Workers Compensation Reform

Wages and the related workers' compensation costs represent a significant input to the provision of quality care.

As organisations that receive Federal funding, we are acutely aware of the already uncompetitive nature of NSW workers' compensation premiums. This already being the case, an increase in premiums of 28% to 35% would further reduce the resources to provide quality care.

We strongly advocate the proposed changes to NSW workers' compensation legislation as outlined in the Issues Paper. Without these changes we consider the already uncompetitive nature of NSW workers' compensation premiums will continue to deteriorate.
