Notes and costing assumptions

This policy proposes to allocate \$3.7 million for grants to the McGrath Foundation to support the recruitment of up to six additional Breast Care nurses, as well as funding for professional development of existing nurses.

Professional development

The policy also proposes to allocate \$100,000 per annum, not indexed, to the McGrath Foundation over three years from 1 July 2019 for professional development. The policy states that these costs will be met from within the existing resources of NSW Health, so there is no budget impact.

Breast Care nurses

The policy proposes to allocate funding to the McGrath Foundation for an additional six Breast Care nurse fulltime equivalents (FTEs) per annum over four years, from 1 July 2019. These nursing costs are based on a Clinical Nurse Consultant Year 2 position, which costs \$137,914 per FTE per annum (inclusive of on-costs and leave loading). This cost is escalated by 2.5% per annum over the forward estimates, based on the NSW Public Sector Wages Policy.

The PBO estimates the cost to be \$2.6 million over the forward estimates, and \$900,000 in 2022-23. However, funding for the additional nurses is excluded from this costing, as it will be delivered under a separate *5,000 Nurses and Midwives* policy. As the McGrath Foundation is a private, charitable organisation, the PBO has assumed, in both this costing and the *5,000 Nurses and Midwives* policy, that the funding for both the nurses and professional development will be paid as a capped grant from NSW Health.
