session, members would be allowed to make passing reference to financial matters but detailed financial analysis and discussion of particular items in the Budget cannot be pursued in the debate on the Address in Reply, 1114.

The motion for the adoption of the Address in Reply should not be used for the purpose of making imputations or allegations of improper conduct, charges or innuendos against another member as these may be made only on substantive motions moved for that purpose, 404.

*Appropriation Bill:* Members should deal generally with the finances of the State and Government financial policies. No detailed reference should be made to administrative acts nor should discussion be entered upon in respect of particular items included in departmental estimates. Matters involving detail and administration should be left until the Committee stage of the bill, 1456.

A member should make only passing reference to matters not relevant to the Budget, 1457.

*Chair:* A member should not canvass a ruling given by the Chair, 1909, 3245.

It is discourteous to the Chair for a member to interrupt while a ruling is being given, 4062.

A member should address the Chair, 9190.

*Debate:* A member had exhausted his time for speaking, 515, 907, 925, 1546, 2511, 3510, 5882, 5895, 6036, 7060, 8194, 9191, 10391.

*Documents:* A member may make only passing references to documents and must not quote extensively from them, 3261.

Reading long newspaper articles is not permissible, 7078.

*Grievance debate:* The Chair will not permit a member to proceed with a dissertation concerning another member. If the member wishes to refer further to that other member he should do so by way of substantive motion, 8196.

*Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder:* Interjections are disorderly, 2502, 3032, 3666, 3683, 4065, 5034, 5094, 7272, 10151; and if a member wishes to contribute to the debate he should seek the call, 5034, 7272.

A member who has spoken in the debate should not interject while another member is making his speech, 1180.

If a member who already had been called to order twice offended again the Chair would have no alternative but to apply the provisions of Standing Order 387, 3689.

In calling for restraint on both sides of the House the Chair said that ordering the removal of a member at this late stage of the sitting would not be much of a deterrent to disorderly conduct. The Chair drew the attention of new members to the consequence of being removed from the House under the standing orders, that they would be excluded not only for the remainder of the day's sitting, but also for the whole of the next sitting day, 501.

The Chair directed the attendant to remove from the gallery a person who was interjecting. The Chair informed those in the public gallery that they must observe certain standards of behaviour laid down by the House and any person interjecting would be removed, 1478.

*Members:* Maiden speeches, 10975.

*Motions:* As it was fifteen minutes after 4 o'clock p.m., the debate was interrupted. Pursuant to Standing Order 123A the motion lapsed, 4073, 9195.

*Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Inputations and Aspersions:* A member was asked to desist from making unparliamentary remarks, 2510.

The following remark was required to be withdrawn: "The member misled the House", 3297.

*Points of Order:* No point of order was involved, 9583, 9584. A point of order was upheld or upheld in part, 2810, 2813, 3297, 3303, 3364, 4062, 5692, 6262, 6264.

As submissions on a point of order were developing into a debate on a bill a member was asked to come quickly to his point of order, 1078.

A member cannot take a point of order on another member who is responding to a point of order, 10390.

A member cannot withdraw a point of order, 3303.

*Privilege:* It is the right of every member to say what he likes under privilege in Parliament, subject only to the observance of the forms and the practices of the House. That right should be exercised with restraint. The things that a member says about matters before a court are on his own head, 7059, 7076.

*Procedure:* A member who is leading for his party should state that at the commencement of his speech, 10142.

A member who has a doubt about whether he is the next member to speak in the debate should seek the call, 4768.

A member who wishes to be given an extension of time must seek it prior to the expiration of the time allotted to him. As a member had failed to do so, he could not be granted an extension, 6036.

A member who wished to reflect on the integrity of another member should do so by way of substantive motion, 10391.

*Quorum:* The Chair reminded a member that if a quorum was present a member who called for a quorum was guilty of disorder, 423.

It is disorderly for a member to leave the House once the quorum bells have been rung, 4055.

Passing reference to matters not directly relevant to the question before the House will be allowed but detailed reference to such matters will not be tolerated, 3501.

A member was warned that if he continued to ignore the Chair's ruling and dealt with irrelevant issues he would be asked to resume his seat, 2779, 2811, 10962.

*Appropriation Bill:* Remarks must be relevant to the question before the Chair, 2043.

When a clause is under discussion the member speaking must confine himself to the estimate of expenditure relevant to that clause, 2059, 2292, 8505.

*Chair:* A member should address the Chair, 2042.

The Chair will not tolerate members ignoring rulings, 2279.

Any member called to order while the Chair is delivering a ruling will be removed from the Chamber and will be absent for the rest of the day, 8516.

*Committee:* Remarks in Committee must not be in the form of a speech in a second reading debate, 4342.

A member speaking in Committee is restricted to the clause or schedule under consideration, 6063.

It is not the intention of the Chair that the words of enactment be put as a question to the Committee, 2012.

*Debate:* A member had exhausted his time for speaking, 8562, 8568, 8575.

*Divisions:* The Opposition Whip should make his intention clear to the Chair if he proposes to call for a division, 3013.

The Chair had put the question and it had been agreed to, 9942.

There was far too much audible conversation in the Chamber, 3013; and members wishing to engage in conversation should leave the Chamber, 4341.

General calls apply to all members. A member should be allowed to make a contribution to the debate without interruption, 8497.

*Procedure:* A member who wished to seek the call should not only stand but should also seek the call, 10168.

*Relevance:* Remarks must be relevant to the question before the Chair, 2023, 2029, 2043, 2059, 2278, 2288, 2292, 2294, 2301, 2303, 2306, 2313, 3010, 8349, 8516, 8519, 8523.

A member was warned that he would be ordered to resume his seat if he continued to make remarks that were irrelevant to the question before the Chair, 2288.

As a member had referred to a matter, some rebuttal of those remarks may be warranted. However, a member should not dwell on the matter, 8507.

When a clause of the Appropriation Bill is under discussion a member speaking shall confine himself to the estimate of expenditure relevant to such clause, 8505.

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. LAWRENCE BORTHWICK KELLY):

*Address in Reply:* The debate is wide-ranging. It would be interfering with freedom of speech to interrupt a member who criticized a person who was not a member of the House, but it

should be kept in mind that the person criticized had no right of reply in the debate, 327.

In the Address-in-Reply debate a member may raise practically any matter, 326; and may refer to the administration of a portfolio, 917; but he may not reflect on another member except by way of substantive motion, 326, 917.

*Adjournment:* In the debate on the adjournment of the House, members are permitted to discuss any one matter of local or general interest and may deal with that matter in such manner as they think fit, subject to the ordinary rules of debate, 3403.

A member was out of order in attempting to continue a debate that had been concluded, 4806.

It is not in order for a member to raise on the adjournment of the House a matter that has been replied to at question time by a Minister, 8077.

A member may not try to continue discussion of a matter that was the subject of a question asked earlier, whether or not that question was unanswered, 5290.

A member was ruled out of order on a matter he wished to raise on the adjournment of the House, 458.

During the currency of the Address-in-Reply debate the subject-matter of an adjournment debate must be strictly local in nature, with fairly narrow implications and highly unlikely to be raised by any other member during the Address-in-Reply debate, 275, 457, 657.

As the Minister had replied to the matter raised by a member on the adjournment the question was. That this House do now adjourn, 2639, 9072.

As the time allowed a member had been diminished because a quorum had been called, though the new sessional orders did not provide for the forming of a quorum during the adjournment debate, the Chair allowed the member to address the House for a further two minutes, 8583.

A difficulty the Chair faced was to decide whether the Minister should have twelve minutes to deal as he wished with any of the subjects raised by members or whether he was entitled to respond to each topic for a maximum of three minutes. The Chair inclined

to the view that the sessional orders allowed the Minister three minutes in which to reply to each matter raised, 10180.

*Adjournment* (S.O. 49): A member who wished to censure a Minister should proceed by way of substantive motion. If a matter the subject of a notice under Standing Order 49 involves an accident that will be the subject of a coronial inquiry it would be difficult for the Chair to allow the matter to proceed. The motion was, by leave, withdrawn, 7832.

The standing orders provide a method by which a matter may be brought into the House and discussed, 238.

*Censure*: Where a motion seeks to censure a Minister personally the Minister may defend his integrity, 4038.

In a censure motion a Minister must be allowed some latitude in defending himself and his actions and in giving reasons why the motion should not be agreed to, 5402.

In a motion that deals with the censure of a member the member is entitled to put his side of the case to the House, 10315.

*Chair*: The control of the House should be left to the Chair, 4145.

It is not in order for a member to direct how the Chair should deal with a matter, 1571.

A member should not reflect upon the Chair, 2267, 2584, 2587, 4906, 8299, 11229.

If a member continued to reflect, even indirectly, on the Chair, the Chair would have no hesitation in dealing with him, 2587.

A member should not canvass a ruling of the Chair, 2583, 3224.

The Chair will deal with members who continue to be disrespectful to the Chair, 2974.

A member was warned that he would be named if he persistently and wilfully disregarded the authority of the Chair, 2267.

A member was asked to resume his seat or to leave the Chamber, 65.

The Chair would not tolerate a member commenting on his ruling. The member was called to order and warned that if he offended again he would be removed from the Chamber, 124.

If members continued to conduct themselves in a disorderly manner while the Chair was addressing the House he would have no option but to remove them, 236.

The Chair had not noticed a member passing between the Chair and the member addressing the Chair, 2970.

A member who had been named was warned that the Chair would not hesitate to name him again if he persisted in similar conduct, and the Chair would extend the period of expulsion for a further two days, 2594, 2595.

A member who was showing disregard for a ruling of the Chair was asked to show caution in the manner he proceeded, 7239.

The Chair has no control over what a member says so long as he conforms to the standard practice of the House, 7233.

The Chair deplored the action of a member in resorting to the news media as a means of attacking the Chair as the standing orders and the practices of the House provided sufficient means for members to express dissatisfaction with actions of the Chair, 2569.

The Chair gives the call, not a member, 7824.

Members should address their remarks to the Chair, 8299, 9636.

It seemed to the Chair that a concerted effort was being made by the Opposition members to trifle with the House by taking points of order, 4146.

*Debate*: It is not in the spirit of a second reading debate for a member to go through a bill clause by clause and ask a Minister questions about the clauses, 3775.

In his reply a member is entitled to refer to remarks made by other members; though he may not introduce new material or any matter that he thought other members intended to raise, 1365, 1368, 1446, 3230, 3231, 3232, 3234, 5420.

When speaking in reply to a motion it is not in order for a member to make another speech on the motion, 1447.

As a member had already spoken in the debate, he had no right of reply, 2484.

A Minister is entitled to a reply to a second reading debate, 3290.

In his reply a Minister may deal with the arguments advanced by other members, 2490, 2829.

If members of the Opposition give a copy of their amendments to the Minister and foreshadow them in the second reading debate, the Minister is entitled to deal with them in his reply, 3045.

Members are not required to report to the press all matters that they propose to raise in debate, 8185.

When a Minister is replying he should restrict himself to the points raised by other members who spoke in the debate, 2600.

A member was asked to resume his seat because of tedious repetition and irrelevancies, 2594.

Nothing in the procedure of the House excludes a member from introducing into the debate statements made by another member, 7379.

It is out of order for a member to quote passages from a newspaper to influence debate in the Chamber, 2586.

With a view to the orderly conduct of the business of the House it has been customary to look to the Opposition Whip, the Leader of the Opposition, or the member leading for the Opposition on a measure to determine whether a division is to be called, though it is in order for any member to call a division, 1306.

The Chair intimated that it was his intention, if he did not have the co-operation of the Whips to ask that the doors be closed. Members who thought that they would thwart the division by staying out of the Chamber ostensibly to obtain copies of bills were on a false premise, 10613.

Once the barriers are closed, members should remain in their seats, 182, 3800.

*Documents*: It is in order for a Minister to quote from confidential files. It is not incumbent upon him to table the report, 1293.

As a document was not a public document the Chair had no power to direct a Minister to table it, 3734.

A private member may not table documents, 4143.

If a Minister wishes to have a document incorporated in *Hansard*, application should be made in the appropriate way, 1438.

It is repugnant to the spirit of debate to read material prepared by people outside the House, 915.

A member may make a brief mention of material prepared by people outside the House but should use material of his own composition to make his speech, 4620.

A member who quotes from a letter should give the name and address of the writer, but in any event a member should not read extensively from letters, 6464, 6467, 6946, 7235.

*Grievance Debate* (See also *Debate and Procedure*): It is permissible in the Grievance Debate for a member to defend a citizen whose reputation has been attacked in a previous debate, 8185.

If a member by interjecting disrupts the debate of another member he will be dealt with by the Chair or called to order, 2591; but if a member who is speaking replies to interjections there is nothing the Chair can do about it, 11227.

There were far too many interjections, 7254, 9148.

Members who persist in interjecting will be named as being disorderly and removed from the Chamber, 3736.

Continual interjections will not be tolerated. The Chair will have no hesitation in naming any member who further offends and those members will be excluded from the sittings of the House for today and the next day of sitting, 1516.

Members who have been called to order for interjecting will be deemed disorderly and named if they are called to order a second time, 2435.

Members who have been called to order for interjecting will be removed from the House if they persist in such disorderly conduct, 1287.

A Minister should be allowed to answer a question without interjection, 119, 3737, 7041, 7042, 7045, 7369.

Remarks about members of the Equal Opportunity Tribunal were allowed, 10177.

*Ministerial Statement*: A ministerial statement is a matter of policy, not a matter of fact, 233.

*Motions*: A member should move the correct motion, 1432.

A member who moves a motion under Standing Order 106 should ensure that the intent of the motion is clear. As the Minister was willing to accept an amendment a member was permitted to amend a motion, 5395.

A member who had moved an amendment to a motion is entitled to speak to the amendment, but should not stray too far from the subject-matter of the motion, 1324.

If a member wishes to impute improper motives to another member he should do so by way of substantive motion, 919.

A motion was ruled in order, 2574.

An amendment to a motion was ruled out of order, 2584.

It being fifteen minutes past 4 o'clock p.m., the debate was interrupted. Pursuant to Standing Order 123A the motion lapsed, 3695, 4950, 7287, 7753.

A member should not digress from the subject-matter of a motion, 7237.

In a motion that deals with the censure of a member the member is entitled to put to the House his side of the case, 10315.

A member cannot vote against his own motion, 10641.

A member cannot move that another member be not further heard when that member is moving a motion, 10596.

*Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions*: Members shall not use offensive or unbecoming words about any member of either House, nor impute improper

motives or make personal reflections on members. If a member wishes to pursue a matter he should do so by way of substantive motion, 916, 1989, 2592, 3224, 5290.

When referring to another member who has been charged with an offence a member must be extremely careful in his speech that he creates no prejudice, 4441.

Though good temper and moderation are essential, particularly when a member is replying to his opponents in debate, members should not be over-ready to complain of rugged and forthright criticism. They must not become too sensitive or too obsessed with the importance of their own dignity, or allow themselves to become intolerant of criticism, 4899.

If a remark is offensive to a member that member has the right to ask for its withdrawal. It is not competent for another member to look after the interests of that member, 5402.

A statement used generally against members cannot be withdrawn by an individual irrespective of how offensive it may be, 5293.

A member seeking withdrawal of remarks should state what has offended him, 1126.

When the Chair asks that a remark be withdrawn, the remark should be withdrawn in an unqualified manner, 1355, 3020.

Any direct remark such as "You are a liar", or "You are telling lies", is unparliamentary language but if a member discounts what has been said by saying, "That's a lie", that is not unparliamentary language, 1350.

A member was asked to withdraw a remark addressed to the Chair, "I exhort you to examine your conscience", 11229.

The following words and expressions were required to be withdrawn: "You are as guilty as hell", 1304; "The Attorney General lied", 1347; "Liar", 1354; "Larry the liar", 1355; "He did not get his cut", 5292; "I do not believe that this House should tolerate this idiot in the performance that he is giving", 5652; "How much did you get paid?", 5746; "That interjection is beneath contempt. It has taken place only because of the extreme inebriation of the member", 5746; "Galah", 6197; "Why did he lie to this Parliament?", 6480; "The Premier made a deliberate approach to intervene in the matter and to have the ordinary course of justice set aside", 7238; "Yet another charge of interference in the

A member was not required to withdraw "Morgan Ryan, a friend of the Premier", 918.

Members who use privilege to attack private citizens do so on their own responsibility, 8185.

*Personal Explanations:* The purpose of a personal explanation is to afford a member the opportunity to explain how his integrity or position as a member has been impugned or affected, 7376; and if remarks made by another member are untrue and the member making a personal explanation can explain that to the House he should do so, but he cannot debate the subject, 3354, 3355.

In making a personal explanation a member is not entitled to debate issues and may not use the opportunity to attack other persons, 479.

A member should come to the point of his explanation and endeavour to deal with it as expeditiously as possible, 1301.

If a member has taken offence at something said about his character or his position as a Member of Parliament he will be allowed to make an explanation about the matter but if he refers to other matters he will not be allowed to proceed, 1301.

A member may tell the House how a reflection has been made on his character or his position as a Member of Parliament. If the information given in statements made by policemen is wrong the member is entitled to explain that matter, but he may not debate it, 1302.

When making a personal explanation a member may deal with those parts of an answer given by a Minister that reflect on his integrity and affect his position as a Member of Parliament, 4911, 4912.

If a member wishes to explain how his integrity or position as a member has been reflected on improperly he may make a personal explanation but he is not entitled to debate the question, he may not introduce new matter, and he should be brief, 1298, 1303, 1305, 4910, 8139, 8298, 8299.

A member was straying from the substance of his personal explanation, 1306.

A member had chosen by way of personal explanation to explain how his integrity had been reflected upon, how his position as a member had been affected, or how his character as a former Attorney General had been impugned. Had he not elected to make a personal explanation he probably could have chosen to rise on a matter of privilege, in which case he would have been entitled to speak for ten minutes. The member was ruled in order, 1572.

The Chair asked a member whether he believed his integrity had been impugned or his position in the Parliament criticized, 485.

A matter was more one for a personal explanation than one on which to take a point of order, 6271.

A member had been given sufficient time to make his personal explanation, 8140, 8300.

*Points of Order:* It seemed to the Chair that a concerted effort was being made by Opposition members to trifle with the House by taking points of order, 4146.

The Chair will rule on points of order, 2459.

If a member wishes to take a point of order he should seek the call, 4145, 10062.

A member is entitled to make his submission on a point of order, 4911; but he may not enter into debate, 1298, 1302, 1305, 3803; and a member should come quickly to his point of order, 1447, 4144, 4146, 4287, 4314, 6198, 6442, 6451, 9534, 9745, 10069.

A member who wishes to contribute to debate on a point of order should do so before a ruling is made on the point of order, 4031.

Members should remain silent while another member is speaking to a point of order, 1447.

A matter was more a matter for personal explanation than one on which to take a point of order, 6271.

*Privilege*: The right of a member to use his position and the privilege of free speech to attack a member of the public should be exercised with restraint, 3286, 8185; and occasionally the Chair will seek to restrain such attacks in what appear to be bad cases, 8185.

If a member improperly attacks a citizen, he may incur the censure of the House or of the public, 1572.

Members carry the burden of any reflection made on members of the public, 8187.

It would be trifling with the House if, when speaking to a matter of privilege, a member were allowed to continue for ten minutes, at the end of which time he intimated that he did not intend to move a motion or did not give a clear intention of moving a motion, 6197.

Under Standing Order 158 a member is allowed to raise a matter of privilege suddenly arising. The member must indicate at the end of the time available, which is ten minutes, that he proposed to move a motion. The member had given that indication and had read to the House the motion he proposed to move. It was clear that the motion dealt with the same matter the member had raised in the House on a previous occasion. A similar matter had been placed before the Joint Select Committee upon Parliamentary Privilege and a report from the committee was pending. The Chair ruled that a prima facie case had not been made, 6200.

In alleging a breach of privilege a member must show that the matter complained of could be said, fairly and reasonably, to be an interference with that member's performance of his duties. As what the member had said would not satisfy that condition, he was ruled out of order, 1050.

Members should listen to another member speak to a point of order, the Chair would rule on the point of order and then another member would be allowed to make a personal explanation, 1299.

No provision is made in the standing orders for a member to raise a matter as one of courtesy, 3045.

It is not possible for a member to move that a Minister be not further heard when the Minister is giving an answer to a question, 6444.

A member was trifling with the House, 5653, 6450.

A matter was more a matter for personal explanation than one on which to take a point of order, 6271.

Allegations of improper conduct or charges against a member may be made only upon a substantive motion framed for that purpose, 4898.

A private member may move for the suspension of standing orders without notice only during question time. That member must rise when he is given the call and move. That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would preclude the consideration forthwith of the following motion, stating the substantive motion he proposed. He will then be allowed to speak on it for ten minutes, and the Minister will be entitled to make a statement on the matter, 4147, 4148.

When giving notice of motion a member must confine himself to giving notice of the motion, 115.

As the House had already established that a matter was urgent and should be dealt with forthwith the question before the Chair was, That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would preclude consideration of the motion forthwith, 128.

As urgency had been agreed to there was no point in a member speaking to urgency, 1346, 3205.

A member must not introduce substantive matters when speaking to a motion to suspend standing orders, 126.

As the bills were yet to be introduced a motion that the bills be declared urgent was out of order, 6770.

The right of a member to use his position and the privilege of free speech to attack a member of the public should be exercised with restraint, 3286.

It is for the House and the public to decide whether a member is misleading the House, 1365.

As a matter of courtesy members refer to other members by the name of their electorates or in the case of a Minister, the portfolio held by the Minister. However, it is in order for a member to say, "You said" or "You did something", 133, 1446, 4442, 6514, 10178.

The grievance debate may not be used for an attack on another member. If a member wishes to attack another member he should do so by way of substantive motion, 8182.

Ministers may table papers at any time, 7708.

When speaking to a motion for the suspension of standing orders a member must give reason why the business of the House should be suspended, and not deal with the substantive motion in detail, 8477.

A member should wait until he is given the call before speaking, 9838.

The accepted practice has been for members speaking to a motion that Government business have precedence of general business to give a brief description of other issues requiring examination, but not to debate them, 10344.

A member seeking the withdrawal of remarks should state what has offended him, 11226.

A member cannot move that another member be not further heard when that member is moving a motion, 10596.

Members seeking the call must catch the eye of the Speaker. The Chair had not seen any member seeking the call, 10595.

The Chair intimated that it was his intention, if he did not have the co-operation of the Whips, to ask that the doors be closed. Members who thought that they would thwart

the division by staying out of the Chamber ostensibly to obtain copies of bills were on a false premise, 10613.

*Rulings on Procedure:* The Chair intimated that earlier in the sitting several rulings had been given but upon reflection the Chair believed the practice of the House to be:

(1) The question that a member "be not further heard" can be moved at any time except upon a member speaking to a point of order or as set out in the sessional orders.

(2) That when a motion has been carried that "the bill or bills be brought in and passed through all stages at this or any subsequent sitting" a member may, after the Minister's second reading speech, proceed to give his second reading speech, unless the House decides otherwise.

(3) That when a member moves a motion he is free to vote upon it on either side of the House, 10754.

*Questions without Notice:* A question should seek information about one matter only, 65; or press for action to be taken, 5366.

Questions should not be argumentative, nor should they contain more facts than are necessary to explain the question, 391, 888, 5854, 5966.

In asking a question no member should give an opinion, put argument or state facts other than are sufficient to explain the question, 391.

A member was in order in asking a question with a view to gleaning information that may be used in a debate at a later stage, 1156.

A member should seek advice from his colleagues about using colourful words when asking questions, 288, 391.

It is not permissible for a member to ask a Minister by way of a question to confirm the accuracy of a newspaper report, 2440.

Though a question referred to a newspaper report, it also sought information and for that reason it was in order, 5958, 7373.

A question should seek information, not opinions. If a Minister answered a question with a statistical example, members should be satisfied that he was not asked for an opinion, 744.

Nothing in the standing orders allows the Chair to direct a Minister to answer a question succinctly, 2263.

As only a minute of question time remained a Minister was allowed to continue answering a question, though it seemed to the Chair that the answer to the question may be lengthy, 891.

A Minister was entitled to answer a question without interjection, 4022, 5481.

The Leader of the Opposition had already had priority in seeking the call to ask a question. If he sought the call again the Chair would give him that opportunity when the question already asked had been answered, 472.

In asking a question a member had given more facts than were necessary to explain the question, 1155.

Questions were ruled out of order, 888, 2970, 3494, 3740, 5366, 5850, 5966, 8663, 9145.

A question was ruled out of order because of its prolixity, 391.

A question was ruled in order, 3350, 3732, 7707, 8483, 8801, 10582.

A question was in order as it sought information and facts, 4548.

Though it is done on occasions, it is unnecessary for a Minister to seek leave to give an answer to a question asked earlier the same day, 4314.

It is not possible for a member to move that a Minister be not further heard when giving an answer to a question, 6444.

A motion that a Minister be not further heard had been moved previously during question time. The Chair intimated that he intended to follow that practice until the House decided otherwise, 6489.

A member who wished to ask a question should seek the call, 3629.

Only passing reference should be made to matters that are of limited relevance to a bill, 2820; or are not within the terms of the bill, 2825; though it is competent for a member to refer to matters mentioned in the schedules to a bill, 3283.

It is difficult to limit a member to the two points the member raised in a censure motion, 4028; but motions should not contain too much argument or too much material that would be introduced in the debate on such motion, 4030.

A member who had moved an amendment to a motion was entitled to speak to the amendment, though he should not stray too far from the subject-matter of the motion, 1324.

A member was trifling with the House, 2261.

It is not improper for a member to raise federal issues that have an effect upon New South Wales, 3391.

A member was asked to resume his seat because of tedious repetition and irrelevancies, 2594.

The accepted practice has been for members speaking to a motion that Government business have precedence of general business to mention and give a brief description of the issues requiring examination, but not to debate them, 10344.

*Special Adjournment:* It is competent for a member to speak to matters listed as general business. Some flexibility is allowed to members

to raise other matters, but if a member wishes to show that another member is misbehaving, he should do so by way of a substantive motion, 3386.

A member is not permitted to traverse his electorate selecting matters he considers of importance to his constituents, 3399.

Members will be confined to stating why the House should not adjourn and to mentioning briefly matters that they think are important, but they will not be allowed to dwell on those matters at any length, 3391.

Christmas felicitations, 11282.

*Sub Judice*: A member should not say anything that might affect the rights of a person before a court, 5778, 8192.

When speaking of another member who has been charged with an offence a member should be extremely careful that he creates no prejudice, 4441.

As a member had referred to a specific Aboriginal housing co-operative it would be a simple matter to identify those persons who had been charged. That could cause injury to people who are entitled to a fair hearing, 2846.
