## INQUIRY INTO SAME SEX MARRIAGE LAW IN NSW

I am a wife, mother, grandmother and secondary teacher who cares about the rights of men, women and children. As an educated professional, I do not like to see grand changes to the rights of any people in our society. I do not feel that we have the right to change such a tradition. Who are we to say that marriage can be between members of the same sex, when throughout the centuries, marriage has been for relationships involving members of the opposite sexes.
