As a pharmacist, it is our responsibility to assist in the treatment of those who are ill and not impede their treatment. Pharmacists have a responsibility to assist the ill to the best of their ability.

Pharmacists have a duty' to review the medical and scientific literature and evidence available.

- Before any agreement to support the introduction of marijuana to treat the sick, it must be agreed that the substance is relatively safe and <u>superior</u> to any <u>other</u> <u>treatment</u>, in use. If this drug cannot pass this test, it cannot be supported, nor should it be.
- Any supporters who promote the use of so-called medical marijuana should have knowledge of the pharmacological and physiological properties of the drug. They must have knowledge of the health and community implications and issues concerning cannabis. They must have some knowledge of other medical treatments, so they can be compared to marijuana. A committee should not and cannot make recommendations on health matters, otherwise it fails in its responsibility. Only then can they recommend to an Expert Advisory Group on their findings.
- In the case of cannabis the committee must be aware of any detrimental effects of cannabis can have on the user.

• The committee will, of course, be aware of the pro-potlobby, who are driving this move to de-regulate this drug.
