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Notes and costing assumptions

The policy proposes to spend \$13 million from 2019-20 to 2022-23 on water infrastructure in the Great Artesian Basin to enhance water supply.

The policy proposes to source the \$13 million from existing government drought support allocated to 2018-19. Table 1 shows the policy impact by financial year.

The policy in aggregate produces a \$4.5 million saving over the forward estimates because \$4.5 million of expenditure occurs in 2022-23 (outside the forward estimates).

Information provided by NSW Treasury indicates \$190 million has been allocated in the current budget to the end of 2018-19 for the Drought Transport Subsidy program. The program provides up to \$40,000 over 18 months from 1 January 2018 to 30 June 2019 to eligible farm businesses to assist in transporting fodder, water and stock. The program is currently forecast to spend \$118 million to the end of 2018-19, an estimated underspend of \$72 million. NSW Treasury has advised that some of this forecast underspend could be reallocated to fund the \$13 million policy.

The government may need to seek additional funding if it proposes to continue providing the drought transport subsidy in 2019-20, or if demand for the subsidy in the final months of 2018-19 is significantly higher than forecast.
