RSPCA NSW provides the following to the Committee in respect of our enforcement and compliance function. It should be read in conjunction with the 2021 Annual Report and Financial Report.

Introduction

RSPCA NSW welcomes the opportunity to provide the Committee with information regarding the enforcement and compliance function we perform pursuant to the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1979* (NSW) (hereafter POCTAA).

RSPCA NSW is a community based, not-for-profit animal welfare charity that cares for, treats, protects and rehomes animals across NSW. For nearly 150 years, RSPCA NSW has actively sought to prevent cruelty to animals by advocating for their welfare and actively promoting their protection and care. RSPCA NSW has performed a statutory role in enforcing animal cruelty legislation since 1928.

Every year, RSPCA NSW:

- Receives over 15,000 reports of animal cruelty or neglect from the community, each of which
 are investigated and addressed, through a range of responses, from education or support for
 the animal owner, to written directions, penalty infringement notices or prosecution for
 offences under the Act;
- Treats, shelters and re-homes many thousands of animals which are abandoned, surrendered, or seized by its Inspectors;
- Supports the community in NSW in relation to animal welfare through a range of programs
 which include providing education in schools and through community organisations and direct
 support to the aged, victims of domestic violence, the homeless and indigenous communities;
 and
- Provides animal welfare assistance during periods of natural disaster, including drought, bushfires and floods.

RSPCA NSW believes that, as an organisation with long experience, a team of specialised and experienced inspectors and volunteers, as well as an existing, integrated network of vets, animal shelters and education and community outreach programs, all directed solely to the prevention of cruelty to animals, RSPCA NSW is ready, willing and able to effectively and efficiently investigate animal cruelty complaints and enforce animal protection laws in NSW, having done so successfully for over 90 years.

The following submission has been complied to provide the members of Portfolio Committee No. 4 an overview of how the RSPCA NSW exercises its' compliance and enforcement functions under POCTAA.

1. Complaints relating to animal cruelty or mistreatment received by the organisation:

Between 1 July 2020 and 30 June 2021, RSPCA NSW received a total of 15,114 complaints alleging cruelty to animals contrary to the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1979 (NSW)* (hereafter the Act). These complaints often involved more than one animal and multiple complaint types.

2. Visits or investigations made by officers of the organisation as a result of complaints:

Of the 15,114 complaints received, RSPCA NSW investigated 13,838 complaints (an average of 53.2 jobs per day). The investigation of these complaints involved 13,838 initial inspections and a further 3,890 revisits (average of 14.9 jobs per day). Revisits were generally conducted to inspect subject animals and assess compliance with either written or verbal directions.

Of the 15,114 complaints received, RSPCA NSW referred a total of 151 (1%) to NSW Police Force for investigation in the first instance. The referrals were made based on the urgent nature of the animal welfare concern and proximity of the nearest RSPCA Inspector. In relation to the complaints attended by NSW Police a proportion were returned to the RSPCA for revisit or follow up inspection.

RSPCA NSW referred 3 complaints to the Animal Welfare League NSW during 2020-2021.

RSPCA NSW referred a total of 51 complaints to other agencies as the allegation fell outside the jurisdiction of RSPCA NSW.

401 complaints were logged for intelligence purposes only as there was information alleging one or more offence within RSPCA NSW jurisdiction but insufficient information to determine or identify a person of interest.

3. Number of visits or investigations made by officers of the organisation that were unrelated to those complaints (such as routine inspections of abattoirs, veterinary practices, pet shops or saleyards):

RSPCA NSW's animal management database does not have the capacity to distinguish between cruelty complaints and 'routine' (proactive) inspections conducted on animal trades under the provisions of Section 24G of the Act.

Data is captured separately to record the number of 'routine' inspections conducted by the RSPCA NSW Inspectorate. A summary of the 201 'routine' inspections conducted during 2020/2021 is tabled below.

Please note that the capacity to conduct 'routine' inspections is dependent on available resources with investigation of animal cruelty complaints taking priority. During the reporting period the impact

of COVID-19 public health regulations restricted Inspectorate capacity to enter facilities other than in respect of a cruelty complaint.

4. Counselling and advice provided by officers of the organisation:

RSPCA NSW provides counselling and advice or educational material to many of the individuals with whom they come in contact via a logged complaint. These specific details could only be obtained by reviewing the visit reports associated with each of the 13,838 logged complaints. In practice the RSPCA Inspectors provide verbal advice in one form or another as part of the investigation of the majority of complaints. In addition, Inspectors regularly provide educational materials to animal trade operators in the form of NSW DPI resources, printed copies of relevant Codes of Practice, and verbal guidance in respect of animal welfare.

5. Number of persons cautioned by officers of the organisation:

Official Cautions issued by the RSPCA NSW in accordance with the *Fines Act 1996 (NSW)* are issued by the Chief Inspector or Deputy Chief Inspector. During the reporting period 15 Official Cautions were issued by RSPCA NSW.

6. Notices issued by officers of the organisation under Section 24N of the Act:

During the reporting period a total of 527 Written Directions were issued pursuant to Section 24N of the Act during the period 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021.

7. Penalty notices issued by officers of the organisation:

RSPCA NSW issued a total of 109 Penalty Infringement Notices during the period 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021.

8. Proceedings for offences under the Act or the regulations that were instituted by officers of the organisation:

RSPCA NSW initiated 104 criminal prosecutions during the period 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021. A total of 104 defendants were charged with 541 offences, involving 1582 animals.

9. Outcome of such of those proceedings as had been finally determined as at the date of the report:

Of the 104 prosecutions initiated between 1 July 2020 and 30 June 2021 the following outcomes were recorded as at 30 June 2021:

- 50 prosecutions had been finalised; and
- 56 prosecutions were still to be finalised.

Of the 50 prosecutions finalised - 32 defendants pleaded guilty, 1 defendant pleaded not guilty, 9 matters were dealt with ex-parte, 4 matters were withdrawn, 2 matters were finalised following a District Court appeal, 1 matter was dealt with under Section 32 of the *Mental Health (Forensic Provisions) Act 1999 (NSW)* and 1 matter was dismissed.

10. Outcome of such proceedings for offences as were referred to in the immediately previous report but not finally determined as at the date of that report:

Prosecutions can take several years to finalise. Of those finalised during the reporting period 2020/2021, 49 matters from previous financial years were concluded:

- Initiated in 2014/2015 1 x matters finalised
- Initiated in 2015/2016 2 x matters finalised
- Initiated in 2018/2019 3 x matters finalised
- Initiated in 2019/2020 43 x matters finalised

The following numbers of cases were still before the Courts as at 30 June 2021:

- Initiated in 2017/2018 1 x Appeal by RSPCA NSW, 1 Local Court Matter
- Initiated in 2019/2020 9 x Local Court matters
- Initiated in 2020/2021 53 x Local Court matters, 2 x Severity Appeal matters, 1 x Section 32 Application

11. Officers of the organisation:

As at 30 June 2021 the RSPCA NSW had a total of 38 authorised officers. Of the 38 Inspectors, all are holders of Prescribed Authorities issued by the Minister for Primary Industries.

12. Training provided by the organisation for its officers:

The following table details the training provided by the RSPCA NSW for its officers in the period from 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021. Due to COVID-19, office training was significantly reduced during the reporting period.

We have served the animals and their people in NSW for nearly 150 years, and we look forward to continuing the work of preventing animal cruelty and promoting animal welfare, which is our reason for existence.





You've launched the taskforce

At a puppy factory, profits come first. That means the welfare of the dogs in these intensive breeding facilities is not a priority—with animals going without even their most basic needs.

With your support, we are determined to put an end to the dark and often hidden world of illegal breeding. We have launched an 'Intensive Breeding Taskforce' specifically dedicated to finding, inspecting and, if necessary, removing animals from poor conditions and charging non-compliant breeders.

We've identified nearly 900 breeding facilities across the state and aim to inspect each to ensure compliance with all laws and codes of practice.

Calls to RSPCA NSW for help doubled over the last year, during COVID-19 lockdowns and isolation, as people found themselves trapped at home with their abusers.

Cassie and her family needed to flee to safety, and they weren't going to leave without Daisy and Gidget—but no refuge could take the dogs. Because of your support, we could welcome Daisy and Gidget into our care whilst Cassie figured out their living situation. 
