- It helps the trees near the river bank grow. Our environment is important to protect. We must protect our river because without it we won't know how to protect the animals, who also need drinking water. Our kangaroos, emus and goannas need the water to survive.
- To not be able to go swimming, fishing and yabbying on our country would be devastating.
- The water also affects our drinking and cleaning water.
- The Baaka is dying. Our culture and people are dying. The off stream billabongs, their flora and fauna are dying, all due to the excessive upstream lake. This is unfair.

It us unfair that Australians are not realizing that our small community is fighting for our river and our animals to survive. The Government needs to listen to our voice, it may be small but it is loud. As the next generation, people must understand that is not just our elders who feel the connection to the river, but our youth as well. When the river is up, we have things to do. When there is no water, our young people have nothing to do, and that is when young people turn to things like crime.
