(even better than lots of other families) But when it comes to legislation we need to thikn bigger than an indivual story. On the whole, children in same sex couples would be disadvantaged, and their rights minimised in favour of adults. Individual stories you will hear of same sex couples will always present a more rosy picture. But we need to look beyond individuals and to society as a whole and in particular children. Legislation should always seek to defend those who cannot fight for themselves.

In making a change like this the is also an unknown element to be considered. Some research has been presented to show that on the whole children are not disadvantaged in same sex relationships. In evaluating hte validity of this research though one thing has not been considered - the candidates at the moment able to acquire children - given the hurdles - will be highly motivated and resourced - ie it is a skewed sample to people more likely to succeed in parenting compared to the average population. If marriage is redefined, and hurdles are removed the case these skewing factors will be removed. When comparing like with like, a mother and father will always have significant advantages to bring up their children.
