Is there a mechanism within the agency to reward staff who choose not to exercise an entitlement to a fleet vehicle as a part of their package but use public transport instead?

10. What car does the Director-General drive?

ANSWER:

As this matter falls outside of my portfolio responsibilities, I suggest the Member redirect her question to the appropriate Minister.

Use of Sniffer Dogs

- 11. How many police dogs and handlers attended the Enmore Theatre in Sydney on the night of 15 October 2008?
- 12. Why was the Enmore Theatre singled out for this operation?
- 13. Were the police acting on specific intelligence in conducting this operation?
- 14. If so, what was the nature of this intelligence?
- 15. How many patrons were searched?
- 16. How many arrests were made?
- 17. What charges were laid?
- 18. Which entertainment venues in Sydney have been subject to police operations involving the attendance of police dogs over the past twelve months?
- 19. How many arrests have been made and what charges have been laid as a result of these operations?
- 20. How many convictions have been recorded and for what offences as a result of these operations?

ANSWER:

The NSW Police Force has advised me:

- 11. One drug dog and one handler.
- 12. The operation targeted Newtown Local Area Command as a whole. A number of locations, including several licensed premises, were attended by police.
- 13-14. Drug dog operations are conducted based on received intelligence and other relevant information. I am not going to give details of the intelligence in question.
- 15. 14 persons on the premises of the Enmore Theatre and 2 in the immediate vicinity of the theatre were searched.

- 16-17. 6 people on the premises and one in close proximity to the theatre were found to be in possession of cannabis. All 7 were issued with Cannabis Cautions.
- 18. Drug dogs are generally deployed in operations targeting drug supply in nominated areas, not specific premises.
- 19. Of incidents recorded as involving drug detection dogs for the period October 2007 to September 2008, police took action against 1050 offenders for 1,304 offences. Of these actions, court action was taken against 514 offenders for 765 offences, of which 622 were for Possess Prohibited Drug.
- 20. Of the abovementioned 622 drug possession matters, 70% have currently been finalised, with a conviction rate of 97%.

QUESTIONS FROM MR GALLACHER

(a-g) The NSW Crime Commission has advised me:

Operation Mocha was a joint operation with the Commission and the Australian Federal Police.

It was targeting a major criminal syndicate for the sale and importation of illegal drugs.

The operation allowed for an informant to sell 7 kilograms of cocaine, 6 kilograms of which were not recovered.

The Crime Commissioner oversees the operations of the Crime Commission.

Operation Mocha took place prior to the passing of the *Police Integrity Commission Amendment (Crime Commission) Bill* in July 2008, which allows for PIC oversight of the Crime Commission with regard to serious misconduct or corruption.

QUESTIONS FROM MR GALLACHER

- 33. Regarding the recently mandated oversight functions of the Police Integrity Commission with specific regard to the New South Wales Crime Commission:
 - a. Given that intelligence gathering and monitoring resources can, and have been shared between the two Commissions where joint investigations are concerned, what legislative and procedural protections have been put in place to ensure the security of investigations the Police Integrity Commission undertakes that involve the NSW Crime Commission?

ANSWER:

I am advised that legislative protections are set out in the *Police Integrity Commission Act 1996*. The PIC is also developing internal procedures to protect the integrity of investigations into NSWCC matters.

QUESTIONS FROM MR GALLACHER

- 34. Regarding the shared resources of the Police Integrity Commission and the NSW Crime Commission:
 - a. The NSW Crime Commission has indicated that both agencies have a full suite of resources and electronic infrastructure with which to carry out their respective roles?
 - b. What specific resources are shared by the NSW Crime Commission and the Police Integrity Commission?
 - c. Does the Police Integrity Commission quarantine some resources from being shared with NSW Crime Commission, due to their new legislative oversight requirements that might see them having to investigate the Crime Commission or its officers?

ANSWER:

I am advised by the Police Integrity Commission:

The PIC and the NSW Crime Commission have not been involved in a joint investigation since Operation Florida. There are no specific resources which are shared by the two organisations. However, each organisation does own particular pieces of technical and surveillance equipment which from time to time may be loaned to the other organisation for the purposes of an investigation being conducted by that other organisation. This relationship also exists between the PIC and the NSW Police Force. There are very few such items in question. Such arrangements do not interfere with the PIC's capacity to oversight either the NSW Police Force or the NSWCC.
