Over the course of the last few years, these events have been pushed further out of the city and the control of industry. This includes both festivals and venues.

The Sydney music scene has not died, but has gotten small and often illegal. Your regular promotor cannot afford to host big names, nor can they afford to host their events within the city limits. The arts scene of Sydney is incredibly creative and it will stay alive, but no one is benefitting. Particularly the Sydney economy and arts industries. When shows are being hosted in parks and warehouses without permits, and everyone brings their own alcohol, Sydney does not benefit and the punters are in risk of their health and safety.
