Dear Members,

In response to a question taken on notice during an appearance before the General Purpose Standing Committee No. 2 on 12 March 2012, please find the relevant details requested.

A survey was undertaken in 2006 by The Federation of Parents and Citizens Associations of New South Wales, 280 responses were captured. See the attached results for details regarding the survey, in particular question 7 - How important to you is the option for your child to attend an alternative program that is non-religious in nature but focused on ethics? Ethics is defined as "generally agreed rules and/or standards for right (moral) conduct or practice" with the results showing a majority of respondents, 41% found it important and 18% found it extremely important that an ethics option be available for their child to attend.

Please also find enclosed the transcript amendments as noted by Sharon Johnson, Pat Clarke and Kelly MacDonald all in attendance at the sitting.
