On behalf of myself and my family, I would like you to consider alternatives to the planned Beaches Link as it is not what the community wants.

We need an alternative way for Northern Beaches residents so they can avoid the Spit Bridge and Military Rd, but another hugely expensive toll road isn't really addressing the problem.
