Q71. Did a submission from the NSW Government go to Infrastructure Australia?

ANSWER: Yes.

Q72. If yes to question 4, what was the exact date?

ANSWER: 10 August 2010. Note that various interactions on the NSW Infrastructure Australia submissions occurred with Infrastructure Australia between March and August 2010.

Q73. If yes to question 4, did that submission propose that the project should be funded, or that a feasibility study should be done?

ANSWER: The submission for Parramatta to Epping rail sought funds to complete detailed patronage forecasting, identify opportunities for transit oriented development, investigate alignment options; and undertake geotechnical investigations, cost estimation, environmental studies and a business case.

In relation to infrastructure funding and the Metropolitan Transport Plan:

Q74. From what funds will the Parramatta to Epping Rail Link be provided?

ANSWER: See answer to Q76 below.

Q75. How much money in the Metropolitan Transport Plan is uncommitted?

ANSWER: See answer to Q76 below.

Questions on Notice to the Premier by Committee Members

Q76. What is funding for the Parramatta to Epping Rail Link in the Metropolitan Transport Plan for the following financial years:

- a) 2010/2011?
- b) 2011/2012?
- c) 2012/2013?

ANSWER: In response to questions 74, 75 and 76, I am advised:

Funding for all elements of the project will be a combination of Commonwealth and State contributions. The State's contribution is within the \$50.2 billion Metropolitan Transport Plan budget. The Secretary of the Treasury has already confirmed that there is sufficient flexibility within the existing \$50.2 billion plan to pay for NSW's share.

The annual Budget Papers reflect that funding for key projects such as the Western Express, the North West Rail Link and the light rail extension is guaranteed. The \$50.2 billion plan contains sufficient flexibility to bring forward funding for some projects — such as the NSW contribution to the Parramatta to Epping Rail Link — into the 10 year horizon. It is essential that, in response to changing population and land use needs, we retain the flexibility to deliver the right projects at the right time.

The NSW Government is developing a funding agreement with the Commonwealth Government to ensure the smooth delivery of the Parramatta to Epping Rail Link. NSW's commitments under the funding agreement will be reflected in the State's Budget Papers for 2011 to 2013.

Q77. How many people have received compensation for contract termination from SOORT since 1995?

ANSWER: For the period 1995 to 2010 there have been a total of 505 compensation claims determined by the Statutory and Other Offices Remuneration Tribunal (SOORT)

Q78. How many of these people have been paid at the maximum 38 weeks?

ANSWER: Of these, a total of 68 have received the maximum compensation of 38 weeks ie, 13.50 per cent of applications. By way of comparison, for the period 1990 to 1995, there were a total of 331 applications for compensation determined by SOORT. Of these, 275

received the maximum compensation of 52 weeks ie, 83 per cent of applicants received the maximum compensation

Q79. What is the total cost since 1995?

ANSWER: The total cost of compensation for the 505 applications was \$42.178 million. By way of comparison, the total cost of compensation for the 331 applications for the period 1990 to 1995 was \$30.168 million.

Q80. Broken down by each person who received compensation, what was the compensation, what department were they previously from, and for how many weeks of their pay?

ANSWER: Please see attached Schedule which is in two parts. The first part relates to the period 1995 to 2010. The second part provides similar information for the period 1990 to 1995.

In relation to former Premier Rees' staff:

Q81. How many received severance payouts?

ANSWER: Sixteen (16) Special Temporary Employees received severance payments. Three (3) staff of the Department of Premier and Cabinet received voluntary redundancy payments.

Q82. Broken down by each Ministerial employee, what was each paid in severance payouts and how much was that worth in relation to weeks of their wage?

ANSWER: This information was provided to the Auditor-General as part of his performance audit into severance payments to Special Temporary Employees in the offices of the Premier, Ministers and Leader of the Opposition. Severance payments to individual staff members have not been disclosed as this would represent an unreasonable disclosure of information concerning the personal affairs of an individual.

Q83. How many staff from former Premier Rees staff currently works for you?

ANSWER: Four (4).

Q84. Do any of former Premier Rees staff who received redundancy payments currently work for you or another Minister?

ANSWER: One staff member received a severance payment and was re-employed after the severance payback period had expired.

Q85. If yes to Question 84, which Ministers?

ANSWER: Minister for Industrial Relations, Minister for Commerce, Minister for Energy, Minister for Public Sector Reform, and Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, the Hon P G Lynch MP.

In relation to rent at Governor Macquarie Tower

Q86. When does the current rent schedule expire at Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrar Place, Sydney?

ANSWER: The current lease expires 31 December 2014. There is no option available.

Q87. What is the current rent change per square metre at Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrar Place, Sydney?

ANSWER: The current rental rate is \$641.68 per square metre per annum (nett). This rental commenced 1 January 2010.

Q88. How many parking spaces are there rented at Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrar Place, Sydney?

ANSWER: There are 115 parking spaces currently under license to the Government at GMT.

Q89. What is the current rent change for parking spaces per square metre at Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrar Place, Sydney?

ANSWER: Car parking is at the rate of \$9,420 per bay per annum for unsecured bays (70 bays) and \$9,780 per bay per annum for secured bays (45 bays) exclusive of GST and Parking Levy.

Q90. Has the NSW Government entered into negotiations for extension rent at Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrar Place, Sydney?

ANSWER: No negotiations have commenced to extend the lease at GMT.

Q91. If so, what is the status of the negotiation?

ANSWER: See answer to Q90 above.

In relation to Ministerial Staff that worked for a Minister as at 4 December 2010:

Q92. How many were terminated and received severance payouts?

ANSWER: One (1) in the period 4 December 2009 to 4 February 2010.

Q93. Broken down by each Ministerial employee, what was each paid in severance payouts and how much was that worth in relation to weeks of their wage?

ANSWER:

\$18,055.38; seven (7) weeks.

Q94. Do any of these staff that received redundancy payments currently work for you or another Minister?

ANSWER: No.

Q95. If yes to Question 94, which Ministers?

ANSWER: Not applicable.

In relation to Temporary Employees

Q96. How many employees were employed under Temporary Staff Contract (C100 – Contingent Workforce), by the NSW Government as at:

- a) 1 July 2009?
- b) 1 January 2010?
- c) 1 July 2010?

ANSWER: The Department of Services, Technology and Administration only holds information regarding temporary staff employed through Contract 100. Some agencies with specialist needs may make alternate temporary staffing arrangements.

The Department collects and aggregates monthly reported data from vendors and collates this information annually, however it does not hold information on the numbers of staff employed on any given day. I am advised that vendor data available to the Department

Questions on Notice to the Premier by Committee Members

indicates that an estimated 10,369 temporary employees were engaged through Contract 100 during the period 1 July 2009 to 30 June 2010.

In relation to Walt Secord:

Q97. What is his current Salary Band?

ANSWER: Mr Secord's salary is determined as a single figure, not part of a salary band. The classification and grade is Ministers' Staff Grade 7.

Q98. What is his current exact salary?

ANSWER: Mr Secord's salary is set in accordance with Government policy.

Q99. How much did he receive as a termination payment when he left the NSW Government in 2005?

ANSWER: Mr Secord's severance was in accordance with Government policy.
