As a veterinary science student, I am all too aware of the 'wastage' from the greyhound racing industry. In anatomy practical classes, our dissection specimens are greyhounds, much to the despair of students and staff alike. The faculty accepts to use them in order to, at the very least, give them a peaceful and quick ending, prior to which they will be taken care of properly in the hands of vets, as most are killed at the hands of amateurs.

However, this exposes us to the extremely alarming rate of 'disposal' of these animals as a by-product of this cruel industry. Greyhounds are extremely friendly and highly intelligent dogs, but instead of being appreciated and cared for, they are over-bred (at around 20,000 in australia every year), drugged, pushed to their extreme and then killed at very young ages for no reason other than not being champions.
