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RUM HOSPITAL RESTORATION REVEAL AT NSW PARLIAMENT HOUSE

Parliament's \$22 million critical maintenance and restoration work program is now complete.

The successful restoration of one of Australia's oldest public buildings, the Rum Hospital, marks a significant milestone in safeguarding an important piece of Australia's history and architectural heritage.

With its origins dating back to 1816, the Rum Hospital is recognised on the NSW State Heritage Register as a pivotal site in Australia's democratic history. Originally used as a hospital, in 1829 it was identified as a fitting location for Australia's first Parliament.

The restoration of the Rum Hospital saw significant structural repairs and conservation of historical features, including restoration of the heritage fabric and materials, remediation of dilapidated fabric and water ingress, and improvements to air quality and accessibility through important upgrades.

The Hon. Greg Piper MP, Speaker of the NSW Legislative Assembly, was pleased to see the work finalised ahead of schedule and on budget.

"The completion of the Rum Hospital restoration marks a significant milestone for all who cherish history and democracy."

"This project goes beyond preserving bricks and mortar; it breathes new life into key components of Australia's cultural heritage, ensuring NSW Parliament House can continue to be the people's house for generations to come," Mr Piper said.
