## SERIOUS INVASIONS OF PRIVACY IN NEW SOUTH WALES – HOW ADEQUATE ARE OUR REMEDIES?

The Law and Justice committee in the Upper House is currently conducting an inquiry into remedies for the serious invasion of privacy. The inquiry will examine whether the existing remedies for serious invasions of privacy in New South Wales are adequate, particularly in light of the rapid growth of social media, surveillance and communication technologies.

The Committee Chair, the Hon Natasha Maclaren-Jones MLC, invites all interested individuals and organisations to make a submission. The committee has extended the closing date for submissions to 20 September 2015.

The Chair said: 'The proliferation of social media has meant that invasions of privacy through online forums, such as the alarming trend of jilted lovers posting sexually explicit photographs of ex-partners on the internet, has immediate and vast reaching repercussions.'

Privacy is also being impacted by other new technologies, such as increasingly affordable surveillance drones which fly overhead and can film people in their backyards and on private property.'

Invasion of privacy has been an ongoing issue which was considered by the NSW Law Reform Commission in 2009 in its 'Invasion of Privacy' report, and by the Australian Law Reform Commission in 2014 in its 'Serious Invasions of Privacy in the Digital Era' report.

Both of those reports considered the need for a cause of action for breaches of privacy,' said Mrs Maclaren-Jones. 'There have also been recent inquiries into privacy law in other jurisdictions such as Victoria and South Australia.'

'Our committee will specifically consider whether there is a need for a statutory cause of action, or whether existing remedies – including the equitable action of breach of confidence – are adequate.'

The committee intends to hold public hearings later this year.
