Attachment 1

Undertake the following reforms:

- Provide \$2 million to animal welfare agencies from 2019-20 over the forward estimates to support specialist on the ground puppy farm inspectors and on-line monitoring of sales. This would be provided as fixed grants of \$666,000 in each of 2019-20 and 2020-21, and \$667,000 in 2021-22.
- Allocate \$500,000 in 2019-20 in departmental funding to develop a licensing system for breeders and sellers of companion animals, in consultation with industry and other stakeholders. Labor commits to implement the system once developed, but implementation would require a subsequent decision of government informed by the policy development process that is funded under the present policy being costed.
- Allocate \$500,000 in 2019-20 and \$200,000 in each of 2020-21 and 2021-22 to enhance tracking through a more stringent breeder ID system at point of sale.
- Crackdown on puppy farms by:
 - Working with industry stakeholders and veterinarians to establishing restrictions on the numbers of breeding dogs according to size (absorb within existing resources);
 - Limiting the amount of litters in a breeding dog's lifetime to one litter a year and no more than five litters in a lifetime (nil budget impact);
 - Enhanced powers to local councils and animal welfare agencies to shutdown illegal puppy farms and remove animals (nil budget impact).
- Work with the NSW pet industry to explore innovative ways to use the pet shop network to rehome unwanted companion animals (absorb within existing resources).
- Undertake a Parliamentary review of the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1979*, with a focus on more proactive measures to seek to prevent animal cruelty, including assist authorised officers to seize animals from a domestic animal breeding establishment (absorb within existing resources).
- Update and strengthen the Code of Practice around boarding kennels and catteries (nil impact).
- Phase in mandatory TAFE Certificate 2 training for those employed in pet industry by the end of the first term of government (nil impact except for gradual second round effects).
- Mandate CCTV in all abattoirs (nil impact).
- Combat native wildlife crime by:
 - establishing Native Wildlife Protection Squad (from existing resources of Office of Environment and Heritage, Fisheries, and Police)
 - make native wildlife crime a reportable crime (nil impact)
 - increase penalties for native wildlife crime (assume nil impact)
 - establish state-wide database (allocate \$1 million in capped funding to support the delivery of a state-wide database on reportable wildlife crime).
