I, like most Australians, was raised with values of fairness, justice and helping those in need. In my life, I have worked to live up to those values and have believed along the way that the law-making entities and the government that represents me would do the same.

The proposed 'right to farm' bill in its current form would be a disgraceful aberration from these values. Not only would we be accepting that corporate interests are more important than the public's right to peacefully protest, but we would also be accepting that protecting corporate interests is more important than protecting innocent and intelligent animals from unnecessary suffering.
