

Australian Apprenticeships

Australian Apprenticeships (this term can relate to both Apprenticeships and Traineeships) are generally made available at the Certificate II, III and IV levels across most States and Territories. New entrants to an industry sector would normally commence at the Certificate II or III level, with opportunities to progress or commence at higher levels in particular circumstances. Certificate III is normally viewed as the "trade level" qualification.

One equivalent and increasing number of sectors are now encouraging involvement at Certificate IV and higher.

Employers of Australian Apprentices may be eligible for an incentive from the Australian Government.

Australian Apprentices receive a wage by their employer and may be eligible for Australian Government assistance including living allowance, home allowance.

Australian Apprenticeships are not just for young people. Anyone who is 16 years and older can be employed as an Australian Apprentice. Existing employees may be eligible under some circumstances.
