



DOLOTACTILE SIGNAGE PROPOSAL



PROPOSAL RELATES TO AS 1428.1 & NCC D3.6



D3.6 Signage

In a building <u>required</u> to be <u>accessible</u>—

a)

braille and tactile signage complying with Specification D3.6 must—

- (i) incorporate the international symbol of access or deafness, as appropriate, in accordance with AS 1428.1 and identify each—
- (A) sanitary facility, except a sanitary facility associated with a bedroom in a Class 1b building or a <u>sole-occupancy unit</u> in a Class 3 or Class 9c building; and
- (B) space with a hearing augmentation system; and
- (ii) identify each door required by E4.5 to be provided with an exit sign and state—
- (A) "Exit"; and
- (B) "Level"; and either
 - (aa) the floor level number; or
 - (bb) a floor level descriptor; or
 - (cc) a combination of (aa) and (bb); and

signage including the international symbol for deafness in accordance with AS 1428.1 must be provided within a room containing a hearing augmentation system identifying—

- (i) the type of hearing augmentation; and
- (ii) the area covered within the room; and
- (iii) if receivers are being used and where the receivers can be obtained; and
- (

signage in accordance with AS 1428.1 must be provided for <u>accessible</u> unisex sanitary facilities to identify if the facility is suitable for left or right handed use; and

(d)

signage to identify an ambulant accessible sanitary facility in accordance with AS 1428.1 must be located on the door of the facility; and

(e)

where a pedestrian entrance is not <u>accessible</u>, directional signage incorporating the international symbol of access, in accordance with AS 1428.1 must be provided to direct a person to the location of the nearest <u>accessible</u> pedestrian entrance; and

(f)

where a bank of sanitary facilities is not provided with an <u>accessible</u> unisex sanitary facility, directional signage incorporating the international symbol of access in accordance with AS 1428.1 must be placed at the location of the sanitary facilities that are not <u>accessible</u>, to direct a person to the location of the nearest <u>accessible</u> unisex sanitary facility; and

(g)

in a building subject to F2.9, directional signage complying with Specification D3.6 must be provided at the location of each—

(i) bank of sanitary facilities; and

(ii) <u>accessible</u> unisex sanitary facility, other than one that incorporates an <u>accessible</u> adult change facility,

to direct a person to the location of the nearest <u>accessible</u> adult change facility within that building.



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Inclusive Bathroom Signage Recommendations

While the increase in adults identifying as LGBTQ+ grows, there continues to be risk in the disclosure of membership in the LGBTQ+ community. Discrimination and violence against the LGBTQ+ community persists despite some progress.

According to the Human Rights Campaign, 21 states prohibit discrimination in housing and employment based on both sexual orientation and gender identity. Additionally, 18 states address hate or bias crimes based on sexual orientation and gender identity.⁸

The FBI's 2016 hate crime statistics showed an increase in violence against the LGBTQ+ community. According to data voluntarily reported to the FBI by various law enforcement agencies across the country, 6,121 hate crime incidents against the LGBTQ+ community occurred in 2016. Analysis from the Human Rights Campaign showed this represents an increase of 5% from 2015.

Case studies

Several state agencies have changed or are in the process of changing bathroom signage. Their experience may provide insight on the process, outcomes, barriers and concerns that arose during their transition to gender-inclusive signage.

Office of Financial Management, State Human Resources

The assistant director of State Human Resources decided to update signage at the State HR offices housed in OFM. This decision was based on recommendations made during a presentation covering basic LGBTQ+ vocabulary and other LGBTQ+ resources on Gov. Inslee's Directive 16-11.

Proposal: The original proposal consisted of five recommendations; two were specific to restroom signage:

- · To add gender-affirming signs to multi-stall restrooms.
- · To remove gender-restricting signs from single use showers and restrooms.

Steps taken: Educational materials were provided to employees at a regular staff meeting. Leadership reaffirmed that the changes aligned with the values of the organization, including OFM as an employer of choice and as a respectful, diverse and inclusive employer. Employees were encouraged to reach out to the Employee Assistance Program, OFM, State HR or management with questions or concerns.

To date: Single occupancy individual shower restrooms were designated as gender nonrestrictive. All multi-stall restrooms have gender affirming signage that reads "You are welcome to use the restroom that best aligns with your gender identity."







Department of Health

A Department of Health work group recently proposed to its leadership updating signage of bathrooms to address feelings of safety and dis/comfort when using restrooms. 12

The proposed change was designed over four stages, with a recommendation that all stages be implemented over a period of time determined by leadership and to schedule six-month assessments on progress by the work group.

Proposed language/look for signs:

Stages proposed:

Stage 1: Add gender-neutral signage on all single-stall bathrooms.

· Image of a shower, toilet and urinal

· Gender neutral figures

Stage 2: Add gender-neutral language to signage on all bathrooms.

Stage 3: Convert bathrooms that have stalls and no showers to gender neutral.

PROPOSED CHANGES

- 'All Gender' instead of 'Unisex'
- International Symbol of Access updated to the more inclusive version
- Additional sign to say

'You are welcome to use the restroom that best fits your gender identity or expression'.
