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Treasurer's message



Over the past several years, the great strength of the people of regional New South Wales has shone through. Our regions have faced a series of generationally significant challenges, including a historic drought, the Black Summer bushfires and — most recently — COVID-19 and devastating storms and floods.

The NSW Government stood beside the families and communities of regional New South Wales throughout these times. We have committed \$3.5 billion in support to flood-affected communities in partnership with the Commonwealth Government and are continuing to roll out the co-funded \$4.5 billion to assist communities recover from the Black Summer bushfires.

The NSW Government stands ready to continue to support our regions overcome the challenges of today.

However, we also believe in the immense capacity of regional New South Wales to help our State build a brighter tomorrow. Regional and rural communities have long formed the engine room of our State's economy, and this Budget invests to help them drive New South Wales towards a more prosperous future.

By investing to ensure that families across our regional towns and cities enjoy a high quality of life, we can unlock economic growth right across regional New South Wales. Building better frontline services and delivering world-class infrastructure will see the brightest minds and most exciting new businesses make the regions their home and underwrite the prosperity of their communities for decades to come.

This Budget injects an additional \$1.3 billion in the community-boosting Regional Growth Fund, building on its success to date in delivering more than 2,700 transformational projects in our regions and \$835.6 million to continue the delivery of a modern, new regional rail fleet.

It also provides a 10-year \$2.4 billion investment to boost the rural and regional health workforce, to ensure that every citizen receives the highest-quality care. This is in addition to \$174.0 million to clear the current waitlist for key worker housing and \$6.5 billion for 32 new and upgraded hospitals to make sure that access to healthcare is not a lottery based on where you live.

This budget invests \$130.0 million to expand our mining industry to unearth and process the critical minerals that will build the technologies of the future. We have also put aside \$163.9 million to bolster our biosecurity measures to support families that rely on our \$20.9 billion primary industries sector for their livelihoods and \$206.2 million for the Sustainable Farming Program, to reward farmers who invest in best practice regenerative farming.

We have committed \$1.9 billion to roll out renewable energy infrastructure that will make regional New South Wales ground zero for the State's emerging clean energy and manufacturing industries. We are also investing \$391.3 million in the Snowy Mountains Special Activation Precinct so that even more people can enjoy the natural beauty of the region.

The strength and resilience of regional New South Wales is one of the greatest assets of our State. The investments this Budget makes will help throw open the doors of opportunity and harness the potential of regional New South Wales to build a brighter future for all.

Regional New South Wales is a key driver of the State's economic prosperity, producing around a fifth of the total NSW Gross State Product. One-third of the NSW population call regional New South Wales home, and thousands more spend time in the regions each year for study and work, to visit family and friends, and experience unique attractions across the State.

The 2022-23 NSW Budget underpins the NSW Government's sustained commitment to supporting families in regional New South Wales, with the services and infrastructure they need and unlocking opportunities for a brighter future.

There are more people wanting to live, work and raise a family in regional New South Wales than ever before, reflected in unprecedented population migration from our cities. In the six months to the March quarter 2021 more than 54,000 people moved to regional New South Wales, with almost 80 per cent from capital cities.

To support this growth, the NSW Government's 2022-23 Budget is ensuring regional communities have access to high-quality services, investing in critical industries, boosting jobs, unearthing new investment opportunities, and improving community infrastructure. The NSW Government's commitments will continue to invigorate communities and grow industries, with regional families and businesses set to benefit from a new wave of enhancements to local services and amenities.

The Government's continued investment in regional New South Wales will:

- Help communities recover from recent natural disasters through targeted programs for impacted families, primary producers, and business owners so no one is left behind.
- Deliver long-term economic benefit to the State's regions through transformative infrastructure projects.
- Create more opportunities and diverse regional economies by investing in local projects, boosting jobs and skills.
- Support families by reducing the cost of living and enhancing regional communities with high quality services and a skilled and growing workforce.
- Empower First Nations communities to support their cultural, social and economic wellbeing.
- Leave a better planet for future generations by protecting and enhancing regional wildlife and the environment and growing a clean economy.

Highlights of the Government's new and existing key regional investments are included in this document.

High-quality services delivered by a strong and growing workforce

This Budget continues to build a brighter future for regional communities, providing high-quality services, creating opportunities for children and young people, and supporting families by boosting household budgets.

The NSW Government will continue building a robust economy that propels prosperity for decades to come, bolstering frontline services and investing \$1.6 billion in projects to strengthen communities, underpinned by a significant expansion of the Regional Growth Fund.

Support for our regional health system

- \$6.5 billion over 10 years for 32 new or upgraded hospitals in rural and regional New South Wales, with works already under way, or commencing in 2022-23.
- \$2.4 billion over 10 years to provide flexible and bespoke recruitment and retention incentives to build and sustain the rural and regional health workforce. This includes increasing training positions locally and supporting professional development to build the skills and expertise to meet regional needs.
- \$1.8 billion to invest in Ambulance NSW across the State, with new ambulance stations at Warilla, Lisarow, Gateshead, Swansea and Kincumber.
- \$149.5 million to expand access to, and eligibility for, the Isolated Patient Travel and Accommodation Scheme, allowing more people in remote locations to access critical healthcare services over four years.

 \$3.0 million to enhance the regional health directory to deliver an expanded customer-centric and geographically based health directory for regional New South Wales.

Support for regional youth

 \$59.0 million for additional regional youth initiatives to support children and young people across regional New South Wales, framed around four key pillars—Work Ready, Wellbeing, Connectivity and Community—and informed by regional priorities.

Support for crossborder communities

Floods, pandemic border restrictions and bushfires created a unique challenge for more than two million Australians who live close to the State's borders.

The NSW Government is expanding its support for these communities with **\$13.3 million** to the Office of the NSW Cross-Border Commissioner, to:

- modernise cross-border arrangements through interjurisdictional agreements
- advocate for cross-border communities, businesses and organisations.

Expanding the Regional Growth Fund

The NSW Government is continuing to invest in enhancing services and amenities in communities across regional New South Wales to maintain high living standards, making the great things about regional New South Wales even better.

The Regional Growth Fund (RGF) represents an unprecedented investment in the people and communities of regional New South Wales, with \$2.0 billion worth of projects committed, delivering 2,700 projects to date.

Making the regions an even better place to live

Every regional community has their own challenges and priorities, and the RGF has been designed with this in mind.

There is no one-size-fits-all approach for local needs, and the multiple programs under the RGF target different areas, ensuring each community can access funds according to its own priorities.

The NSW Government recognises that not every community is the same, but that all communities across regional New South Wales are worthy of Government commitment and investment.

The RGF is helping to build major infrastructure and bolster regional economies, create jobs, encourage investment, and create opportunities to participate in sport, recreation and culture.

Patton Park Upgrade

\$395,000 was provided to upgrade Patton Park in Broken Hill through the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

Untouched since the 1940s, Patton Park was an empty, disused area where families did not feel safe using outdated amenities and unappealing playground equipment.

Since its upgrade, Patton Park is now a hub of activity, with parents holding so many children's birthday parties there that an event hire company has moved its premises closer to the park.

Lockhart and The Rock Swimming Pools

\$1.5 million was provided from the Stronger Country Communities Fund to refurbish the Lockhart and The Rock Swimming Pools, providing modern maintenance and accessible facilities to meet the long-term needs of the community.

Both pools were at the end of their lives and required significant refurbishments to meet safety and operational obligations.

With funding from the RGF, these projects have delivered modern, all-abilities access amenities across three heated pools at Lockhart and two pools and adjacent playground at The Rock.

Modern community infrastructure plays an integral part in attracting and retaining new families of all ages and abilities, which will benefit the community at large for years to come.

The RGF has been designed to align with the long-term economic vision for regional New South Wales and plays a key role in providing what residents need to live, work, invest and play.

It responds to the diversity and changing needs of regional New South Wales for today and into the future.

The direct and indirect impact that RGF investments have is already evident today, and over time it will significantly contribute to the overall liveability and economic resilience of the State's regions.

This Budget commits an extra **\$1.3 billion** for the next generation of the RGF to build on the success of the program to date and help make regional New South Wales an even better place to live.

This expansion will continue to invest in those areas that matter most to local communities, including:

- \$250.0 million to expand the Stronger Country Communities Fund, supporting grassroots projects to reinvigorate rural communities.
- \$230.0 million to support tourism development projects and enabling infrastructure, leveraging recent significant growth in regional tourism and supporting job creation.
- \$220.0 million to expand the Resources for Regions program, supporting the ongoing prosperity of mining communities by improving economic opportunities and local amenities and creating positive social outcomes.

- \$175.0 million for economic activation, providing investment to existing key industries in regional New South Wales.
- **\$100.0 million** for the Regional Job Creation Fund to support NSW businesses to grow and incentivise interstate and international businesses to invest in regional New South Wales.
- **\$65.0** million for Regional Events Acceleration to allow them to reach a wider audience across the regions.
- **\$20.0 million** to support projects and events for the activation of business opportunities in community facilities.
- \$18.4 million for local community and cultural events to bring people together.
- **\$9.6 million** to support and strengthen regional communities and councils, including priority projects and partnerships.

Ballina Coastal Recreational Walk

\$750,000 from the Regional Growth Environment and Tourism Fund for the Ballina Coastal Recreational Walk to address key accessible tourism infrastructure gaps in the Northern Rivers.

With parts of the track between Skennars Head and the Pat Morton Lookout difficult to traverse. dangerous in locations and inaccessible for many people in the community, a five-kilometre stretch connecting the townships of Lennox Head and Ballina was established.

The purpose-built infrastructure has delivered a safe and efficient route that promotes physical activity, has increased participation in walking and cycling for locals and visitors to the region, and is helping improve quality of life and wellbeing in the region.



High quality and affordable housing

The NSW Government is investing in practical solutions to address regional housing supply issues, implementing key recommendations of the Regional Housing Taskforce Report to remove barriers for delivery, increase stock and expand enabling infrastructure. This Budget will provide:

- \$174.0 million for 271 new homes to clear the waitlist for key workers in regional and remote New South Wales.
- \$149.8 million to deliver 200 new homes and 260 upgrades to State and community-owned properties in First Nations communities, with about 80 per cent of the funds to be spent in regional New South Wales.
- \$120.0 million for Accelerated Infrastructure Fund grants to co-fund critical enabling infrastructure across regional NSW councils.
- \$33.8 million for the Regional Housing
 Development Program, including expanding the
 Urban Development Program (supporting 127,000
 new homes in the 10-year pipeline).
- \$32.0 million to deliver planning and infrastructure upgrades to First Nations communities through the Roads to Home program, supporting access to essential services.

Boosting household budgets

The Budget provides a range of measures that leave more money in household budgets for families right across New South Wales, including:

- \$1.3 billion for the Brighter Beginnings Affordable Preschool initiative to provide fee relief for children across both the community and mobile preschool and long day-care sectors.
- \$193.0 million for the Back to School Subsidy, providing \$150 to every NSW schoolchild towards the cost of school supplies in 2023.
- \$128.0 million Energy Bill Buster program
 to help eligible households reduce their power
 bills by installing free solar panels and more
 efficient appliances.
- **\$98.0** million to provide a \$250 prepaid Regional Apprentice and Uni Travel Card for university students and apprentices in regional New South Wales each year to ease the cost of travel.





Partnering with First Nations communities

Regional New South Wales is home to many diverse First Nations communities whose ancestors have cared for Country for more than 60,000 years.

Shared decision-making and partnership with these communities are key priority reforms under the National Agreement on Closing the Gap.

To support this commitment, the NSW Government is investing \$715.8 million over four years on measures that will strengthen partnerships and support First Nations community-controlled organisations in the regions, including:

- \$30.0 million for the Community and Place program, providing grants of up to \$250,000 to community-controlled organisations to support place-based initiatives.
- \$15.0 million as part of the State Water Strategy for an integrated set of initiatives that deliver the first Aboriginal Water Strategy for New South Wales.

- \$12.5 million for the development of new housing design standards and wraparound service approaches for First Nations people in regional communities.
- \$9.9 million to pilot an Aboriginal Legal Service Child and Family Advocacy and Support program in Western New South Wales and a state-wide telephone advice, advocacy, referral and support service.
- \$9.8 million to establish local place-based partnerships, including support for Aboriginal Community-Controlled Organisations (ACCOs) to form local and regional coalitions.
- \$6.2 million to undertake research and evaluation and deliver a pilot program in partnership with local ACCOs to improve digital connectivity and inclusion in First Nations communities.

Investing in regional economies

Strong economies with opportunities for all

The NSW Government is committed to growing stronger regional economies and communities by investing in vital job-creating projects delivering locally based infrastructure and key services.

Prosperous regions mean a strong state as a whole. The NSW Government is continuing its record investment to drive job creation and retention and ensure that all engine industries continue to be strong.

The 2022-23 NSW Budget will unlock new opportunities in emerging sectors and future industries so regional economies strengthen and grow over the coming years. Key investments to support engine industries and unlock new opportunities include:

- \$296.5 million for the Multipurpose Services Strategy Stage 5, with 19 centres delivered so far and two under way in 2022-23.
- \$145.7 million to deliver the Mission-Critical Emergency Services Messaging Program for a centralised emergency services paging network.
- \$145.0 million to establish
 the Regional Investment
 Activation Program to make
 regional New South Wales the
 location of choice for investors,
 facilitating new private sector
 investment to activate the
 potential of priority precincts
 and industries.

- \$130.0 million to grow investment in mining and exploration by implementing the NSW Critical Minerals and High-Tech Metals Strategy, providing enabling infrastructure and developing skills in critical minerals mining and processing.
- \$28.0 million to support landowners to implement new Private Native Forestry Codes of Practice to encourage forest stewardship, diversify on-farm incomes and improve productivity and environmental outcomes for farm forestry.
- \$9.0 million for a Regional Concierge Service to attract key workers to the regions, focusing on factors outside work that influence a person's decision to live and work in regional areas.
- \$3.6 million to continue supporting young pre-elite athletes in the lead up to the 2032 Brisbane Olympic Games.
- \$1.2 million to support local businesses to expand and supply the defence and aerospace industry through the Regional Defence Networks Program.



Resilience and recovery

The NSW Government continues to provide vital assistance to our rural and regional communities that have faced challenges, with many programs under way to repair, rebuild and recover, in partnership with the Commonwealth Government.

Floods

The severe storms and flooding in February and March 2022 have had a devastating impact on communities across New South Wales, particularly in the Northern Rivers region.

In response, the NSW and Commonwealth governments have jointly committed \$3.5 billion to support impacted communities and established the Northern Rivers Reconstruction Corporation to set and implement reconstruction priorities in the region.

Other measures are designed to provide immediate support and assist people and businesses with returning to their lives as quickly and as safely as possible, including:

- \$312.5 million to deliver State and local government transport infrastructure resilience improvements and upgrades in the Northern Rivers.
- \$145.0 million to replace water and sewerage critical infrastructure.
- \$142.0 million for the Property Assessment and Demolition Program to assess properties and demolish those found to be uninhabitable.
- **\$67.0** million for the North Coast Flood Recovery Education Support Package to support the recovery of schools, early childhood education services and training providers.
- \$36.0 million for levee repair works across northern NSW.
- Direct support grants for local councils, individuals and families, primary producers, small businesses, and not-for-profit organisations.

The NSW Government is also investing an additional \$132.7 million to enable the NSW State Emergency Service to better respond to, understand, plan and prepare for flood and storm events. This includes:

- \$58.7 million to upgrade critical priority unit facilities across New South Wales.
- \$43.0 million to establish two additional zones in northern and western New South Wales with sufficient staffing to support local volunteers.
- \$18.0 million to update the capability of the existing five NSW SES Zone Headquarters to Level 3 Incident Control Centre capability.
- \$11.7 million to establish Zone Headquarters with Level 3 Incident Control Centre capability for the two new Zones.
- \$1.3 million to develop an NSW SES Facility Strategy for modern Incident Control Centres.

Bushfires

The NSW Government continues to provide \$4.5 billion, in partnership with the Commonwealth Government, to assist the continued community recovery from the Black Summer bushfires.

The Government has accepted all 76 recommendations of the NSW Bushfire Inquiry and, in partnership with the Commonwealth Government, committed a further \$315.2 million to:

- \$147.9 million for extending hazard reduction activities.
- \$129.7 million for firefighting tanker replacements and safety upgrades.

- \$27.7 million over four years to upgrade and operate national parks radio infrastructure enabling firefighters to gain critical access to the NSW Public Safety Network.
- \$10.0 million to continue the delivery of critical strategic fire trails.

For national parks, this takes the total Budget investment to \$173.8 million, which will establish an additional 200 permanent firefighter roles and 50 bushfire conservation roles.



Investing in transformational infrastructure

The NSW Government has invested significantly in regional infrastructure over the past decade. To ensure regional New South Wales continues to build excellent facilities for its growing population and provide all the services that strong communities need, this Budget will invest in new and improved infrastructure right across the regions.

Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund

The NSW Government's \$4.2 billion Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund (the Fund) is a once-in-a-generation opportunity to invest in transformative infrastructure across regional New South Wales.

The Fund is delivering critical infrastructure and initiatives to foster regional economic development across priority areas identified in long-term government plans. Key projects include:


- \$100.0 million for the Gig State project to upgrade digital network infrastructure to deliver metro-level internet services to regional businesses and residents.
- \$50.0 million for Mobile Coverage Stage 1, investing in infrastructure and emerging technologies to deliver improved mobile coverage across regional New South Wales.
- \$47.9 million for the Farms of the Future program, supporting farmers to adopt agtech devices and apps.

Special Activation Precincts

The NSW Government is continuing its investment in Special Activation Precincts (SAPs), which represent new ways of planning and delivering industrial and commercial infrastructure to support the ongoing prosperity of regional New South Wales.

The Government has committed around \$1.0 billion of capital expenditure framed at enabling more local jobs and driving economic outcomes, including:

- \$391.3 million for the Snowy Mountains SAP, including the new Southern Connector Road in partnership with the Commonwealth Government, expanding the visitor economy to a year-round destination to increase investment and jobs in the area.
- \$219.0 million for the Parkes SAP, which covers around 4,800 ha at the only junction of Australia's two rail spines, the Inland Rail and Trans-Australia Railway.
- \$193.9 million for the Moree SAP, providing a new business hub specialising in agribusiness, logistics and food processing.
- \$150.6 million for the 4,500 ha Wagga Wagga SAP to capitalise on the Inland Rail project, supporting manufacturing, agribusiness and freight and logistics.
- **\$25.0 million** for Special Activation pre-delivery works for the Williamtown SAP.



Education

The NSW Government continues to deliver high-quality education and modern school infrastructure that meets the needs of the State's growing population while preparing young people for the future economy. This Budget includes:

- \$583.6 million in 2022-23 towards building and upgrading schools across regional and rural areas, equating to 32 per cent of the major works spend on schools in 2022-23.
- \$89.8 million in 2022-23 for new and ongoing capital works programs at regional TAFE campuses to improve facilities, upgrade teaching equipment and create modern learning spaces.
- \$10.6 million for the NSW Aboriginal Education Consultative Group to develop a Regional Operations Model. This includes \$460,000 in 2022-23 to continue implementation and maintenance of the community component of the Language and Culture Nests initiative in regional locations.

Transport

The NSW Government is continuing to invest in projects that connect communities to one another, improve productivity, and increase connections to national and international markets through the movement of goods and people. This Budget includes:

- \$835.6 million over three years to continue delivery of a modern, new Regional Rail Fleet to replace the ageing XPT, XPLORER and Endeavour trains, and construct a purpose-built maintenance facility in Dubbo.
- \$335.0 million over four years as part of a NSW and Commonwealth Government funded proposal to grade separate several road and rail interfaces in New South Wales as a result of the Inland Rail project.
- \$274.5 million over four years to continue detailed planning and commence early works of the Fast Rail Network including initial stages on the northern corridor between Sydney, the Central Coast and Newcastle in collaboration with the Commonwealth Government.
- \$201.2 million for a range of regional transport programs and projects including the Fixing Country Bridges program, continued planning and delivery of the 16 Cities program, and supporting regional councils through the Fixing Local Roads program.
- \$193.0 million over two years to support the upgrades of priority regional roads transferred to the State, as part of the NSW Government's Regional Road Transfer and Road Classification Review.

- \$60.2 million over two years for the Fixing Country Rail program, to continue to deliver improved capacity and reliability of the regional rail network and deliver a highly functional network for moving freight in and out of regional areas.
- \$12.0 million to continue the Transport Connected Bus Program, delivering vehicle tracking and automatic passenger-counting technology across contracted buses in regional New South Wales.
- \$8.7 million to commence the Heavy Vehicle Rest Stops Improvement program, which will allow for the progressive delivery of rest-stop improvements on state roads throughout regional New South Wales.

Energy

The NSW Government is transforming the State's energy infrastructure that will generate economic and employment benefits for regional industries, workers and consumers.

Additional investments over the next four years that will significantly boost regional areas include:

- \$1.9 billion to roll out transmission infrastructure for Renewable Energy Zones in five New South Wales regions (which is intended to be fully recouped, with a maximum impact on net debt of \$1.2 billion after taking account of recycling proceeds).
- \$110.0 million to build low-carbon industry by providing grants for new business activities to competitively produce low-emissions materials.
- \$105.0 million investment in the Renewable Manufacturing Fund to ensure New South Wales captures the jobs and investment benefits of the renewable energy transition.
- An additional \$50.4 million to accelerate the Renewable Energy Zone development in light of earlier-than-expected thermal power plant closures.
- \$45.9 million to expand the Pumped Hydro grants program to add a further 1.4 GW of storage capacity to the grid.

Primary industries

The primary industries sector is the backbone of many of the State's regional areas. This Budget invests:

- \$182.0 million to deliver the 10-year NSW Government Marine Estate Management Strategy to improve water quality, estuary health and other biodiversity and environmental metrics.
- \$163.9 million in 2022-23 to bolster the State's response and readiness capability to future biosecurity incursions, including enhanced response targeting endemic species.
- \$58.0 million to undertake repair work on state forestry roads and related infrastructure as part of the Forestry Land Stabilisation and Repair Program.
- \$17.1 million to continue the Farm Business Resilience Program and Rural Financial Counselling Service, which provides farmers with the skills and knowledge they need to build resilience to future droughts and natural disasters.

Protecting and enjoying our natural environment

Investing in protecting and enhancing the State's natural capital ensures the environment is sustained to secure a shared future for the wildlife and people of New South Wales. New investments include:

- \$222.1 million over four years for the National Parks and Wildlife Service across the State, to support the following investments benefiting regional communities:
 - the new Arc Rainforest
 Centre and Dorrigo
 Escarpment Great Walk to
 showcase the ancient World
 Heritage rainforests of the
 Dorrigo escarpment

- the establishment of a Reserve and Activation Fund to fill critical gaps in the national parks estate and to enhance regional tourism and economic benefits
- \$206.2 million over 10 years to enhance the State's natural capital by rewarding farmers who opt-in to a Sustainable Farming accreditation program.
- \$106.7 million to establish a new Biodiversity Credits
 Supply Fund, to purchase and make available biodiversity credits for re-sale to public and private proponents, enabling sustainable development and rewarding landholders who use their land for conservation.
