## INQUIRY INTO EDUCATION AMENDMENT (ETHICS CLASSES REPEAL) BILL 2011

## FACTS AT PUBLIC SCHOOL

I have been involved with advocating for lessons in ethics as an option for children who opt out of SRE since early 2010 through my involvement with the Public School P&C. In early 2010 the P&C carried out an online survey of Public School parents and of 109 responses 84% said they would enrol their children in ethics classes. This result led the P&C to pass a motion in favour of ethics classes at on 18 May 2010.

In January 2011 I was engaged by Primary Ethics to recruit teachers and coordinate ethics classes at Public School. Since February 2011 ethics has been an option for Years 5 and 6. Last year 21 children enrolled in ethics. It was very successful and has the full support of our Principal

In 2012 the total school roll at Public School is 616 and 162 of those students are non-scripture students - 26%. This year 30 Year 5 and 6 children are enrolled in two ethics classes.

The classes are taught by two highly capable and dedicated voluntary teachers who have completed a rigorous screening and training process.

In Term 3 I have plans to start two more classes for Years 3 and 4. I have already recruited two more volunteers to teach them. Then at last I will have a choice for my daughter in Year 4 on Wednesday mornings.

## RECOMMENDATION FOR ACTION

I recommend that the Education Amendment (Ethics) Act 2010 should not be repealed. The provision of ethics classes is a long overdue initiative which is providing a worthwhile grounding in ethical reasoning and debate for many students who have opted out of SRE. Our society can only benefit from this.
