Proposed Merger between Ku-ring-gai Council and Hornsby Council

 $\boldsymbol{\mathrm{I}}$ wisah to state my strong objection to the above merger for the following reasons:

- 1. the substantial increase in rates for Ku-ring-gai ratepayers due to the much higher land values in Ku-ring-gai compared to those in Hoernshy. This may cause a great deal of hardship to some residents. Ku-ring-gai has a large number of older people, many of whom may not receive an old age pension but do not have a great deal of money. Younger people with a mortgage may also be affected.

In summary: this would hardly be a fair merger with all the advantages going to Hornsby and all the disadvantages for Ku-ring-gai.

I zm also strongly opposed to forced council mergers. This was hardly an issue at the last State Election and there is no way that Premier Baird could claim a mandate for forced council mergers.
