"AUSTRALIA is heading for extinction. The world's driest habitable continent, already groaning under the weight of its existing population, is exhausting its soils and may well go the way of Easter Island-where civilisation descended into anarchy and eventually collapsed. That is the prognosis of several prominent scientists speaking at the ANZAAS meeting in Canberra last week. According to Barney Foran, of the Division of Wildlife and Ecology of the CSIRO, Australia's national research organisation, the current population of 18-3 million is already close to consuming all the continent's lifesustaining resources. "Australia is very, very short of good soils. We're an old weathered continent", says Foran"

"Productive volcanic soils are invariably highly paramagnetic. This phenomenon is characterised by the capacity of these soils to intercept electromagnetic energy (usually derived from lightening) and to store, transform and transmit this energy to surrounding plants and micro-organisms."
