SCCI has benefitted from a presenting partnership with Sydney Living Museums to showcase international guest speaker talent to a broad and diverse audience across multiple venues. Within the last 18 months of our partnership, specifically under the consolidated leadership of Adam Lindsay, the SARA has enjoyed increased exposure in the public sphere, capitalising on the digital and physical exposure developed by SLM.
