THOMPSONS SQUARE: VALUABLE HERITAGE

Thompson Square was named after Jack Thompson, one of the very first convicts who managed to carve himself out a successful career. Gov. Macquarie named the square in Thompson's honour after he died saving people in one of the region's infamous floods. Thompson personifies the Australian spirit of working hard to succeed, and helping others along the way. To lose this important and valuable area would be to devalue this vital Aussie value.
