What is the NSW PBO?

- Re-established every four years in the lead up to the NSW State election
- The PBO publishes the costs of election promises made by the Government and Opposition prior to the election
- This allows voters to know the impact of the promises on NSW finances



Legislative Foundation

Parliamentary Budget Officer Act 2010

- Established the Parliamentary Budget Officer as an independent Officer of the Parliament to provide costings of election promises
- NSW was the first Australian jurisdiction to have a PBO (followed by Commonwealth in 2012 and Victoria in 2017)
- NSW in unique amongst Australian PBOs as it publishes the costs of policies before the election



What does the PBO do?

- Costs 'announced or proposed' election policies for the Premier and Leader of the Opposition
- Does not cost policies for minor parties, independents,
 Ministers or Shadow Ministers
- Applies the same approach to costings to both the Premier and Leader of the Opposition



PBO and Parliamentary Leaders

- The PBO Act requires Parliamentary leaders to have all election policies costed (s18)
- Each leader nominates a representative to liaise with the PBO on their behalf
- Once a leader <u>notifies</u> the PBO of an election policy being announced, the PBO will publicly release that costing request and its costing



What is a costing?

- The best estimate of the impact of a policy on the forward estimates
- Considers expenses, revenues and capital
- Reports on the impact on the budget and total state finances
- Outlines all of the assumptions needed to calculate the costs of a policy



How does the PBO cost a policy?

- Calculates the likely cost over the current and forward estimates years: 2022-23, 2023-24, 2024-25 and 2025-26
- Uses the latest Treasury update as the baseline
- The costing estimates how much the policy <u>changes</u> the budget via either spending or savings
- The PBO can also obtain information from government agencies to assist with costing a policy
- The PBO has a small team of staff seconded from the NSW Parliament and various government agencies



Assumptions

- Costings can vary enormously depending on the assumptions behind the policy concerned
- Assumptions are set by the parliamentary leaders
- As a general rule, the PBO will accept the assumptions used by the leader for their policy, unless there is an error, or the assumption is clearly unrealistic
- The PBO uses Treasury's forecasts for factors like inflation, economic growth and population that will impact on future costs of policies



Risks and uncertainties

- Many costings are uncertain or subject to risks.
 For example:
 - How many people will take up a new benefit
 - Timing for completion of a major project
 - Future building costs
- The PBO cannot predict the future
- We make the best point in time estimate we are able to and note any risk and uncertainty in the costing notes



Confidentiality

- By law, PBO and Agency staff are required to keep information highly confidential
- Penalties apply for unauthorised disclosure
- Ensuring confidentiality of policy costings is essential to politicians' trusting the public service
- This also allows the parties to consider different options and select the most cost effective
- Discarded options will remain confidential forever



Budget Impact Statements

- Are published 5 days before the election
- Provide the total budget and financial impact of the Government and Opposition policies
- The starting point will be the *Pre-election Budget Update* issued by Treasury



PBO and the media

- All PBO procedures are published on our <u>website</u>
- Work in-progress on costings is completely confidential and never discussed
- Once a costing is published, it will be self-explanatory
 - All the workings used to calculate the costs are provided
 - The PBO can be contacted if anything is unclear
 - The PBO will <u>not</u> comment about the merits of the policy
- The PBO may issue a public statement in the case of public misrepresentation about the PBO's role and/or costings
