1. Establish a dedicated Sydney Marine Park to protect the jewel in Sydney's crown, the world renowned Sydney Harbour;

Assumptions

- Labor is committed to establishing a Sydney Harbour Marine Park. The policy being costed would fund a policy development process to inform the determination of marine park status in government.
- The policy would provide fixed amounts (inclusive of indexation) to support as follows:

- The final determination of the marine park status (including appropriate zonings) would be subject to a further policy decision in government on the basis of the research and policy development process funded by the policy being costed.
- The Sydney Marine Park component of this costing is approximately consistent with the PBO's Sydney Marine Park costing at the 2015 NSW Election (A343, published 23 March 2015). One change is the removal of \$903,000 for a substantial scientific investigation of marine health due to work since undertaken through the Hawkesbury Shelf Marine Bioregion Assessment.
- 2. Undertake overdue reviews of marine park management rules and management plans where the Government has failed to adhere to 10-year reviews required under legislation, beginning with Port Stephens-Great Lakes Marine Park;
- 3. Prioritise protection of breeding areas such as the islands, headlands and beaches where seabirds nest and raise their young;
- 4. Ask the NSW Threatened Species Scientific Committee to consider the addition of the hawksbill sea turtle to the State's Threatened Species List, to give this rare and beautiful creature the protection it deserves;
- 5. Within the first one hundred days, introduce legislation to ban single-use plastic bags; and
- 6. Develop a single-use plastic phase out plan for NSW.
