The Attorney General recently referred your request for information in relation to the Committee's inquiry into community based sentencing options for remote areas and disadvantaged populations.

Thank you for the opportunity to contribute to the Committee's inquiry.

The NSW Attorney General's Department funds and administers a number of programs in the locations that you have specified. Details of these programs are provided in the attached table in the format that has been requested.

In regard to these programs I can advise that the Department administers the Circle Sentencing programs, currently in Brewarrina and shortly to commence in Bourke, directly employing an Aboriginal Project Officer within the Local Court to run the program in that community. The Crime Prevention Division through local auspice agencies funds Aboriginal Community Justice Groups and Aboriginal Community Patrols in a number of rural communities.
