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#### **ABOUT THIS BUDGET PAPER**

#### Purpose and scope

Budget Paper No. 3 *Infrastructure Statement* provides information on the Government's infrastructure investment program. The objectives of this budget paper are to:

- present a clear report on the State's planned capital program covering new works and works in progress
- explain how resources have been allocated in the current budget and over the forward estimates for both the general government and public non-financial corporation sectors
- explain how infrastructure investment supports the Government's priorities and service delivery objectives, including the underlying policies and strategies.

This Budget Paper includes the infrastructure investment of agencies that are material to the general government and public non-financial corporation sectors. Budget Paper No. 1 *Budget Statement*, includes an overview of agency classifications by sector. A more detailed glossary is included in *How to Read the Budget Papers*.

#### 1. OVERVIEW

The 2023-24 Budget provides for a \$116.5 billion investment in public infrastructure over four years to deliver new schools, hospitals and transport projects, and catalyse housing supply.

The infrastructure program has been targeted toward essential services through the Essential Infrastructure Plan, with additional funding for new schools, hospitals, transport and clean energy projects across the State. The Essential Infrastructure plan is being delivered without privatising any public assets.

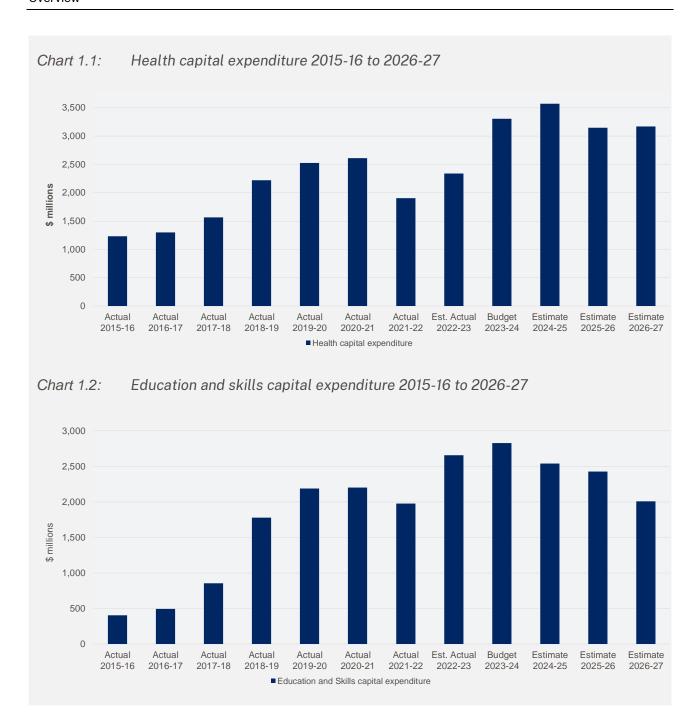
The 2023-24 Budget balances what is fair and responsible with meeting the needs of growing communities to achieve this critical infrastructure investment. Key recommendations from the Strategic Infrastructure Review are being implemented to stabilise the infrastructure program and support a renewed focus on infrastructure that supports essential services.

The Government is directing much needed funding towards essential schools and hospitals. This is demonstrated through a new \$1.4 billion investment over four years to support the planning and delivery of 34 new and upgraded schools and over \$1.4 billion over four years in new funding for hospitals and health facilities.

There is also a strong focus on regional NSW with a \$3.8 billion investment over four years in regional health facilities and a \$1.4 billion investment over four years in regional schools. In addition, over 30 per cent of new Restart NSW reservations will be spent on projects and programs in the regions.

The Government's infrastructure program is the beginning of a new era of responsible long-term investment to rebuild essential services that support quality of life for all people in New South Wales.

#### 1.1 The Essential Infrastructure Plan

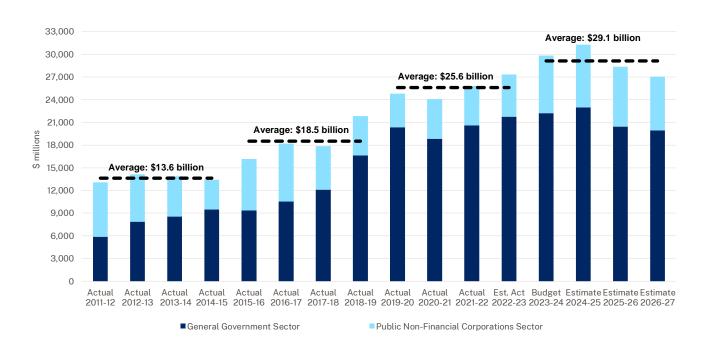
The 2023-24 Budget includes new funding to rebuild essential services and catalyse new housing supply through the Essential Infrastructure Plan. By balancing what is fair and sustainable, this Budget delivers a significant investment in schools, hospitals, and other infrastructure without privatising public assets.

A sustained high level of infrastructure investment across the country is presenting challenges to both project deliverability and affordability. Local and global supply constraints for key materials, including timber, metals and steel, alongside high freight costs and skilled trade shortages means more competition for these scarce resources, driving cost escalation. A rise in the number of large and complex megaprojects is also challenging the construction sectors capacity to deliver.

In acknowledging these challenges, the Government has rebalanced the infrastructure program. Funding for new projects has been partially offset through deferring lower priority projects and programs, based on the advice of the independent Strategic Infrastructure Review.

The Budget includes \$116.5 billion in capital expenditure over the four years to 2026-27 for essential infrastructure projects. The average estimated infrastructure investment of \$29.1 billion per annum over four years is 13.8 per cent higher than the average four-year investment of \$25.6 billion across the four years 2019-20 to 2022-23. Chart 1.3 shows the projected growth in the State's capital program from 2011-12 to 2026-27.





#### Box 1.1: Health and Education infrastructure commitments

The 2023-24 Budget includes new funding to deliver on the Government's commitment to new and upgraded schools and hospitals that are the foundation of our vital education and health services.

By redirecting funds from low priorities, the 2023-24 Budget increases the four year infrastructure investment on hospitals and health facilities by 15.6 per cent and education facilities by 6.6 per cent compared to the four year forecast announced in the 2022-23 Budget<sup>2</sup>.

New funding has been allocated for hospitals and health facilities including:

- more than doubling the funding for the new Rouse Hill Hospital, from \$300.0 million to \$700.0 million, to expand the facility and include an Emergency Department, maternity and women's health services and a day surgery unit
- \$550.0 million for the Fairfield Hospital Redevelopment to deliver more medical and rehabilitation beds and increase the capacity of emergency and critical care services
- \$538.0 million for a major redevelopment of Albury Wodonga Regional Hospital to improve patient safety and increase the capability and responsiveness of the health service to meet future health needs
- \$350.0 million for the Canterbury Hospital Redevelopment to ensure the facility is able to respond to the health needs of the growing local community
- \$120.0 million for an expansion of Blacktown and Mount Druitt Hospitals to increase bed capacity.

\$1.4 billion in new funding over four years has also been allocated to support the planning and delivery of 34 new and upgraded schools. This investment will target the replacement of demountables and meet the needs of growing communities by providing additional classrooms. Projects being delivered include:

- a new primary school will be built near Sydney Olympic Park and planning will commence for three new primary schools at Huntlee, West Dapto and Calderwood
- new high schools at Medowie, Googong, Jordan Springs, Melrose Park and Gledswood/Gregory Hills
- upgrades to Northmead Public School, The Ponds High School, Kingswood Public School, Katoomba High School, Jerrabomberra High School and Eagle Vale High School.

This significant health and education investment is the foundation of the Government's plan to rebuild essential services.

Significant projects continuing or commencing delivery as part of the 2023-24 Budget are detailed below.<sup>3:</sup>

#### \$72.3 billion for transport and infrastructure, including:

- \$13.7 billion over four years for Sydney Metro West<sup>4</sup>
- \$7.9 billion over four years for Sydney Metro Western Sydney Airport<sup>4</sup>
- \$4.7 billion over four years for the Western Harbour Tunnel Upgrade
- \$3.3 billion over four years for Sydney Metro City and Southwest<sup>4</sup>
- \$3.0 billion over four years for Connecting Sydney Roads
- \$532.7 million over four years for the Newell Corridor Upgrade
- \$46.6 million over four years for the Regional Roads Fund (as part of a total \$334.0 million investment)
- \$43.0 million over four years for Parramatta Class ferries.

## \$13.8 billion for health infrastructure<sup>5</sup> to plan and deliver new and upgraded hospital builds, including:

- \$1.3 billion for the new Bankstown Hospital
- \$1.0 billion for the Nepean Hospital and Integrated Ambulatory Services Stage 1 and 2
- \$740.0 million for the Liverpool Health and Academic Precinct
- \$669.8 million for the Statewide Mental Health Infrastructure Program
- \$438.0 million for the Shoalhaven Hospital Redevelopment.

#### \$9.8 billion for education and skills infrastructure, including:

\$767.1 million for four new primary schools and 10 new high schools.

#### \$3.6 billion to support the clean energy transition, including:

- \$3.5 billion over four years for the Transmission Acceleration Facility
- \$1.0 billion reserved in Restart NSW for the Energy Security Corporation
- \$95.5 million over four years for Zero and Low Emission Vehicle Reform.

#### Investment in social housing and enabling infrastructure, including:

 \$610.1 million for an increase of around 1,500 permanent social housing dwellings as part of the Australian Government funded Social Housing Accelerator Agreement

The estimated total cost (ETC) of projects identified in this chapter may include prior year expenditure and expenditure beyond the budget and forward estimates.

Sydney Metro projects that are in delivery are being reviewed through the Sydney Metro Review. For further information see Box 1.4.

#### Box 1.2: Aligning housing and infrastructure delivery

Housing affordability and availability is the biggest single pressure facing the people of New South Wales, with mortgage payments and rent the largest expense for most households.

New South Wales is experiencing an unprecedented housing crisis, driven by higher interest rates, escalating rental costs and an insufficient supply of social and affordable housing.

Between the start of 2020 and May 2023, dwelling prices have grown 27.6 per cent in Greater Sydney, 33.2 per cent in Western Sydney, and 47.6 per cent in the Regions. In comparison, median rents have grown by 18.9 per cent in Greater Sydney, 21.8 per cent in Western Sydney, and 34.6 per cent in the Regions.

Infrastructure is a key enabler of increased housing supply, with timely provision critical to supporting housing delivery and creating communities that meet the needs of residents for years to come.

The Government is committed to increasing housing supply to support the State's growing population and to help alleviate the housing affordability crisis.

In its first two months, the Government introduced the new Housing and Productivity Contribution (the HAP) to support housing and productivity in key growth areas of New South Wales. The HAP will help deliver essential state infrastructure such as roads, public transport and regional open space in Sydney, Illawarra-Shoalhaven, the Lower Hunter and the Central Coast.

New reservations have also been created in the Restart NSW Fund to support the delivery of enabling infrastructure in priority areas, with \$400.0 million set aside for the Housing Infrastructure Fund. An additional \$9.1 million has also allocated to assess housing supply opportunities across government-owned sites, with 30 per cent of surplus government land to be set aside for social, affordable and universal housing.

New public transport infrastructure is being directed to support new housing that is well connected to neighbouring communities and jobs.

The 2023-24 Budget also includes a new investment in social and affordable housing. See Box 1.3 of this budget paper for further information.

These initiatives will help ensure that NSW has the homes needed for a growing population.

#### **Delivering for regional communities**

The 2023-24 Budget delivers infrastructure in regional and rural NSW. Important projects being delivered for regional communities include:

- \$1.5 billion over four years for the Pacific Motorway (M1) to Raymond Terrace and Hexham Straight Widening to connect the M1 Pacific Motorway and the Pacific Highway
- \$1.3 billion over four years for the Coffs Harbour Bypass to improve connectivity and safety for local and interstate motorists
- \$263.8 million for the Grafton Base Hospital Redevelopment to support timely access to healthcare and improve patient outcomes in the region
- \$260.0 million for the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Redevelopment to deliver a sustainable, modern and purpose-built facility with level 4 capacity to meet the needs of the Eurobodalla Shire
- \$222.0 million for new and upgraded schools in regional areas including Googong Public School, Medowie High School, Jerrabomberra High School and Vincentia High School
- \$200.0 million for the Bathurst Hospital Redevelopment which will ensure the local community and wider Central West region have access to high quality health care
- \$100.0 million over four years for the Bells Line of Road Upgrade program to enable a safer journey on the scenic route between the Blue Mountains and Richmond
- \$100.0 million reserved within Restart NSW for the regional component of the Housing Infrastructure Fund, to provide the enabling infrastructure required for additional housing in the regions.

#### Box 1.3: Building more social and affordable housing

The 2023-24 Budget includes additional funding to deliver more social and affordable housing, providing homes for key workers and vulnerable members of the community. More social and affordable homes are needed urgently, to address a decade of underinvestment and ensure that everyone has a safe and affordable place to call home.

This investment will help tackle the State's housing crisis and assist New South Wales in meeting its commitments under the National Housing Accord to build more homes.

The Budget includes<sup>6</sup>

- \$610.1 million from the Australian Government under the Social Housing Accelerator Agreement to deliver a permanent increase of around 1,500 social homes over the next five years, in partnership with community housing providers
- \$300.0 million in reinvested dividends to enable Landcom to deliver an additional 1.409 affordable homes and 3.288 market homes to 2039-40
- \$70.0 million interest-free debt financing for NSW Land and Housing Corporation (LAHC) to accelerate the delivery of social, affordable and private homes primarily in regional New South Wales
- \$60.0 million for Landcom to deliver around 100 build-to-rent homes on the South Coast and Northern Rivers, targeting 20 per cent affordable rental housing
- \$35.0 million to LAHC to support critical maintenance of State-owned social homes
- \$20.0 million reserved in Restart NSW to deliver residential accommodation for those with long-standing mental health challenges, in partnership with The Haven Foundation
- \$10.0 million for LAHC to pilot the delivery of modular social homes and investigate how off-site manufacturing can deliver more homes sooner.

The Government is also establishing Homes NSW to deliver better outcomes for social housing tenants, deliver more affordable and social housing, and reduce homelessness.

These investments are in addition to initiatives to accelerate private market housing supply, detailed in Box 1.2.

Housing measures include a mix of recurrent and capital expenditure in the general government and public non-financial corporation sectors.

#### 1.2 Strategic Infrastructure Review

In April 2023, the Government commissioned an independent expert, Mr Ken Kanofski, to undertake a review of the State's Infrastructure program – the Strategic Infrastructure Review. The Review was commissioned in response to significant challenges facing the NSW infrastructure program, driven by substantial cost escalation, the ongoing impacts of COVID-19 and the need for a fairer distribution of investment.

The construction industry's capacity to deliver is being challenged by the scale of investment not just in New South Wales, but across Australia and globally, while supply chains issues and skills shortages continue to be an issue.

Projects are experiencing delays more often, leading to an increase in capital slippage. Additional funding has had to be provided to projects, such as the Sydney Metro City and Southwest, to ensure they can be completed following multiple occurrences of cost escalation (see Box 1.4 for further information).

Increasing infrastructure delivery costs are having a direct impact on the State's debt levels. A return to a more sustainable infrastructure investment is a key step in stabilising the Government's debt position.

#### Strategic Infrastructure Review - Findings

The Review was tasked with identifying infrastructure projects and programs that should no longer proceed, or should be delayed or de-scoped, to get the State's infrastructure pipeline back on stable footing.

Following the Review, the Government has agreed to delay or descope projects worth more than \$2.5 billion, including:

- the Great Western Highway Duplication
- Ultimo Powerhouse Museum
- the Fast Rail Program
- Wyangala Dam Wall Raising and the New Dungowan Dam and pipeline augmentation.

As a result of reprioritising funding, the Government has been able to increase investment in new and upgraded schools, hospitals and public transport infrastructure without the privatisation of public assets.

The Review also recommended more coordinated decision making for future infrastructure investment, stronger central oversight and coordination of the infrastructure program, and to strengthen the alignment between infrastructure planning and housing completions.

The Government will review and streamline the business case and planning processes to ensure that the State's finite resources are being directed toward developing the highest priority proposals that demonstrate strong value for money.

#### **Box 1.4:** Sydney Metro Review

In April 2023, the Government announced a comprehensive review into the Sydney Metro project, the Sydney Metro Review, conducted by independent experts Mr Mike Mrdak and Amanda Yeates. The Review considers all Sydney Metro projects in delivery including:

- Sydney Metro West
- Sydney Metro Western Sydney Airport
- · Sydney Metro City and Southwest.

Due to ongoing cost and delivery challenges, the Sydney Metro Review is to examine value for money, delivery models, project governance and passenger impacts. It is evaluating the delivery of Sydney Metro to date, the current state of progress against delivery targets and making recommendations for getting the maximum value out of the project and better integration with the wider transport network.

The Review is expected to have several crucial recommendations, including opportunities where Sydney Metro could make a stronger contribution to delivering broader government social and economic objectives.

The Review's Interim Report was released on 1 August 2023, with the findings focused on overall budget pressures and key decisions for the 2023-24 Budget. In line with the findings of the Interim Report, the Government allocated an additional \$1.0 billion to Sydney Metro City and Southwest to ensure the project can be delivered despite cost escalation and time delays.

Final findings and recommendations will be tabled by the end of 2023 for consideration by the Government.

#### 1.3 Four-year capital program

The Government's capital investment program is forecast to be \$116.5 billion over the four years to 2026-27. Table 1.1 provides a reconciliation of capital expenditure between the 2023 Pre-election Budget Update and the 2023-24 Budget.

The timing and cost of infrastructure projects can often change due to factors outside the control of government. Examples of this include changes in economic conditions, variations to Australian Government grants and accounting and technical adjustments (including accounting standard changes).

Variation estimates also take into account central adjustments for capital slippage, as informed by historical data. Capital slippage occurs when there are delays in spending compared to a project's forecast profile. This requires the expenditure to instead be spent in future years.

Table 1.1 shows that capital expenditure has increased from \$27.3 billion in 2022-23 to \$29.9 billion in 2023-24. Drivers of this increase include new funding of \$1.4 billion for health facilities over four years and \$1.4 billion in new funding over four years for new and upgraded schools.

#### Breakdown of the capital program

Table 1.2 details the breakdown of capital expenditure by agency group. The majority of the program is comprised of the Government's investment in transport infrastructure, which includes large scale projects such as Sydney Metro City and Southwest and the Western Harbour Tunnel. The program also includes a significant investment in Health and Education infrastructure over the four years to 2026-27.

More information on individual agency capital programs is provided in Chapter 2.

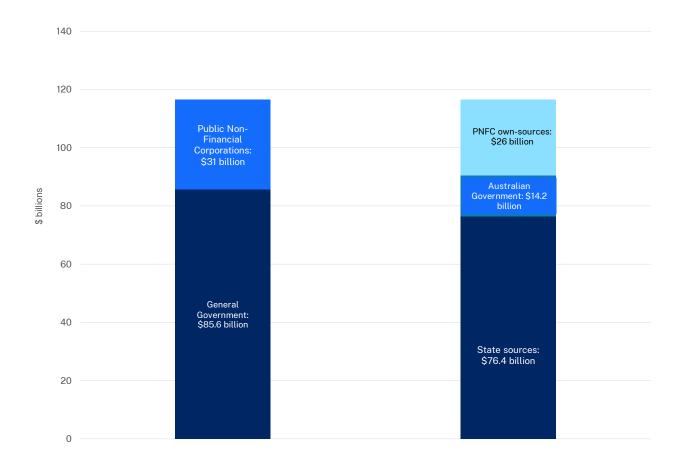

#### 1.4 Funding the delivery of infrastructure

The State's capital program of \$116.5 billion over four years to 2026-27 is funded by a range of sources including:

- State funding, comprising borrowings, taxation, Restart NSW and other own-source State revenues (\$76.4 billion)
- public non-financial corporations (PNFC) sources (including from own source revenue, equity, retained earnings and borrowings) (\$26.0 billion)
- Australian Government grants (\$14.2 billion).

Chart 1.4: Summary of capital expenditure and funding sources – 2023-24 to 2026-27



As shown in Chart 1.3, the capital program comprises \$85.6 billion from the general government sector and \$31.0 billion from the PNFC sector.

#### State funding

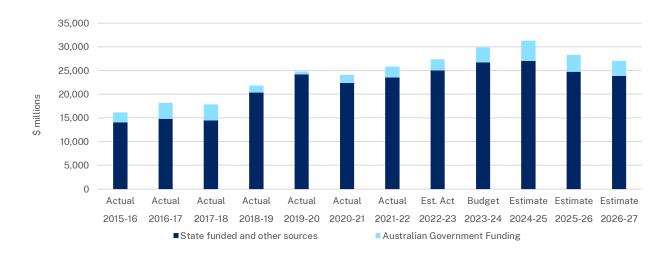
The total State funded program is forecast to be \$76.4 billion over the four years to 2026-27. State sources are predominately comprised of borrowings, highlighting the need for sustainable investment to stabilise the State's debt levels.

#### **Australian Government funding**

The Australian Government co-funds infrastructure projects across New South Wales and is forecast to contribute \$14.2 billion to NSW's infrastructure program over the four years to 2026-27. The funding for these projects is subject to the Australian Infrastructure Investment Program Strategic Review (see Box 1.5 for more information), with decisions to be finalised once the Australian Government Review is complete.

Chart 1.5 shows the Australian Government's contribution as a proportion of the total state capital program over the years 2015-16 to 2026-27.

#### Box 1.5: Australian Government Infrastructure Investment Program Strategic Review

In May 2023, the Australian Government announced the Infrastructure Investment Program Strategic Review. The Australian Government Review is examining the \$120 billion Australian Government funded infrastructure program to ensure it is investing in projects that are nationally significant.

The outcomes of the Australian Government Review will have significant implications for the State's infrastructure program, with many NSW projects reliant on Australian Government funding. The continuation of these projects is contingent on the outcomes of the Australian Government Review.

The NSW Government will engage closely with the Australian Government to confirm that high priority projects continue and ensure the best outcome for New South Wales residents.

#### 1.5 Existing assets and maintenance program

#### **Existing assets**

The Government's asset base plays a critical role in the provision of high-quality services. Asset management by agencies is the cornerstone of a sustainable infrastructure investment. It enhances the reliability, efficiency, resilience and longevity of critical infrastructure, equipment and systems necessary for services provided to the community.

Table 1.3 shows that the State's asset base will grow as a result of the Government's Essential Infrastructure Plan. The State's physical assets are estimated to have a value of \$492.6 billion as at 30 June 2023, representing an increase of \$55.9 billion from 30 June 2022.

NSW Government agencies are continuing to implement the Asset Management Policy for the NSW Public Sector (TPP19-07). The policy seeks to enable agencies and the Government to use data and evidence to effectively balance cost, risk and asset performance in decision making. The increasing size of the State's asset base reinforces the need for strong asset management capability to ensure the asset base remains fit for purpose and can support the needs of NSW residents.

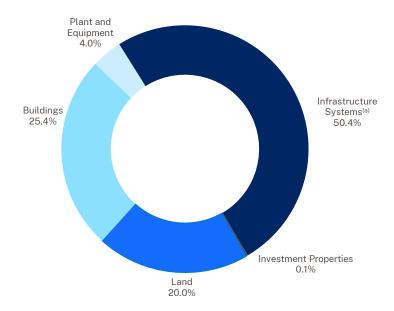
The State of Infrastructure Report, prepared annually by Infrastructure NSW, examines the performance of the State's physical asset base, informed by findings from Infrastructure NSW's assurance of the Asset Management Policy for the NSW Public Sector. For further information on the 2022-23 State of Infrastructure Report, see Box 1.6.

Chart 1.6 details the components of the State's physical assets. The largest component as at 30 June 2022 was infrastructure systems (\$220.3 billion). The remaining components comprise buildings (\$110.9 billion), land (\$87.4 billion), plant and equipment (\$17.5 billion) and investment properties (\$0.6 billion).

(a) Infrastructure Systems are assets that comprise public facilities and provide essential services. They also enhance the productive capacity of the economy, including roads, bridges, and water infrastructure and distribution works.

#### Box 1.6: State of Infrastructure Report 2022-23

The State of Infrastructure Report is an evidence-based performance assessment of the Government's physical and digital asset portfolio. The Report, prepared annually by Infrastructure NSW, summarises the performance of the asset base and highlights risks and opportunities related to service delivery.

While the Government's physical asset base has increased, investment in recurrent maintenance expressed as a percentage of the asset base has declined from 1.4 per cent to 1.0 per cent over the period 2013-14 to 2022-23.

In this light, the 2022-23 Report identified five key challenges and opportunities impacting the physical asset portfolio:

Infrastructure investment needs to be balanced to deliver optimised outcomes – sustainable infrastructure investment should consider an holistic range of options, including both investment in the existing asset base and new assets. This will allow Government to maximise the value of assets by ensuring they are properly maintained and replaced, opportunities to extract more value are realised and capabilities are enhanced through more minimal, lower-risk interventions. Investment in the existing asset base can also assist in improving service delivery and increasing resilience.

Measurement of the maintenance liability must be standardised – maintenance requirements should be calculated in a consistent manner and be aligned to the delivery of service outcomes. Better information on maintenance needs will allow the Government to prioritise funding to where it is needed most, ensuring continuity of service while balancing a tight fiscal environment.

Assets remain vulnerable to shocks and stresses – natural and human induced hazards challenge the resilience of the asset base, testing its ability to withstand and absorb loads and exposing vulnerabilities.

The nature of infrastructure is dynamic – the increased cost of living, hybrid working, technological advances, changing customer expectations and climate change are examples of factors that are changing how customers use assets. Combined with the increasing size and interconnectivity of the asset portfolio, these trends are escalating the complexity of asset management.

The existing asset base can be leveraged to deliver improved outcomes – mature asset management practices help to identify opportunities to use assets differently and unlock latent capacity in agency portfolios by using assets in new ways or by working across government to share spare capacity.

#### Infrastructure maintenance

Agencies maintain their physical assets to support the delivery of high-quality services. Ongoing investment in maintenance is vital to ensure the State's asset base is able to provide the services people need.

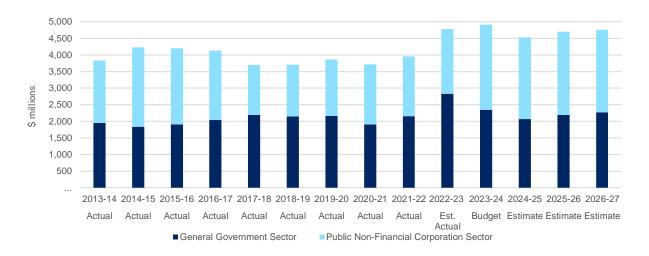

#### 1.6 Restart NSW Fund (Restart NSW)

The 2023-24 Budget includes a new focus for Restart NSW, with funding redirected towards the Government's Essential Infrastructure Plan to rebuild essential services and provide the infrastructure needed to support housing supply and thriving communities. These investments will support job growth and economic productivity, improve regional liveability and deliver sustainable community assets.

In 2023-24, new Restart NSW reservations have been approved for the Government's commitments including:

- \$1.0 billion for the Energy Security Corporation
- \$400.0 million for the Housing Infrastructure Fund, including \$100.0 million for regional projects
- \$385.0 million for the Urban Roads Fund (as part of a total \$770.0 million investment)
- \$302.7 million for Buses and Rapid Buses for Western Sydney Airport
- \$250.0 million for the Working Regions Fund
- \$200.0 million for Parramatta Light Rail Stage 2
- \$60.0 million for Western Sydney Metro business cases
- \$30.0 million to establish a Truck Stop in Greater Sydney
- \$25.0 million for planning for the Blue Mountains Hospital Redevelopment
- \$21.9 million for Wollongong Hospital Upgrades
- \$20.0 million to deliver residential accommodation for those with long standing mental health issues
- \$15.0 million for planning and site selection for a new public hospital in the Western Parkland City region.

The 2023-24 Budget allocates more than 30.0 per cent of all new Restart reservations to the regions. This includes \$250.0 million for a new Working Regions Fund and \$100.0 million for the regional component of the Housing Infrastructure Fund.

The majority of remaining reservations target new transport projects to support new housing supply in Western Sydney. This includes \$302.7 million for Buses and Rapid Buses for Western Sydney Airport and \$200.0 million for Parramatta Light Rail Stage 2.

# 2. NEW INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM TO SUPPORT ESSENTIAL SERVICES, HOUSING AND COMMUNITIES

All people in New South Wales deserve access to the essential infrastructure needed to support thriving communities, including schools, hospitals, transport and energy.

The NSW Government's Essential Infrastructure Plan supports the growing communities of New South Wales by delivering investment in new schools and hospitals as well as the public transport and roads we rely on, and the energy transition we need to secure a clean and sustainable future.

Highlights of the Government's current infrastructure pipeline include:

- \$9.8 billion for schools and skills infrastructure
- \$13.8 billion for health infrastructure
- \$72.3 billion for public transport and infrastructure
- \$3.6 billion for energy infrastructure
- \$2.7 billion to build stronger communities.

The \$116.5 billion Essential Infrastructure Plan delivers new investment in schools and hospitals, without privatising public assets.

#### 2.1 Communities and Justice



Communities and Justice agencies deliver community services that support a safe and just New South Wales through operating an efficient and effective legal system, protecting children and families, responding to natural disasters and emergencies, promoting public

safety, reducing reoffending, supporting community harmony and social cohesion.

This Budget includes capital investment of \$2.7 billion in Communities and Justice over the four years to 2026-27.

#### Box 2.1: Eurobodalla Emergency Services Precinct

This Budget commits an additional \$5.0 million in capital grant funding to develop a new Rural Fire Service (RFS) Fire Control Centre (FCC) and integrated Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) at Moruya to service the South Coast and enhance community safety. This brings the total investment in this critical facility to \$20.0 million.

The NSW RFS is working with Eurobodalla Shire Council to identify suitable locations for the development within Moruya. The new site will enhance capabilities and communications across Incident Management Teams when responding to major fires and other emergencies. The FCC will also deliver volunteer training, manage local response and coordinate various logistical functions which all aim to deliver better outcomes for the community during emergencies and natural disasters.

Hazard reduction teams working out of the EOC will also help reduce bush fire risks in this area of the Far South Coast. The same location will also accommodate the NSW State Emergency Service (SES), Fire and Rescue NSW and Marine Rescue NSW and allow for greater coordination especially during major disaster events.

This precinct will further strengthen the interoperability of Emergency Services, providing a centralised facility for the command and coordination of responses to both natural and man-made disasters in the Far South Coast region.

A key ongoing goal is to promote a progressive, whole-of-sector approach to service provision, enabling clusters to promote productivity and efficiency.

This Budget includes \$1.2 billion in capital spending for Customer Service initiatives and projects over the four years to 2026-27.

# 2.3 Education



This Budget demonstrates the NSW Government's commitment to meet the urgent challenges facing public education in New South Wales. The NSW Government is delivering capital investments that will modernise existing school assets and provide additional

teaching spaces where they are most needed.

The 2023-24 Budget includes \$1.4 billion in new capital expenditure over the four years to 2026-27 that will support planning and delivery of 34 new and upgraded schools, with many targeted at replacing demountables and meeting the need for additional facilities in rapidly growing communities.

The NSW Government is committed to high quality public education that starts in the early years by fast-tracking the delivery of 100 new and upgraded preschools. This is the biggest investment in public preschools in New South Wales's history, and the NSW Government will ensure every new primary school also includes a co-located preschool.

The Government is focussing on planning and building new primary schools and secondary schools in areas of growth to ensure every student can attend a local school. Upgrades are underway at 14 primary school and 10 high school's to modernise assets, provide additional facilities and replace demountable classrooms.

## Box 2.2: Regional Schools

This Budget dedicates more than \$1.4 billion over four years to deliver a pipeline of new and upgraded schools for regional NSW. The NSW Government is committed to supporting students across the State. This includes a new permanent high school for Googong and an expansion of Jerrabomberra High School in the State's southwest, together with a new high school in Medowie in the Hunter and an upgrade to Vincentia High School have been approved in this Budget demonstrating the Government's commitment to ensuring secondary students can attend a local high school.

# 2.4 Environment and Planning



The Environment and Planning agencies are responsible for the stewardship of the built and natural environment in New South Wales. The key areas of focus include initiatives to unlock housing supply in New South Wales, protect our native flora

This Budget includes \$4.7 billion in capital spending for Environment and Planning initiatives and projects over the four years to 2026-27.

## Box 2.4: Protecting Koalas in NSW

The 2023-24 Budget provides \$79.3 million total capital expenditure over four years to preserve koalas in the wild and protect their natural habitat. Koalas are a threatened species requiring measures to protect and restore remaining koala populations. This additional outlay will expand existing nature reserves, protect critical koala habitat and preserve koala populations in the wild.

Key capital investments include:

- \$28.5 million to support the establishment of the Great Koala National Park on the Mid-North Coast to preserve large tracts of koala habitat
- \$22.5 million to construct and complete koala-friendly crossings across Appin Road supporting the sustainability of koalas in South-Western Sydney
- \$22.1 million to establish the new Georges River Koala National Park to protect one of the largest koala populations in metropolitan Sydney
- \$6.2 million to preserve wildlife corridors and establish a reserve for the koala population in Woronora Heights.

Ecological advantages of this capital expenditure will extend to a range of other threatened species of flora and fauna within these areas. Local and Aboriginal communities will benefit from increased tourism and employment, and conservation of traditional cultural heritage.

#### Box 2.5: Critical investment in nature-based tourism

The NSW Government is investing to protect key natural heritage assets and ensure biosecurity and visitor safety while sustaining the tourism economy across the State.

In the 2023-24 Budget, the NSW Government provides:

- \$36.4 million capital expenditure for the replacement and renewal of visitor infrastructure to ensure ongoing access and enjoyment of New South Wale's unique National Parks
- funding for the continuation of a marine freight service to Lord Howe Island and upgrade
  of its waste management facility to meet essential community needs and biosecurity and
  regulatory standards for the World Heritage listed site.

The Government's continued funding will ensure key nature-based sites remain open and safe to support increasing tourism demand, protect the environment and deliver economic, social and environmental benefits to the NSW people and economy.

## 2.5 Health

Health infrastructure is a key enabler for a high performing health service which provides accessible, safe, quality care to the people of New South Wales. The NSW Government is rebuilding our essential health services to ensure all communities have access

to world-class care with a 15.6 percent increase in health capital expenditure compared to last year's budget<sup>1</sup>.

This includes investments in new infrastructure and upgrades for a number of existing health facilities across New South Wales. In addition to delivering safe, high quality and reliable health care across all settings, these investments support the attraction and retention of an appropriately skilled health workforce.

The NSW Government is committed to delivering world-class health facilities that improve access to healthcare across the state. Investments made today, ensure New South Wales is appropriately prepared to meet the growing demand for public hospital and health services in the future.

This Budget includes \$13.8 billion<sup>2</sup> of capital investment over the four years to 2026-27 in health infrastructure, which includes both hospitals and health facilities.

# Box 2.6: Investing in Western Sydney's Hospitals – additional funding for Rouse Hill Hospital

The Rouse Hill Hospital will be the first major new adult hospital build in Western Sydney in over 40 years.

Aligning with NSW Government's priorities in investing across Western Sydney, the scope of the new Rouse Hill Hospital has been expanded with funding increasing from \$300.0 million to \$700.0 million.

The expansion of Rouse Hill Hospital will include:

- an Emergency Department including urgent care centre and emergency medicine
- maternity services and women's health services
- day surgery unit
- adult and paediatric short stay unit
- ambulatory and outpatients care including day chemotherapy and infusion, renal dialysis mental health, and ante/post-natal care
- comprehensive medical imaging services
- prehabilitation and rehabilitation services.

The four year Health capital expenditure was forecast to be \$11.9 billion in the 2022-23 Budget.

This includes \$968.3 million for lease acquisitions and \$561.1 million of capital expensing from the Ministry of Health's expense budget over the next four years. In 2023-24, health infrastructure spending includes \$137 million of capital expensing and \$142.1 million for lease acquisitions. This does not include \$61.9 million reserved in Restart NSW for Wollongong Hospital Upgrades, planning for the Blue Mountains Hospital Redevelopment, and planning and site selection for a new public hospital in the Western Parkland City.

## 2.6 Jobs and Tourism



This group of agencies brings together the State's key cultural, hospitality, entertainment and tourism agencies, alongside leading economic development and investment attraction organisations, to drive investment and new jobs in New South Wales by

This Budget includes capital investment of \$944.3 million in Jobs and Tourism over the four years to 2026-27. This will help create prosperity and keep New South Wales competitive in a rapidly evolving global economy.

# Box 2.7: Powerhouse Parramatta and Australian Museum Pacific Gallery

Considered one of the most architecturally significant projects underway in Australia, Powerhouse Parramatta will be the first major cultural institution established in Western Sydney. Once complete, Powerhouse Parramatta will be the largest museum in New South Wales and the leading science and technology museum in the Southern Hemisphere. Attracting two million visitors annually, construction is expected to be complete in 2025.

In late 2023, the Australian Museum will open a new Pacific Gallery, providing a long-awaited opportunity in one of Sydney's leading cultural facilities for Pasifika diaspora in New South Wales and across the Pacific region to share their stories.

# 2.7 Regional NSW



Regional NSW agencies help build strong, cohesive regional communities and economies. Projects delivered will help to grow primary industries and ensure sustainable land use practices, create regional employment opportunities and steward the use of

natural endowments including advancing sustainable mining and resource development.

In addition, Regional NSW administers the delivery of major projects funded from the Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund, which is investing in transformative infrastructure across regional New South Wales.

This Budget includes \$651.6 million of capital expenditure for projects across Regional NSW over the four years to 2026-27.

## Box 2.8: Supporting the regions through the Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund

The Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund was established under the *Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund Act 2018* following the sale of the State's share in Snowy Hydro Scheme to the Australian Government.

The Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund is supporting the delivery of \$572.4 million of new roads, schools, ambulance stations and community infrastructure in our regions, including:

- \$242.0 million as part of the \$334.0 million Regional Roads Fund to build new roads in regional areas, including \$46.6 million capital expenditure to upgrade timber bridges, duplicate roadways, improve flood resilience and upgrade key routes to improve driver safety
- \$222.0 million for new high schools in Medowie and Googong and upgrades for Jerrabomberra High School and Vincentia High School
- \$64.0 million for new regional helicopter ambulance bases to help improve emergency health response times in rural areas
- \$28.4 million in capital works to establish a Great Koala National Park, as part of the Government's \$80.0 million commitment
- \$16.0 million to expand the residential aged care facility at the Bombala Multipurpose Service and reopen the Currawarna Assisted Living Group facility.

The NSW Government is committed to investing in regional NSW to rebuild essential services and support job creation and economic development. The 2023-24 Budget includes funding to support \$688.7 million of capital expenditure, including:

- \$269.0 million to transform Parkes into a national freight and logistics hub (\$201.9 million from the Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund)
- \$198.5 million to support Moree becoming a northern gateway and thriving business hub in the middle of Australia's most productive grain region
- \$169.6 million for Wagga Wagga to be a hub of high value agricultural and food production supporting industries and businesses to connect to the world
- \$45.6 million in the Snowy Mountains region to support housing supply and economic activation.

## Box 2.9: Protecting New South Wales from the risk of Foot and Mouth Disease

Australia is currently free from Foot and Mouth Disease, though there is an increasing risk of an outbreak into New South Wales. This would have significant impacts on state and national economies and regional communities. The Government is acting to enhance New South Wales' capacity to respond to the escalated risk of an outbreak of the disease.

The NSW Government has committed \$65.0 million to enhance the State's response capability to prepare for and manage any future outbreaks of Foot and Mouth Disease. This investment includes \$14.3 million of capital expenditure to:

- expand effluent decontamination and sterilisation system capacity at the Elizabeth Macarthur Agricultural Institute to treat animal waste
- use portable sensor activated automatic wheel and truck wash facilities to prevent the transmission of disease, pests and weeds in the event of a biosecurity outbreak.

# 2.8 Transport



Transport plays a key role in making New South Wales a better place to live, work and visit by connecting people and communities. Integrated transport networks including road, train, metro, bus, ferry, light rail, cycling and walking is critical for driving economic

growth, wellbeing, and creating vibrant precincts and cities.

Rapid technological change, along with patronage increase post pandemic, means transport planning and delivery needs to be more agile and sustainable to respond to changes in commuter needs and travel patterns.

The Transport capital program includes a \$72.3 billion investment over the four years to 2026-27, including major investment in Sydney's transformational Metro projects.

#### Box 2.10: Urban Roads Fund

The NSW Government has committed \$770 million (capital and recurrent expenses) to establish an Urban Roads Fund (over four years to 2026-27). The funding will be used to plan and build major roads in metropolitan areas, including improvements to key corridors in Heathcote, Riverstone and smaller projects to improve roads in local communities.

## Key projects include:

- planning for upgrades on Fifteenth Avenue Transit Corridor, which is a vital east-west connection between Liverpool and Bradfield providing a direct bus connection
- duplicating key sections of Heathcote Road
- upgrade of Bandon Road
- upgrade Henry Lawson Drive at Milperra
- upgrading Hill Road at Homebush.

## **Box 2.11: Western Sydney Flood Resilience**

The NSW Government is investing \$200 million towards developing and delivering key flood evacuation routes as set out below. The Western Sydney Flood Resilience program is part of the Urban Roads Fund.

- Richmond Road Upgrade M7 to Townson Road: The project will enable the development of adjoining precincts, unlock key land use activities in the burgeoning North West Growth Area, and support flood evacuation strategies.
- Pitt Town Bypass: The upgrade will include extending Pitt Town Road and adding two
  new roundabouts with a key focus on improving road safety, removing heavy vehicles
  from the town centre, and supporting the new residential development to the north of
  Pitt Town.
- Garfield Road East Upgrade: The upgrade of Garfield Road East between Windsor Road, Box Hill and Piccadilly Street, Riverstone, Hamilton Street and Edmund Street, and the enabling works for the 3.4-kilometre corridor upgrade. The enabling works package will consider a range of activities including detailed design, priority property acquisition, geotechnical works, utility installation, early stormwater and culvert investigations, integration with adjacent developments and other intersection improvements.
- **Upgrade the intersection of The Driftway and Londonderry Road**: This includes an additional southbound lane as part of upgrades to flood evacuation routes in the Hawkesbury Nepean Valley.

# Box 2.12: Return Freshwater-class ferries to Circular Quay-Manly route

The NSW Government has committed to returning the Freshwater-class ferries to the Circular Quay to Manly route. The commitment will see an extensive refurbishment plan started to ensure the iconic vessels can be returned to the route for years to come.

The upgrade of the iconic vessels will include refreshed passenger areas and will improve the experience for passengers with a disability. The extensive refurbishments will focus on local manufacturing and jobs, with expert naval engineers, electrical engineers, shipbuilders, painters, plumbers and more all working here in New South Wales. Refurbishing each vessel includes the use of more than 650 square metres of new ceiling panels, seven kilometres of new cabling, 4,000 litres of paint, 750 square metres of new flooring and the recovering of every interior seat.

#### Box 2.13: New Parramatta Class Ferries

The NSW Government has committed to delivering seven new Australian made Parramatta Class vessels that have been designed by world renowned Sydney-based naval architects and constructed in Hobart, Tasmania.

The building of the first two vessels has already commenced, with the first vessel expected to enter sea trials in early 2024 before going into service.

#### **Box 2.14: Active Transport**

The NSW Government is committed to developing and delivering Active Transport projects that expand cycleway networks and increase opportunities for walking in and around connected centres and neighbourhoods.

It has committed funding to the delivery of both the Sutherland to Cronulla Active Transport Link (SCATL) Horizon 3 and the Sydney Harbour Bridge Northern Cycle Ramp.

## **SCATL Horizon 3**

The final stage of the SCATL will improve connections and increase road safety for active transport users between Sutherland and Cronulla, as well as create links to key attractors along the corridor. The project will provide active transport dedicated paths and safe separation for both riders and walkers between activity hubs, key destinations, schools, employment, and local attractions.

# Sydney Harbour Bridge Northern Cycle Ramp

The Northern Cycle Ramp will improve accessibility and safety for bike riders by avoiding the 55 cycleway steps at the northern end of the Sydney Harbour Bridge and improve pedestrian safety by removing conflicts with bike riders at Milsons Point.

## Box 2.15: Parramatta Light Rail Stage 2

The NSW Government has committed an additional \$200 million (funded via a reservation in Restart NSW) to expedite the planning of the procurement, construction, and delivery of Parramatta Light Rail Stage 2 for Western Sydney.

Stage 2 of the Parramatta Light Rail will connect Stage 1 and Parramatta's CBD to Sydney Olympic Park via Camellia, Rydalmere, Ermington, Melrose Park and Wentworth Point. It is a vital project for achieving housing growth and connecting communities in the Greater Parramatta and Olympic Peninsula, bringing the vision of a '30-minute city' closer to reality.

Planning approval for the entire project is expected in early 2024, and procurement is progressing on the enabling works to build the vital 320-metre-long public and active transport bridge across the Parramatta River, connecting Wentworth Point and Melrose Park.

Figure 2.1: Parramatta Light Rail proposed route

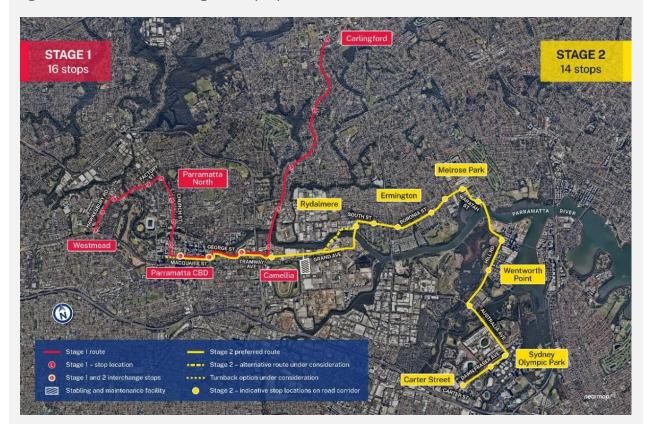

## Box 2.16: Pacific Highway, Extension to Raymond Terrace and Hexham Straight

The Australian and NSW Governments have committed \$2.2 billion to deliver the M1 Pacific Motorway extension to Raymond Terrace and Hexham Straight projects. The M1 Motorway extension will boost the regional economy and improve connectivity, road transport efficiency and safety for local and interstate motorists.

The project addresses a key national motorway 'missing link' between Sydney and Brisbane as the existing M1 Pacific Motorway, New England Highway and Pacific Highway carry some of the highest traffic volumes across the Hunter.

The project includes a 15-kilometre dual carriageway motorway link between the M1 Pacific Motorway south of John Renshaw Drive, and the Pacific Highway at Raymond Terrace, bypassing Hexham and Heatherbrae. Key features include four interchanges at Black Hill, Tarro, Tomago and Raymond Terrace, and an additional crossing of the Hunter River, to improve safety and relieve traffic congestion.

The extension will provide:

- improved connection between the M1 Pacific Motorway and the Pacific Highway
- improved traffic flow for motorists and freight for more reliable travel times
- improved accessibility to the surrounding road network
- improved safety for all road users.

## **Box 2.17: Coffs Harbour Bypass**

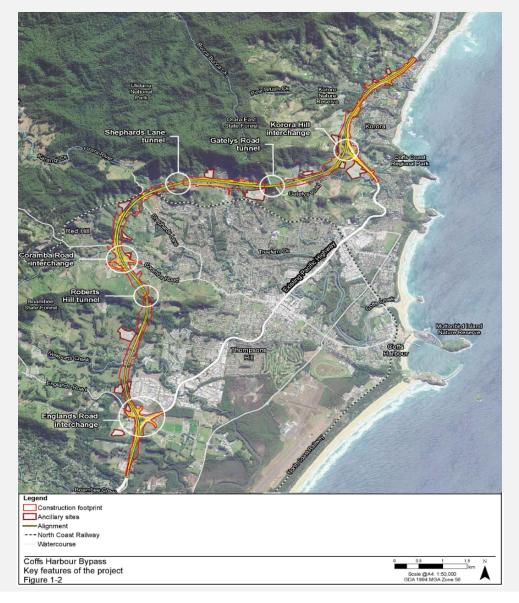
The Coffs Harbour Bypass Project is jointly funded by the Australian and NSW Governments. The project includes building or upgrading 14 kilometres to a four lane road which will improve transport efficiency and road safety for local, regional and interstate road users. The project will save motorists 12 minutes travel time, bypass up to 12 sets of traffic lights and remove thousands of vehicles from the Coffs Harbour CBD.

The project is a priority for both Governments as the Pacific Highway is a major contributor to Australia's economy. The bypass will be a key link in this vital piece of the nation's infrastructure, connecting Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane.

## The upgrade will:

- improve road safety for local, regional and interstate motorists
- deliver road freight efficiency for heavy vehicles
- ease congestion.

# Box 2.18: Jervis Bay Road and Princes Highway Intersection

The Jervis Bay Road and Princes Highway intersection has the highest volume of vehicle movements on the highway between Nowra and the border with Victoria.

The Australian and NSW Governments are investing \$164 million on the intersection upgrade. A more reliable intersection will support pedestrians, cyclists, and public transport passengers to travel safely.

The upgrade will also reduce congestion, improve access to local roads and growing tourist and residential areas, improve network resilience and support the growth of regional economies.

Following the environmental assessment and community feedback on the concept design, the Jervis Bay Road and Princes Highway intersection upgrade project has been approved for construction.

The intersection upgrade will include:

- widening the road to a four-lane divided highway, with two lanes in each direction
- building an overpass bridge over Jervis Bay Road
- building two roundabouts at the existing road level to enable safer access and improve traffic flow
- building an access road to service properties located to the south-east of the intersection.

Pages 4-58 to 4-64 of Chapter 4 of this *Infrastructure Statement* lists the major capital projects and minor works for the Transport agencies, including the ETC, estimated expenditure to 30 June 2023, and 2023-24 allocation.

# 2.9 Treasury (including Office of Energy and Climate Change and Infrastructure NSW)



The Treasury infrastructure program is predominantly focussed on delivering the Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap. This function is performed by EnergyCo and the Office of Energy and Climate Change.

Responsibility for delivering the Roadmap will be

guide the transition of New South Wales to renewable energy over the next decade, principally by supporting Renewable Energy Zones located in regional New South Wales. The program also includes investment to support Treasury's economic and financial management responsibilities.

Infrastructure NSW is creating a sustainable infrastructure legacy for New South Wales by providing independent advice and assurance to government on the identification and prioritisation of critical public infrastructure and leading the development of urban projects and precinct transformations.

# Box 2.19: Renewable Energy Zones

Renewable Energy Zones (REZs) will group new wind and solar power generation into locations where it can be efficiently stored and transmitted across New South Wales. Additional capital funding of \$804.0 million will support the delivery of the Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap through maintaining critical path for the Central-West Orana REZ, New England REZ and Hunter Transmission Project. Five zones have so far been identified in the Central West Orana, New England, South West, Hunter Central Coast and Illawarra regions of the State. The REZs will keep NSW electricity reliable as coal-fired power stations retire, delivering large amounts of new energy to power our regions and cities.

- The Central-West Orana REZ is approximately 20,0000 square kilometres around Dubbo and Dunedoo and will unlock up to 6 gigawatts intended network capacity. The REZ is also expected to support around 5,000 construction jobs in the region.
- The New England REZ is located around Armidale and has an intended network capacity of 8 gigawatts. It is expected to support around 830 operational jobs and 1,250 construction jobs.
- The South West REZ is located around Balranald and Hay and at its peak is expected to support over 2,000 construction jobs in the region.
- The Illawarra REZ is located around Wollongong and Shellharbour and will utilise rehabilitated industrial land, port and transport infrastructure. The recent Registration of Interest indicated over 17 gigawatts of generation and storage capacity.
- The Hunter-Central Coast REZ is located around Newcastle and Muswellbrook. The recent Registration of Interest indicated almost 40 gigawatts of renewable generation and storage capacity.

The Transmission Acceleration Facility (TAF) has been established to develop transmission projects to the stage where they can be delivered by a private operator who will pay for the costs incurred to date, at which point the cash receipt will be reflected in the budget. The forward estimates do not include the \$1.6 billion in anticipated receipts from the recycling of the State's investment to develop the Central West Orana (CWO) Transmission project. The planned cash receipt from the anticipated transaction with the Network Service Operator for the CWO REZ will be budgeted for when the transaction is finalised, as will be the case for other major asset transactions as part of the energy transition.

# **Box 2.20: Energy Security Corporation**

The NSW Government is committed to establishing an Energy Security Corporation (ESC) to accelerate investment and ensure dispatchable supply of clean energy.

The ESC will be seeded with a \$1.0 billion reservation from the Restart NSW Fund. Following the model of the Clean Energy Finance Corporation, the Energy Security Corporation will support projects that traditionally find it harder to get off the ground, but which New South Wales needs to accelerate the transition.

The role of the ESC will be to partner with industry on projects that provide affordable, accessible and reliable energy to New South Wales. This includes renewable storage solutions, commercially viable technologies able to provide grid stability and community batteries to maximise the benefits for households of rooftop solar.

# Box 2.21: Electric Vehicles Charging Infrastructure

The NSW Government aims to increase electric vehicle sales to more than 50 per cent of new cars sold in New South Wales by 2030. To achieve this, the Government is investing:

- \$263.0 million in new (recurrent) funding to deliver the Electric Vehicle Strategy, including additional EV infrastructure
- \$149.0 million to co-fund the delivery of ultra-fast EV charging stations
- \$20.0 million for co-funding EV charging infrastructure in commuter carparks
- \$20.0 million to co-fund destination charging along tourist routes
- \$10.0 million to co-fund about 500 kerbside charge points in areas of metropolitan NSW where residents do not have access to off-street parking
- \$10.0 million to co-fund upgrades to electrical infrastructure in about 100 medium and large apartment buildings.

The NSW Government is also investing \$105.0 million to support private and local council fleets to purchase EVs and is committed to electrifying its own passenger vehicle fleet.

# 3. INFRASTRUCTURE DELIVERED FOR NEW SOUTH WALES

# 3.1 Key infrastructure delivered

In 2022-23 an estimated \$27.3 billion was invested in infrastructure across New South Wales.

Major infrastructure delivered includes:

- schools and education facilities with new and upgraded facilities to accommodate ongoing enrolment growth
- significant investment in transport to provide an integrated network and connect people to each other and to places across New South Wales
- investment in the biggest and busiest public health system in Australia to deliver the best and safest care to patients, consumers and clients
- key cultural, hospitality and tourism investments to drive long-term economic transformation, a future economy.

# **Digital Courts Reform Program**

Significant items in this package will provide aerial fire-fighting capability and trucks for crews involved with hazard reduction works across the State.

# **Albury Courthouse Upgrade**

The \$6.4 million upgrade of the Albury Courthouse delivered a third courtroom, new safe spaces for vulnerable witnesses and other modern facilities for court users.

# **New Fire Station at Kingscliff**

This station was rebuilt on its existing site after appropriate land could not be located.

# Fire Station Major Renovation at Wentworth Falls

The station renovation addresses engine bay space, diesel particulate exposure, work and living area improvements and separation; enhanced response capability; inclusion of enhanced training facilities to ensure increased firefighter skills/capabilities and improved amenities to meet and compliment the requirements of a diverse workforce.

## **Bathurst Police Station Major Upgrade**

A major upgrade (\$7.1 million) to the facilities, accommodation standards and equipment at Bathurst Police Station to enable the delivery of modern policing services to the community.

# Police Properties Economic Stimulus - Build, Retain, Preserve

A \$39.4 million program of property-related capital projects in metropolitan and regional areas including new small police stations in rural locations, heating ventilation and air conditioning, a disaster resilience program, facade cladding remediation, a solar panel program and security upgrades to enable delivery of front-line policing services.

# **Cyber Security Transformation Program**

An uplift of the NSW Police Force's cyber security capabilities, completed at a cost of \$8.5 million, to mitigate the risk of cyber-attack.

# **Canterbury South Public School redevelopment**

This \$37.1 million full redevelopment delivered a new layout of modern facilities with safer access for students and the community. A spacious and well-resourced library with a special STEM room and technology rich learning environments support innovative teaching and learning programs. A new hall and external play space allows student development to continue outside of the classrooms.

# **LED Lighting Upgrade Program**

Completion of the \$157.8 million upgrade over the past five years with positive feedback from schools. This project replaced inefficient lights with new LED lights, in up to 1,000 public schools across New South Wales. This is expected to reduce operating costs for schools and provided opportunities for local tradespeople to deliver the lightning upgrades across New South Wales, while helping to improve learning environments and outcomes for our students.

# Richmond High School Upgrade - Richmond Agricultural College

The completed \$15.2 million upgrade to Richmond High School has delivered new and improved education facilities to support the student community and a new Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) building. The new facilities will support a STEM selective stream and a new agricultural specialist stream, which is part of the new state-wide model for agricultural education.

# Googong Public School

The completed \$57 million Googong Public School opened to students for the 2023 school year and accommodates up to 700 students in 30 flexible learning spaces and three support classrooms. It is centrally located within the growing Googong community to ensure families have access to a local public school. The Googong Public School project provides brand new modern and flexible learning environments with integrated technology; a well resourced library; airconditioned learning spaces and large outdoor learning areas; and onsite before and after-school care.

#### TAFE NSW Meadowbank Education Precinct - Institute of Applied Technology for Digital

The completed \$128.9 million Institute of Applied Technology – Digital at Meadowbank includes modern, flexible and future-proofed learning spaces offering practical training experiences that support employability. Courses are delivered in partnership with TAFE NSW, Microsoft, The University of Technology Sydney and Macquarie University.

A four-day walking trail totalling 39 kilometres of world class, purpose-built trails and associated infrastructure, to be constructed within the Murramarang National Park on the New South Wales south coast. ETC value of \$3.6 million.

The ePlanning program is improving digital access to planning services across New South Wales. ETC value of \$66.5 million.

# Hornsby Hospital Redevelopment Stages 1 and 2

The project involved a new clinical services building, including the first robotic pharmacy in a public hospital in New South Wales, expansion of the existing Emergency Department, and delivery of additional ambulatory care services including new renal dialysis, chemotherapy and oral health services. ETC value of \$406.5 million.

# Lismore Hospital Redevelopment Stages 3A, 3B and 3C

The project involved a multi-year program of construction to deliver an integrated hospital and community health campus. A new 10 storey Northern Tower, expanded emergency department, community health facilities on the main hospital campus and additional outpatient clinic capacity offer access to world class healthcare in a growing region. ETC value of \$312.8 million.

# **Coffs Harbour Hospital Expansion**

The project delivered a new multi-storey Clinical Services Building and refurbishment of existing hospital spaces, delivering additional facilities and services for the Coffs Harbour community and surrounding areas, including a larger emergency department, additional new operating theatres, additional critical care and inpatient beds and increased capacity for renal dialysis. ETC of \$194.0 million.

# **Tumut Hospital Redevelopment**

3 - 4

The project delivered a new hospital on the health service campus, providing the local communities of Tumut, Gundagai, Batlow and Adelong with an integrated modern healthcare service under the one roof. A new helipad has been relocated to the front of the hospital to ensure patients have a fast and direct connection from the hospital's Emergency Department to receive lifesaving emergency care. ETC of \$50.0 million.

# Projects under the Rural Ambulance Infrastructure Reconfiguration (RAIR) Program

The \$232 million project has delivered 54 new and upgraded ambulance stations, providing local paramedics with modern, fit-for-purpose infrastructure to better meet the emergency medical care needs of communities in regional and rural NSW. New ambulance stations have been delivered at Casino, Forster, Lake Cathie, Medowie, Tamworth and Tumut. Upgraded stations have been delivered at Armidale, Blayney, Bomaderry, Bulahdelah, Coleambally, Evans Head, Gloucester, Lockhart, Macksville, Manilla, Mudgee, Narooma, Stockton, Taree, Tea Gardens, Tenterfield and West Wyalong. The new ambulance stations will provide an enhanced working environment for local paramedics, tailored to the needs of regional and rural communities to enable paramedics to continue delivering high quality emergency care.

# Key Health projects delivered in 2022-23

# **Projects under the HealthOne Strategy**

The NSW Government has invested \$100 million in the HealthOne Program which included 20 projects across New South Wales. These integrated health facilities improve patient access to health services and improve health outcomes for the community by integrating primary and community-based health services and providing a variety of health services closer to home. New facilities delivered in 2022-23 include Buronga, RPA Green Square, and Camden Haven.

# Mother and Baby Unit, Westmead Hospital

As part of the \$669.8million state-wide Mental Health Infrastructure Program, the state's second purpose-built Mother and Baby Unit was completed at Westmead Hospital. The new unit enables families to remain together when a mother requires hospitalisation for a severe perinatal mental illness. It has been co-designed with women with a lived experience of mental illness, their families and clinicians, to ensure it meets the needs of the women who will access the service.

# Cystic Fibrosis Specialist Service Unit at Westmead Hospital

The project involves the Australian-first, purpose-built Cystic Fibrosis Specialist Service ward at Westmead Hospital, including a 16-bed inpatient unit and a specialised cystic fibrosis ambulatory (outpatients) unit. The project was fully funded by the Australian Government. ETC value of \$65 million.

# Rural Health Infrastructure Program - Deniliquin and Leeton

Replacement of ageing infrastructure and works to enable the integration of health services for improved patient care and operational efficiency. ETC value of \$5.7 million.

#### Manly Adolescent & Young Adult Hospice

The Adolescent and Young Adult Hospice is Australia's first dedicated service for young people with life-limiting illness. The service is for 15 to 24 year old patients and offers respite care, symptom management and end of life care. The hospice will welcome families from metropolitan, rural and regional NSW. The project was delivered with funding committed from the NSW and Australian Governments and generous community donations. ETC value of \$20.3 million.

The completion dates identified in Chapter 4 are the financial completion dates, which involve the finalisation of all commercial payments and confirmation that all contractual obligations have been met. This may occur 12-18 months after the building becoming ready for commissioning and occupation by patients and staff.

The final piece of Phase 1 of the development, the Burra Learning Centre provides a new state of the art learning place bringing together First Nations knowledge and Western science through an immersive and engaging children's gallery. The State Library of NSW has digitised much of its resources in order to allow greater regional accessibility.

# Continuing shark mitigation and ocean beach safety

The continuing shark mitigation program at NSW ocean beaches is based on evidence from the world-leading trials and research of the NSW Governments Shark Management Strategy. The capital component of the program included the purchase of additional shark-bite response measures, including but not limited to four Rapid Response Vessels, SMART drumlines, shark tags and tagged shark listening stations.

# **Bushfire Insurance Fence Repairs**

The Bushfire Fence Replacement program involved the replacement of fences as part of Local Land Services response to the 2019-20 bushfires. The fences were predominantly for the travelling stock reserves.

#### Heathcote Road, Woronora River Bridge

The duplication of Heathcote Road Bridge with a new bridge parallel to the existing bridge opened to traffic in March 2023. This separates traffic flow, provides safety benefits and allows for safer passing of broken-down vehicles along this section.

#### **Eden Safe Harbour**

A wave attenuator was built which breaks coastal waves to reduce their force prior to reaching Snug Cove. This creates a safe harbour for commercial boats, private vessels and maritime infrastructure by providing protection from high winds and wave conditions.

#### WestConnex - M4-M5 Link

The M4-M5 Link Tunnels project is a critical component of WestConnex, featuring twin tunnels between the New M4 at Haberfield and the M8 at St Peters. The project opened to traffic in January 2023.

# **Transport Access Program (TAP)**

TAP delivers a better experience for public transport customers across NSW by providing accessible, modern, secure and integrated transport infrastructure. Greater Sydney train stations were upgraded in 2022-23 at Normanhurst, Pymble and Thornleigh.

# **Commuter Car Parks (CCP)**

CCP provides more convenient access to public transport at key transport interchanges to help ease congestion, improve safety and reduce travel time for passengers on the Greater Sydney Road network. Key CCPs were completed in 2022-23 at train stations at Riverwood, Revesby, Emu Plains and Hornsby, as well as on Oakes Road in Carlingford.

# Pacific Highway, Parsons Road to Ourimbah Street

The Pacific Highway upgrade between Ourimbah Street and Parsons Road at Lisarow opened with two lanes in each direction in July 2023, improving traffic flow and safety for around 30,000 motorists travelling on this section of highway.

# New England Highway, Belford to Golden Highway Upgrade

The New England Highway between Belford and the Golden Highway was upgraded to provide two travel lanes in each direction and a flyover for vehicles turning right from the Golden Highway towards Maitland and Newcastle. The NSW Government invested \$97 million for the upgrade to improve traffic flow, travel times and safety for motorists. The new flyover bridge opened to traffic in July 2023.

# Kings Highway, Nelligen Bridge Replacement

The \$148 million Nelligen Bridge Replacement project provides a new two-lane bridge over the Clyde River and upgrades to 1.4 kilometres of the Kings Highway. The new bridge opened to traffic in February 2023.

# McKanes Bridge

The McKanes Bridge over Coxs River on McKanes Falls Road at South Bowenfels opened to traffic in November 2022. The work included replacement of the existing bridge with a safer, stronger and more reliable bridge which still has the appearance and heritage aspects of the original.

# Upgrade to Cessnock Road Flood Immunity at Testers Hollow

The upgrade helps mitigate the impact of flood events along Cessnock Road at Testers Hollow and improves connectivity between the Maitland area, Hunter Expressway and the broader community during these events. The project is a partnership between the Australian and NSW Governments. The project was completed in November 2022.

# Hunter Pinch Points: Intersection Upgrade City Road (Pacific Highway) at Kahibah Road and Northcott Drive

The NSW Government invested \$13.5 million to upgrade intersections of City Road (Pacific Highway) at Kahibah Road and Northcott Drive to improve traffic flow and safety. The project opened to traffic in November 2022.
