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EDUCATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING

Questions from the Hon Mark Latham MLC

1. What practical steps to further safeguard children with a disability in NSW Education schools have been undertaken since the Parliamentary Inquiry into Students with a disability or special needs in NSW schools?

The NSW Government accepted the findings of the Inquiry and are acting on the recommendations of the Inquiry.

Together with educators, disability experts and families, we have put together a plan for an education system that does better by children and young people with disability, and enhances support for those providing that education – our teachers and school staff.

The Department of Education's Disability Strategy was released in 2019 and sets out a plan for providing children and young people with disability, their families and the broader community with an education system that meets their needs. It responds to, and goes beyond, the Parliamentary Inquiry recommendations.

2. Given the NSW Disability Strategy now has a 'Reference Group' that has met twice since September 2019 – has said group been asked to offer any advice to the Department or have they only been given information on actions already taken? What are the details?

Yes, the group has been consulted by the Department of Education.

The Disability Strategy Reference Group has met on two occasion since September 2019. It is supported by two other reference groups, the Professional Development Reference Group and the Improving the Learning and Support Journey Reference group.

The terms of reference for the Disability Strategy Reference Group were agreed by the members. The role and purpose of the group is to provide advice to the Department of Education in meeting the objectives and commitments of the Disability Strategy.

Members provide strategic advice and feedback on and test ideas with respect to:

• the impact of the Disability Strategy and its initiatives;

- the work that needs to be done to realise the intended vision of the Disability Strategy; and
- how the work from the Disability Strategy is being received in schools, across the department and in local communities.

Some of the topics that we have discussed in depth with the Reference Group are:

- Innovation Program
- Behaviour Strategy and Suspension policy review
- Student and parent voice.

The Department will continue to seek advice from the reference group on the Strategy's work to ensure that the intended vision of is realised.

3. Given that the Department did not previously classify all cases that involved children with a disability as involving children with a disability; will they now do so, and will previously 'inaccurate' data now be rectified to note this?

Legal claims can be received at any time during or after a student has been at NSW public school. Whether a claimant has or had a pre-existing disability may not be stipulated at the time of making a claim (which may be many years after they have left school), and it may not be relevant to the claim.

In response to questions asked during previous Budget Estimates hearings, the NSW Department of Education reported amounts that have been paid on behalf of the Department in settlement of discrimination and bullying claims made by students with a disability. This data was sourced from Insurance and Care NSW (iCare) who hold source data for NSW Government Agencies in relation to claims.

When this data was originally collected and coded, the question of whether a claimant was a person with disability was generally only recorded in relation to disability discrimination claims, and not in relation to general negligence claims.

The Department's insurer, iCare, recently performed a manual review of around 400 claims relating to the Department. iCare has now added data extracted from their claim files which was not previously maintained in the insurance database.

The data previously provided was not inaccurate. It was responsive to the question asked to the extent that iCare could identify relevant claims.

Questions relating to the coding and recording of claims data on behalf of the State should be directed to iCare.

4. How many legal actions have been taken against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019)?

There were 46 complaints to the Anti-Discrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission naming the NSW Department of Education as a respondent, in relation to the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools. Seven of

these named a staff member in the complaint. The Anti-Discrimination Board issued a separate notice of investigation to a staff member named in one complaint against the Department.

- 5. Of those legal actions taken against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019) where the department paid out settlements or discontinuations, involving complaints about staff, how many staff,
 - (a) were reprimanded;
 - (b) were transferred away from children with a disability;
 - (c) were removed from their posts; and
 - (d) had no action taken against them?

Of the seven complaints made to the Anti-Discrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission that named Departmental staff members, only one matter was referred to the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate. No action was taken against the staff member concerned.

Any legal action taken against the NSW Department of Education is treated separately from any investigation of misconduct. Complaints made to the Antidiscrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission, may not amount to reportable conduct and therefore may not elicit investigation or disciplinary action.

All allegations of a child protection nature are individually assessed by trained child protection investigators. Following investigation, should an employee be found to have engaged in misconduct, appropriate disciplinary action, ensuring the safety and welfare of children, is taken.

6. How much money has the Government of NSW, on behalf of the NSW Department of Education, had to pay in court costs, in settlement and in discontinuation agreements in regard to legal action against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019)?

The above amounts were paid on behalf of the NSW Department of Education in settlement of disability discrimination claims, as well as general negligence claims disability was an essential component of the alleged breach of duty of care.

iCare recently performed a manual review of around 400 claims relating to the Department. iCare has now added data extracted from the iCare claim files not previously maintained in the insurance database.

Given the expanded criteria and the depth of the manual review performed recently by iCare, the above figures are not directly comparable to the previous responses provided to Budget Estimates. In addition, the above figures reflect the calendar year totals, whereas previous responses reflected financial year totals.

Payments made during these calendar years may arise from events occurring during earlier periods.

7. How many

- (a) primary and
- (b) secondary

mainstream schools in NSW have a separate 'support unit' for children with a disability?

There are currently 423 primary schools and 289 secondary schools with support classes.

8. How many SSP schools have a full curriculum for children with a disability?

Under the Disability Standards for Education (2005) all principals and teachers have legal obligations to ensure that every student is able to participate in the curriculum on the same basis as their peers.

All schools for specific purposes (SSPs) use the same curriculum that is used for mainstream schools as the basis for what they teach their students. Teachers make adjustments on how it is accessed and delivered to meet the needs of students. Making adjustments enables students with disability and additional learning and support needs to access syllabus outcomes and content on the same basis as their peers.

9. It is estimated that only a third of commencing Initial Teacher Education (ITE) students are still in the industry beyond the first 5 years. Some of our top education universities are now moving into clinical-based training. What alternative models of teacher training have been explored to reverse this alarming attrition pattern?

The Department of Education is focusing on both short-term and long-term interventions to support the needs of NSW public schools and the Department's goals over the next 10 years. This work includes partnering closely with Initial Teacher Education providers and exploring alternative employment models and pathways.

The Department supports the employment of graduates in their final year of study in casual and temporary teaching roles, providing these graduates with valuable school-based experience while they finalise their degree.

10. There are estimates that the cost of staff churn in public schools is around \$100 million nationally per annum. Has the NSW Department of Education developed a way to accurately measure the financial impact including re-training, transition and human resource management?

There is currently no specific measure of the financial impact of staff movement across NSW public schools. Appropriately qualified teachers are appointed to permanent vacancies, so there is no specific re-training required for teachers being permanently appointed into vacant positions.

Schools receive professional learning funding to support teacher development, in line with their professional development plan.

11. Across public, Catholic and Independent schools in regional areas there appears to be a crisis in the new supply of quality teachers. The Deputy Director of Catholic Education in Wilcannia-Forbes has said:

'During 2018 Catholic schools in the Diocese of Wilcannia-Forbes experienced first-hand a growing trend of not being able to fill classroom teacher positions. After three unsuccessful rounds of advertising (no applicants), classroom teacher positions at 3 schools were filled internally through reallocation of duties of existing staff. In each case this solution came at the expense of sacrificing key programs/innovations designed to address the unique needs and challenges of our rural, remote students. It is alarming to see this trend continue in 2019.'

What initiatives are being introduced to address this problem?

The Department of Education is committed to addressing teacher availability and experience within rural and remote schools, and has a number of incentives aimed at making rural and remote schools attractive to new and experienced teachers.

The scholarship program is aimed at increasing teacher availability; improving practicum placement in rural and remote areas through better support of graduates, and better selection of candidates.

The new incentives that commenced in 2019 for public schools include a Rural Teacher Incentive of up to \$30,000 per annum dependent on school location; an Experienced Teacher Benefit of \$10,000 per annum for teachers who have been proficient for more than six years; and a Rural Non School Based Teaching Service Incentive of up to \$25,000 per annum for Non School Based Teaching Service staff,

in Bourke, Broken Hill, Deniliquin and Moree state offices. This incentive was initiated with the intention to increase the number applicants to teaching roles in rural and remote schools, and increase the number of experienced teachers in rural schools while reducing turnover and increasing tenure across NSW rural and remote public schools.

Teachers in a number of rural locations for public schools are eligible for a \$5,000 per annum retention benefit payment. This payment is made for up to 10 years of service in a school and encourages staff to stay in rural and remote schools, increasing continuity of teaching.

To support a pipeline of teachers in rural and remote public schools, the Department has fast-tracked temporary to permanent teacher conversion.

In addition, the Department offers a rental subsidy of between 50% and 90% to teachers in the State's rural and remote public schools as well as various locality allowances to assist with costs of living, heating and cooling. In some locations the Department provides for up to five additional days of additional personal leave, and a 10-week trial prior to confirmation of permanent appointment.

Since the introduction and changes to these incentives, recruiting principals in rural and remote public schools have reported an increase in applications for rural and remote positions, as well as a reduction in employee initiated transfer requests out of these areas.

12. What is the average length that a teacher will remain in a regional area if flown in from outside the community? What other opportunities is the Government exploring to train teachers from the regions to stay and teach within their own communities?

The Department of Education does not fly in teachers for long-term engagements and does not hold information on teacher tenure by means of relocation.

The Department is currently developing a number of strategies to ensure an adequate supply of teachers in rural and remote areas, including interventions for immediate rollout in 2020 and 2021, that address known gaps in certain Key Learning Areas (KLAs). In addition, the Department is focusing on long-term interventions to support the needs of NSW public schools and the Department's goals over the next 10 years.

13. The recent report on Measurement and outcome-based funding in New South Wales schools (Recommendation 53), as well as the National Regional, Rural and Remote Tertiary Education Strategy (Recommendation 5.24) recommend that alternative teacher training be explored. There are new school cluster clinical approaches to teacher training that have been successfully initiated in the Hunter Valley at St Philip's Christian College, as well as through the recently formed Sydney Teaching School Alliance (otherwise referred to as the Hub model). In the Hunter they are reporting 80 local applicants applying for 10 ITE training

positions in 2020, an average ATAR of just under 90 for those accepted, and over 600 VET students expected in 2021 through the tertiary/school partnerships developed. Has the Minister sent her office or the department to visit the school clusters and thoroughly assess this model? Has the Minister herself met with these innovative training providers? When will meetings take place please?

The Department of Education is focusing on both short-term and long-term interventions to support the needs of NSW public schools and the Department's goals over the next 10 years. This work includes partnering closely with Initial Teacher Education providers and exploring alternative employment models and pathways.

14. Are entertainers performing on school premises outside of school hours subject to Working With Children checks? What are the details?

Typically, if a school has contracted an entertainer to perform for students as part of a school organised event, either during or after school hours on school premises, then the school is required to conduct appropriate screening, which includes the verification of a Working With Children Check clearance and completion of a Declaration for Child Related Contractors.

If the entertainer is accessing the school facilities outside of school hours to conduct a performance that is not a school organised event, they would be doing so under the Department's Community Use of School Facilities policy. In this instance, if the entertainer is performing child-related work, they are required to meet all legislative requirements under the *Child Protection Act (2012)*.

15. What action is Mount Ousley Public School taking to achieve academic growth for its students and not be distracted by political issues concerning transgenderism? Why in its 2016, 2017 and 2018 NAPLAN outcomes has the school failed to achieve any above-average literacy and numeracy results (measured by comparable schools)?

Mount Ousley Public School teachers have high expectations of themselves and their students, and are committed to high levels of academic achievement. There is a strong focus on developing teacher capacity through professional learning which is informed by data evidence and implementing effective pedagogy to improve student academic outcomes.

Mount Ousley Public School has a continuing focus on improving academic results through the following strategies:

- Language, Learning and Literacy Kindergarten Year 2
- Years 3 6 follow similar program of explicit teaching in Literacy
- Writing In The Middle Years for all students in Years 3 6
- Keys into Comprehension for all students in Years 1 6
- Assessment in Number Sense and the areas identified in this program are then targeted areas for each child in Kindergarten – Year 6
- Mathburst for all students in Kindergarten Year 6
- Spelling strategy for all students in Kindergarten Year 6

• The Learning and Support Team withdraws individual children for a site specific reading program which includes Multi – Lit.

Mount Ousley Public School has achieved above-average results compared to comparable schools NAPLAN outcomes in Year 3 for Reading - 2017 and 2018, Writing – 2018 and Spelling – 2018; and in Year 5 Reading - 2017 and 2018, Writing – 2018 and Grammar and Punctuation – 2018.

16. What guidelines have been issued to NSW Government schools concerning the conduct of transgender and other sexuality-related events on school grounds, in and out of school hours? Are parents with children urged to attend these events always notified in advance, in detail of the nature of the events?

Schools adhere to the Controversial Issues in Schools policy and related procedures.

Controversial issues may be questions, subjects, topics or problems which create a difference of opinion, causing contention and debate within the school or the community, this may include transgender and other sexuality-related events, and is determined by the school. Where outlined in the procedures, parents and carers should be informed about the participation of their children in delivery of curriculum, events, excursions, school programs or activities addressing controversial issues.

17. How many different genders does the Department recognise in NSW schools? What are the details?

Currently the application to enrol in NSW public schools provides two options for gender: male and female.

18. What use is being made of Bruce Pascoe's fictitious Dark Emu in NSW schools? And why has this book been accepted as a valid interpretation of Australian history ahead of our greatest, most critically acclaimed historians Manning Clark and Geoffrey Blainey?

Dark Emu is not referenced in NSW syllabuses. NESA has not made a determination about the validity of Dark Emu.

Individual schools determine resources to be used to support teaching and learning.

19. Does the Department truly believe that pre-1788 Indigenous Australians were not a hunter-gatherer, nomadic people and they actually lived in permanent villages using domesticated animals and agriculture? If so, how did every other Australian historian, from Clark to Blainey, get it so wrong?

No outcomes in mandatory NSW syllabus reference specific historians. NSW schools are required to provide an educational program mapped to the outcomes of NESA developed syllabuses.

Individual schools make choices about the teaching and learning resources they use within a classroom.

20. What use is being made of the Shark Island Adam Goodes movie in the NSW schools, given that the makers of the movie have acknowledged its propaganda purpose in trying to confirm "there is racism in all of us"? In showing the film to students, what evidence does the Government have that the booing of Goodes was racially motivated, rather than a response to Goodes' faking for free kicks; his MCG controversy with a 13-year-old girl; his aggressive war dance against child/female fans; and his political attacks on Australia?

The Shark Island Adam Goodes movie is not referenced in NSW syllabuses. NESA does not hold data about individual schools showing this movie to students.

Individual schools determine resources to be used in the educational program at the school.

21. Why have the NAPLAN results at Malabar Public School declined so sharply after 2016 (measured by comparable schools) and how much of the decline is attributable to the introduction of the 'Grow Your Mind' program? What is being done to turn these results around?

The average NAPLAN score for Malabar Public School has seen an upward movement since 2017. While the percentage of students in the top two NAPLAN bands is below the Statistically Similar Schools Group, the percentage over years is steady and does not show a sharp decline.

The Grow Your Mind program has been implemented at Malabar Public School since 2018 as a valuable wellbeing program of study that serves to enhance a whole school approach to learning. It addresses anxiety, stress, promotes positive relationships and is highly valued by the school community and teachers. The introduction of the program has not contributed to a decline in the school's NAPLAN results.

Malabar Public School plans, implements and evaluates existing programs in literacy and numeracy to achieve improvement and maintain upward trends in overall achievement and student growth. The school is diligent in covering syllabus areas with targeted programs in reading, writing and numeracy as they work to achieve school targets in reading and numeracy.

22. Given that the Department had six years to prepare for the 2019/20 Gonski equity funding boost, why did it fail to develop enforceable guidelines for schools on the most effective way of using these funds? Who is responsible for this failing?

Funding to NSW public schools through the Resource Allocation Model (RAM) methodology is in its seventh year. The RAM delivers needs-based funding to schools through seven loadings: the four equity loadings (socio-economic,

Aboriginal, English language proficiency and low level adjustment for disability) and three base loadings (per capita, location and professional learning).

Schools are provided with the School Budget Allocation Report (SBAR): A guide for schools that outlines advice for each equity allocation in relation to the use of funds and examples of effective practice.

The guide also includes the equity funding support package as an appendix developed in consultation with the NSW Teachers Federation and program area specialists with support from the NSW Primary Principals' Association and the NSW Secondary Principals' Council.

The equity funding support package includes:

- a policy context
- how RAM equity funding is allocated
- effective practice in using equity funding to support students and their learning.

In reforming Local Schools, Local Decisions in 2020, the Department will provide stronger direction through a clear policy on needs-based funding expenditure linked to the school plan and improved reporting options at both the school and system levels.

The Department is developing a needs-based funding evaluation framework to support the tracking of school and student outcomes resulting from the effective use of needs-based funding. The evaluation framework will identify and inform the future delivery of resources to schools, professional learning requirements of principals and school leaders, and the clarification of accountability requirements.

The Department will determine a consistent view of the objectives for the use of equity funding. These will be communicated to schools through school planning resources, and policy and accountability requirements.

The Department will continue to develop and deliver appropriate examples of effective practice that demonstrate the impact on student learning and include details of improvement measures.

23. Can the Department demonstrate that its 60% female senior leadership policy is not in breach of the NSW Anti-Discrimination Act on gender discrimination grounds against men? What legal advice has it taken on this matter?

The Department of Education's Diversity and Inclusion Strategy 2018-2022 supports the departmental goal of ensuring our workforce is of the highest calibre. These activities are based on supporting one of the Premier's Priorities of having 50% of senior leadership roles held by women.

The Department is committed to the goal of being the best education system in Australia and firstly selects staff based on excellence and ability. Commitment to our diversity and inclusion goals supports the Department in this aim, ensuring the

Department is able to attract, engage and retain teachers of the highest calibre who are representative of the communities we serve.

The Department recognises the impact of leadership roles on student outcomes, and employs and promotes people into leadership appointments based on excellence and ability. As the supply of teachers has been predominantly female over the last 30 years, this is now being reflected in the proportion of female leaders.

We recognise that there is a higher representation of female teachers than there are male teachers in our public schools. In 2019, 78% of our permanent and temporary workforce was female. However, we have a proportionally higher representation of males in senior leadership in schools, including as principals. The target of 60% female senior leaders aims to ensure that merit is appropriately recognised by our recruitment system.

24. Will the 'Bump It Up' strategy now also include focusing on lower band students, moving them into middle band attainment? If so, what are the details?

Interventions under the 'Bump It Up' strategy are expected to improve learning for all students, including those in the lower bands.

From 2020, all schools with sufficient student cohorts will set targets in NAPLAN top two bands (reading and numeracy), and will be able to take up targets for NAPLAN expected growth (reading and numeracy), Aboriginal students in NAPLAN top three bands, HSC attainment, attendance and wellbeing.

Lifting the proportion of students in the top two bands requires an improvement in the quality of teaching across an entire school and focusing on the top two bands promotes a culture of high expectations for all students. The key interventions to achieve this priority will focus on lifting the quality of teaching in the school as a whole, through tailored support to individual schools, and a system-wide effort to strengthen the use of data and evidence-based practice.

From 2021, all schools will adopt a target in attendance and wellbeing; and a target in either NAPLAN expected growth, or NAPLAN Aboriginal student top three bands. Both of these targets will measure students moving out of the bottom two bands, as well as into the top two bands.

25. Why did Liverpool Boys High School win a 2019 Secretary's Award, and what evidence is there for the success of its Project-Based Learning program in terms of academic growth?

Liverpool Boys High School was awarded a Public Education Foundation Secretary's Awards for an Outstanding School Initiative in 2019 for the school's Project Based Learning initiative. These awards are presented to NSW public schools demonstrating through a specific program, event or initiative their commitment to teaching and learning outcomes, leadership, supporting the students and/or creating a sustainable learning environment.

Project based learning at the school bases teaching, learning and assessment on seven key capabilities that include literacy and numeracy. Evidence of the success of this in terms of academic growth includes a higher than state average proportion of students who met or exceeded expectations of growth in Year 9 NAPLAN Reading in 2018 and 2019, and in Year 9 NAPLAN Numeracy in 2019.

HSC results in 2019 included the school's first cohort of students who completed project based learning in Years 7 to 10. While the HSC results of this cohort are relatively similar to students who had completed a traditional curriculum in recent years, the cohort also had the second lowest number of HSC Band 1 results the school has had in 14 years.

26. What changes have there been in Liverpool Boys High School's

- (a) attendance rates and
- (b) Year 12-to-university student progression rates over the past 5 years? How is the decline in Year 10 attendance explained?

Two factors had a significant impact on the overall attendance rate for Year 10. Firstly, the decline in Year 10 attendance in 2017, 2018 and 2019 is partly attributed to an increased number of students from disadvantaged and complex backgrounds. The school's Family, Occupation and Education Index (FOEI) progressively increased from 146 to 162 from 2017 to 2020, indicating increasing numbers of students in the lowest two quartiles of socio-economic status.

The largest drop in Year 10 attendance occurred in 2019 and this cohort also accounted for 42% of the total number of days students were suspended from the school. This cohort also had 13 students with attendance rates of 0% to 12% due to

complex mental health, family and wellbeing matters that were difficult to resolve despite school and departmental interventions.

27. In the strategic directions of their school plans, how many NSW schools are seeking "academic growth" or words to that effect? Can the Department please list these schools?

As at July 2018, the indicative number of schools to reference "achieving academic growth" or words of similar intent in their school plan strategic directions, was at least 1,018 of 2,208 schools. This number is indicative due to point in time analysis and limitations associated with searching for terms in school plans. For example, a school may reference words of similar intent to "achieving academic growth", but have not been included in the search terms for analysis. Schools may have also updated their school plan since the point in time analysis in July 2018. This number should be treated with caution and only used to draw indicative conclusions, rather than those that are definitive. It is for these reasons that providing a list of schools is likely not to completely reflect all the schools who make reference to "achieving academic growth" or words of similar intent.

Words of similar intent included: "student achievement" OR "students' achievements" OR "student achievements" OR "students' achievement" OR "student's achievements" OR "student progress" OR "students' progress" OR "students' progress" OR "students' outcomes" OR "students' outcomes" OR "student's outcomes" OR "student's learning" OR "student's learning" OR "student's learning" OR "student's growth" OR "student's growth" OR "student attainment" OR "students' attainment" OR "students' attainments" OR "students' attainments" OR "student's attainment" OR "student gains" OR "student's attainments" OR "student's gains" OR "student's gains" OR "student improvements" OR "student improvements" OR "student improvements" OR "students' improvement" OR "improving students" OR "improving students" OR "enhancing students" OR "enhancing students".

28. How does Mr Dizdar support his assertion at the Budget Estimates (just prior to the lunch break) that the new school targets "are going to be visible in the school plan, which is visible to the school community"? What does this mean in practice? Will the new targets and performance measures be published school-by-school?

The School Excellence Policy requires every school to have a school plan, which is published on the school's website. From 2021, all schools will complete a new Strategic Improvement Plan incorporating new school targets as part of the improvement measures on the Strategic Direction pages, which are published on the school website. Progress towards achieving these will be monitored frequently throughout the year. The progress is evaluated and reported annually (in the school's published annual report) using the School Planning and Reporting Online (SPaRO) tool as part of the ongoing school improvement process.

29. Can the Department please clear up the inconsistency highlighted at paragraph 6.140 of the recent Committee report on Outcome-Based Budgeting, concerning the relationship between school complexity/disadvantage and educational outcomes? What is the truth of the matter?

The NSW Department of Education is developing a tool to identify schools that are 'complex school environments' to enable the Department to see where different types of support are required in order to achieve better educational outcomes. This includes consideration of the following elements:

- Proportion of students in Out of Home Care
- Reports to the Child Wellbeing Unit
- Reports to the Incident Support Unit
- Disability access requests
- Students with refugee status
- Students with high developmental vulnerability primary schools only.

The results of investigation so far show that complexity is not synonymous with disadvantage. A school can be considered as having a complex school environment without being highly disadvantaged by standard socioeconomic indicators. Analysis also shows some schools are operating in complex school environments, and with high levels socio-economic disadvantage. There are some schools in both of these environments that are achieving high value add for their students, which offers the opportunity to gather evidence from them about what is working to counter disadvantage.

30. What progress has been made in the use and findings of the Department's 'new tool' highlighted at paragraph 6.142 of the recent Committee report?

The NSW Department of Education is analysing how complex school environments impact educational outcomes. Investigation is underway in schools who are managing complex school environments, and who are on a trajectory towards excellence. It is expected this investigation will reveal opportunities to yield evidence to build strategies for use in other schools.

The tool is being developed to take a multi-variate approach to understand complex school environments. The Department is developing the tool to include more data sources to provide a more detailed picture of complexity overall.

31. Who in School Infrastructure NSW is responsible for the extraordinary expenditure on new open-plan school buildings and what evidence did they use to believe that such classroom design would achieve academic growth?

The Department of Education is responsible for delivering the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW. Each project undergoes a rigorous design development process to ensure school infrastructure meets the educational need and requirements of the Educational Facilities Standards and Guidelines (EFSG).

This process includes extensive consultation with stakeholders including School Operations and Performance and education specialists to determine a suitable Education Rationale for each project. The Education Rationale informs the design process at the commencement of a project, and provides a framework to guide the use of space for learning and teaching. This is on a school-by-school basis.

School Operations and Performance are consulted throughout the project lifecycle as part of the project governance. This ensures project design is developed in accordance with the rationale and desired pedagogy for the school.

The Centre for Education and Statistics (CESE) has produced two evidence papers looking at the impact of the school environment on student outcomes: School assets and student outcomes (2015) and School assets and student outcomes: An update (2019, unpublished). The earlier paper found mixed findings in relation to open plan learning environments and noted that much of the literature on this topic suggests that the move towards open learning environments must be accompanied by changes in teaching practices. The later paper found that while there is some evidence to indicate that innovative learning environments can have a positive effect on student outcomes, more research is needed.

32. Has the Department surveyed the capacity of students to hear accurately and concentrate on teacher instructions/lessons in open plan, co-teacher classrooms? What does this research show?

The Department of Education is a research partner on the Innovative Learning Environments and Teacher Change project, which was awarded by the Australian Research Council. One area being examined in this research are the acoustic characteristics of different classrooms which allow for a range of teaching and learning activities. This research is due for completion later this year.

The Department has also partnered with Macquarie University and the National Acoustics Laboratory to develop ListenApp for Schools, an iPhone app that allows teachers to evaluate the acoustic properties of their classrooms. ListenApp for Schools also provides information on how classroom modifications have improved a classroom's acoustic properties. The app is free to download and use.

The *Tell Them From Me* survey asks students and teachers questions about the built environment. These questions do not relate to noise specifically, but do ask whether 'the design of the learning space helps me learn' (student survey - secondary) and 'the design of the learning spaces in my school support effective teaching practices' (teacher survey). These questions were first asked in Term 3, 2019: 45% of secondary school students agreed or strongly agreed that the design of the learning spaces helps them learn, 18% disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 37% neither agreed nor disagreed; 64% of teachers agreed or strongly agreed, 17% disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 19% neither agreed nor disagreed.

33. How does the Department explain the disappointing and declining NAPLAN results (measured by comparable schools) of the following

schools after the opening of open-plan buildings/classrooms: The Ponds High School, Victoria Avenue Public School, Cammeraygal High School, Mowbray Public School, Harbord Public School and Banks Public School?

The Ponds High School

NAPLAN results are on an upward trend from 2018-2019

NAPLAN results indicate the following positive trends:

Reading: 22% of students in top 2 bands by year in 2019 compared with 16.5% in 2017

Numeracy: 29.5% of students in top 2 bands by year in 2019 compared with 25.8% in 2017

Victoria Avenue Public School

The school operates a model of single teacher classes with adjoining classrooms to enable agile teaching approaches where appropriate and relevant.

The school opened in 2015 and since that time, the cohort of students, particularly in Year 5, has been a maximum of 16 students in 2018. In 2019, 15 Year 5 students sat the NAPLAN assessments and of these students, eight students were enrolled in one of the school's five support classes that cater for students with diagnosed disabilities. This is representative of the school's vision to include these students in all aspects of schooling. This impacts on the validity of the data for such a small and complex cohort and the data needs to be read with caution.

Average growth for NAPLAN Year 3 to Year 5 from 2017 to 2019 is on par with Statistically Similar School Groups (SSSG) and the State across all domains, except for writing. The sample size is small and the analysis of this data needs to be undertaken with caution. In 2019, this growth data was measured on 12 students, five of which are in mainstream classes.

Overall school enrolments have increased year on year, however, the cohort enrolments have declined slightly each year, and the primary re-enrolment rate is approximately 30 percentage points lower than Statistically Similar School Groups (SSSG). This transience of the school population is to be considered when analysing the data.

Cammeraygal High School

Open learning spaces were commissioned on the senior campus of Cammeraygal High School in 2019. Students sitting NAPLAN exams from 2015 to 2019 would have done so on the junior campus where traditional classrooms are operational. Any change in student performance cannot be attributed to open plan learning. The school is continually evaluating teaching practices to best support students' learning.

Mowbray Public School

The average NAPLAN score over time at Mowbray Public School was above comparable schools in all areas except Year 3 Numeracy. In the Year 3 Numeracy syllabus gap analysis for 2019, there were only seven questions where students answered at a lower percent than the State. This is unrelated to open-plan classrooms.

Harbord Public School

Students in the Harbord Public School are located in both open learning and traditional classroom spaces. There was an increase in the percentage of students in the top band overall in both Year 3 and Year 5 NAPLAN in 2019. Harbord Public School is confident of continuing to support student gains in literacy and numeracy based on the introduction of a range of programs since 2017. Staff have been involved in professional learning and collaborative practices that are contributing to student growth.

Banks Public School

The classrooms/buildings at Banks Public School are not designed in an open-plan style. The school is currently working on plans established in 2019 to address areas of underperformance in NAPLAN. Such plans include tailored support from the Department's School Services team.

34. What is the Department doing to turn around the alarmingly weak NAPLAN results at Victoria Avenue Public School (measured by comparable schools)?

Data analysis, including external and internal assessments, is used by the staff and the executive of Victoria Avenue Public School to inform and develop individualised learning and continuous school improvement measures.

External assessments include NAPLAN, Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) from the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER), International Competition and Assessment for Schools (ICAS) from UNSW, and Curriculum Based Measurement from the University of Oregon. School-based assessments include, but are not limited to, use of the National Literacy and Numeracy Progressions, moderation of student work samples, formative assessments, co-designed assessment rubrics and consistent teacher judgement.

Victoria Avenue Public School introduced evidence-based practice in the implementation of data walls for literacy and numeracy K-6. The school developed short-term and targeted school improvement structures utilising current research that focuses learning conversations on continuous student growth and progress.

The school's involvement in the External Validation process in 2019 informed a sharpened focus on effective strategies for the collection and analysis of whole school data. This work will align with the school's partnership with the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) as part of a three year initiative to strengthen evaluative thinking and data skills and use.

In 2020, the school aligned strategic resourcing to employ additional teaching staff to support targeted intervention programs to improve literacy and numeracy outcomes. This included the employment of an instructional leader to model best practice pedagogy, provide feedback to teachers and refine evidence based instruction. Additional school learning support officers have been employed to assist with collating assessment data to enable teachers to analyse and implement intervention programs in literacy and numeracy.

35. Why does the School Vision Statement at Casula Public School mention many objectives but not academic growth and teaching the students from this disadvantaged community how to read, write and do numbers?

The school vision statement of Casula Public School focuses on the intent of the school to develop competent, connected and compassionate Australian citizens. It draws its inspiration from documents such as the Melbourne Declaration. The School Context deals with more explicit information regarding the educational opportunities in both literacy and numeracy. The School Plan 2018 – 2020 includes Strategic Direction 1 - Data driven teaching and Learning which provides granular information regarding how the school plans to meet the educational needs of its students.

36. Do the following schools comply with the requirements of the School Excellence Framework in

- (a) Whole School Reporting,
- (b) Student Growth,
- (c) Explicit Teaching,
- (d) Data Use in Planning and
- (e) Accreditation: Kelso High, Bathurst High, Casula Public, Rooty Hill High, Kempsey West Public, Lithgow High, Prairiewood High, Floraville Public and Wollongbar Public?

What are the details?

The School Excellence Framework and policy asks schools to assess their practice against three domains: Learning, Teaching and Leading to inform their school plans and annual reports. The School Excellence Framework (SEF) is not intended as a compliance document.

In terms of the five areas identified in the question, the SEF will supply meaningful feedback to school leadership teams in regards to how they are performing at a given point in time and supply direction for them to continuously improve their practice.

Denison College of Senior Education

Denison College of Senior Education in Bathurst has two campuses that comprise the college structure, Denison College of Senior Education Bathurst High campus and Denison College of Senior Education Kelso High campus. Each campus is led by a campus principal and the college structures are led by the College principal.

Denison College of Senior Education Bathurst High campus and Denison College of Senior Education Kelso High campus have complied with all elements of the School Excellence Policy.

Both campuses have engaged in completion of the School Excellence Framework School Self - Assessment (SEF – SAS) annually. This has been uploaded into the

School Planning and Reporting Online website, and assessment has been detailed in each campus Annual School Report.

Casula Public School

Casula Public School uses data in all planning and utilises the School Excellence Framework School Self Assessment (SEF - SAS) each year to ascertain the school's status and the areas for development. The school team, led by the principal comprehensively analyses both external and internal data to inform teaching and learning and resourcing to support improved outcomes. Explicit teaching occurs across all Key Learning Areas (KLAS) at points of need. A whole school approach also comprises strategies that include the explicit teaching of the 4 Cs. The school works with an academic partner to develop teacher skills in explicit teaching. The Annual school report is available online for 2016, 2017, 2018. Reports to parents are prepared as per policy requirements. The school is 'delivering' in NAPLAN Value added across Kindergarten – Year 3 and Years 3 - 5. All teachers are accredited at the required proficiency level.

Rooty Hill High School

Rooty Hill High School complies with all requirements of the School Excellence Framework. In 2019, the school was externally validated by peer principals and was assessed as excelling in all 14 domains, including (A) Whole School Reporting, (b) Student Growth, (c) Explicit Teaching, (d) Data Use in Planning and (e) Accreditation.

Kempsey West Public School

Kempsey West Public School has complied with all elements of the School Excellence Framework and has engaged in completion of the School Excellence Framework School Self-Assessment (SEF – SAS) annually. This has been uploaded into the School Planning and Reporting Online website, (SPaRO) and assessment has been detailed in the Annual School Report. The school is scheduled to participate in External Validation on 5 June, 2020.

Lithgow High School

Lithgow High School has complied with all elements of the School Excellence Framework and has engaged in completion of the School Excellence Framework School Self-Assessment (SEF – SAS) annually. This has been uploaded into the School Planning and Reporting Online website, (SPaRO) and assessment has been detailed in the Annual School Report.

Prairiewood High School

The school uses data in all planning and utilises the School Excellence Framework School Self Assessment (SEF- SAS) each year to ascertain the school's status and the areas for development. SEF- SAS indicates the school is 'sustaining and growing' in this area and have been since 2015. The school team, led by the principal comprehensively analyses both external and internal data to inform teaching and learning and resourcing to support improved outcomes. All teachers are accredited at the required proficiency level.

Explicit teaching occurs across all KLAs at points of need, especially supporting KLA specific writing such as mathematics processes, report writing, essay writing. A

whole school approach also includes strategies such as ALARM for writing, SUPER6 in the area of reading. Student growth is 'excelling' in NAPLAN Value added across Years 7 - 9 and in NAPLAN to HSC Value added across Years 9 – 12 consistently for at least 7 years.

The Annual school report is available online for 2016, 2017, 2018. Reports to parents are prepared as per policy requirements.

Floraville Public School

Floraville Public School complies with the requirements of the School Excellence Framework (SEF). The school engages in the extensive annual School Excellence Framework School Self-Assessment (SEF – SAS) process actively involving the school staff, making the following determinations in 2018 and 2019:

- A) Whole school reporting Sustaining and Growing in 2018 and 2019.
- B) Student Growth Sustaining and Growing in 2018, and Delivering in 2019.
- C) Explicit teaching Excelling in 2018 and Excelling in 2019.
- D) Data use in planning Sustaining and Growing in 2018 and Sustaining and Growing in 2019.
- E) Accreditation Delivering in 2018 and Sustaining and Growing in 2019.

The school will be undertaking its formal External Validation process in 2020 and will submit their 2019 SEF-SES before the end of Term 1 2020.

Wollongbar Public School

Wollongbar Public School has complied with all elements of the School Excellence Framework and has engaged in completion of the School Excellence Framework School Self-Assessment (SEF – SAS) annually. This has been uploaded into the School Planning and Reporting Online website, (SPaRO) and assessment has been detailed in the Annual School Report.

The school participated in the External Validation process in 2017. The school's SEF-SAS was fully supported by the External Validation team.

37. In (36) above, how long has non-compliance been occurring and how has this been allowed to happen? How do the principals at each school account for any non-compliance?

All schools have met all elements of the School Excellence Policy annually.

Questions to NESA

38. How does NESA explain the root causes of the decline in NSW's PISA results this century?

There is no agreement among education experts, governments and other stakeholders on a single cause or set of causes for the decline in NSW's PISA results.

NESA's mission and purpose is to bring about change to improve student learning and wellbeing through:

- supporting the teaching profession to be the best it can be through the Australian Professional Standards for Teaching and quality assurance of professional learning and development
- developing world class curriculum
- supporting the understanding and practice of assessing student knowledge and capabilities, and
- driving improvement in the quality assurance systems for schools.

39. Has the NESA Review of its Statement of Equity Principles been completed? Has the clause about 'deconstructing gender and sexuality' been removed? How does the statement now read?

NESA has completed an initial review of the Statement of Equity Principles.

A dot point in the guiding statement to Equity Principle 4.3 has been revised, and now reads:

 providing opportunities for students to analyse and evaluate gender-based stereotypes, with particular reference to historical and contemporary representation, and the influence of family, peers and the media.

The Statement of Equity Principles will be further considered as part of the implementation of the recommendations of the NSW Curriculum Review.

40. How many different genders does NESA recognise in NSW schools? What are the details?

For students enrolled in the HSC, NESA records two genders, male or female. On request from schools, NESA can override with 'N' (Not specified).

NESA administers NAPLAN tests on behalf of the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA). For students enrolled in NAPLAN, NESA follows national instructions on the options to be used for data collection. They are:

- Male
- Female
- Intersex/Indeterminate
- Not stated/inadequately described
- 41. What use is being made of Bruce Pascoe's fictitious Dark Emu in the NSW school syllabus? And why has this book been accepted as a valid interpretation of Australian history ahead of our greatest historians Manning Clark and Geoffrey Blainey?

Please see response to question no 18.

42. Does the Department truly believe that pre-1788 Indigenous Australians were not a hunter-gatherer, nomadic people and they actually lived in permanent villages using domesticated animals and agriculture? If so, how did everyother Australian historian, from Clark to Blainey, get it so wrong?

43. What use is being made of the Shark Island Adam Goodes movie in the NSW school syllabus, given that the makers of the movie have acknowledged its propaganda purpose in trying to confirm, "there is racism in all of us"? In showing the film to students, what evidence does the Government have that the booing of Goodes was racially motivated?

Please see response to question no 20.

44. Why does every NSW school syllabus/course require three cross-curriculum priorities of Aboriginal Culture, Engagement With Asia and Environmental Sustainability? What researched evidence is there about the impact of these priorities on NSW school results? In what way are these priorities helping to reverse declining NSW school results and achieve student academic growth?

NSW adopted and adapted the Australian Curriculum content into NSW syllabuses. This included incorporation of Australian Curriculum's three cross curriculum priorities; Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures, Asia and Australia's engagement with Asia and Sustainability into the thirteen learning areas across the curriculum areas that are addressed within NSW syllabuses.

This learning across the curriculum areas assists students to achieve broad learning outcomes, including those defined in the *Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians* (December 2008) and in the Australian Government's *Core Skills for Work Developmental Framework* (2013).

45. What is the maximum number of units a HSC student can take for a single language course, counting towards their ATAR?

Students must satisfy the NESA pattern of study requirements for the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

In most languages, a student may study a maximum of two units of that language for the HSC.

Both a two unit Continuers language course and a one-unit Extension language course are available in the following languages; Arabic, Chinese, Classical Greek, Classical Hebrew, French, German, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Modern Greek, Spanish. For each of these languages a total of three units may be studied.

46. Is NESA aware of students gaming language courses, knowing that maximum units are a soft way to a higher ATAR? What are the details?

NESA is unaware of students gaming language courses.

The scaling of language courses is determined by the Universities Admissions Centre (UAC), and varies each year depending on the general ability of the cohort in each course.

47. What language skills do students need to display in sitting a typical HSC language test? How is this assessed?

Stage 6 languages courses aim to develop linguistic, cognitive and intercultural knowledge, understanding and skills for effective communication in that language.

The school-based assessment components include listening, reading, speaking and writing. These requirements are described in the assessment and reporting document published for each language syllabus.

The specifications for the HSC examination are also included in the assessment and reporting document. The examinations for most HSC languages courses include both a written paper and an oral examination that tests skills in listening, reading, speaking and writing. Language and Literature courses include only a written examination.

48. Is NESA aware of students memorising language speeches for their HSC, achieving high marks but not being able to actually speak the language in question? What are the details?

Schools determine the teaching and learning approaches used for their students.

The criteria for the oral language examination in Beginners and Continuers languages courses involves students responding to, exchanging and justifying information.

Responses that attain high marks require students to demonstrate their oral ability to manipulate and apply their language learning. It is difficult to demonstrate these skills to a high level in a memorised response.

49. What assessment has NESA undertaken of the employment that high-unit (above 2) language students achieve upon completing their HSC? How many of these jobs relate to use of the language they studied?

NESA does not collect data related to a student's employment after completing school.

50. In (12) above, what are the employment numbers for Indonesian HSC graduates as a proportion of all high-unit (above 2) Indonesian HSC students?

NESA does not collect data related to a student's employment after completing school.

51. What is the purpose and what are students being taught in the following secondary history courses:

- (a) 'Tibet in the Modern World' and
- (b) 'The Apollo 11 moon landing, its impact on environmental awareness and the impact on Earth Day 1970'?

The Year 11 course in the Modern History syllabus has three sections, one of which is *Investigating Modern History*.

'Tibet in the Modern World' and 'The Rise of the Environmental Movement' – which includes content related to the Apollo Moon landing – are case studies within this section of the course. These case studies are not mandatory, and are included among fourteen other optional case studies.

The purpose of the case studies is for students to investigate aspects of the history of the modern world through a study of key concepts that define the discipline of history, including continuity and change, causation, perspectives, significance and contestability.

The inclusion of a range of case studies from which schools can choose provides some flexibility related to student interest, teacher expertise, school context and available resources.

52. How are marking disparities in HSC History and English essays resolved? Is NESA aware of HSC marking supervisors telling markers to reach an acceptable consensus to avoid third-marker arbitration processes? What are the details?

When two HSC markers award marks to a student's response that are not sufficiently close together, the response is referred to a senior marker. The senior marker initially marks the response themselves, in most cases without knowing the original two marks. Then they review all the marks that have been awarded – ie. that of the two markers as well as their own – and determine the final mark. This is known as "discrepancy resolution" and applies to all double-marked written exam questions, including those in History and English.

The discrepancy resolution process ensures students receive the correct mark. It also provides senior markers with valuable information on a marker's understanding of the marking guidelines, which they use to monitor marker accuracy.

The markers of HSC written exams work independently, and are unaware of the marks awarded by other markers. There is neither the opportunity nor the need for markers to reach a consensus if marks are discrepant. Instead, the senior marker resolves the discrepancy as outlined above.

53. If, for example, a HSC student answered a question on the rise and fall of Hitler with an essay about the role of Rasputin in Russia, what mark out of 20 would NESA expect the student to score?

Prior to HSC marking starting, senior markers develop a "marking kit" for each question. The kit generally consists of the marking guidelines and benchmark responses that illustrate achievement at various levels or mark ranges. Markers are trained to apply the marking kit to all responses. If a student misreads a question or presents a pre-prepared essay that does not answer the question that has been asked, their response will still be marked; however, it is unlikely to achieve a high mark as it will not fulfil the criteria in the marking kit.

In the example described, it may be the case that the student has mislabelled the question. It is not uncommon for students to write the wrong question number on their response. All student exam booklets are clerically checked before they are distributed for marking, and mislabelling instances are usually corrected during that process. If not, the marker to whom it is allocated will reassign it to the correct marking group.

Questions from Mr David Shoebridge MLC

Special Religious Education

54. How many complaints are currently outstanding regarding concerns about SRE in NSW?

The Department of Education is aware of a complaint from one organisation.

55. What steps does the Department/Minister currently take to oversight the material provided to children under SRE?

The curriculum for Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics is the responsibility of approved providers.

Approved providers are required to provide online access to their authorised age-appropriate curriculum scope and sequence, and ensure Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics teachers are teaching the curriculum with sensitivity and in an age-appropriate manner. The curriculum scope and sequence must be provided in sufficient detail for parents/carers to understand what is covered in Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics lessons.

Parents/carers who would like to discuss the content of lessons, or have any concerns regarding the delivery of Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics, should make contact with the approved provider.

56. How many volunteer SRE teachers are there currently in NSW? Of these how many have had their working with children check sighted by school or departmental authorities?

The Department of Education does not centrally collect statistics on the number of Special Religious Education teachers.

Approved providers are required to have procedures in place to ensure compliance with the requirements of the *Child Protection (Working with Children) Act 2012* including verification of the Working with Children Check clearance. Schools are required to ensure that religious groups and their teachers are an approved provider to deliver Special Religious Education and cross-referencing Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics teachers on the Department's Not to be Employed (NTBE) database.

Family violence and education

57. What resources are being put towards developing new programs in schools that realistically and transparently discuss domestic & family violence, healthy relationships and consent (in line with the primary prevention priority of the National Plan to Reduce Violence against Women and their Children)?

NESA is responsible for developing syllabuses to be taught in NSW schools, from Kindergarten through to Year 12.

In NSW, respectful relationships education is included in the mandatory Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) K–10 Syllabus for all students. This new syllabus includes strengthened content related to domestic violence. School implementation commenced from 2019.

Schools are best placed to determine the resources used to deliver respectful relationships related content within PDHPE. Schools have the flexibility to choose resources that are age and stage appropriate, and in line with the ethos of their school.

The Department of Education is currently updating the Child Protection Education materials to reflect the PDHPE K-10 syllabus implemented in all NSW schools from Kindergarten to Year 10 in 2020. These resources will focus on domestic and family violence in the secondary years in alignment with the syllabus content.

58. What existing programs are there in schools that consider family violence?

Domestic and family violence impacts the safety and wellbeing of students in NSW schools and the resulting trauma may impact on their learning.

Public schools promote attitudes and behaviours of non-violence and establish environments that reinforce to students that violence in any relationship is not acceptable.

The Department of Education provides schools with universal curriculum access on respectful relationships and responding in a positive way to anti-social behaviour in students.

Through the mandatory syllabus of Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) students from Kindergarten to Year 10 learn about roles and responsibilities in developing and maintaining positive and respectful relationships, including skills in conflict resolution.

In NSW public schools, students in Year 11 and 12 undertake a mandatory 25 hour 'Life Ready' program which also includes content relating to respectful relationships.

Temporary Teachers

59. How many teachers in New South Wales public schools are currently employed as a temporary teacher?

As at 30 June 2019, there are 19,115 full time equivalent (FTE) temporary teachers employed in NSW public schools.

60. What was the figure for the same in each of the past five years?

The total full time equivalent of temporary teachers employed in NSW public schools as at June of each year is as follows:

2018 - 18,751 2017 - 18,096 2016 - 16,439 2015 - 15,122 2014 - 14,075

61. How many of the teachers employed on a temporary basis are in that position to replace a permanent teacher on some form of long term leave?

This precise information is not able to be provided. Temporary teachers can be engaged by a Principal via multiple pathways. Some methods capture the specific reason for the engagement and map to the replaced position, whereas other methods result in the creation of a new position with no reason centrally captured and therefore no mapping to a replaced teacher's position if it is applicable.

62. What is the justification for the remainder of those teachers employed on a temporary basis?

Temporary teachers can be engaged for a number of reasons, including but not limited to:

- Substantive teacher on leave.
- Substantive teacher temporarily filling another role.

- Temporary teacher engaged whilst a decision on permanent vacancy is being made, such as:
 - there is a vacant permanent role, but school enrolments are declining so there is potential for teaching entitlement to decrease
 - curriculum needs of the school are changing, resulting in the need to review appropriateness of the subjects taught under the vacant position.
- Temporary positions can be created by the Principal which are locally funded using budget funds from the Resource Allocation Model (RAM), and/or special initiatives and programs where funding will be available for a finite period and/or not necessarily the same amount in forward years.

63. Does the Department require schools to explain why a teacher is being employed on a temporary basis and not converted to permanent?

A Principal may request to fill a permanent teacher vacancy with a temporary teacher for a period of time only under specific conditions, as outlined in the Agreement between the NSW Department of Education and the NSW Teachers Federation on the Staffing of NSW Public Schools.

Approval to hold a vacant position for a period of time requires approval of the Director, Educational Leadership. The Department's Human Resources monitors the filling of unfilled vacancies and reports this information on a quarterly basis.

64. After how many weeks of service can a temporary teacher be converted to permanency?

A temporary teacher may be eligible for conversion to a permanent vacancy where they have at least two years' continuous service at the school where the vacancy has occurred, where they would otherwise be eligible for the role and where they have satisfactory performance.

In the case of schools eligible for rural and remote incentives and Connected Communities schools, this option is available for temporary teachers after one year of continuous service.

Advance Australia materials

65. We understand you have already said that you will not allow Advance Australia to send its resources - promoting denial of climate change - to schools in this state - can you please confirm this?

The Department will not aid in the distribution of Advance Australia materials to schools.

66. What communication has there been between your office and Advance Australia about their proposal?

The Department has no record of communication with Advance Australia about their proposal.

Coronavirus response

67. What support is being provided to teachers to support students dealing with students who may be experiencing racist bullying that has been heightened by the coronavirus stories?

Bullying of any kind is not acceptable in NSW schools. Our schools have a responsibility to take positive action to help prevent bullying and to respond appropriately when it does occur.

The NSW Department of Education strongly rejects all forms of racism. Its Anti-Racism Policy commits the Department to the elimination of racial discrimination, including direct and indirect racism, racial vilification and harassment. A range of initiatives and resources support the implementation of the policy.

All schools are required to have a trained Anti-Racism Contact Officer (ARCO), who is able to provide timely and professional responses to complaints of racism, support principals and teachers to implement anti-racism strategies, and assist principals in resolving complaints of racism which may involve following procedures under the Complaints Handling Policy or implementing the School Discipline Policy.

Teachers have access to a wide range of anti-racism education materials and resources that assist schools to build and maintain community harmony and enhance social inclusion, including classroom resources and teacher professional learning programs. The Racism. No Way! website provides anti-racism education information and resources including lesson ideas, fact sheets and interactive materials for use in the classroom.

Regarding racist incidents that may arise during the coronavirus outbreak, principals are in the best position to know the needs of their communities and can select the most appropriate forms of assistance and resources to develop local strategies to counter such racism.

Principals have been advised to send messages to students and parents that racism and discrimination in any form will not be tolerated as we work together to support those who have been impacted.

Anti-Racism Contact Officers have also been provided with advice about the need to be mindful of potential incidents of racism in this context.

Teachers aides

68. What is the current number of teachers aides in NSW compared to the number in schools at March 2011?

There are 10,429 full-time equivalent (FTE) school learning support officers (formerly known as teacher aides) as at 30 June 2019 compared to 6,766 FTE as at 30 June 2011.

69. We have been advised that at Thirroul Primary in Wollongong, teachers have told parents that there has been significant cuts to the numbers of teachers aides and reading support programs this year.

Thirroul Public School does not have a school learning support officer entitlement, and has not had an entitlement in previous years.

Schools can make local decisions to engage staff using flexible funding.

70. What other schools in NSW have been forced to reduce this support for students?

Schools are allocated student learning support entitlement on the basis of special education classes or provisions.

Beyond entitlement, schools are able to utilise flexible funding to employ school learning support officers to meet the needs of their students.

71. What steps are being taken to address this?

There has been an overall increase of school learning support officer entitlement across NSW public schools.

Frenchs Forest High School relocation

72. The Frenches Forest High School is under consideration to be relocated to land which is currently open space playing fields (Aquatic Reserve Baseball Park), located on a former landfill dump.

The Department of Education has not determined to relocate The Forest High School.

The Department is currently assessing various site options with Northern Beaches Council and the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

Site options will be considered in the context of their suitability based on demographic trends, catchment boundaries, educational requirements, play area space, site sizes, transport links, partnership opportunities, and environmental considerations

73. Can the Minister confirm whether there is an intention to relocate the Frenches Forest High School school to land which is currently open space playing fields (Aquatic Reserve Baseball Park)?

The Department of Education has not determined to relocate The Forest High School.

The Department is currently assessing various site options with Northern Beaches Council and the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

Site options will be considered in the context of their suitability based on demographic trends, catchment boundaries, educational requirements, play area space, site sizes, transport links, partnership opportunities, and environmental considerations.

74. Will it make available to the community copies of all investigations made regarding this site concerning the presence of landfill gas and other toxic substances landfilled at this site? Is the Minister aware of the contents of this landfill?

This information would be released as part of the statutory planning requirements.

75. Does the Minister hold documents regarding the potential safety impacts of waste at this site on children and young people if the school were relocated to this site?

The Department of Education's assessment of site options will be done so in the context of their suitability based on a number of factors including environmental considerations.

Planning new schools to meet future needs

76. What population forecasts/statistics are you using in relation to the Central to Eveleigh development corridor to inform planning for new schools?

The Department of Education's long term projections are informed by census data and dwelling and population projections provided by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment in conjunction with local councils. The Department reviews the demographic need for school facilities on a continual basis. These projections align with the Government endorsed 2016 Common Planning Assumptions.

77. How much land have you reserved for new schools in the area?

The Department of Education is continually monitoring demographic trends and planning ahead for future educational needs in partnership with other government agencies, local councils and the private sector.

Numerous strategies are used to manage enrolment demands in the short to medium term, including enforcing the department's enrolment policy to restrict out-of-area enrolments, reviewing school catchment boundaries and the provision of demountable accommodation. These measures help the Department ensure that every eligible student who wishes to attend a NSW Government school will be given a place at their local school. In cases of sustained and stable enrolment increases, the Department provides additional permanent facilities, or new schools, as necessary.

78. How many new schools will there be?

Numerous strategies are used to manage enrolment demands in the short to medium term, including enforcing the Department of Education's enrolment policy to restrict out-of-area enrolments, reviewing school catchment boundaries and the provision of demountable accommodation. These measures help the Department ensure that every eligible student who wishes to attend a NSW Government school will be given a place at their local school. In cases of sustained and stable enrolment increases, the Department provides additional permanent facilities, or new schools, as necessary.

79. How many students will that be able to accommodate?

Numerous strategies are used to manage enrolment demands in the short to medium term, including enforcing the Department of Education's enrolment policy to restrict out-of-area enrolments, and reviewing school catchment boundaries. These measures help the Department ensure that every eligible student who wishes to attend a NSW Government school will be given a place at their local school. In cases of sustained and stable enrolment increases, the Department provides additional permanent facilities, or new schools, as necessary. Any future school upgrades or new schools will be designed to accommodate current and future enrolments needs as they arise.

80. What population forecasts/statistics are you using in relation to the Parramatta Rd corridor in to inform planning for new schools?

The Department of Education's long term projections are informed by census data and dwelling and population projections provided by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment in conjunction with local councils. The Department of Education reviews the demographic need for school facilities on a continual basis.

81. How much land have you reserved for new schools in the area?

The Department of Education continues to investigate potential land reservations with other government agencies along the Parramatta Road renewal corridor that could be used for public purposes such as new schools.

82. How many new schools will there be?

The Department of Education's long term projections and the scope of the Parramatta Road renewal corridor developments will continue to be monitored and determine the scale of education infrastructure required.

83. How many students will that be able to accommodate?

The Department of Education's long term projections and the scope of the Parramatta Road renewal corridor developments will continue to be monitored and determine the scale of education infrastructure required.

Inclusivity in schools

84. How many primary mainstream schools in NSW have a separate 'support unit' for children with a disability?

There are currently 423 primary schools with support classes.

85. How many secondary mainstream schools in NSW have a separate 'support unit' for children with a disability?

There are currently 289 secondary schools with support classes.

86. How many NSW primary mainstream schools are fully inclusive for children with a disability?

All NSW public schools have a responsibility to ensure that all students attending are known, valued and cared for. The Department of Education is committed to inclusion in NSW education. Inclusion means all students, regardless of disability, can access and fully participate in learning at their local school, alongside their similar aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching strategies tailored to meet their individual needs. We are committed to building the capacity of our mainstream public schools to meet the needs of their local students unless there are compelling individual reasons why a different option would better support the student.

87. How many NSW secondary mainstream schools are fully inclusive for children with a disability?

All NSW public schools have a responsibility to ensure that all students attending are known, valued and cared for. The Department of Education is committed to inclusion in NSW education. Inclusion means all students, regardless of disability, can access and fully participate in learning at their local school, alongside their similar aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching strategies tailored to meet their individual needs. We are committed to building the capacity of our mainstream public schools to meet the needs of their local students unless there are compelling individual reasons why a different option would better support the student.

Enrolment of children with a disability

88. How many children with a disability initially applied for enrolment in their local mainstream school in 2018/2019?

All children who apply for enrolment in a NSW public school enrol initially through their local school. Decisions about specialist settings are made in conjunction with parents and school staff after initial enrolment at their local school. Work is underway to track and report on the movement of students with disability through the Department of Education's Access Request process.

89. How many children with a disability, who initially applied for enrolment in a mainstream school in 2018/2019 were actually enrolled in a mainstream school as part of a mainstream class?

All children who enrol in a NSW public school initially enrol in their local school.

As at the end of February 2020 there are 10,100 students with disability enrolled in mainstream classes supported through integration funding. It is estimated that a further 90,000 students with disability are in mainstream classes in mainstream schools, supported by school resources.

That is, in 2020 an estimated total of 100,100 students with disability were enrolled in a mainstream school as part of a mainstream class.

Work is underway to track and report on the movement of students with disability through the Department of Education's Access Request process.

90. How many children with a disability, who initially applied for enrolment in a mainstream school in 2018/2019 were actually enrolled in a mainstream school as part of a support class?

We currently have 19,363 children in support classes in NSW mainstream schools. This represents 2.39 per cent of all students enrolled in NSW public schools.

Work is underway to track and report on the movement of students with disability through the Department of Education's Access Request process.

91. How many children with a disability, who initially applied for enrolment in a mainstream school in 2018/2019 were actually enrolled in a SSP?

All children who enrol in a NSW public school initially enrol in their local school. Parents may then apply for their child to be enrolled in a support class, some of which are in SSPs. We currently have 5,493 children in SSPs in NSW. This represents 0.67 per cent of all students enrolled in NSW public schools.

Work is underway to track and report on the movement of students with disability through the Department of Education's Access Request process.

92. How many children with a disability, who have been in a SSP, have transferred to mainstream class in a mainstream school in 2018/2019?

In 2018-2019, 318 students with disability transferred from a SSP to a mainstream class in a mainstream school.

Complaints about treatment of children with a disability

93. Could the Department of Education provide the number of, the details of and outcomes of all complaints made against staff in the last 3 years in regards the treatment of children with a disability.

The information provided includes findings where allegations about conduct towards students with disability have been investigated by the NSW Department of Education from 1 January 2017 – 31 December 2019. Students with disability are identified using the criteria under Nationally Consistent Collection of Data for students with Disability.

The initial allegations recorded are the initial allegations as put by the complainant. The actual allegation may ultimately be different, following an investigation.

Physical abuse: may range from unnecessary physical contact with a student through to grab, push, pull, restrain, assault – conduct which, if proven, would constitute criminal conduct.

Sexual misconduct: includes making inappropriate comments; exposing a student to offensive material (even if accidentally), inappropriate touching; crossing the professional boundary, grooming behaviour, other overtly sexual behaviour. **Sexual abuse:** touching which, if proven, would constitute criminal conduct. **Neglect:** includes failing to provide proper care or supervision of a student or students, failure to report an incident internally, to report risk of harm to the relevant authorities, to fail to protect a student from another student; to properly follow a behaviour management plan.

III-treatment/emotionally abuse: includes inappropriate use of time-out; upset; failure to follow a behaviour management plan; making a student fearful, disciplining or correcting a child in an unreasonable manner, making degrading or personal comments to a student.

Psychologically harm: to engage in conduct which is proven to cause psychological harm that is more than transient.

Misconduct has a very broad definition under employment legislation and the types of conduct that may constitute misconduct are more clearly defined in the Department's Code of Conduct. The Department is also finalising a list of examples of what constitutes misconduct following recommendations from the Tedeschi Review into the operations of the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate. Examples of misconduct can range from relatively minor matters to very serious matters including criminal conduct.

Sustained misconduct means misconduct has been proven to have occurred.

In circumstances where the conduct of an employee may not amount to misconduct but may still demonstrate poor practice, the employment legislation permits remedial action to be taken in order to assist the employee to address the practice that resulted in allegations of misconduct being made. This means remedial action can be used for minor sustained misconduct or for matters that were not sustained to be misconduct but may amount to poor practice.

94. How many child protection complaints against a staff member must be made before a full investigation of said staff member is initiated, and said staff member is relocated away from non-verbal children?

The NSW Department of Education is required to comply with the *Children's Guardian Act 2019* and must investigate allegations that amount to reportable conduct.

When an allegation of reportable conduct is made to the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC), officers are firstly required to assess the risk to students, as the protection of students is paramount under the Department's

legislation and the wellbeing of students must be the first consideration. An assessment is also made about the risk to the school and the risk to the employee themselves. If risk cannot be adequately managed in the school, a decision is made to remove the employee from child related employment and place them at another site away from contact with children.

95. We have previously had concerns raised with us that data collected by the Department regarding which complaints concerned treatment of a child with a disability excluding many matters, what steps have been taken to remedy this?

Legal claims can be received at any time during or after a student has been at NSW public school. Whether a claimant has or had a pre-existing disability may not be stipulated at the time of making a claim (which may be many years after they have left school), and it may not be relevant to the claim.

In response to questions asked during previous Budget Estimates hearings, the NSW Department of Education reported amounts that have been paid on behalf of the Department in settlement of discrimination and bullying claims made by students with a disability. This data was sourced from Insurance and Care NSW (iCare) who hold source data for NSW Government Agencies in relation to claims.

When this data was originally collected and coded, the question of whether a claimant was a person with disability was generally only recorded in relation to disability discrimination claims, and not in relation to general negligence claims.

The Department's insurer, iCare, recently performed a manual review of around 400 claims relating to the Department. iCare has now added data extracted from their claim files which was not previously maintained in the insurance database.

The data previously provided was not inaccurate. It was responsive to the question asked to the extent that iCare could identify relevant claims.

Questions relating to the coding and recording of claims data on behalf of the State should be directed to iCare.

96. What practical steps to further safeguard children with a disability in NSW Education schools have been undertaken since the Parliamentary Inquiry into Students with a disability or special needs in New South Wales schools?

The NSW Government accepted the findings of the Inquiry and are acting on the recommendations of the Inquiry.

Together with educators, disability experts and families, we have put together a plan for an education system that does better by children and young people with disability, and enhances support for those providing that education – our teachers and school staff.

The Department of Education's Disability Strategy was released in 2019 and sets out a plan for providing children and young people with disability, their families and the broader community with an education system that meets their needs. It responds to, and goes beyond, the Parliamentary Inquiry recommendations.

97. Has the NSW Disability Strategy 'Reference Group' been consulted on any issues since their formation around September 2019?

Yes.

The Disability Strategy Reference Group has met on two occasion since September 2019. It is supported by two other reference groups, the Professional Development Reference Group and the Improving the Learning and Support Journey Reference Group.

The role and purpose of the Disability Strategy Reference Group is to provide advice to the Department of Education in meeting the objectives and commitments of the Disability Strategy.

Members provide strategic advice, feedback and test ideas regarding:

- the impact of the Disability Strategy and its initiatives;
- the work that needs to be done to realise the intended vision of the Disability Strategy; and
- how schools, the department and local communities are receiving the Disability Strategy's work.

Some of the topics that we have discussed in depth with the Reference Group are:

- Innovation Program
- Behaviour Strategy and Suspension policy review
- Student and parent voice.

98. How many legal actions have been taken against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019)?

There were 46 complaints to the Anti-Discrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission naming the NSW Department of Education as a respondent, in relation to the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools. Seven of these named a staff member in the complaint. The Anti-Discrimination Board issued

a separate notice of investigation to a staff member named in one complaint against the Department.

- 99. Of those legal actions taken against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019) where the department paid out settlements or discontinuations, involving complaints about staff, how many staff were reprimanded?

Of the seven complaints made to the Anti-Discrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission that named Departmental staff members, only one matter was referred to the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate. No action was taken against the staff member concerned.

Any legal action taken against the NSW Department of Education is treated separately from any investigation of misconduct. Complaints made to the Anti-discrimination Board and Australian Human Rights Commission, may not amount to reportable conduct and therefore may not elicit investigation or disciplinary action. All allegations of a child protection nature are individually assessed by trained child protection investigators. Following investigation, should an employee be found to have engaged in misconduct, appropriate disciplinary action, ensuring the safety and welfare of children, is taken.

100. Of those legal actions taken against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019) where the department paid out settlement or discontinuations, involving complaints about staff, how many staff were transferred away from children with a disability?

101. 102. 103. How much money has the Government of NSW, on behalf of the NSW Department of Education, had to pay in court costs, in settlement and in discontinuation agreements in regard to legal action against staff and schools for the treatment of children with a disability in NSW public schools in the last three years (2017, 2018 and 2019)? NB we have been advised the figures offered last year were inaccurate and do not cover all relevant settlements.

2017 - \$515,000 2018 - \$951,344 2019 - \$485.801

The above amounts were paid on behalf of the NSW Department of Education in settlement of disability discrimination claims, as well as general negligence claims where the claimant had a pre-existing disability or where the fact of the child's disability was an essential component of the alleged breach of duty of care.

In response to questions asked during previous Budget Estimates hearings, the Department reported amounts that have been paid on behalf of the Department in settlement of discrimination and bullying claims made by students with a disability only. This data was sourced from Insurance and Care NSW (iCare) who hold source data for NSW Government Agencies in relation to claims.

When this data was originally collected and coded, the question of whether a claimant was a person with disability was generally only recorded in relation to disability discrimination claims, not general negligence claims.

iCare recently performed a manual review of around 400 claims relating to the Department. iCare has now added data extracted from the iCare claim files not previously maintained in the insurance database.

Given the expanded criteria and the depth of the manual review performed recently by iCare, the above figures are not directly comparable to the previous responses provided to Budget Estimates. In addition, the above figures reflect the calendar year totals, whereas previous responses reflected financial year totals.

Payments made during these calendar years may arise from events occurring during earlier periods.

Privacy concerns and schools

104. How many NSW public schools conducted surveys run by The Resilience Project (as listed here https://theresilienceproject.com.au/school-programs/) sought approval by State Education Research Application Process (SERAP) to conduct the Resilience Project survey?

The Resilience Project is a Victorian-based organisation that provides programs to school communities about building student resilience and developing mental health.

State Education Research Application Process (SERAP) approval is not required in circumstances where a NSW Government school engages the services of an external organisation to provide a program such as The Resilience Project, as opposed to a research project.

SERAP approval only applies to research, carried out by external agencies in NSW Government schools, for example research by a university.

The list of schools on the website does not appear to include any NSW Government schools.

105. How many of these schools gained approval by SERAP to conduct the Resilience Project survey?

None. State Education Research Application Process (SERAP) approval is not required in circumstances where a NSW Government school engages the services of an external organisation to provide a program such as The Resilience Project.

SERAP approval only applies to research, carried out by external agencies in NSW Government schools, for example research by a university.

The list of schools on the website does not appear to include any NSW Government schools.

106. Did Kensington Public School send a privacy notice and consent form to parents or "authorised representatives", as defined by the Health Records Information Privacy Act, S8, to conduct this survey?

No, Kensington Public School did not send a privacy notice and consent form to parents. The school provided written and oral information about the survey and the organisation that managed the survey. The parental consent was an 'opt out' process.

107. How many programs is the Education Department aware of that use surveys (both anonymous and personally identifiable) conducted on children in the past year without any privacy notice to or consent of the children's guardians?

One program using a survey to obtain student information has been the subject of an application for privacy internal review due to an alleged failure to comply with notification and or consent provisions of privacy legislation. The matter is currently before the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

Globe Wilkins Preschool

108. What is the time frame for the construction of the Globe Wilkins Preschool?

Construction of the Globe Wilkins Preschool is expected to start in late 2020 with an anticipated completion timeframe of mid-2021.

109. What involvement has the existing Globe Wilkins preschool and preschool community had in the planning process?

The Department of Education conducted community information booths on site to allow opportunity for the preschool community, and the school community, to provide feedback on the master-planning process. The plans for the preschool also went through a regulatory approval process.

Questions from the Hon Mark Banasiak MLC

110. The Secretary stated in questions on notice last October that as of the 4th September 2019, 40 permanent staff and 22 casual staff have been removed pending EPAC investigations. My question WAS where they have been removed to and for what length of time?

The Department of Education only removes employees from duty as a risk management strategy to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children.

A casual employee's name is placed on the 'Not to be Employed' list. Permanent employees are placed in suitable non-teaching duties.

The length of an alternative duties placement varies dependent on a number of factors including the complexity of an investigation and the involvement of other agencies such as NSW Police, or pending the hearing of criminal charges.

All alternative duties placements are reviewed regularly.

111. Given the Department's management and performance policy states that complaints need to be dealt with "in a timely fashion" and given I have evidence of two female teachers having been removed and placed on "alternative duties" in a Sydney South West Regional Office for two and three years respectively, would you consider this to be "a timely fashion?"

Employees are placed on alternative duties as a risk management strategy to ensure the safety and wellbeing of children. Employees may remain on alternative duties for reasons that are out of the Department of Education's control, for example, during criminal proceedings.

All alternative duties placements are reviewed regularly and appropriate supports provided to employees.

112. Are you concerned for their psychological health?

The Department of Education is always concerned for the health and wellbeing of its employees. Appropriate support is provided and referrals are made as required.

113. Are you concerned for legal ramifications for the Department?

114. Why does EPAC deny injured workers access of their stored documentation pertaining to their complaint that they are legally entitled to? Is this standard practice?

Employees are provided with all of the material to which they are entitled.

115. Why does EPAC force injured workers to have to apply to the Government Information Privacy Commission and often times to the Independent Privacy Commission to force EPAC to comply with NSW laws and release documentation to them?

The Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate complies with all policy and legislation in relation to the release of information. Employees are entitled to seek assistance from the Information and Privacy Commission should they be dissatisfied with the material released.

116. Why are some documents redacted when the information pertains to the individual and their investigation?

In some instances, information provided to employees must be redacted for privacy reasons as it may contain personal information about other parties including witnesses.

117. What is the annual premium paid by the Department for Workers Compensation? 2019?2018?2017?2016?

The Department of Education is insured by the Treasury Managed Fund (TMF), which provides cover for all asset and liability exposures (other than compulsory third party insurance) faced by general government sector budget dependent agencies and participating non-budget public sector agencies. The TMF delivers on the government's responsibility to keep the people and property of the State safe.

Membership of the TMF is mandatory for government agencies in accordance with Treasury Circular TC12/12.

NSW Treasury provides budget funding each year to support the Department to meet its premium payments. As such, these payments are largely budget-neutral for the Department.

118. What is the annual premium paid by the Department for Public Liability Insurance? 2019? 20118? 2017? 2016?

Please refer to Supplementary Question 144

119. In 2007 (Ms Marnie O'Brien) was the subject of a formal, Ministerial complaint concerning her behaviour in relation to the bullying, harassment and intimidation of an employee. The response from Deputy Secretary Peter Riordan stated, "I have discussed the matters you raised with (Ms O'Brien) and reminded her of my expectation that all staff be treated professionally and fairly." After this discussion, why have complaints about the same behaviours continued?

All complaints received to date have been investigated. A culture health check was undertaken in 2019, with all recommendations from this health check now implemented.

120. Why in 2013, did the Workers Compensation Commission find in favour of an employee who complained about these same behaviours? (WCC Case: 011673/12)

These are all historical matters which have been fully dealt with.

121. In the case, the adjudicator found that the applicant sustained a psychological injury attributable to Ms O'Brien's behaviour. The findings state that "Ms O'Brien was far from composed when dealing with the applicant", and adding, "A person in her senior position should not have become involved in a 'heated' discussion". The adjudicator found, "There seems little doubt that (Ms O'Brien) was the main source of the issues that contributed to the applicant's emotional state."

These are all historical matters which have been fully dealt with.

- 122. Can the Executive Director of the Health and Safety Directorate 100% confidently inform this committee that all positions recruited have followed the proper government processes?
 - (a) Was the recruitment of the position of Director of Health and Safety, an open and transparent recruitment process?
 - (b) If so when and where was position advertised
 - (c) Who was on the interview panel?
 - (d) How were conflicts of interest managed with this interview process?
 - (e) How many declarations of conflict were made during this process?

Yes. In November 2015, the Director, Work Health and Safety was filled through the Senior Executive Implementation (SEI) Plan in accordance with the GSE Act transitional arrangements. The initial recruitment action to fill these roles was limited to:

- i. Any transitional former senior executives who occupy a similar role in the relevant parts of the agency,
- ii. Any Public Service senior executives employed in the relevant parts of the agency in a similar role after the commencement of the Act, and
- iii. Any other Public Service employees (or groups of Public Service employees) in the relevant parts of the agency whom the agency head considers appropriate.

The selection panel consisted of Ms Marnie O'Brien, Group Director, Work Health and Safety and Mr Peter Riordan, Deputy Secretary, Corporate Services.

Ms Rosemary Gerardis was approved to be included for consideration for the role due to her long-term temporary assignment to the Assistant Director, Work Health and Safety role. Ms Gerardis was assessed against the capabilities for the PSSE Band 1 role and was found to be suitable.

There are no records on file to indicate any conflict of interest.

123. Underperformance, high staff turnover and rapid enrolment declines are a clear indicator of maladministration and ineffective leadership. Will these contributing factors form part of the intervention process of the LSLD internal review?

In 2020, the NSW Government will reform Local Schools, Local Decisions to ensure the right balance between accountability, intervention and support for schools. The Government will also be seeking to reduce the administrative burden on principals. These reforms are due to come into effect in 2021.

Enrolments in NSW Government Schools are not declining.

Principals in NSW public schools are responsible for identifying and managing poor staff performance. Principals are supported in this area by the Department's Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate and through the Teacher Performance Management and Improvement Project field staff.

The Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate's support and advice also extends to Directors Educational Leadership, in the management of Principals with performance issues.

124. As part of the changes to the Local Schools Local Decisions policy, will the Minister review the Merit Selection Process to ensure procedural fairness given the first Referee is always the current Principal, giving the Principal enormous power over the career paths of their staff?

The Merit Selection Procedure is exercised in accordance with the Agreement between the NSW Department of Education and the NSW Teachers Federation on the Staffing of NSW Public Schools (2016-2020). The Procedure is grounded in procedural fairness.

The Procedure requires applicants to include three referees in their application. For classroom teacher and executive positions, where the applicant is a current permanent employee, the first referee must be the applicant's current principal. For principal positions, the first referee is the applicant's Director, and for external applicants, the first referee is the applicant's current supervisor.

As part of the shortlisting process, the merit selection panel is required to contact two referees, one of whom must be the applicant's principal. The principal, as a part of the referee check, is required to:

- Confirm they are aware of the application
- Verify the contents of the application are accurate and
- Confirm the applicant is performing his or her duties satisfactorily.

Selection panels consider the written application and the comments of the two referees to determine applicants to be invited to interview.

Selection panels are then required to contact the third referee for any applicant being considered as the proposed recommended applicants or for inclusion on the eligibility list.

In rare circumstances where a permanent staff member believes it would not be appropriate to include their current principal as a referee (for example, if the principal is new to the school and has not known the applicant for a reasonable period), the applicant is able to request an alternate first referee, with the approval of their Director.

125. What repercussions are currently in place for panel members do not declare their non-pecuniary interests?

The Merit Selection Procedure clearly describes the responsibilities of all panel members, including the convenor, to declare any personal prior interest or knowledge of any of the applicants being considered.

Should a panel member not declare any personal prior interest or knowledge of an applicant, and a subsequent non-pecuniary conflict of interest is reported, the process would be subject to appeal. If the non-declaration is found to have negatively impacted the decision making process of the panel, the appeal would be upheld and the outcome would be invalid.

In these circumstances, the position would need to be re-advertised, with an entirely new panel formed.

Should the failure to declare a non-pecuniary interest with an intent to subvert the merit selection process be detected, and the relevant panel member is a departmental employee, that person may be subject to further disciplinary action for breaching the code of conduct.

126. Can you please provide the number of Merit Panel appeals for 2019? 2018? 2017? 2016?

Under the Merit Selection Procedure and Agreement between the NSW Department and the NSW Teachers Federation on the Staffing of NSW Public Schools (2016-2020), a permanent teacher may appeal against the recommended appointment to a senior position through an advertised selection process on the grounds that the process was irregular or improper. Senior positions include principal, deputy

principal, assistant principal, head teacher and highly accomplished teacher positions.

127. Given the Department's management and performance policy states that complaints need to be dealt with "in a timely fashion" and given there is evidence of two female teachers having been removed and placed on "alternative duties" in a Sydney South West Regional Office for two and three years respectively, with no specific role, would you consider this to be in "a timely fashion?"

128. Can you specify which policy indemnifies Principals and Directors from being reported to EPAC?

There is no policy or procedure that indemnifies Directors and Principals from being reported to the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC). The Department of Education's policies and procedures are applied fairly and transparently. EPAC regularly receives reports about Principals and Directors, and where the threshold for misconduct is reached, EPAC conducts investigations into allegations. Where the allegations concern conduct towards students, the Children's Guardian has oversight of EPAC's management of the allegations.

129. Will your current procedures for reporting issues with Principals and Directors be reviewed?

There is no plan to review the procedures for reporting issues with Principals and Directors. The Department of Education has no evidence to indicate that there has been a failure in the procedures for reporting misconduct of Directors or Principals.

130. The Minister visited Randwick Boys and Randwick Girls late 2019 and promised a scope of works for major upgrades by the end of the year. It has now been 21 months since the upgrades were announced and there still has not been any scope of works. Students and Teachers continue to work in less than adequate facilities. These are not the only schools waiting for upgrades as part of the Government's election promises. What is actually being done to expedite these upgrades in a timely fashion?

The Department is establishing a community reference group to inform the masterplan and concept designs for the upgrades. The group, which will include school community representatives, will look at designs, heritage of the site, sustainability and how the proposed upgrade could build on the schools strengths and focus areas. The upgrades will retain Randwick Boys as a boys-only school as it will not transition to co-education following extensive community consultation that

was announced in 2019. When the project scope is finalised, in consultation with school community stakeholders, it will be published on the School Infrastructure NSW website along with the anticipated timeline for construction.

131. You stated in questions on notice that there have been long term processes in EPAC reaching judgements which is why you are putting more staff into EPAC in order to shorten these time frames. Is EPAC the biggest area of growth within the Department for employment? Why?

Comparisons in staff numbers are difficult to make as there have been multiple changes to the Department of Education's corporate structure over time, with some completely new divisions created, for example School Infrastructure NSW, and other divisions merging or splitting to reflect necessary changes to meet the strategic plan of the Department.

132. Given 48 new investigators have been hired by EPAC, is this not an indication that complaints are far more frequent than before?

Following the review of the Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC), in recognition of increased demand, additional funding was provided to enhance staffing resources. This included the employment of 13 additional investigators. There are 48 investigators in total.

133. How many complaints have been made to EPAC in 2019? 2018? 2017? 2016?

135. The Tedeschi Report recommended strongly that EPAC investigations should be undertaken by a panel not an individual investigator. Why is it

that directions are being handed down by ONE EPAC representative, who I understand was brought out of retirement for two days a week to undertake this role?

The Review did not recommend that investigations be conducted by a panel. The Review recommended that panels should be used to assist the delegated decision maker at the conclusion of the investigation. The Department of Education accepted this recommendation. The panel is currently being established and will meet for the first time in May 2020.

Disciplinary decisions are made by an Executive Director and ten Directors, two of whom work part-time.

136. What protocols are in place to ensure that staff who breach of the code of conduct which unnecessarily caused the demotion, dismissal and psychological injury of an innocent staff member by providing fabricated or inaccurate allegations are dealt with appropriately?

If, during the investigation process, there is evidence that a person has fabricated allegations or deliberately misled the Department of Education, appropriate action is taken.

By the time disciplinary action is taken, an employee has had two opportunities to respond to allegations and findings, and present any evidence contrary to the matters being alleged.

137. Are there procedures in place to remove those false allegations from an employee's file?

The Department of Education's Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC) manages records in accordance with the *State Records Act 1998* and will ensure that information that indicates that an allegation is false will be added to the record.

Conduct matters are not placed on an employee's personnel file unless misconduct has been proven.

138. Why does EPAC deny injured workers access of their stored documentation pertaining to their complaint that they are legally entitled to? Is this standard practice?

Employees are provided with all of the material to which they are entitled.

139. Why does EPAC force injured workers to have to apply to the Government Information Privacy Commission and often times to the Independent Privacy Commission to force EPAC to comply with NSW laws and release documentation to them?

The Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate complies with all policy and legislation in relation to the release of information. Employees are entitled to seek assistance from the Information and Privacy Commission should they be dissatisfied with the material released.

All directions were issued by the Department of Education's Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC) in relation to serious conduct matters arising during the course of the employee's employment with the Department.

142. Your own WHS guidelines state that the DEPT has no authority to direct an injured worker to attend an Independent medical assessment. How many psychologically injured employees have been directed by a director to attend an independent medical assessment while on Workers Compensation?

The Department of Education is able to direct an employee to a medical examination in accordance with the authority outlined in the Teaching Services Regulation 2017 (Clause 10) and Government Sector Employment Regulation 2014 (Clause 15).

The Department has Independent Medical Capacity Assessment Referral and Implementing Guidelines which outline the process for referring employees for an assessment which were developed in accordance with the guidance material from the Public Service Commission.

These guidelines are an administrative document and do not restrict the broad powers conferred by legislation.

The Department does not collect data on the number of directions issued by a Director or other relevant executive member.

143. What is the annual contribution paid by the Department for Workers Compensation? 2019?2018?2017?2016?

The Department of Education is insured by the Treasury Managed Fund (TMF), which provides cover for all asset and liability exposures (other than compulsory third party insurance) faced by general government sector budget dependent agencies and participating non-budget public sector agencies. The TMF delivers on the government's responsibility to keep the people and property of the State safe.

Membership of the TMF is mandatory for government agencies in accordance with Treasury Circular TC12/12.

NSW Treasury provides budget funding each year to support the Department to meet its premium payments. As such, these payments are largely budget-neutral for the Department.

145. What is the annual premium or contribution paid by the Department for Public Indemnity Insurance? 2019?2018?2017?2016?

The Department of Education is insured by the Treasury Managed Fund (TMF), which provides cover for all asset and liability exposures (other than compulsory third party insurance) faced by general government sector budget dependent agencies and participating non-budget public sector agencies. The TMF delivers on the government's responsibility to keep the people and property of the State safe.

Membership of the TMF is mandatory for government agencies in accordance with Treasury Circular TC12/12.

NSW Treasury provides budget funding each year to support the Department to meet its premium payments. As such, these payments are largely budget-neutral for the Department.

146. Can you explain the cost of funding to creating more leadership roles within Education over the last ten years?

Between 2010 and 2020, "leadership roles" in the Department of Education have included: Senior Officers and Senior Executive Service employees (under the *Public Sector Employment and Management Act (PSEM) 2002*) between 2010 and 2013; and Public Service Senior Executive (PSSE) roles (under the *Government Sector Employment Act 2013*) between 2013 and 2020.

Between 2010 and 2013, the creation of Senior Officer and Senior Executive Service roles was governed by the *Public Sector Employment and Management Act (PSEM)* 2002, Premier's Circulars and related Public Sector employment policies. The cost of funding the creation of Senior Officer and Senior Executive roles was managed as

part of the employee costs section of the budget of the Department, as approved and expended under the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1983* between 2010 and 2013.

Between 2013 and 2020, the creation of PSSE roles within the Department was governed by the *Government Sector Employment Act* 2013 transitional provisions, and is currently governed by the *Government Sector Employment Act* 2013; including the operative provisions in the Regulations, Rules, Public Service Commission guidelines and the Department's Public Service Employee and Administrative Delegations of Authority under the *Government Sector Employment Act* 2013. The cost of funding the creation of PSSE roles is managed as part of the employee costs section of the budget of the Department, as approved and expended under the *Public Finance and Audit Act* 1983 between 2013 and 2019; and the *Government Sector Finance Act* 2018 between 2019 and 2020.

147. How much does each executive director earn?

An Executive Director in the Department of Education is a Public Service Senior Executive (PSSE) band 2. The total remuneration package (TRP) value for the PSSE band 2 SOORT remuneration range is currently between \$274,701 and \$345,550 under the 2019-2020 SOORT remuneration ranges.

148. How much do you earn? What does a director earn?

The Minister's salary is publically available.

A Director in the Department of Education is a Public Service Senior Executive (PSSE) band 1. The total remuneration package (TRP) value for the PSSE band 1 SOORT remuneration range is currently between \$192,600 and \$274,700 under the 2019-2020 SOORT remuneration ranges.

149. Can you provide evidence through your budget how creating more director positions yet schools are still without basic resources is improving student outcomes?

At the system level, the total for the 2020 school budget allocations is \$9.6 billion delivered to 2,212 public schools through the School Budget Allocation Report (SBAR).

The Director, Educational Leadership, has a key strategic role in supporting the continuous improvement of principals in NSW public schools to ensure that the work of schools is evidence-based and responsive to the needs of all students from preschool to Year 12. The Director, Educational Leadership, provides differentiated line management support to principals in their pivotal responsibility for leading and managing their school. The Director will work with the Principal to ensure evidence-based decision-making is focused on improving student progress and achievement by improving the quality of teachers and through effective school planning, strategic resource management self-assessment and change management processes.

150. Can you provide evidence that the taxpayer is getting value for money in terms of improving student outcomes when positions have been created, including directorships being split into two, instructional leaders, some schools having an over appointment of Assistant Principals, and Deputy Principals all non-teaching roles?

Since 2014, NSW public schools have been funded through the needs-based Resource Allocation Model (RAM) that ensures a fair, efficient and transparent allocation of the state public school education budget.

Through the RAM, additional resources are provided to schools, with more resources allocated to schools with the greatest need. Each year the RAM and School allocations are reviewed and updated which provides an ongoing mechanism to continue to refine the RAM to improve targeted funding based on need.

Principals make decisions about the strategic use of resources to meet the needs of every student. Schools have access to a range of resources to support their students, including those available through the seven needs-based loadings allocated through the RAM.

Key educational research highlights the direct connection between school leadership, teacher professional learning and improved student outcomes. There is no question that excellence in leadership remains a crucial factor in determining whether students and schools succeed. It is second only to the in-school effects of excellence in teaching practices. (Leithwood et al 2019)

Therefore assistant principals and deputy principals are integral to the delivery of essential professional learning; and the provision of feedback to teachers, so that they can continue to improve their teaching practices.

151. Can you provide evidence how the introduction of business managers has impacted expenditure per school?

There are a range of factors that determine a school's financial position, and each school manages its financial and administrative functions differently.

Schools have the flexibility to engage business managers if they wish, for finance and non-finance functions. Business managers can be employed on a part or full time basis, or may be engaged across a number of schools.

This option has been made more accessible through the recent school administrative staff pay equity settlement. Schools can choose to use flexible funding sources, such as the annual \$50 million School Support allocation, or accumulated funds to provide additional targeted support where needed.

152. How much financial assistance does a principal receive to run a TIP

Principals are able to access up to 10 relief days to support the implementation of a Teacher Improvement Program.

153. Are Principals aware that in order to be successful in their application for promotion that experience in overseeing a TIP is a requirement?

Overseeing a Teacher Improvement Program is not one of the selection criteria for either executive or principal positions.

As a part of the merit selection process for principals, all applicants are required to address a range of general and specific selection criteria in their written application. One of the general selection criteria, mandatory for inclusion in all principal merit selection processes is:

Ability to lead and manage the development and performance of staff to improve teaching and learning.

The Department of Education's NSW Public School Leadership and Management Credential, a series of modules developed to support aspiring and new principals, also includes a specific module on performance improvement, including the implementation of the Teacher Improvement Program.

154. Given this is the case, and TIPS are being run for that purpose, is it a feasible school of thought that exorbitant amounts of taxpayers money is being wasted and being channelled AWAY from students and resources towards leadership positions?

Teacher Improvement Programs are implemented when attempts to address performance concerns through performance and development processes do not result in sufficient, sustained improvement. They are not implemented for any reason other than to ensure students are taught by proficient teachers.

155. Given these programs have a 99% failure rate, and you have a policy that has titled the program a 'project' is it your intention to casualise the workforce by deliberately encouraging older and experienced teachers by being bullied out of their jobs whilst you stand shoulder to shoulder to 'get the job done?

The purpose of an improvement program is to assist a teacher to improve. Where principals have sought shoulder-to-shoulder support from the Teacher Performance Management and Improvement Team, approximately one-third of cases were closed because the teacher improved and did not need to be progressed to a Teacher Improvement Program. Neither age nor experience is the basis of moving a teacher to an improvement program. When a principal identifies concerns with a teacher's performance as assessed against the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers, action is taken. The *Teaching Service Act 1980* requires the protection of children to be the paramount consideration, and this extends to protecting students from teachers who are incompetent.

156. What is the DoE's budget for Teacher Improvement Programs?

The 2019-20 budget for Teacher Improvement Programs is \$5,927,302. This includes the salaries of staff in the Employee Performance team and the trial Teacher Performance Management and Improvement project.

157. The Secretary Mark Scott capitulated in the recent Budget Estimates hearing that bullied teachers fighting for justice are "just disgruntled employees." Why given the data on the alarming increase in psychological injury WC claims, as a direct result of bullying by line managers, does the Secretary to continue to deny there is serious issue with leadership with the DoE. Can Mark Scott please provide the sources of information for his opinion vs the evidence that exists to the contrary?

Mr Mark Scott, Secretary, was referring to a number of online social media postings and groups that elect to raise issues via social media and other public and informal channels rather than using the Department of Education's established Complaints Handling Policy and associated procedures.

The Department does not tolerate bullying in its workplaces and encourages anyone who experiences such behaviour to report the matter so that actions can be taken to prevent and respond to allegations of bullying in the workplace. Established processes and procedures are in place for managing complaints against staff regarding allegations of bullying and other forms of unacceptable behaviour in the workplace.

While the number of workers compensation claims for psychological injuries has increased over the past three years from 17% of claims in 2016-17 to 19% of claims in 2018-19, the proportion of workers compensation claims that involve an allegation of bullying or harassment has remained stable for the last 3 years.

While any number of claims is too many claims, when the size of the Department is considered, the number of psychological workers compensation claims represents less than 1% (0.96%) of the workforce in a year, based on 92,465 full-time equivalent (FTE) reported in the Department's 2018 Annual report.

The cause of psychological injury in the Department is a result of a complex and dynamic human centred environment. Injuries of a psychological nature may be the result of:

- Distress due to Work Pressure
- Allegations of harassment and bullying; by colleagues, students or members of the school community
- Distress due to threats, intimidation or acts of violence from students, members of the public or members of the school community
- Distress due to witnessing or being involved in a traumatic event

The Department has services in place which provide emergency response, post incident support, specialist injury management and work health and safety support, to assist in the management of a workplace issue and the promotion of health and wellbeing in the workplace.

Should a claim involve an allegation of bullying or another breach of the Code of Conduct, the Department takes these matters seriously and applies the relevant policy to manage the allegations and ensure procedural fairness to all involved.

Questions from the Hon Mark Buttigieg MLC (on behalf of the NSW Labor Opposition)

Minister's backflip on Local Schools, Local Decisions

158. Did the Minister or Department consult with principals, the Secondary Principals Council and Primary Principals Associations prior to the Minister making an announcement about changes to Local Schools Local Decisions in a Saturday paper?

The Department of Education, the Minister's staff, and the Minister have had many discussions about Local Schools Local Decisions with stakeholders across the education sector, including principal groups. The announcement referred to in question 158 was about indicating the Government's intent to reform Local Schools Local Decisions — it did not announce the specifics of the reform. The reform of Local Schools Local Decisions will be shaped through extensive consultation with stakeholders, including the Primary Principals Association and the Secondary Principals Council.

159. The Department is finalising its evaluation of Local Schools Local Decisions this year, the Audit Office is delivering an inquiry this year as well. Why have changed to the policy before these reports issue final reports?

The Local Schools, Local Decisions (LSLD) reform was about making sure that students in NSW are placed at the centre of all decision making. This remains the Department of Education's focus.

The Audit Office of NSW's performance audit report of needs-based funding in government schools and the findings of the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation final Local Schools, Local Decisions Evaluation report (due mid 2020) will inform the next steps in continuing to deliver support to schools.

160. Are you concerned that this approach does not provide certainty for school principals?

Principals continue to have certainty through the needs-based funding model. Principals are aware that through the Resource Allocation Model (RAM), more resources are allocated to schools with the greatest need.

The School Budget Allocation Report (SBAR) shows each school's funding allocation including staffing, operational costs, the seven needs-based loadings and initiative funding. It assists schools to develop their own budget with certainty and allocate funding to deliver on the strategic directions in their school plan to best meet student needs.

161. How much is being spent on this evaluation of Local Schools, Local Decisions, despite the fact you have made a decision prior to it being finalised?

The Local Schools, Local Decisions evaluation is being completed internally by the Department's Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation.

162. What measures will you actually be undertaking as a result of this announcement by media on Saturday?

The reform of Local Schools, Local Decisions will ensure the right balance between accountability, intervention and support for schools.

The reform will consider a number of aspects, including ways to better provide support for those schools that need stronger guidance regarding how best to meet student needs, ways to reduce administrative workload for principals, and guidance on best use of funding.

163. What roles will the Department take back from principals specifically?

Any changes will involve consultation with the NSW Primary Principals' Association and NSW Secondary Principals' Council to ensure the right balance of support for principals and schools.

164. Will you be reinstating all of the staff cut as a result of the LSLD reforms?

The ways in which we support our schools has changed since Local Schools, Local Decisions commenced.

In addition, principals are able to use their school's resources flexibly to respond to the learning needs of all students in the school through the employment of additional staff with the appropriate expertise.

165. If not, why not?

The ways in which we support our schools has changed since Local Schools, Local Decisions commenced.

In addition, principals are able to use their school's resources flexibly to respond to the learning needs of all students in the school through the employment of additional staff with the appropriate expertise.

Bushfire impacted schools

166. Can you provide a list of the NSW schools impacted or destroyed by bushfires across 2019/2020, and provide a breakdown of buildings and assets that we're destroyed, impacted or not impacted at each affected school?

The majority of fire impacted NSW schools suffered minor damage or required additional cleaning because of soot, ember damage or smoke impacts. The majority of work was completed and schools were operational for all students on day one, Term 1, 2020.

Wytaliba Public School, Bobin Public School and Cabramurra Public School were almost completely destroyed. Wytaliba Public School and Bobin Public School were rebuilt and operational for the commencement of the school year. Cabramurra Public School will not be rebuilt and was previously in recess due to lack of enrolments.

A list of impacted schools is provided in the response to Supplementary Question 167.

167. Please also provide a list of the current enrolments at each impacted school.

There were 189 NSW public schools impacted by bushfires across 2019-2020, with a total of 47,742 students enrolled at these schools.

Enrolments range from 4 to 1,268 students.

No. The Department of Education has engaged with the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) and the Telecommunications Functional Area who have confirmed that satellite phones have limitations, including being unreliable in smoke, heavy cloud and mountainous areas. The user must be outside in an open area and in a direct line to the satellite to send and receive calls. Satellite phones are therefore not a reliable way to send and receive calls in all emergency events such as bushfire and do not receive Emergency Alerts. I have asked the Department to look at alternative solutions for emergency communication.

180. Can you confirm whether all bushfire impacted schools had a satellite phone or other emergency contact device on site during the bushfire season of 2019 up until 3 March 2020?

All schools had communication in place during this period, including landline telephones. Bobin Public School was issued with a Satellite phone on 15 January 2020 as a trial to establish if this would be an effective method of communication.

The following schools were impacted by bushfire in some way, all of which had landline telephones available.

Counsellors at bushfire impacted schools

Bushfire impacted schools have received additional counselling support since the beginning of Term 1, 2020.

The level of continued support is based on feedback from principals about the needs of their schools. Some schools have returned to their regular allocation, and others have maintained an increased level of support. Increased support will continue to be available for as long as it is required.

190. If so, please list the schools and the time periods that the counsellors were not present at the schools.

The needs of schools will continue to be monitored. These positions may change from week to week depending on the needs of the school.

191. Please confirm whether Batlow Technology School's assigned bushfire counsellor has left the school?

The counsellor allocation to Batlow Technology School has increased following consultation with the school. The school will receive 5 days a week of counselling support for as long as is required.

Batlow Technology School had temporarily returned to their regular counselling allocation due to local workforce issues. Contingency workforce was engaged to return the school to an increased allocation and the school will receive increased support for as long as is required.

192. Can you confirm whether any assigned counsellors or mental health workers returned to schools following the issue being raised at estimates?

Following the Budget Estimates hearing, contact was made with the Principal of Batlow Technology School. The Principal advised that the school was already aware of the workforce issue and confirmed that arrangements had already been put in place for contingency workforce to start the following day.

A total of 23.4 of the 25 school counselling positions have already been recruited.

231. Has the percentage of students studying a Language Other Than English decreased in NSW over the past three years? Please provide the data for 2017, 2018 and 2019.

Yes, the percentage of NSW government school students studying a language other than English decreased by 0.8 percentage points, dropping from 23.1% in 2017 to 22.8% in 2018 and 22.3% in 2019.

232. What percentage of NSW students are currently studying a second language, broken down by high school and primary school?

In 2019, 28.7% of students in NSW government schools were studying a language other than English. By education level, 16.1% of primary students and 32% of secondary students in NSW government schools were studying a language other than English in 2019.

233. What percentage of NSW students were studying a second language in 2018, broken down by high school and primary school?

In 2018, 29.3% of students in NSW government schools were studying a language other than English. By education level, 16.1% of primary students and 33.7% of secondary students in NSW government schools were studying a language other than English in 2018.

NAPLAN

234. Are you concerned that the Government's bungling of the NAPLAN online system contributed to the poor results recorded in NAPLAN in 2019?

NAPLAN Online is run by the Federal Government through the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA).

ACARA investigated the NAPLAN 2019 data to ascertain whether the connectivity issues experienced by some students on Day 1 had an impact on results.

The following advice was provided on the nationally-consistent Individual student report template developed by ACARA:

For the 2019 transition year, the online test results were equated with the penand-paper tests. Results for both tests are reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale.

NAPLAN results, however, should always be interpreted with care. This is particularly the case this year for some students who experienced disruptions due to connectivity issues.

235. How many students had to sit the NAPLAN tests twice?

Approximately 10,600 students in 395 NSW schools re-sat NAPLAN in 2019.

236. How many students had to sit the NAPLAN tests more than twice?

No NSW students completed the NAPLAN tests more than twice.

237. Does the Department think it's appropriate for the Education Minister to call NAPLAN tests "no longer fit for purpose", despite the requirement that they are conducted and the results still provided to parents as an indication of their child's progress?

NAPLAN has been in place since 2008 and is evolving with the introduction of online testing. It is timely that we consider if NAPLAN remains fit for purpose in the future national assessment landscape.

The purpose of the review is to identify what a standardised testing regime in Australian schools should deliver, assess how well NAPLAN achieves this, and identify short and longer-term improvements that can be made.

238. Will the Department be providing any information to parents alongside the NAPLAN results explaining that the Government feels the tests are not currently fit for purpose?

The Council of Australian Governments Education Council will consider any future NAPLAN communications, noting:

- NAPLAN exams will be cancelled this year due to widespread disruption to schools caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The NAPLAN Review, led by NSW, QLD, VIC and the ACT, is considering ways that NAPLAN can continue to support an effective national assessment environment into the future, alongside a national formative assessment tool and the full transition to NAPLAN Online.

239. Is the Department concerned that Year 5 boys went backwards, with only 93.5% achieving the minimum standard in reading?

Our aim is that every student, every teacher, every leader and every school improves every year.

Noting the proportion of students achieving national minimum standards can be volatile from year to year, for the 2019 proportion of Year 5 boys achieving the national minimum standard in reading, there is no statistically significant difference to results in 2018.

The Department provides extensive evidence-based guidance to teachers and principals, so that they apply teaching practices with the strongest evidence base.

We are also ensuring that teachers have valid and reliable assessments that will help them to measure progress and make decisions about student learning. This includes:

- A phonics check in Term 3 for Year 1 students and teachers, who will participate in a trial of the Year 1 phonics check. The Year 1 phonics check will be an additional tool for teachers and will complement existing strategies to identify students' progress in developing foundational literacy skills.
- The Department is committed to providing evidence based professional learning to all teachers. For this reason, we are working with Dr Tessa Daffern from the University of Wollongong to create professional learning for writing. 240. How many NSW students does that 6.5% of student's amount to?

6.5% corresponds to 3,200 Year 5 boys below the national minimum standard for reading in NSW in 2019.

241. Is the Department concerned that Year 5 boys also went backwards in grammar and punctuation, with only 90.5% achieving the minimum standard in reading?

Our aim is that every student, every teacher, every leader and every school improves every year.

Noting the proportion of students achieving national minimum standards can be volatile from year to year, there is no statistically significant difference between the 2019 and 2017 results for Year 5 boys achieving the national minimum standard for grammar and punctuation.

The Department of Education provides extensive evidence-based guidance to teachers and principals, so that they apply teaching practices with the strongest evidence base.

We are also ensuring that teachers have valid and reliable assessments that will help them to measure progress and make decisions about student learning. This includes:

- A phonics check in Term 3 for Year 1 students and teachers, who will participate in a trial of the Year 1 phonics check. 242. How many NSW students does that 9.5% of student's amount to?

9.5% corresponds to 4,600 Year 5 boys below national minimum standard for grammar and punctuation in NSW in 2019.

243. The number of very remote area student's activing the National Minimum Standard in Year 3 spelling fell by 5%. Is that acceptable?

Our aim is that every student, every teacher, every leader and every school improves every year.

Noting the proportion of students achieving national minimum standards can be volatile from year to year, for the 2019 proportion of Year 3, very remote students achieving the national minimum standard in spelling, there is no statistically significant difference to results in 2018.

In 2019, there was less than 50 NSW public school students from very remote areas registered for Year 3 NAPLAN in 2019. In 2018 there was a total of 43 students in

Year 3 across all 12 schools at the time of census. It is not valid to conclude that the minimum reading standard fell by 5% in that sample size, and caution needs to be applied to making any such comparisons on an invalid/compromised sample size.

The Department of Education provides extensive evidence-based guidance to teachers and principals, so that they apply teaching practices with the strongest evidence base.

We are also ensuring that teachers have valid and reliable assessments that will help them to measure progress and make decisions about student learning. This includes:

- A phonics check in Term 3 for Year 1 students and teachers, who will participate in a trial of the Year 1 phonics check. The Year 1 phonics check will be an additional tool for teachers and will complement existing strategies to identify students' progress in developing foundational literacy skills.
- The Department is committed to providing evidence based professional learning to all teachers. For this reason, we are working with Dr Tessa Daffern from the University of Wollongong to create professional learning for writing. The professional learning has a particular focus on evidenced based spelling strategies. It will be avalaible to all schools in Semester 2, 2019. The EAfS initiative provides 182 (FTE) experienced literacy and numeracy instructional leaders, who work alongside classroom teachers to enhance their practice. There are 325 inner regional, outer regional, remote and very remote schools involved in EAfS.

244. Will the Department give us an assurance that results will improve across the board in this years NAPLAN tests?

Following the decision of the Education Council not to proceed with NAPLAN testing in 2020 due to the impact of COVID-19, there will not be student performance data for this year.

NAPLAN 2019 results show that the Government achieved the previous Premier's Priority to increase the proportion of NSW students in the top two bands for reading and numeracy by 8%. We aim to build on this success and increase the proportion of NSW public school students in the top two NAPLAN bands for literacy and numeracy by 15% by 2023.

NSW is already one of the top three performers for the proportion of students (public and independent) in the top two NAPLAN bands. Achieving this Premier's Priority will make NSW the number one State in the country (excluding the Australian Capital Territory).

We have put in place a set of evidence-based reforms across the State to help achieve these targets – reforms aimed at improving the literacy and numeracy development of children in the early years of schooling, as well as reforms to improve the overall quality of teaching in schools and enhance outcomes for all students.

245. Please provide a breakdown of the 2018 and 2019 NAPLAN results in each category by NSW school education areas.

Education areas are only defined for NSW public schools. There are six areas, which are referred to as Operational Directorates. The following table provides the proportion of NSW public school students achieving at or above national minimum standards in each domain for each year level for 2018 and 2019 by Operational Directorate.

251. Can you confirm how many schools had their asbestos reports modified since this issue was raised in the previous estimates session?

The Department of Education releases updated asbestos registers for schools across the State once a year. The last registers were released in September 2019, and the Department expects the next to be released in September 2020.

The Department is currently working towards providing updated asbestos registers more frequently.

252. Have any schools contacted the department to express that they hadn't been made aware of the existence of the asbestos register for their school?

School Infrastructure NSW is not aware of any schools contacting the Department of Education to express that they hadn't been made aware of the existence of the asbestos register for their school.

253. If so, how many and which schools?

See answer to Question 252.

254. How many schools still have friable asbestos present?

332 government schools currently have friable asbestos.

The majority of this type of asbestos is encapsulated within heaters. The remaining friable items consists of a variety of materials such as medium density fibre board, vinyl flooring, insulating materials for incinerators or compressed sheeting and other items that are assumed to contain asbestos.

Where the Department of Education identifies friable asbestos as posing an immediate risk to the health and safety of students, it immediately isolates the space in accordance with the Department's asbestos management plan and remediates it in line with Safework NSW guidelines.

255. Please provide a list of every school which has friable asbestos present, broken down by school, electorate and the year the school opened.

This information is publicly available on the Department of Education's schools asbestos register.

256. How many schools still have damaged asbestos present?

This information is publicly available on the Department of Education's schools asbestos register.

257. Please provide a list of every school which has damaged asbestos present, broken down by school, electorate and the year the school opened.

This information is publicly available on the Department of Education's schools asbestos register.

258. Were any issues identified with the asbestos report the contractor undertook for Newcastle East Public School?

Yes. A clerical error indicated an incorrect licence number for the hygienist. However, this was resolved with new clearance certificates being reissued with the correct licence number.

259. If so, have any other reports conducted by this contractor been checked?

All services performed by the Department of Education's contracted independent hygienists are carried out under a certified quality management system which meets the relevant Australian Standards.

260. If not, was incorrect information given by to this committee about the asbestos risk at Newcastle East Public?

See Answer to Question 258.

261. How can parents and school communities trust the information provided by the Minister and Department when false information is provided?

Asbestos is controlled and managed in accordance with the Department of Education's Asbestos Management Plan and SafeWork NSW regulations.

All work is completed by licensed asbestos contractors, and monitored by occupational hygienists in strict accordance with all applicable legislation, regulations, policies and guidelines.

262. How can parents and school communities trust the asbestos reports for their school when the contractors do not assess areas they can't reach or are inaccessible by them on the day the report is undertaken?

Asbestos on NSW government school sites is managed in strict accordance with Safe Work NSW and all applicable legislation, regulations, policies and guidelines including the Department of Education's Asbestos Management Plan for NSW Government Schools.

All inaccessible areas are flagged for further investigations by a licenced asbestos assessor. If a qualified person has identified non-assessable areas that is likely to have asbestos containing materials, it is assumed the areas will contain asbestos until it is assessed.

263. Doesn't this mean that the reports are not 100% accurate?

No, all work is completed by licensed asbestos contractors, and monitored by occupational hygienists in strict accordance with all applicable legislation, regulations, policies and guidelines

264. Does the Department crosscheck the reports prepared by contractors to ensure there aren't inconsistencies?

All services performed by the Department's contracted hygienists are carried out under a certified quality management system that meets the relevant Australian Standards.

265. How many asbestos report audits have been conducted since this issue was last raised in Estimates last year?

The Department releases updated asbestos registers for schools across the State once a year. The last registers were released in September 2019, and the Department expects the next updated registers to be released in September 2020. The Department relies on qualified hygienists to advise it on any known or assumed asbestos on school sites. These hygienists carry out their work under a certified quality management system that meets the relevant Australian Standards.

Minister's Trip to USA and Canada

266. The Education Minister last year visited the USA and Canada on a \$90,000, 8 day tour, is that correct?

267. Does the Department consider this trip to be value for money? Yes.

268. What education and teaching methods did the Minister see in the USA and Canada that were not present in Australia?

On 28 September to 6 October 2019, the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning and the Deputy Secretary, School Operations and Performance engaged in a study tour of high performing education jurisdictions in the USA and Canada, including: the District of Columbia, USA; New Jersey, USA; Toronto, Canada; and Vancouver, Canada.

The aim of the study tour was to gain a first-hand understanding of the operations, mechanisms, and organisation of other large education systems that are pursuing both excellence and equity. The delegation was immersed in learning at all levels of each system, including school visits, system level discussions, roundtables with academics, and meetings with Ministries.

There were a number of commonalities across these systems that contribute to their growth and success that NSW can learn from. These include:

- Mechanisms to recognise, utilise, and reward high performing teachers resulting in increased retention, particularly in 'hard to staff' schools, and improved teacher quality and student outcomes across the system.
- Frameworks and processes for identifying leadership talent within schools and a variety of accountability mechanisms for monitoring Principal performance.
- A complete focus on Literacy and Numeracy in early education, with other curriculum offerings delayed until Year 3 (Stage 2).
- Early and extensive engagement with community through on site pre-schools (birth to kindergarten), extensive extracurricular offerings, adult/community classes and health and wellbeing services. These were of particular importance in low SES schools and resulted in high attendance and completion rates for students.
- A variety of in-school skills and trade programs to prepare students for the workplace resulting in increased engagement with learning and high school completion rates.

269. Has any outcomes of the Minister's trip overseas been directly applied into the Department of Education and NSW Schools?

Visits to education jurisdictions within the USA and Canada presented opportunities for the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Learning and the Deputy Secretary, School Operations and Performance to deeply explore the values, systems, structures, processes and policies that have enabled growth in student learning outcomes in each of these systems.

The Minister visited District of Columbia (DC) Prep Anacostia Elementary Campus (AEC), a public charter school for pre-Kindergarten – Year 3, to observe their standards based approach to instruction, targeted intervention and use of campus based instructional leadership teams.

From Grade 1, students at DC Prep have specialist teachers in mathematics and science and there is a clear focus on literacy and numeracy in the early years.

The Minister and Department were interested to see how this approach has improved literacy and numeracy results for DC Prep students and potentially inform our approach to the use of Instructional Leaders in NSW schools.

The delegation also met with Dr Melissa Kim, Deputy Chancellor of DC Public Schools to discuss and learn from their approach to teacher and leader preparation and development, the 'IMPACT' program.

The IMPACT program supports professional growth by:

Clarifying Expectations - IMPACT outlines clear performance expectations and provides a common language of success for all school-based employees. Providing Frequent and Meaningful Feedback - Regular feedback opportunities support reflection and action planning toward excellence.

The IMPACT talent strategy for school leaders in this system has driven changes in teacher quality that have produced, on average, four additional months of student learning per year.

NSW has made a significant investment in school leaders through the School Leadership Strategy and agrees that great school leadership is key to improved student outcomes.

Through the Department's School Leadership Institute, we are preparing a pipeline of high quality leaders to ensure our schools led by effective leaders focuses on a culture of school improvement.

The Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation does not have access to any Australian or International school level results. As such, we cannot provide the results for the United States and Canada schools visited by the Minister and Deputy Secretary School Operations and Performance.

A comparison of the 2018 PISA results for Australia, Canada and the United States across the three PISA domains of Reading, Mathematical and Scientific literacy shows that Canada's performance was significantly higher than Australia's performance in all three test domains. United States' performance in Reading and Scientific literacy was not significantly different from Australia. United States' performance in Mathematical literacy was significantly lower than Australia

Empty classrooms

272. Are there any NSW schools where there are currently spare classrooms not in use by a class as at Term 1 2020?

Yes. All schools abide by a statewide class size policy which rages from a maximum of 20 students in a kindergarten class up to 30 students in the core curriuculum areas in Years 7-10 in high school. In adhering to the maximum class size allowed for each year group there is an understandable variation across the capacity available in each class, across each term and across each school because of the fluctuations a school experiences in its student population.

273. If so, please provide a list of the number of currently available classrooms which are not in use by classes, excluding demountables, at each school in NSW, broken down by electorate and number of spare available classrooms. Please provide this in a searchable excel spreadsheet.

The Department does not hold such data as all schools abide by a statewide class size policy which rages from a maximum of 20 students in a kindergarten class up to

30 students in the core curriuculum areas in Years 7-10 in high school. In adhering to the maximum class size allowed for each year group there is an understandable variation across the capacity available in each class, across each term and across each school because of the fluctuations a school experiences in its student population.

274. Will Inner Sydney High open as a 7-12 schools this year?

Inner Sydney High School will accommodate up to 1,200 students once the project is complete from Years 7 to 12. The enrolment is being staged, and the first Year 7 students started classes at Inner Sydney High School at the end of January 2020.

275. If not, why not?

The enrolment is being staged as is often the case with new schools. The first Year 7 students started classes at Inner Sydney High School at the end of January 2020.

Inner Sydney High School opened in three heritage buildings with 12 General Learning Areas (GLAs) which have a capacity for 180 students.

Throughout 2020, construction of the 14 storey tower will continue. When finished, the school will have 47 GLAs with the capacity to enrol 1200 students with approximately 200 in each year. These 47 GLAs are in addition to specialist spaces such as Food Technology and Science Laboratories.

276. Please list when each year of students will begin at the school.

The enrolment is being staged. The first Year 7 students started classes at Inner Sydney High School at the end of January 2020. The intent is to expand year on year by year group.

2020: Year 7 2021: Years 7-8 2022: Years 7-9 2023: Years 7-10 2024: Years 7-11 2025: Years 7-12

277. Will any classrooms be vacant once fully completed, before the year group begins?

Yes. As the school will be occupied year by year the tower upper levels will be occupied progressively. All levels have a combination of General Learning Areas and specialist spaces including science laboratories, the commercial kitchen and the domestic kitchen, and the gymnasium and fitness studio.

278. If so, please list how many classrooms will be vacant in each year from 2020 to 2027.

This is dependent on enrolments year by year.

The following vacancy rates are estimates. These would be General Learning Areas that may be totally vacant, taking into account that a number of other General Learning Areas will be partially used until the school is at capacity.

2020: None 2021: 21 2022: 7

2023 - 2027: None

Each level has a combination of General Learning Areas and specialist spaces. Regardless of the number of enrolments, students will be occupying each level to access learning spaces.

Inquiry into measurement and outcome-based funding in NSW Schools 279. Has the Department reviewed the inquiry report?

The Department of Education welcomes the report and appreciates the work of the Committee in conducting the inquiry. The Department has reviewed the inquiry report and is in the process of considering each of the recommendations.

280. Does the Department believe the inquiry report accurately reflects the evidence provided to the committee in the submissions?

Data has been provided as at 1 March 2020, however this changes regularly as services vary their operating models.

The Department is consistently approached by a wide sector of the community to build new schools, including property developers, councils and members of the general community.

Should a proponent of a new school wish to build a school for the Department, the Department may enter into a Voluntary Planning Agreement (VPAs) where advantageous to do so. VPAs allow property developers to contribute to land and/or new school infrastructure in new housing development areas being built by property developers.

VPAs are negotiated and managed by a NSW land use planning authority, such as the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment or a NSW council, on behalf of the Department.

There are instances where approaches from external parties to the Department to build new government schools are not appropriate and do not proceed any further.

Teachers

The total Actual 2019 teaching full-time equivalent (FTE) for all public schools in NSW was 57,005.87 FTE and the total Actual 2020 teaching FTE is 58,017.23 FTE. The additional teaching entitlement between 2019 and 2020 is 1,011.37 FTE.

This data is extracted from the Department of Education's iSeries Enrolment and Entitlement system.

The teaching entitlement for a school includes the formula-based entitlement based on student enrolment and the non-formula-based allocations such as Learning and

Support, School Counselling, Home School Liaison Officer, Community Language etc.

334. How many of those teachers hired have qualifications in maths or maths teaching?

The Government commitment to hire 4,600 new teachers is based on State-wide aggregate forecasts from the May 2018 Budget Paper 3 (BP3) submission. They forecast extra teaching full-time equivalent (FTE) required to accommodate growing enrolments, primarily driven by population growth.

The annual actual entitlements are an aggregate of changes in teaching entitlement based on student enrolments submitted by Principals at the beginning of term one each year, and are not broken down by individual subjects.

335. How many will be hired in total by the end of 2020?

The forecast increased teaching full-time equivalent (FTE) by end of 2020 is 1,008.

Source: Figures are based on the Budget Paper 3 (BP3) forecasts provided to NSW Treasury in May 2018. The Government commitment to hire 4,600 new teachers is based on State-wide aggregate forecasts from the May 2018 Budget Paper 3 (BP3) submission. They forecast extra teaching full-time equivalent (FTE) required to accommodate growing enrolments, primarily driven by population growth.

Forecasts on teaching entitlement are performed from a budgeting perspective, not for operational or strategic workforce planning purposes and do not contain a key learning area or subject breakdown.

341. How many students are currently being taught maths by out of field teachers in NSW high schools? Please break this figures down by year group, and maths level.

The Department of Education does not have this data.

As a result, there can be course name mapping discrepancies which may affect the number of mathematics subjects identified from this data. Similarly, where a school has entered incorrect, or incomplete employee information, it's not possible to determine whether the teacher is teaching in or out of field.

343. How many teachers hired since the election have had online only qualifications?

Since March 2019, no applicants seeking approval to teach via the Department of Education's Graduate Recruitment Program completed their teaching qualification in an online only format.

344. Has the Minister and Department considered the impact of the ban online teaching qualification on discouraging rural and regional people from becoming teachers?

The Department of Education will continue to consider applications from teacher education students from rural or remote locations, career changers for in demand subject areas or applicants with specific personal circumstances who complete their course of study wholly online. These applicants will still be required to meet all other requirements, including demonstrating readiness for teaching through satisfactory practicum reports, before being issued an approval to teach in NSW public schools.

345. Are there any high schools in NSW which don't have any teachers with qualifications in maths or maths teaching?

There are no high schools in NSW without a teacher holding qualifications in maths or maths teaching.

The Department of Education will continue to offer a range of scholarships and sponsorships to support applicants seeking to become a mathematics teacher. This includes the teach.MathsNOW scholarship aimed at career changers and STEM undergraduates, as well as sponsorship opportunities for qualified teachers seeking to retrain as mathematics teachers.

348. Can you give a commitment that more students will not be taught by out of field teachers as a result of the introduction of compulsory maths for years 11 and 12?

The Department of Education will continue to appoint qualified mathematics teachers to permanent vacancies, in accordance with the subject code requirements specified by the Principal.

349. How many additional maths teachers will be needed in NSW as a result of compulsory maths policy announced by the government?

The Department of Education has made assessments of the impact of the policy change on the pipeline of mathematics teachers. Work to refine this into subject level forecasting is planned into future modelling enhancements.

Out of field teaching is estimated based on timetable data from a sample of secondary and central schools. Not all schools use this platform for their timetable.

Enrolment Capacity

355. Please provide a list of the enrolment capacity of everyschool in NSW separated into permanent building capacity and current demountable capacity, broken down by school and electorate in a searchable excel spreadsheet.

NSW public schools are able to accommodate every local child who wishes to attend. The Department of Education can adapt its existing facilities or use demountables to ensure appropriate learning facilities are available for all students.

In 2019 a revised enrolment policy was implemented. This policy sets an enrolment cap for eligible schools and schools with an enrolment at or above this cap are permitted to consider taking 'out of area' students only under exceptional circumstances.

The cap does not set a limit on the number of local students a school can enrol and is not the enrolment capacity of the school.

Attached is a list of eligible schools with 2020 enrolment caps.

356. Are there any space spare rooms in NSW that are not in use as of Term 1 2020.

Yes. All schools abide by a statewide class size policy which ranges from a maximum of 20 students in a kindergarten class up to 30 students in the core curriuculum areas in Years 7-10 in high school. In adhering to the maximum class size allowed for each year group there is an undersandable variation across the capacity available in each class, across each term and across each school because of the fluctuations a school experiences in its student population.

The Department of Education does not hold such data as all schools abide by a statewide class size policy which rages from a maximum of 20 students in a kindergarten class up to 30 students in the core curriuculum areas in Years 7-10 in high school. In adhering to the maximum class size allowed for each year group there is an undersandable variation across the capacity available in each class, across each term and across each school because of the fluctuations a school experiences in its student population.

358. What percentage of NSW students in 2020 are learning in demountable classrooms?

It is not possible to provide an accurate percentage of students learning in demountable classrooms.

There are several reasons for this:

- 1. Principals are able to change the use of their facilities in order to meet individual school needs.
- 2. The Department of Education does not record the number of students physically located in classrooms.
- 3. Approx 400 demountable classrooms are provided as temporary accommodation while Capital Works is undertaken.
- 4. Secondary students rotate on a change of period from one classroom to another.
- 5. 2020 enrolment figures only became available on 11 March, 2020. D1T1 demountable movements will not be finalised until mid-April.

In overall terms based on all available information in March 2020 approximately 12% of classrooms in NSW public schools are in demountable buildings.

In adhering to the maximum class size allowed for each year group there is an undersandable variation across the capacity available in each class, across each term and across each school because of the fluctuations a school experiences in its student population.

Classroom Heating

361. Does every school in NSW have heating in every classroom?

The Department of Education works hard to ensure public schools across NSW have comfortable learning environments. The Department installs heating facilities in all new and upgraded public schools, and regularly maintains existing heating facilities in all public schools across NSW to ensure the safety of students.

The NSW Government is also investing a record \$500 million in the Cooler Classrooms Program to ensure students across more than 900 NSW public schools have comfortable learning spaces. This is the first time a dedicated fund has been established to air condition public schools across NSW. The systems will enable both cooling and heating of eligible learning spaces.

As a result of continued investment and works underway the type and location of heating facilities in public schools across NSW continues to change. An accurate list of heating facilities in NSW public schools is not available at this time.

362. If not, please provide a list of schools where not every classroom has heating and how many classrooms are not heated at each, broken down by type of heating (heater, reverse cycle air-conditioning or both), electorate and lowest average temperatures at each school.

School Aircon

The Government has invested a record \$500 million over five years to provide a sustainable air conditioning program in thousands of classrooms and library spaces in more than 900 schools across NSW.

372. If some schools will miss out, will that include some of those schools that currently still listed in the 'due diligence' phase?

Due diligence is being undertaken on all state schools as a part of the Cooler Classrooms Program.

373. How many schools applied as part of round one of the program?

The schools set to benefit from the Cooler Classrooms have been announced and published on the School Infrastructure website.

School principals are responsible for managing energy usage at their individual schools. When the Department undertakes any upgrade work at a school energy efficient fittings are used wherever possible.

384. On 27 February the Queensland Government announced they will complete the air-conditioning of every classroom, library and staff room in every Queensland state school in 2 years. How is it that it's taking the NSW Government 5 years for the Cooler Classrooms program, and yet won't even cover every classroom or every school?

The record \$500 million Cooler Classrooms program will provide sustainable air conditioning in thousands of classrooms and library spaces in more than 900 schools across NSW. The program is unique to the NSW Department of Education which is the largest provided of public education in Australia.

School Maintenance

385. What does the school maintenance backlog currently sit at?

The \$622 million committed in the 2019-20 budget to clear the existing school maintenance backlog is on track for completion by July 2020.

386. Please provide an updated excel spreadsheet list of any schools with outstanding maintenance, broken down by school, amount, the nature of the works required, and the date when they will be completed.

As of 1 July 2019, it was estimated that there were over 270,000 identified planned maintenance activities with a total value of \$622 million to be undertaken by July 2020. The Department of Education provided a proposed breakdown of this by school and electorate in response to Question 123 of the supplementary questions from the hearing on 4 September 2019. No additional information is available at this time.

Shorts option for girls in NSW schools

387. The Government gave a commitment that girls 'must have the option to wear shorts and pants' to school.

The Department made changes to its School Uniform Policy in 2018. The changes included that girls must have the option to wear shorts and pants to school, as part of their school uniform.

388. Will the Department enforce this policy across NSW schools?

The School Uniform Policy applies to all Government Schools in NSW. Schools must provide girls with the option to wear shorts or pants as part of their school uniform.

389. If not, how can the Government honour its commitment for all girls to have the option to wear shorts and pants?

The Department has implemented the School Uniform Policy.

390. If schools aren't complying, what will the Department do to enforce the policy?

School Principals have the responsibility of implementing the School Uniform Policy. The Department monitors compliance through Directors, Educational Leadership. If there are instances where a school is not complying with the policy, or a parent is

concerned about how the policy is being implemented, Learning and Wellbeing Directorate can work with the school to address barriers to implementation.

The Staffing Agreement <u>www.teach.nsw.edu.au/documents/agreement.pdf</u> between the Department and the NSW Teachers Federation describes the general class sizes in NSW public schools:

- a state wide average class size of 20 students in Kindergarten, 22 students in Year 1 and 24 students in Year 2:
- no class need exceed 30 students in Years 3 to 6
- no class need exceed 30 students in Years 7 to 10; and that
- no class need exceed 24 students in Years 11 and 12.

The Principal, in consultation with staff, is responsible for determining actual class sizes based on school and student needs, community expectations, and the skills and expertise of the teachers.

Each school determines the class structure which best suits the students enrolled. This may include multi-age classes or classes larger than the state-wide planned average class size if the Principal determines this is in students' best interests.

393. Have there been any instances of class sizes exceeding the maximum in 2018, 2019 or 2020?

The Department of Education collects class size data for Kindergarten to Year 6.

Additional information:

- In 2018 there were 1095 schools out of a total of 1664 schools with one or more class over the state wide average class size target.
- 1074 of these schools also had other classes either at the state wide average class size target or below the target.
- There were 20 schools with between 21 and 31 students which only had one composite class including students across all scholastic years. This composite class was over the state wide average class size target for Kindergarten (and in some cases over the target for other scholastic years.
- One school with a total of 47 students had two classes which were both over the statewide average class size target.

 569 schools only had classes at or below the state wide average class size target.

The comparable figures for 2019 were:

- 1034 schools out of 1667 with one or more class above the state wide average class size target:
- 1024 schools with classes above the state wide average class size target and also classes at or below the target;
- 10 small schools which only had classes over the target size. All of these schools had 21 to 29 students in a single composite class including students across all scholastic years. This class was larger than the statewide average class size for Kindergarten students cases for Year 1 and Year 2);
- 633 schools only with classes at or below the state wide average class size target.

Anxiety in Schools

395. Are you concerned about anxiety of students in NSW schools?

Yes. The health and wellbeing of students in NSW schools is of the highest priority for the NSW Government. Since 2015, the NSW Government has allocated more than \$290 million for mental health in schools.

In 2019, the NSW Government announced an \$88.4 million commitment to provide every public high school with a full time school counselling allocation and full time student support officer. These staff will provide vital mental health support for students, including those who may be experiencing anxiety.

The Department of Education has made considerable investment to build the capacity of staff to recognise and respond to signs of distress in students. At the same time, programs that increase mental health literacy, help seeking behaviours and emotional regulation such as *Youth Aware of Mental Health* and *Smiling Mind* are being implemented in schools across NSW.

The Department is also partnering with leading mental health organisations to support schools in delivering best practice early intervention in mental health support.

396. Does the Department monitor anxiety amongst NSW school students?

The learning and wellbeing of students is monitored in the classroom and through learning and support processes in schools. The Department of Education does not formally screen NSW school students for anxiety.

Students who may be experiencing an anxiety disorder are encouraged to seek clinical support.

Through the Tell Them From Me student survey, the Department measures a range of indicators of wellbeing. It also includes school-level wellbeing targets: sense of

belonging, advocacy at school (i.e. support from teachers) and expectations for success.

Other measures of wellbeing collected through Tell Them From Me student survey support the insights gathered through these indicators, including: optimism, perseverance and incidents of bullying.

397. What actions are the Department taking with regards to anxiety in schools?

The Department is engaged in a number of actions to support student mental health and wellbeing. The NSW Government has allocated more than \$290 million for mental health in schools since 2015.

The Department has worked closely with the Black Dog Institute to develop training and resources for the Department's school counselling service which provides the latest evidence in managing anxiety and depression in children and young people.

The Department is partnering with other leading mental health organisations to support schools to deliver best practice early intervention in mental health support. For example, the Department has partnered with headspace to deliver the *Schools and Families Enhancing Minds (SAFEminds)* program to both primary and high schools. *SAFEminds* aims to enhance early intervention mental health support for children and young people in schools, with a focus on anxiety, depression and self-harm.

The NSW Government has provided funding along with the Buildcorp Foundation to roll out the Smiling Mind program in 400 government primary schools across the state. This will enable Smiling Mind to deliver mindfulness training to about 100,000 students in 400 primary schools. Smiling Mind will also provide training for about 8,000 teachers as well as deliver teaching and student resources and lesson plans.

In 2019, the NSW Government announced an \$88.4 million commitment to provide every public high school with a full time school counselling allocation and full time student support officer. These staff will provide vital mental health support for students, including those who may be experiencing anxiety.

In addition to these positions, schools in regional and rural NSW will have access to a team of specialist psychologists who will provide a dedicated fly-in-fly out service to ensure rural and remote students can access regular and timely psychology support.

432. Were any of the classrooms in use by Riverbank Public School on its site counted for Riverbank instead of The Ponds High School?

As of Term 1, 2020 all demountable classrooms on The Ponds High School site are appointed to and being used by The Ponds High School.

433. Can you confirm how many demountables The Ponds High School now has as at Term 1 2020?

As at 16 March 2020, The Ponds High School has 32 demountable teaching spaces, demountable boys and girls toilets and a demountable staffroom.

434. Has the Department drafted school catchment maps for proposed new schools due to be completed in NSW over the next 4 years?

Provisional catchment boundaries are finalised approximately six months prior to opening. Catchment boundaries are finalised after the school is operational.

435. If so, please provide copies of the maps for each location where a new school is due to be built.

Only new schools opening within six months have a provisional catchment boundary. Jordan Springs Public School is the only new school opening and the provisional catchment boundary information is publicly available at https://my.education.nsw.gov.au/school-finder.

436. Have any schools built since 2011 not been masterplanned to allow for future upgrades?

All school sites are capable of being masterplanned to allow for future upgrades.

Masterplanning of school sites is undertaken on all minor and major capital works projects.

440. Schofields Public School is currently being upgraded to cater for 600 students.

441. It already has more than 600 students before the upgrade is even completed, yet it isn't being masterplanned for a future upgrade.

The Department of Education uses numerous strategies to manage fluctuating enrolment demands including enforcing the Department's school enrolment policy to restrict out of area enrolments, reviewing school catchment boundaries to improve utilisation across schools in a local area, and providing additional demountable facilities, including classrooms and specialist spaces as required.

In cases of sustained and stable enrolment increases, the Department provides additional permanent facilities, or new schools, as necessary.

442. Isn't that a case of significant mismanagement which will cause overcrowding problems from day one in one of the fastest growing suburbs in NSW?

A new primary school at Alex Avenue, Schofields will provide 44 teaching spaces. The forecast completion date for the new school is early 2021. It is located within the existing Schofields Public School catchment and will relieve pressure at this school.

443. Did the department ever consider masterplanning Schofields Public School, in order to easily allow for future upgrades?

Schofields Public School was masterplanned. The masterplan considered the overall needs of the local School Community Group and population growth projections in the local area.

444. Why has the department designed a school for only 600 students at Schofields Public School which will be full on day one?

A new primary school at Alex Avenue, Schofields will provide 44 teaching spaces. The forecast completion date for the new school is early 2021. It is located within the existing Schofields Public School catchment and will relieve pressure at this school.

Mobile Phones in schools

445. Why is the Government not implementing this policy from the start of 2020?

The Student Use of Digital Devices and Online Services policy governs the use of mobile phones in schools and was implemented from the start of Term 1, 2020.

446. Victoria rolled out their mobile phone ban in six months. Why is it taking over two years for the NSW Education Department to deliver on the Premier's 2018 promise to ban mobile phones in primary schools?

The NSW Government commissioned a review into the non-educational use of mobile devices in NSW schools. On 13 December 2018, the NSW Government announced that it would accept the recommendation to restrict the use of devices in NSW Government primary schools. This restriction was piloted on a voluntary basis in some schools in 2019.

Throughout 2019, policy development was underpinned by extensive consultation with: school staff; students; parents and carers; experts in child development, cyberbullying, mental health and technology; peak groups and departmental stakeholders.

447. Has there been any issues with compliance with this policy?

No issues about compliance with the Student Use of Digital Devices and Online Services policy have been reported centrally. School compliance is monitored locally by Directors, Educational Leadership

448. What rationale has the Government used in determining that the compulsory ban should be provided in primary schools but not in high schools?

If used inappropriately, digital devices may put young children at risk and can be a distraction from their learning and engagement. This is why the policy is that primary-aged students are not allowed to use digital devices during class time, recess and lunch, unless for an educational purpose or where a student needs it for other reasons, such as an adjustment to support their learning or health.

However as technology plays an important and increasing role as students' progress through their education, secondary schools should retain the flexibility to opt into any restriction on device use or pursue the approach that best suits the learning and wellbeing needs of their school community.

Social, emotional and technological competencies are essential for our students. We want to give secondary schools the flexibility to balance the benefits and risks of technology in the way that best supports their students and prepares them for life beyond school.

This rationale is consistent with the recommendations of the independent review into the non-educational use of mobile digital devices in NSW public schools, and many high schools have opted to implement a full ban.

Environmental Education Centres

451. How many schools have had classes visit an Environmental Education Centre at least once since the rollout of the centres?

Environmental and zoo education centres are NSW public schools staffed by trained teachers. They support schools by providing:

- resources to help integrate environmental education across a variety of subject areas
- professional learning opportunities for teachers
- assistance in implementing more sustainable practices
- opportunities for student learning and environmental leadership
- excursion programs for visiting school groups, linked to NSW syllabuses, that utilise the unique features of the centre's location
- incursion programs for schools, linked to syllabuses and classroom learning
- pre and post excursion support materials.

Schools across NSW regularly access the centres which are also located throughout the state, conducting excursions across all years. The nature of the visit to the centres is dependent on which aspect of the curriculum the teacher is aiming to address. The teachers liaise closely with the centre teaching staff to ensure that all learning needs are met.

Schools are also able to access a range of virtual incursions where the centre teachers lead a virtual visit, if students are unable to attend the site. This is also accessed by teachers for pre and post visit learning activities.

Centre teachers also regularly conduct sessions for teachers, whether on site ofrthrough the virtual platform. These professional learning opportunities may be aimed specifically at the individual needs of teachers from a year, stage or school; or may also be provided for all interested teachers to access.

452. How many schools have not visited an Environmental Education Centre at any point?

Environmental and zoo education centres have had, and continue to have, a full schedule of bookings throughout each year since their inception, with the majority of schools accessing the wide range of services on offer.

Environmental and zoo education centres do charge fees. The costs vary across centres and school sector.

This income is used to fund the upkeep of the site, equipment as well the training of casual staff that may be required to cover additional classes and if a centre staff member is unable to attend to conduct the fieldwork with schools to meet demand.

458. Do the costs differ by sector? If so, how so.

These costs do vary across centres and school sector, based on demand.

School Lockers

459. How many NSW public high schools have lockers on their premises?

The Department of Education does not store this information centrally. I am advised that schools locally determine if they wish to provide students with and / or have lockers on their school premises.

460. How many NSW public high schools don't have enough lockers on their premises to cater for all of their students?

The Department of Education does not store this information centrally. Lockers are not a standard requirement in NSW government schools, rather they are an option afforded to students through local management. Should there be a high demand for lockers in schools, the provision is a school based decision.

461. How many NSW public high schools don't have any access to lockers for their students?

The Department of Education does not hold this information centrally. Each school determines the need for lockers, based on community need and expectation. Not all schools have lockers on their sites.

462. Which NSW public high schools don't have access to lockers? Please provide a list broken down by electorate.

The Department of Education does not hold this information centrally.

463. Are school lockers provided by the Department, or are they purchased by individual schools?

Lockers are purchased by individual schools.

464. Do students have to pay to hire a school locker at any NSW high schools?

This varies across schools. Payment is used as a holding deposit and refunded when the student no longer wishes to have a locker.

465. If so, which schools? Please provide a breakdown by school and electorate.

The Department of Education does not hold this information centrally. Each school, through community consultation, locally determines if lockers will be supplied on a needs basis.

466. And if so, why are students required to pay for locker hire at public high schools?

Students are supplied with a locker, lock and key. Some students are asked to provide their own lock and key. This is a school based decision. Students pay a minimal fee to cover the costs of locks provided or repairs needed. Students are refunded payments once they no longer need to use the locker and return the lock and key provided by the school

467. Can you confirm that Kingswood High School has charged students for lockers?

Kingswood High School has confirmed that they charge their students a holding fee of \$10.00. The fee is charged to provide students with locks and keys for their lockers. Each student has the \$10.00 refunded once they no longer need this service.

468. Do you think this is a suitable practice?

Each school determines how they support the supply of lockers at their school. The supply of lockers in schools is not a standard requirement. Should students wish to hire or use a locker, the fee charged is reasonable, and is used to service the student request, pay for locks and keys where provided by the school and make repairs as necessary. Students are reimbursed at the end of use or need of the locker.

Dyslexia

469. Is dyslexia classified as a disability for the purposes of education support?

The Commonwealth *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and associated *Disability Standards for Education 2005* define 'disability' to include students with a wide range of physical, intellectual, sensory, and mental health disorders. This includes disability that result in a student learning differently from a person without disability.

In Australia the term 'learning difficulties' is used to refer to a broad range of difficulties in learning, including difficulties with reading, writing, and mathematics. The term 'dyslexia' is considered to be a specific learning difficulty characterised by ongoing difficulties acquiring and developing reading and spelling skills.

Students who have reading difficulties such as dyslexia receive support with their learning. All schools receive an additional loading as part of the Resource Allocation Model to support learning adjustments.

At this time, dyslexia is not included as a 'disability' in the Department's Disability Criteria. These Criteria are used to inform access to the Department's targeted specialist provisions – Integration Funding Support and specialist support classes. The Department's Disability Criteria are currently being reviewed.

470. Are students with dyslexia eligible for any additional support in NSW schools?

All students, including those with reading difficulties such as dyslexia receive support with their learning.

471. If so, please outline what that support entails?

The type of support provided for each student reflects their personalised learning

and support needs and is determined in consultation with the student where appropriate and their parents or carers.

All NSW public schools receive an allocation of learning and support funding as part of the School budget. This includes a specialist teacher allocation and annual flexible funding. Schools use these resources as part of the total school budget to provide support for their students, including students with reading difficulties such as dyslexia, where and when needed. The allocation is based on the size of the school and the learning needs of students. It supports students with disability and additional learning needs without the need for a disability diagnosis or confirmation. For 2020, learning and support resources directly allocated to schools total more than \$294 million.

Students who have a confirmed disability diagnosis and also have reading difficulties, including dyslexia, may need higher levels of support in mainstream classes. These students may be supported through the Integration Funding Support Program (IFS) which provides additional funding to the school to meet the needs of students. The school principal and school's learning and support team can determine how the additional resources can be used within the school to meet the additional learning needs of students. This may include additional teacher time, professional learning for teachers, and school learning support officer time.

The Department provides professional learning for teachers to build their capacity to respond to the additional learning and support needs of students, including those with reading difficulties, such as dyslexia. This includes an accredited specialist course 'Understanding Dyslexia and Significant Reading Difficulties'. More than 6,500 Department staff have undertaken this 10 week course since its introduction in 2012. Course participants have reported increased knowledge, skills and confidence in supporting their students.

The NSW Centre for Effective Reading provides evidence-based resources and professional learning on supporting the needs of students with reading difficulties including dyslexia on its website. The Centre also provides direct support for eligible primary school aged students who have ongoing reading difficulties and live in rural and remote areas of NSW (100 kilometres or more from metropolitan Sydney).

472. Does any of that support come with additional individual support within the classroom?

More than 1,889 learning and support positions work in NSW mainstream public schools to support students with additional learning and/or behaviour needs, including dyslexia and their teachers.

The type of support provided for each student reflects their personalised learning and support needs and is determined in consultation with the student where appropriate and their parents or carers.

473. Is the department aware of any cases of incorrect management of students needs with dyslexia within NSW schools?

No, the Department is not aware of any cases of incorrect management of students with dyslexia.

474. If so, please provide details.

School Retention Rates

483. Schools data released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) on 6 February 2020 shows school retention rates are down in NSW over the 2018-2019 period.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics data shows that for 2019, NSW Government schools had the following capped apparent retention rates for full-time students:

- Year 7 to 12: 73.5 per cent
- Year 7 to 10: 100 per cent
- Year 10 to 12: 70.6 per cent

These rates are a little lower than the Australian Bureau of Statistics results in 2018 for Year 7 to 12 and Year 10 to 12:

- Year 7 to 12: 74.4 per cent
- Year 7 to 10: 100 per cent
- Year 10 to 12: 71.4 per cent

However, over the past 10 years, retention rates from Year 7 to Year 12 in NSW government schools have increased. A retention rate of 74.4 per cent in 2018 represents an increase of 8 percentage points from 66.4 per cent in 2009.

484. Does the Department believe this an accurate measure of school retention rates?

Yes.

Schools Australia uses a nationally agreed method to calculate apparent retention rates (ARR). ARR measures the total number of students in each year level compared to the number in an earlier year, rather than by tracking the retention of individual students. While ARR does not track specific students, it is consistent across time and jurisdictions, and is an accurate and reliable calculation of the change in the number of students in a cohort as they move through scholastic years.

485. Does the Department's own figures show that school retention rates are down in NSW over the 2018-2019 period?

The Department of Education relies on the Australian Bureau of Statistics data.

The Department provides NSW Government data for publication in *Schools Australia*. Review of the *Schools Australia* data prior to public release confirmed that the apparent retention rates match those in the Department's internal systems.

The data also shows that over the past 10 years, retention rates from Year 7 to Year 12 in NSW government schools have increased. A retention rate of 74.4 per cent in 2018 represents an increase of 8 percentage points from 66.4 per cent in 2009.

The Department of Education supports schools to improve school retention through a variety of measures, including supporting students and schools with evidence-based and targeted support.

489. Is the Department concerned about a decline in school retention rates in NSW?

The Department of Education supports schools to improve school retention through a variety of measures, including supporting students and schools with evidence-based and targeted support.

490. What procedures has the Department put in place to improve school retention rates?

The Department of Education supports schools to improve school retention through a variety of measures, including supporting students and schools with evidence-based and targeted supports.

491. Will any changes be made to try and increase retention rates over the coming year?

The Department of Education is committed to continuous improvement and supporting an increase in retention rates.

492. If so, what changes will be implemented.

The Department of Education is implementing targeted programs to priority cohorts that support increased retention rates. The below initiatives support our Aboriginal students to engage with their schooling through their cultural identity, as a way to improve retention rates

One of the Premier's Priorities is to increase the proportion of Aboriginal students attaining Year 12 by 50 per cent, by 2023, while maintaining their cultural identity. To achieve the Premier's Priority, the NSW Coalition of Peak Aboriginal Organisations (NSW CAPO), the Premier's Implementation Unit and the Department agreed to four key initiatives. They are:

- A goal setting program for culturally relevant student support. This initiative is called Pirru Tahngkuray, a Murruwarri word meaning Dream Strong.
- Learning and Engagement Centres for Years 9-12 transition and engagement.
- · Locally-tailored cultural immersion and policy engagement for schools.
- Integrating Aboriginal culture into teaching and learning.

To further support Aboriginal students and retention rates while maintaining their cultural identity:

- Clontarf Foundation and Role Models and Leaders Australia (Girls Academies) deliver mentoring and support program to male and female Aboriginal students in Years 7 to 12. The programs provide support to students to maximise school attendance and encourage behavioural change, develop positive attitudes and to improve student retention rates.
- The Aboriginal Language and Culture Nests initiative aims to revitalise and maintain Aboriginal Languages as an integral part of cultural identity. This initiative is important in engaging and retaining Aboriginal students as it provides a safe and supportive learning environment for students to learn about their Languages and Culture at school.

In addition, to support an increase in retention rates across cohorts the Department is implementing the following initiatives:

- Schools provide a range of curriculum options which cater for the diverse range and abilities of individual students. Stage 6 students have the option to engage in vocational education and training courses, school based apprenticeships and traineeships and a variety of opportunities for workplace learning. This enables students to remain in mainstream learning, while also preparing them for education, training and employment in their post-school pathways.
- The Department provides specialist staff, including careers and transition advisors to assist students to select the most appropriate pattern of study so that they remain engaged at school and complete Year 12.

SRE and SEE

493. Does the Department publicly report numbers of students undertaking SRE and SEE at NSW schools?

Actual participation and attendance in Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics at the school level changes frequently.

The Department of Education does not consider it to be the best use of resources to establish an additional state-wide monitoring system for attendance in Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics.

Schools collect information on parent choice regarding Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics at the point of enrolment. The information is collected for the purposes of planning at individual schools.

494. If not, why not?

See response to question 493.

495. Does the Department publicly report which SRE and SEE options are available at each school so this information is available for parents?

Parents/carers can access information on Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics options from their child's school. Schools are responsible for providing access to current information about approved providers working in their school and information on alternative meaningful activities.

496. If not, why not?

See response to question 495.

497. Will the department investigate publicly providing this data online? See response to question 493.

498. How many NSW schools currently offer SEE? Please break these down by primary and high school.

The Department of Education does not centrally collect statistics on Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics, including the options available in schools. Special Education in Ethics is currently only available in primary schools.

499. Does the Department audit SRE and SEE providers to ensure compliance?

Each of the approved providers certifies compliance through the return of the annual assurance to the Department of Education.

500. Does the Department require SRE and SEE volunteers working for SRE and SEE providers to have working with children checks before working in NSW schools?

501. If not, why not?

502. Does the Department audit SRE and SEE provider documentation to ensure all SRE and SEE volunteers going into schools have valid working with children checks?

All approved providers submit an annual assurance to the Department of Education in order to maintain the status of an approved provider delivering Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics in schools.

The Working With Children Check requirements are clearly documented in the annual assurance of providers of Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics.

As a condition of maintenance of approval status, the approved providers certify that Special Religious Education and Special Education in Ethics teachers have a Working With Children Check clearance. It is the responsibility of the provider to ensure each teacher has obtained this clearance and the provider to verify the clearance prior to the teacher working directly with children. The provider is required to keep records of the teacher's verified Working With Children Check clearance.

All approved providers submit an authorisation letter to the school in which they are delivering Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics listing the teachers, their date of birth and contact details in order for schools to check the teacher against the Department's Not To Be Employed Database.

503. If yes, please list whether there have been any instances where SRE and SEE volunteers have been working in NSW schools without working with children checks since 2011, and break these down by school and provider.

The Department of Education is unaware of any instances.

504. If so, please list the audits undertaken since 2011, broken down by date and the number of schools audited.

All approved providers submit an annual assurance to the Department of Education in order to maintain the status of an approved provider delivering Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics in schools. Where an approved provider has not submitted the annual assurance their approval status has been revoked.

All approved providers submit an authorisation letter to the school in which they are delivering Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics listing the teachers, their date of birth and contact details in order for schools to check the teacher against the Department's Not To Be Employed Database.

LANTITE Testing

505. Does the Department believe there is any validity in moving the LANTITE testing to prior to students conducting an education degree in NSW, in order for potential students to know whether they meet the necessary skills to become a teacher in NSW?

Since April 2011, one of the national standards for teaching degrees described in Accreditation of initial teacher education programs in Australia: Standards and Procedures has been that entrants possess levels of personal literacy and numeracy broadly equivalent to the top 30 per cent of the population.

In December 2015, Education Ministers agreed that, from 1 July 2016, the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (the Test) would be the sole means for teacher education students to demonstrate they meet this standard before graduation. Universities are required to support students to pass the Test.

The national Test policy allows teacher education students to have three standard attempts at passing and two further attempts upon the support of the candidate's university based on special or extenuating circumstances. However, the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) requires NSW universities to ensure that all students pass the Test prior to their final professional experience placement in their teaching degree.

Over a number of years, NESA has encouraged the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER), the Test administrator, to provide a full scale exemplar of the Test to enable candidates to better appreciate the literacy and numeracy demands of the Test. This exemplar was made available on ACER's Test website during 2019 to newly enrolled teacher education students.

NESA has urged NSW universities to encourage their students to access the Test exemplar and have their first attempt at the Test as early as possible in their program.

506. If so, why?

The NSW Education Standards Authority has advised NSW universities to encourage their students to access the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (the Test) exemplar and have their first attempt at the Test as early as possible in their program. Doing so allows universities to identify those students who don't pass at their first attempt and who need further support in their personal literacy and numeracy skills.

With the experience of the last three years in applying the Test prior to their final professional experience placement and graduation, some NSW universities are now requiring that the Test is passed prior to their final year of studies.

507. If not, why not?

Requiring applicants to have their first attempt at the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (the Test) before commencing a teaching degree is currently not possible. The Australian Council for Educational Research online form for registering for the Test requires candidates to name their university and provide their student number.

508. Has the Department done any review of LANTITE or its operations?

The Australian Government's Department of Education, Skills and Employment has conducted a review of the implementation of the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students but has not publically released any report as yet.

509. If so, does the Department believe any changes need to be made to improve it?

The NSW Education Standards Authority will consider the findings and recommendations of the report arising from the Australian Government's review of the implementation of the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students.

510. Have there been any issues raised with the Department where people have studied to become a teacher, yet have only found out towards or at the end of their course that they have failed LANTITE and are not eligible to be a teacher in NSW?

In accordance with the December 2015 Education Minister's decision, passing the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (the Test) has been applied in NSW as a graduation requirement for both already enrolled and newly commencing students from 1 July 2016 onwards.

As the national Test policy allows teaching students to have three standard attempts at passing and two further attempts upon the support of the candidate's university based on special or extenuating circumstances, there have been instances where already enrolled students have not passed the Test after three or four attempts and are in the final stages of their teaching degree.

A very small number of these students have exhausted their full complement of five test attempts without passing and have not been able to graduate.

Sustainable Schools Grants Program

511. How many grants were successful in the Sustainable Schools Grants program?

194 schools were successful under round 1 of the Sustainable Schools Grants program.

512. How many were unsuccessful

573 schools submitted a grant proposal in round 1 of the Sustainable Schools Program. Of those 508 applications were compliant and met the criteria. Through the random selection process, 194 schools were successful in round 1. Schools that did not receive a grant in the first round are eligible to resubmit the proposal for round 2 or submit a new proposal when applications open in November 2020.

513. Was the full amount of \$2.5 million allocated?

Yes.

514. Please provide a list of all the successful grants awarded so far, broken down by electorate, school, amount awarded, funding round and what the project entails.

These public schools across NSW received grants ranging from \$1,100 - \$15,000 for innovative sustainability projects.

The Sustainable Schools Grants is a four-year, \$10 million dollar program. Successful grants in round 1 have been announced with round 2 opening in November 2020. Schools that did not receive funding in round 1 will be eligible to reapply as part of round 2.

516. Grant money may be used for 'external expertise' under the program guidelines. Please provide a list of any external expertise that formed part of this program.

Schools have not formally reported on any external expertise that have formed part of the program since receiving funding as part of the Sustainable Schools Grants program.

Higher Needs Schools – Teacher allocation

517. Are any higher needs schools treated as primary schools for the purpose of teacher allocation, even if they go up to high school level?

Pay Equity Pay Rise for School Administrative and Support Staff

522. In the agreed statement of facts submitted to the Industrial Relations Commission in September 2019 it notes that large numbers of school support staff were in temporary positions.

Not applicable. This is not a question.

523. For example, the figures show that approximately 61.57% or School Learning Support Officers (SLSOs) were employed on a temporary basis. These staff are 86.38% women. Many have been employed on a temporary basis for over 10 years, and some up to 20 years. How is this acceptable?

SLSOs are employed to support the various needs of students in schools. Funding for SLSO positions follow the students who need the support for as long as they need it. For students this support need can be present throughout their schooling. Some of these students will attend Schools for Specific Purposes, where there are high levels of permanent employment for SLSOs as a result. For students in mainstream classes the funding moves with them as they progress from primary to high school. The period for which support is required and the school the student attends are highly variable resulting in the need for SLSOs to be employed temporarily to ensure flexibility in the delivery of support.

524. Many SLSOs are employed in relation to funding for in relation to the student. The argument for temporary employment is that a student could leave the school and the funding would go with them leaving the school or the department out of pocket. However, the number of students with a disability in public schools has not decreased in the last 15 years and there is no reason to expect it is likely to. Therefore, how can this lack of permanent employment for SLSO's be justified?

There are 10,429 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) SLSOs in the Department of Education as at 30 June 2019, of which 32% are permanent employees.*

There will always be a need for temporary employment to allow schools to respond to variation in student enrolment and needs. For example, when a student moves from primary to high school, leaves the public education system or no longer requires support.

The Department of Education, like any other public sector agency, employs staff in accordance with the work that needs to be performed within the budget available. Some of this work will be undertaken by temporary employees.

Hurlstone Agricultural High School

526. Why was the decision to relocate Hurlstone Agricultural High School overturned?

The Department of Education reviewed the proposal to relocate Hurlstone Agricultural High School. The review indicated that retaining Hurlstone Agricultural High School at Glenfield, upgrading Richmond High School and building a new Agricultural Centre of Excellence in Hawkesbury would improve educational outcomes.

The combined response will enhance the delivery of agricultural education to students across NSW and the Centre of Excellence will play a crucial role in improving the understanding and development of agricultural practices. The Centre will, through tertiary education partnerships and industry engagement, provide opportunity for advancements in science and technology, delivery of educational pathways for students and teacher development.

527. How much was spent on work planning for the now reversed Hurlstone Agricultural High School relocation?

A total of approximately \$8 million has been spent on planning for the relocation of Hurlstone Agricultural High School, this work continues to support the revised scope.

528. How many hours had Department staff spent on planning and preparations for the original relocation project?

The Department of Education does not record the number of hours spent on the planning of any given project.

529. Were any concept plans designed? If so, please provide a copy of the plans.

Yes. Concept plans were developed for the proposed relocation of Hurlstone Agricultural High School to the Hawkesbury site.

As the Department is no longer pursuing the scheme for which the plans were developed and as the plans were not approved, the plans are unable to be released.

530. Were any consultancy firms engaged with regards to plans for the current Hurlstone site or the new site?

Yes.

531. If so, please provide the details of what work was conducted and the costs paid.

532. How much will the upgrades to the current site, subsequently announced in December 2019, cost?

The upgrades announced in December 2019 are in the planning and design stages and as such the cost of upgrades is not yet known.

533. Is this currently funded by the budget?

Yes.

534. Will this be funded in the 2019-20 budget?

Funding for this project has been reserved in the Department's capital program. However, until a final business case has been approved and a commercially sensitive tender process concluded, a project cost will not be disclosed.

535. What is the timeline for the projects construction and completion?

The upgrades announced in December 2019 are in the planning and design stages and as such a timeline for construction is not yet known.

536. How much of Hurlstone's land is still to be sold off for development?

The Hurlstone Agricultural High School site is part of the Glenfield-Macarthur urban renewal precinct that is being master planned for a range of future uses by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

Land requirements are currently being determined.

537. What percentage of the total area of the site will be sold for development? Refer to Answer 536.

538. Will this impact on the amount of livestock that are currently held on site at the school?

Refer to Answer 536.

539. Did the Government's announcement of the move of the school in 2015 have any impact on enrolments?

The 2015 announcement changed the enrolment processes at the school. As such, student numbers grew from 900 in 2016 to 1080 in 2019.

540. Please provide the enrolment figures per year, from 2011 to 2020, broken down by the year and the number of students in each grade per year.

541. Were any transition plans in place that impacted on the students and staff, prior to the Government's backflip to no longer move the school?

The 2015 announcement included transition plans to increase the number of students at the school. The plans also shifted Year 7 and 10 students from

compulsory agricultural education. As such, the staffing allocation was adjusted to reflect this shift and included an increase in core subject teachers.

Kings Langley Public School

542. Can you confirm how many demountables Kings Langley Public School currently has?

There are six demountables classrooms at Kings Langley Public School.

543. How long have each of these been on the school grounds?

The six demountable classrooms were established on the school grounds in the years 1994, 2009, 2012, 2015 and two were established in 1995.

544. How old are each of the demountables at the school?

The demountable classrooms were originally built in the years 1966, 1967, 1970, 1973, and two were built in 1975.

Through the Department of Education's refurbishment program, demountables are returned to "as new" condition. When demountables are refurbished, components are completely disassembled, repaired and replaced.

Prior to 2014 the program was managed by NSW Public Works on behalf of the Department of Education and as such, not all records are held by the Department. However, since 2015 one demountable was refurbished prior to being placed on site.

Demountables are assessed to ensure they are fit for purpose prior to being placed on site and receive regular maintenance.

545. Are there any plans to replace these with permanent classrooms?

The Department of Education monitors population and development trends so that it can plan to meet enrolment needs in schools across NSW. To do so the Department regularly consults with relevant Departments and agencies such as the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment, local councils and local developers.

546. Parents have reported mould issues in the demountables. Can you confirm whether there have been any mould issues, and if so have they been dealt with?

There was a previous mould issue which has now been resolved.

Former Glenbrook Infants School

547. How many students are currently at the Glenbrook Centre, the off-campus support unity of Springwood High School?

Thirteen students are currently enrolled in the support unit at the Glenbrook campus of Springwood High School.

548. What the site's current student capacity?

Twenty one students can be enrolled on the current site. Three classes (of seven students) are currently provided for students with a confirmed MH1 (Internalising Mental Health) diagnosis.

Extreme student mental health needs are catered for in this support unit.

549. Is there a reason the unit is only open to students in year 9-12?

The support unit is open for enrolment to eligible students in Years 8 to 12. Most students access Distance Education for many aspects of their curriculum. The students cannot access the regular school curriculum at Springwood High School as the Glenbrook campus of Springwood High School is 15 kilometres away.

As a result, Year 7 students are not deemed immediately suitable for the demands of Distance Education study in a support unit with a significant internalised mental health and anxiety focus.

Students are encouraged to first complete Year 7 at high school to determine the most suitable placement for them.

550. If required, could this site accommodate more students in the support unit, and if so, how many?

There are four classrooms at the Glenbrook Centre campus of Springwood High School. The site could accommodate more students who meet the eligibility criteria. However, it is not suitable for expansion to meet a broader range of disability without significant modification to facilities and its access.

Lane Cove Public School - Hall

551. What was the determined cause of the fire at Lane Cove Public School hall?

Fire and Rescue NSW concluded the most likely cause was an electrical fault, however, the exact nature of the fault was not determined.

552. If the cause was electrical, have other schools halls been checked for potential similar issues?

No. The exact nature of the fault was not determined therefore the Department of Education is unable to check other schools for potential similar issues.

553. Was the hall insured?

Yes.

554. If not, why not?

Refer to answer to question 553.

555. What will be the cost to rebuild the hall, and when will the rebuild be complete?

Work is underway through SINSW to determine the cost and timeline to rebuild the hall.

556. Were the contents of the hall insured?

Yes.

557. If not, why not?

Refer to answer to question 556.

558. Was the school part of the Share our Spaces program? If so, was the school open at the time of the fire?

Lane Cove Public School did not participate in the Share Our Space program during the summer 2019-2020 holidays.

559. Was there a security guard or another person on site overseeing the school at the time?

No. A security guard was dispatched following the fire to ensure the site was secure.

Yass High School

560. Is the current upgrade ongoing at Yass High School on time and on budget in line with when it was originally announced?

The project is proceeding in line with forecasts and remains scheduled for completion in mid-2020.

561. Please provide the detail of the budget and when the new facilities will be opened for use.

Budget for the project is \$8.4 Million and is scheduled for completion in mid-2020.

New Primary School in Murrumbateman

562. School infrastructure NSW says: A new primary school in Murrumbateman is prioritised for planning.

Yes.

563. This was announced in 2018. Has any works started?

Planning work has begun.

564. Has a site been chosen?

Due diligence is currently being undertaken on a preferred site.

565. If not, how can being 'prioritised for planning' assure a community that their school will be delivered in a timely way, instead of being stuck in planning limbo?

School Infrastructure NSW (SINSW) is delivering on the NSW Government's commitment that a new primary school at Murrumbateman be prioritised for planning. Planning work has begun through SINSW and due diligence is currently being undertaken on a preferred site.

566. When will this school be opened?

A final completion date is currently not available, however, any updates will be provided via the School Infrastructure NSW website https://www.schoolinfrastructure.nsw.gov.au/projects/n/New-primary-school-in-Murrumbateman.html.

567. Does the Department of Education have a limit on the amount of time a project can remain 'prioritised for planning'.

No. Planning timeframes will be related to individual project circumstances, ensuring the project has the best outcome for the school and school community.

568. What is the longest amount of time a school has been in the planning phase before construction has begun, and for which school project was it?

Planning timeframes will be related to individual project circumstances and are dependent on options assessed to give the best outcome for the school and school community. Planning of school infrastructure projects considers a number of factors including demographic trends, education requirements, condition of the existing school buildings, catchment boundaries, heritage requirements, transport links and partnership opportunities. Project approvals, including statutory approval, design finalisation and planning approval are also required prior to construction commencing.

569. Please provide a list of the 30 school building projects that have had the longest planning stages. Please provide the names of the schools, their electorates, the nature of the project and the projected cost of each.

Enrolment policy exemptions

570. Have any regional schools been exempt from the enrolment policy crackdown?

The Enrolment of Students in NSW Government Schools policy assists schools to meet their obligations under the *Education Act 1990*. It outlines procedures to ensure that schools uphold the NSW Department of Education's core values of equity, accountability and integrity in the enrolment process. The Department reviewed the policy in 2019.

The revised policy introduces measures for schools with a designated intake area, that are at or nearing capacity, to manage their non-local enrolment applications. These measures are required so that the Department continues to meet its legislative obligation to provide students with places at their local schools and to effectively and equitably use resources across NSW public schools.

NSW public schools with a designated intake area and up to 150 enrolled students, some of which are regional do not have a calculated cap. These schools will work with their Directors Educational Leadership to meet the needs of their communities in relation to student enrolment.

571. If so, please list the schools, broken down by electorate and student population at each school.

Unexpected finds of asbestos did occur at Monaro High School. The school's asbestos register was subsequently updated and immediate action was undertaken by the Department to remediate the site in accordance with SafeWork NSW safety standards.

577. If not, why was the asbestos not located on the schools asbestos report?

In accordance with the Department's Asbestos Management Plan and Asbestos Registers, disturbance investigations were required to be undertaken prior to demolition and upgrade works.

As such, there were unexpected finds of asbestos within restricted or inaccessible areas that were hidden from view. Following the investigation of other blocks on the school site, the asbestos register was updated.

578. How can school communities be confident in their asbestos reports if they are not 100% accurate?

Each school's Asbestos Register contains all known asbestos at that school and is managed in strict accordance with Safe Work NSW and all applicable legislation, regulations, policies and guidelines including the Department's Asbestos Management Plan for NSW Government Schools.

Occasionally, unexpected finds of asbestos occurs. When this happens, the school's asbestos register is updated. Additionally, when the presence of asbestos is reported, immediate action is taken by the Department to protect public health, including isolating the area and engaging a licensed contractor to remediate the site to SafeWork NSW safety standards.

579. Was there any potential exposure to students and staff at any time during the project?

No. All works are being undertaken in accordance with the advice of an independent hygienist and with all required SafeWork NSW guidelines and relevant legislation.

The project's current budget will cover the costs of remediation.

Due to the sensitive nature of suspension data, this data is not disaggregated by school in the Campbelltown Local Government Area (LGA). The data represents the number of suspensions, not the number of students suspended.

In 2018, there were 562 suspensions in primary schools, 1,815 in secondary schools and 397 in Schools for Specific Purposes in the Campbelltown LGA. In 2019, there were 576 suspensions in primary schools, 2,110 in secondary schools and 355 in Schools for Specific Purposes in the Campbelltown LGA.

(b) There are currently 31 active Employee Performance and Conduct Directorate (EPAC) investigations in the Campbelltown LGA. Of these, 4 permanent employees are currently on alternative duties and the name of 1 casual staff has been placed on the 'Not To Be Employed' list.

From 1 January 2018 to 1 December 2019, EPAC closed 107 investigations involving staff at schools in the Campbelltown LGA.

(c) The below figures show the part-time/full-time status of teachers at each school in the Campbelltown Principal Network, with a break down by nature of employment whether it be temporary or permanent. The Shell Cove and Flinders area is in the Oak Flats Secondary School Community Group and in the Shellharbour Local Government Area (LGA). This School

Community Group has capacity for approximately 3,400 students and the latest available enrolments show that approximately 2,550 students are enrolled in 2020.

645. If yes, when will this study take place?

Not applicable.

646. What level of population growth would need to occur in the suburbs Flinders and Shell Cove in order for the NSW Government to commit to a feasibility study?

The population would need to grow significantly and students enrol in government high schools. Should the combined surplus capacity in the existing schools within the School Community Group be utilised, School Infrastructure NSW will consider the need for further planning.

647. What strategies has the Government implemented in order to address the long term educational needs of these areas?

The Shell Cove and Flinders area currently has sufficient school infrastructure to address its long term educational needs.

This School Community Group currently has capacity for approximately 3,400 students and the latest available enrolments show that approximately 2,550 students are enrolled in 2020.

Yes, the Department of Education has land in the West Dapto area.

The Department of Education has sufficient land for educational requirements in the West Dapto area.

The Department of Education monitors population and development trends so it can plan to meet enrolment needs in schools across NSW. The Department reviews the need for school facilities on a continual basis and this information will inform if and when a new school is needed.

652. How much funding has been allocated for the upgrade to Dapto Public School?

All project expenditure is published in the Infrastructure Statement within Budget Paper 2 on a yearly basis once a construction contract is awarded.

653. When is the upgrade of Dapto Public School expected to commence and what is the targeted completion date for this project?

The upgrade is currently forecast to commence in mid 2020 and is currently forecast to be completed in early 2021.

654. What will the Government do to address issues raised by concerned residents living adjacent to the Dapto Public School site regarding the school's upgrade?

Wollongong City Council is currently finalising the review of the Development Application and of supplementary responses to its additional requests. Council will issue draft conditions of approval, which will be reviewed and responded to accordingly.

655. Why were no funds allocated for the upgrade of Dapto Public School in the 2019-20 budget?

Funding was allocated for the 2019-20 financial year to the Dapto Public School upgrade project.

656. The Government promised additional support for public schools to partner with early childhood providers to co locate facilities. This included the establishment of two demonstration to identify opportunities for collaboration and connection.

The NSW Department of Education established two demonstration sites, the Inner West Virtual Community of Practice in Sydney's Inner West and the Hillvue Early Learning Engagement Centre in Tamworth.

The Inner West Virtual Community of Practice pilot was completed in November 2017.

676. What are the objectives of this program? Please provide an outline of the program.

Y-PEP's program objectives are:

- Students should have a raised awareness of what safe and respectful relationships are
- Students should have an increased understanding and knowledge about their rights and responsibilities in relationships
- Students should have greater skills in recognising and responding to unsafe situations

To engage students, extend reach to schools and encourage sustained learning, the Y-PEP program has been delivered by both Y-PEP facilitators and school teachers through face-to-face workshops, interactive live stream workshops and/or use of on-demand resources. The Y-PEP programs and resources were offered to schools free of charge.

The High School program was available for students in Years 7 to 10. The program consisted of a three-hour workshop which covered three topics:

- Power in Relationships
- Recognising Abuse
- Protective Strategies

The Primary School program was delivered to students in Kindergarten to Year 6. The program consisted of four one-hour workshops over four consecutive weeks. It was delivered to each stage or year within the primary school. In addition to the three topics above, the Primary School program also covered:

· Sense of self

An optional one-hour follow-up workshop was made available to both primary and high schools.

677. \$224 million was promised to train and support primary school teachers to become mentors to others.

The NSW Government committed \$224 million over a four year phased implementation to the Quality Teaching, Successful Students (QTSS) initiative which provides an additional staffing resource allocation for all NSW public schools that have primary students enrolled.

The allocation is used to:

- set up collaborative practices in the school (and/or across a number of schools) so that teachers can plan and observe each other's lessons, jointly develop units of work and assessment tasks, and work together to assess and analyse student data
- establish mentoring and coaching practices in the school to provide constructive feedback to individual teachers on lesson delivery, programming, assessment and classroom management
- provide more comprehensive and focused support for teachers with accreditation processes and the Performance and Development Framework.

678. Has this money been committed?

Yes. The four year phased implementation of the initiative, which commenced in Semester 2 of 2015, is as follows:

- \$10 million in 2015-2016
- \$38 million in 2016-2017
- \$88 million in 2017-2018
- The sum of \$91 million has been confirmed as the base funding for the years 2019 2022.

679. How many teachers have been trained under this program?

The initiative was first rolled out in Term 3, 2015, with 1,141 schools receiving an initial QTSS staffing resource allocation based on 25 per cent of their total primary enrolments.

In Term 3, 2016, all eligible schools (1,769) received a QTSS staffing resource allocation based on 50 per cent of their total primary enrolments.

In Term 3, 2017, all eligible schools (1,769) received a QTSS staffing resource allocation based on 100 per cent of their total primary enrolments.

In Term 3, 2018, \$88 million was available for allocation to eligible NSW public schools (1783).

Principals, in consultation with their executive, decide the best use of this additional resource. While principals have flexibility, the strategies they choose must be evidence-based and focused on improving the quality of classroom teaching.

680. Please provide a breakdown of the allocation of the funding.

The QTSS initiative was first rolled out in Term 3, 2015, with 1,141 schools receiving an initial QTSS staffing resource allocation. This figure was based on 25 per cent of total primary enrolments.

In Term 3, 2016, the QTSS staffing resource allocated was based on 50 per cent of total primary enrolments in eligible schools. The total funding allocation for 2015-2016 was \$10 million.

In Term 3, 2017, all NSW public schools with primary students enrolled received a QTSS staffing resource allocation based on 100 per cent of their total primary enrolments. This equated to a total of \$38 million in funding allocations.

In 2018, \$88 million was available for allocation to eligible NSW public schools.

For the years 2019 – 2022, \$91 million has been confirmed as the base funding for QTSS.

681. The Government promised \$20 million to upgrade 50 science labs in NSW Public Schools, including Riverstone High School?

Yes.

682. Has Riverstone High School received an upgrade to its science lab? Please provide an outline of the upgrade and the funding mad made available for the upgrades.

The science lab upgrade at Riverstone High School was completed in 2017. The upgrade comprised refurbishment of two science laboratories and a science chemical storeroom, and included new flooring, ceilings, furniture, tapware, and other fixtures and fittings. \$20 million was made available for the upgrades.

683. Please provide a list of schools that have received upgrades, or are due to receive upgrades and details of completion, outline of completion and a breakdown by electorate.

The 52 schools in the table below have all received science lab upgrades as part of the Government's \$20 million 2015 election commitment.

685. Did the upgrade include the construction of a new multi-story building with 10 classrooms, a library, a special programs room, sports stores and other student facilities?

686. Did the upgrade include converting the existing library into two classrooms?

Yes.

687. Was there an extension of the existing administration block to provide additional administrative and staff facilities?

No. The administration building was altered and refurbished into the new library facilities.

688. How many demountable were removed from the site?

Eleven demountables were removed from the site in in 2019.

690. It was announced that there would be new distance education facilities in Queanbeyan as part of a \$10 million dollar project.

Yes.

691. Has this project been completed?

Yes. The Finigan School of Distance Education has been operational since March 2019 and was fully completed in August 2019.

692. If so, please provide an outline of the project and the total expenditure.

The Finigan School of Distance Education is a purpose-built facility that:

- Accommodates the needs of 950 students.
- Provides purpose-designed spaces to support distance education.
- Contains interactive booths for teacher/student one-on-one video conferencing, as well as interactive studios for the preparation of recorded digital and audio material.
- Includes interactive studios for student/teacher video conferencing where a larger space is required, such as movement (dance or physical education) or demonstration (science, applied arts and food technology).

The centre has been named after Walter Finigan, an Australian pioneer and world leader in distance education.

Total expenditure on the project is approximately \$18.5 million.

693. The Government promised the creation of a \$20 million Before and After School Care fund to help establish new services in government and non-government primary school communities that do not currently do not have a service.

Yes.

694. Please provide a breakdown of the allocation of the funding by government/non-government school, completion status and by electorate. Please also state the amount of funding each school received.

\$11.4 million of which approximately \$313,000 was contributed by the school for playground equipment and a covered outdoor learning area.

Manly Community Centre and Services Inc. (now known as Community Northern Beaches) had an agreement to lease rooms in Block D. This delivered on the NSW Government's 2015 Election Commitment to enter into an agreement with the Manly Community Centre to continue to use the space they occupied at Manly Public School for another three years.

The agreement expired on 31st December 2019.

714. What was the nature of this agreement?

The Community Centre had a lease over a section of Block D.

715. Has a major upgrade of Homebush West Public School been completed yet?

Yes - all works have been completed at Homebush West Public School, except for a minor electrical upgrade to a substation. This upgrade is required to provide sufficient power and spare capacity due to the inclusion of air conditioning in the project.

This minor upgrade is not having any effect on school operations.

716. Did the upgrade include the provision of 26 new classrooms?

Yes - 26 new classrooms were provided as part of the upgrade.

717. Did the upgrade include an expansion of the library, administration area and school hall?

Yes – while there were no works to the administration area, a new staff area was provided in a previous learning space, with those students going to the new building.

The library area was modified to allow for flexibility of space usage, but was not expanded.

The school hall was not extended, however the old canteen was demolished and relocated into the new building. This increased the covered area outside the hall.

718. Has the rebuild of St Clair High School been completed yet?

Yes – the redevelopment at St Clair High School was completed in 2018.

719. Did the rebuild include a new commercial grade kitchen?

Yes – the redevelopment at St Clair High School delivered a commercial style teaching kitchen to be used for VET commercial cookery classes.

720. Was a new mezzanine level constructed to connect the new build and the existing building?

There is no connection between the new building and any of the old buildings.

721. Were new overhanging shade areas constructed?

Some shade areas were constructed as part of the redevelopment – two external shade structures as well as an undercroft to the new building.

The future education needs of the area will be fully resolved in the context of the whole of government approach to the Planned Precinct, and this analysis is expected to be completed in 2020.

Staffing and training

The Department of Education provides a range of specialist training opportunities to staff to support them to work with children and young people with disability.

Since 2013, the Department has offered two e-learning courses to staff on their obligations under the Disability Standards for Education 2005.

More than 74,200 teachers have completed one or more modules of the Disability Standards for Education e-learning since 2013. In 2019, the Department recorded 4,006 completions of these modules by teachers.

The Department also offers eight on-line blended learning courses to staff on specific aspects of disability. These courses are delivered as a combination of self-guided e-learning and tutor-led, small group sessions. The courses currently offered by the Department are as follows:

- Understanding Autism Spectrum Disorders (since 2009)
- Understanding & Supporting Behaviour (since 2010)
- Dyspraxia & Motor Coordination Difficulties (since 2011)
- Speech Language & Communication Needs (since 2011)
- Dyslexia & Significant Reading Difficulties (since 2012)
- Understanding Hearing Loss (since 2013)
- Personalised Learning & Support (since 2015)
- Supporting Student Wellbeing & Mental Health (since 2019)

Over 40,000 course completions have been recorded since 2009 and of these, almost 30,000 have been teachers. In 2019, there were 3,344 course completions by Departmental staff of which 2,302 were by teachers.

Given the fluctuating nature of the teacher workforce, it is not possible to determine a precise percentage of teachers currently employed by the Department who have done one or more of these particular forms of training.

In addition, since 2012, the Department has sponsored 295 teachers to gain additional post-graduate qualifications in special and inclusive education. A further 198 teachers have been sponsored under the new Inclusive Practice in Education scholarship, launched in 2019. The new scholars are anticipated to commence study this year.

The Behaviour Strategy is being informed by an independent evidence review, conducted for the Department by the Telethon Kids Institute, a think tank with

national and international academic experts in this field. As part of their review they had extensive consultation with Department staff.

The strategy will be comprehensive and include resources to support classroom teachers in implementing good practice approaches to behaviour management, professional learning for school staff and those who support the work of schools, and targeted training for specialist education staff.

Broad consultation with internal and external stakeholders commenced in 2018 to review the Student Discipline in Government Schools policy. This work is ongoing in 2020.

A framework of effective principles of good practice in behaviour support has been developed which aims to build the capacity of Department staff to implement effective behaviour interventions and support. Good practice examples and case studies to support schools are being researched and will undergo quality assurance measures.

A review of evidence, including a literature review and stakeholder consultations with Department staff commenced in 2018-2019. A range of face-to-face focus groups and telephone interviews have been conducted with school services and school staff to better identify need, including the content and types of professional learning that would help to build staff capabilities. This work will guide the implementation plan.

Equity Funding Allocation

- 776. What data does the department utilise when assessing a school's level of need to determine the equity loading for their equity funding allocation?
 - (a) From where does the department source the data?
 - (b) Does the department utilise the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) to determine need of funding for low level disability supports?
 - (c) In what other circumstances does the department use NCCD data?
- a) To assess a school's level of need and equity funding allocation, the Department utilises data from the following sources:
 - Socio-economic background data is calculated using the Family Occupation and Education Index;
 - Low- level adjustment for disability is calculated using the total school enrolment and the Student Learning Needs Index based on NAPLAN data;
 - English language proficiency loading is calculated using an assessment of English language proficiency for individual students; and
 - Aboriginal background is based on the number and percentage of Aboriginal students in the school.
- b) The department does not use Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) to determine need of funding for low level disability supports.

The Department is currently undertaking a review to explore more contemporary ways to determine how we fund students with disability which takes account of their educational and support needs of students rather than disability diagnosis. This may involve exploring the role of different sources of data, such as the NCCD, in determining need as well as reviewing the department's current disability criteria.

c) The Commonwealth provides NSW with aggregate funding (which includes all loadings and base funding) based on the NCCD data. NSW then pools this Commonwealth funding with the state contribution and distributes it to government schools through the Resource Allocation Model (RAM) – in the main through the Low Level Adjustment for Disability equity loading as well as targeted funding through Integration Funding Support.

NSW Child Death Review

- 777. In its response to the Report of the Deaths of Children in NSW in 2016-2017, the NSW Department of Education noted suicide as a priority in supporting the mental health and well-being of its students, including funding and rapid response to suicide prevention in allocating \$88M over 4 years for 2 dedicated mental health professionals in each public high school.
 - (a) Has been implemented in each school?
 - (b) Has the allocation of 2 per school been adequate for each school?
 - (c) Is this working as a solution in reducing loss of life of young people?
- (a) These positions, which were announced in 2019, will be phased in with 25 positions placed in 2020-2021, 50 positions in 2021-2022 and 25 positions in 2022-2023. Recruitment planning for school counselling and student support officer positions for the 2020-2021 phase of the commitment is underway and a total of 23.4 of the 25 school counselling positions have already been recruited.
- (b) The allocation of two mental health and wellbeing professionals per high school will be phased in from July 2020, with 25% placed in 2020/2021, 50% in 2021-2022 and 25% in 2022-2023. This allocation will ensure schools have a minimum of two positions, and an evaluation of the increased wellbeing and mental health support will take place.
- (c) The progressive implementation of this element of the election commitment will begin in July 2020. This election commitment is one strategy the Department is undertaking to support the mental health of children and young people. The Department is actively implementing other strategies to directly address suicide prevention, for example:
 - Youth Aware of Mental Health (YAM), a universal mental health program and suicide prevention program for young people aged 14 – 16 years. A comprehensive European study has demonstrated that implementation of YAM contributes significantly to improvements in youth mental health by effectively reducing depression, conduct problems, hyperactivity, suicide

- attempts, severe suicidal ideation and suicide plans. An extensive evaluation in NSW schools is currently being undertaken by the Black Dog Institute.
- Youth in Distress: Managing suicidality and self-harm training for school counselling staff, a suite of professional learning and resources based on the latest evidence and developed in collaboration with an expert advisory group. Evaluation results showed positive measurable effects for improving school counselling knowledge and confidence in managing suicidality and self-harm that were sustained over time.
- Project Air Strategy for Schools, a collaborative project between the NSW Department of Education, NSW Ministry of Health and University of Wollongong, targeted at providing schools with professional learning and resources to better recognise and respond to young people with complex mental health problems. 2018 research in NSW schools indicated improvements in participants' confidence, knowledge and skills in working with young people with complex mental health issues.
- Schools and Families Enhancing Minds (SAFEMinds), a training package for staff, which aims to increase their knowledge of mental health and emerging concerns. Headspace reports that in evaluations of initial program development and implementation, between 90% and 100% of participants have reported that they found the training useful and would recommend it to others.
- batyr@school, preventative mental health programs for high school students in years 9 to 12 that aim to reduce the stigma around mental health and educate and empower young people to reach out for support. Australian research in 2017 found batyr@school reduced stigma associated with mental ill health and improved attitudes and intentions towards seeking help from professional sources for mental health issues and suicidal thoughts.

778. Have current interventions been effective in reducing or preventing suicide clusters?

(a) Please detail the results of the review into suicide clusters across the State.

Suicide contagion can lead to a suicide cluster, which occurs where a number of connected suicides occur following an initial death. Reducing the risk of contagion can reduce the likelihood of a suicide cluster occurring. Postvention is an important factor in the effort to reduce suicide contagion, and thereby in the effort to prevent suicide clusters.

In order to reduce the likelihood of contagion, since 2016, the Department of Education has worked with headspace to facilitate the roll-out of suicide postvention planning workshops across NSW. Suicide is a complex phenomenon, and it is difficult to determine in individual circumstances whether contagion would have occurred. However, schools who have had a postvention plan in place and have very sadly experienced the death of a student by suicide, have reported how effective this plan has been in the recovery process.

The Department has also released a step by step guide to support schools as they respond after the suicide of a young person. This resource, *Responding to Student Suicide Support Guidelines for Schools*, was released in July 2015 and was

developed in collaboration with headspace and the NSW Ministry of Health. These clear, evidence informed guidelines assist schools to have a consistent response that may also help reduce contagion.

a) The Biennial report of the deaths of children in New South Wales: 2016 and 2017, published on 25 June 2019 by the NSW Child Death Review Team, recommended that the "NSW Department of Education should evaluate postvention initiatives in NSW government high schools, particularly the effectiveness of such initiatives in preventing suicide clusters".

The Department is acting on this recommendation and is engaging an external provider with expertise in suicide prevention and postvention to conduct an evaluation of suicide postvention initiatives in NSW public high schools. A procurement process has been undertaken and the Department is currently negotiating with our preferred provider to finalise a contract to undertake this important work.

- 779. Please provide the outcomes of any review or appraisal process carried out following a suicide attempt or death at a public school in NSW.
 - (a) How have the outcomes of these reviews informed future (better or best) practice and policy development?

Sadly, there have been schools in NSW in which more than one student has taken their own life. In one regional area of NSW, the deaths were related. In this instance, the Department of Education provided intensive and sustained support to the affected schools. This included working closely with headspace to implement additional counselling support, additional staffing support for school executive, consultation support from the Department's Legal Services and Health and Safety directorates and participation in parent and community workshops as part of a broader community response.

The Department's local school counselling team provided support to individual students and families, as well as professional learning to further develop capabilities of school staff, including school executive teams, on matters relating to student wellbeing and mental health issues.

Schools also have worked collaboratively with government and non-government agencies to promote wellbeing and support for students at risk. For example, the Department has been implementing Youth Aware of Mental Health, a universal evidence based mental health and suicide prevention program for young people aged 14-16 years, with the support of Black Dog Institute.

(a) The Biennial report of the deaths of children in New South Wales: 2016 and 2017, published on 25 June 2019 by the NSW Child Death Review Team, recommended that the "NSW Department of Education should establish a process of review after a suicide death of a child or young person in a public school".

The Department is acting on this recommendation and is engaging an external provider with expertise in suicide prevention and postvention to conduct an

evaluation of suicide postvention initiatives. The Department will establish a process of review based on the findings of this evaluation, in consultation with the provider.

All tender submissions for Out of School Hours Care services are compared against the same evaluation criteria, regardless of whether the service would be run by a not-for-profit operator or a commercial entity.

Globe Wilkins Preschool

786. What is the timeline for constructing the purpose-built preschool at Wilkins Public School?

Construction of the Globe Wilkins Preschool is expected to start in late 2020 with an anticipated completion timeframe of mid-2021.

787. Have any costings been done on the project?

Yes.

788. Has a location been identified at the school for the preschool? If so, where? If not, when will this information be available?

The position of the preschool is expected to be confirmed by the end of April 2020.

789. Will there be a tender process for services once the preschool has been built? What is the timeline?

Once the terms of the current service provider's licence expire, the Department of Education will open the operation of the new preschool and the Outside School Hours Care service to a competitive tender process.

The Department expects the tender process to be completed by mid-2020.

The approved funding for the Newcastle East Public School upgrade is approximately \$8.8 million.

807. What has been the total cost of asbestos remediation works at NEPS?

As at 25 March 2020 the total cost of asbestos remediation is approximately \$1.4 million.

808. What is the cost of replacing all of the library book at NEPS which were destroyed due to asbestos exposure?

As at 19 March 2020, the cost of replacing all library books at Newcastle East Public School is approximately \$110,500.

809. What is the cost of replacing all of the sports equipment at NEPS which was destroyed due to asbestos exposure?

As at 19 March 2020, the cost of replacing all sports equipment at Newcastle East Public School is approximately \$30,000.

810. Will the Minister direct School Infrastructure NSW to remove all known asbestos at NEPS to provide parents with peace of mind?

All known asbestos is in the process of being removed from Block A, the heritage building, in accordance with the site specific Asbestos Management Plan and with the advice of an independent hygienist. All known asbestos will progressively be removed from remaining buildings by the end of 2020. Asbestos containing material in the playground is encapsulated and will not be removed. The playground redesign will, where necessary, remediate encapsulated material and artificial turf will be installed on top.

811. How many students from NEPS have been registered on the National Asbestos Exposure Register?

The Australian Government created the National Asbestos Exposure Register (NAER) to record the details of members of the community who think they may have been exposed to asbestos. All information contained within the register is kept confidential and details are not released to third parties without the registered parties consent.

The Department of Education has robust communication processes in place. From January 2020, the Department has increased communications with the Newcastle East Public School community, including holding further community information sessions, holding wellbeing sessions, issuing weekly notifications, and uploading additional content relating to asbestos containing material on the School Infrastructure NSW website, which can be found at

814. Is the Minister satisfied that all appropriate processes and policies were followed during the removal of the asbestos at NEPS?

Yes. I am advised that all appropriate processes and policies were followed during the removal of the asbestos at Newcastle East Public School.

In accordance with the site specific Asbestos Management Plan for Newcastle East Public School, remediation work was carried out during December 2019 and January 2020. All work was carried out by a licensed asbestos removalist and with the advice of an independent hygienist. SafeWork NSW were informed of the work as per requirements and have advised they are satisfied with the Department's remediation processes.

Remediation and removal of asbestos containing material continues at Newcastle East Public School and the community is being updated on a weekly basis.

The Department has been directed to improve communication with school communities during holiday periods.

815. Was a request made to close NEPS on Day 1 Term 1 due to asbestos?

(a) If so, who made the decision to open the school?

Newcastle East Public School was open on Day 1, Term 1, 2020 as all planned asbestos remediation works had been completed, and the independent hygienist had provided clearance certificates that confirmed the school was safe for students and staff to return as normal.

816. Who authorised the destruction of the historical artefacts at NEPS?

The independent hygienist advised that historical artefacts in Block A were contaminated and should be destroyed. An electronic record that had previously been made of some of these historical artefacts has been printed for the school to include in its archives.

817. When will the asbestos test results be released?

The independent hygienist issued clearance certificates for Newcastle East Public School and these have been available online since late January 2020 through the School Infrastructure NSW website at

A Service Needs Report for the Newcastle Primary School Community Group (SCG), which includes Fern Bay Public School, has been completed and is currently going through an assurance process.

The needs of Fern Bay Public School will be considered as part of the wider evaluation of the SCG through the business case development process.

A Service Needs Report for the Newcastle Primary School Community Group (SCG), which includes Fern Bay Public School, has been completed and is currently going through an assurance process.

The needs of Fern Bay Public School will be considered as part of the wider evaluation of the SCG through the business case development process and will consider more permanent asset solutions.

A copy of the SNR and future business case are cabinet in confidence and cannot be provided.

821. Is the Minister aware that Fern Bay Public School only has one permanent classroom?

(a) What action is the Minister taking to address this?

The Department of Education is aware that Fern Bay Public School has a single permanent classroom.

The Department monitors population and development trends to enable effective planning in order to meet enrolment needs across NSW public schools. The department uses demountables to accommodate students and help schools manage fluctuations in enrolment demand.

A Service Needs Report for the Newcastle Primary School Community Group (SCG), which includes Fern Bay Public School, has been completed and is currently going through an assurance process

The needs of Fern Bay Public School will be considered as part of the wider evaluation of the SCG through the business case development process.

A Service Needs Report for the Newcastle Primary School Community Group (SCG), which includes Fern Bay Public School, has been completed and is currently going through an assurance process

The needs of Fern Bay Public School will be considered as part of the wider evaluation of the SCG through the business case development process.

Newcastle Education Precinct

The primary schools in the Newcastle Primary schools group are not over capacity. As of late 2019, the Newcastle Primary schools community group has 123 teaching spaces with a demand for 113.

Growth rates for inner Newcastle are consistent with state averages. Importantly, primary student enrolments in the Newcastle LGA are anticipated to decrease slightly by 2024. Secondary student growth is anticipated to increase slightly in alignment with state averages.

The growth rates are consistent with state averages. The Department monitors population and development trends to enable effective planning in order to meet enrolment needs across all NSW public schools. It uses numerous strategies to manage enrolment demands in the short to medium term, including enforcing the enrolment policy to restrict out-of-area enrolments, and reviewing school catchment boundaries. In cases of sustained and stable enrolment increases, the Department provides additional permanent facilities, or new schools, as necessary.

827. In 2018 the government announced the Newcastle Education Precinct, what is the current status of this project?

A business case for the project is currently being prepared for government consideration.

(b) In relation to Sun Child Care Centre (SE-00009163):

The Department of Education has conducted five service visits for the purpose of monitoring, compliance and assessment and rating and issued five compliance actions.

The High Risk Team began targeted monitoring with this provider in April 2019. Four visits were conducted to the service and a show cause notice to cancel the provider was issued in July 2019. A decision to cancel the provider was issued September 2019. The matter was before NCAT on 13 November 2019. The service was granted a stay and a range of improvement plans were agreed with the service.

The Department conducted another assessment and rating visit at the service on 11 March 2020 and improvements in quality and rating were visible. Evidence from this assessment is currently under review.

The service is a 38 place long day care service.

(c) In relation to Muck-A-Bout (SE-00011632):

The Department of Education re-rated this service within a three month timeframe from the publication of the first SIR rating.

The Department has conducted four service visits since the SIR rating in 2019 for the purpose of monitoring, compliance and assessment and rating.

The service was not rated after the transfer of the service in 2015 as no process existed at this time to prompt a re-rating due to transfer. In mid-2019 the Department introduced a process to ensure that all services undergoing transfer are re-rated six months after the transfer takes effect.

The service was most recently rated in January 2020, a draft report has been issued with an improved rating of "Working Towards" with some "Meeting" elements.

The service did not participate in the Quality Support Program.

The service is a 100 place Outside School Hours Care.

- 850. When Mr D'Adam asked why the number of serious incidents had risen, why did Mr Graham respond by saying that the number of breaches of regulations has fallen?
 - (a) Is Mr Graham aware that breaches are recorded separately from serious incidents?

Serious incidents are self-reported by the education and care service, and not all serious incidents lead to a confirmed breach. Serious incidents cover a wide range of incidents from hospitalisation to bronchiolitis and gastroenteritis.

A confirmed breach occurs when the Department of Education finds a service non-compliant with the legislation, which may occur in response to a serious incident, a complaint or a visit.

- 851. Minister Mitchell indicated that schools were applying for additional funding of \$10,000 or \$15,000 to increase the number of OSHC (BASC) places. Is this the funding program that offers grants of up to \$15,000 as a deduction in rent in order to reduce costs?

- The Equipment and Facilities Grant under the \$50m Infrastructure Fund. This supports the sector with infrastructure activities up to \$30,000 such as minor site modifications and fit out costs or to pay for necessary equipment to support additional before and after school care places.
- The Interim Support Grant under the \$20m Implementation Fund, which is supporting services with sustainability issues up to \$15,000 to ensure continuity of services while the NSW Government continues to develop innovative solutions to meet the needs of smaller schools, particularly those in rural and remote NSW.

In the Department of Education's data for the 2019 Before and After School Care reform commitment, the Department defines a before and after school care place as an approved place at a Service Provider who offers Before School Care and/or After School Care, according to the National Register. This data set relies on self-report by the service and only provides information for all Government school sites, not specific to services operating on public primary schools. It is however, noted that the vast majority of Before and After School Care Services operating on Government school sites are located on public primary schools.

The NSW Government committed to improving access and opening school facilities at public primary schools in Sydney, Newcastle, Illawarra and the Central Coast as well as major regional centres for before and after school care services.

For smaller or remote schools, the Department recognises that stand-alone onsite services may not be a viable option, or services may not be located sufficiently close to the school. The Department is exploring a variety of innovative solutions such as transportation to other nearby sites or clustering groups of schools together to achieve economies of scale.

Recognising that a one-size-fits-all approach will not work we are working school by school to find solutions that meet the needs of local community.

Universal Access to Preschools

- 855. On 19th June 2019 the Government announced \$200 million of funding to provide universal access to two years of preschool for everychild in NSW. In relation to this funding, how does the Department define a preschool place?

As part of the 2018-19 budget announced on 19 June 2018, the NSW Government committed \$197.8 million over four years to extend the Government's record investment in preschool education under the Start Strong program.

In the 2018-19 financial year, 706 community preschools were funded under Start Strong. As at the third quarter of the 2019-20 financial year, 702 community preschools have been funded under Start Strong. Data on the number of preschool places on 18 June 2019 is not available. As of August 2018, there were 26,510 licenced community preschool places available, and 44,114 children enrolled in community preschool. Data on the number of preschool places on 1 March 2020 is not available. As of August 2019, there were 26,616 licenced community preschool places available, and 44,113 children enrolled in community preschool.

The relationship between licenced places and enrolment numbers depends on a number of service-level factors. Funding is provided via a demand-based system, where detailed program level costing depends on a range of factors including the number of enrolments, child characteristics and parent decisions about the early childhood service that best meets their needs.

Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarships

- 856. On 17th September 2015 the Government announced \$1.3 million of funding to provide early childhood teaching scholarships. - (a) The eligibility criteria for a Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarship includes that the applicant has not already commenced an early childhood teaching degree prior to applying for the scholarship.
 - In 2016-17 after the award of the scholarships, two applicants subsequently advised the Department that they had commenced a degree prior to the application. One of these applicants retained their scholarship upon further consideration. The other applicant was subsequently successful in their application for a 2018 Incentive Scholarship. Incentive Scholarships were awarded in 2018 to support educators in rural or remote areas of NSW who were already enrolled and currently completing an early childhood teaching degree.
- (b) The eligibility criteria for a Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarship includes that the applicant has not already commenced an early childhood teaching degree prior to applying for the scholarship. Applicants may commence study after the application and then subsequently be awarded a scholarship.

Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarships make provision for Recognised Prior Learning. The Scholarship Holder is required to provide a list of all of the subjects and the total number of credit points the higher education provider requires them to complete to attain the Qualification. The scholarship recipient must also identify the total Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) credits granted to them by the higher education provider.

If the Scholarship Holder receives RPL above the standard RPL credit provided for diploma qualified early educators, the Scholarship Holder may therefore be required to complete fewer subjects to attain the Qualification.

In the 2016-17 Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarships program, each of the seven graduated scholars all received RPL. Additionally, two of these commenced study in the 2016 calendar year following the submission of their scholarship applications.

In the 2017-18 Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarships program, the one graduated scholar had received RPL and had commenced study in the 2017 calendar year following the submission of their scholarship application.

(c) Rural and Remote Early Childhood Teaching Scholarships are available to applicants working full time or part time. The full time or part time working status is not collected at the time of application.

The Department will continue to support children's education and care services to ensure all children attending those services are safe from harm. When faced with emergency risks such as bushfires or floods the Department will advise services that they must heed the advice of relevant lead authorities (such as the NSW Rural Fire Service) and follow any directions those authorities may give.

If a service fails to comply with a directive issued by a relevant authority in response to emergency risks, and the failure impacts upon the safety, health and wellbeing of children, the Department will take appropriate regulatory action.

858. What responsibilities does the Department have in relation to advice or decisions about the closure or adaptation of activities at early childhood learning services due to poor air quality?

The NSW Department of Education, as the Regulatory Authority in NSW, regulates children's education and care services in accordance with the *Children (Education and Care Services) National Law.*

Under the *Children* (*Education and Care Services*) *National Law* the Department doesn't have the authority to close services in relation to poor air quality. However, the Department as the regulator facilitates the provision of advice from the relevant authorities to the sector.

The Department will continue to support children's education and care services to ensure all children attending those services are safe from harm. When faced with risks, such as poor air quality, the Department will advise services that they must heed the advice of relevant lead authorities (such as NSW Health) and follow any directions those authorities may give.

If a service fails to comply with a directive issued by a relevant authority in response to health risks, and the failure impacts upon the safety, health and wellbeing of children, the Department will take appropriate regulatory action.

859. What responsibilities does the Department have in relation to advice or decisions about the closure or adaptation of activities at early childhood learning services due to health risks such as epidemics?

The NSW Department of Education, as the Regulatory Authority in NSW, regulates children's education and care services in accordance with the *Children (Education and Care Services) National Law.*

Under the *Children (Education and Care Services) National Law* the Department doesn't have the authority to close services in relation to health risks, such as epidemics. However, the Department as the regulator facilitates the provision of advice from the relevant authorities to the sector.

Providers can submit an application through the National Quality Agenda IT System to request a waiver or request to relocate to a new premises if a service has been impacted by an emergency situation. The Department works with the applicant, and may expedite applications and waive fees if required.

861. What role does the Department have in relation to providing contact or other details of early learning services (including OSHC) to emergency services during a period of emergency?

The NSW Department of Education will assist emergency services during a period of emergency to provide the name, address and contact details of education and care services as relevant. These details are publicly available on the National Register of education and care services (published on the ACECQA website).

- 862. How many services contacted the Department seeking assistance in determining whether to operate or close between 1st September 2019 and 1st March 2020 in relation to:
 - (a) Emergency risks?
 - (b) Poor air quality?

The NSW Department of Education began receiving calls relating to emergency risks associated with the bushfire crisis from 12 November 2019. Between 12 November 2019 and 1 March 2020, the Information and Enquiries team in the Early Childhood Education and Care Directorate received a total of 312 enquiries from services seeking advice on their operations. Most of these services were affected by both bushfire risk and poor air quality.

863. How do emergency services know whether there are early learning services (including OSHC) operating in their geographic area?

The name, address and contact details of all education and care services are publicly available on the National Register of education and care services (published on the ACECQA website).

The NSW Department of Education assists emergency services with accessing this information if required.

Globe Wilkins Preschool

- 864. What is the timeline for constructing the purpose-built preschool at Wilkins Public School?
 - (a) Have any costings been done on the project?
 - (b) Has a location been identified at the school for the preschool? If so, where? If not, when will this information be available?

- (c) Teachers selected for the Best in Class Teaching Unit are selected based on evidence of the teacher consistently achieving outstanding results for students. Experience levels of teachers varies with the least senior graded teacher being at a Teacher Band 2.3.
- (d) The Best in Class Teaching Unit's professional learning pilot includes four highly qualified English teachers, who have demonstrated curriculum expertise and outstanding results in HSC Standard and Advanced English, which requires literacy expertise. An explicit focus on literacy is addressed through other targeted programs within the Department of Education, whereas the Best In Class Unit is focused on deepening practice for teachers in their HSC subject area.
- (e) The Best in Class Teaching Unit's professional learning pilot includes four highly qualified English teachers, who have demonstrated curriculum expertise and outstanding results in HSC Standard and Advanced English, which requires expertise in reading. An explicit focus on reading is addressed through other targeted programs within the Department, whereas the Best In Class Unit is focused on deepening practice for teachers in their HSC subject area.
- (f) Mathematics Growth Team (MGT), part of the Best in Class Teaching Unit, has been working to build the capacity of mathematics teachers across NSW public high schools with the most effective practices.
 - The MGT consists of seven school-based expert mathematics secondary teachers, five MGT Trainers (classified at Deputy Principal level) and two MGT Specialists (classified at Head Teacher level).
 - The Department will progressively roll out a broader Best in Class Teaching Unit and this will include teachers who specialise in relevant program areas.
- (g) The Best in Class Teaching Unit's professional learning pilot includes four highly qualified science teachers who have demonstrated curriculum expertise and outstanding results in HSC Biology.
- (h) The Best in Class Teaching Unit is in the early stages of piloting programs and implementation. The Department will provide more information about future programs as they develop. Team leaders currently have expertise in a range of curriculum areas including English, mathematics and science.

- (i) The teachers invited to work in the Best in Class teaching program are selected based on the academic results they have achieved for their students. Every teacher is highly qualified educator, with qualifications ranging from Bachelor's to Masters Degrees.
- (j) The teachers invited to work in the Best in Class Teaching Unit are selected based on the academic results they have achieved for their students. Every teacher is highly qualified educator, with qualifications ranging from Bachelor to Masters Degrees.
- (k) The Best in Class Teaching Unit is in the early stages of implementation. Each Best in Class team has been setup to best meet the needs of students, teachers and schools.

The MGT started working in schools at the start of the school year at the following secondary schools: Swansea High School, Francis Greenway High School, Wingham HS, Woolgoolga HS, Bowraville Central School, Alstonville High School, Macksville High School. The Department chose these schools based on datasets on stage 5 achievement, stage 6 mathematics participation, Tell Them From Me Survey and HR data on teachers who have approval to teach mathematics by school, as well as the geographical location of successful Mathematics Growth Team applicants.

The five MGT Trainers also have a responsibility to support the local cluster of primary and secondary schools in their area.

Other Best in Class teaching Unit teams will be allocated half to their existing school and half to the Unit. They will deliver professional development across the state to meet the needs of the teaching workforce and students across the system.

The HSC professional learning and support is available to all teachers of the selected HSC courses across the system.

(I) The first tranche of teachers have been selected and have begun working with schools. Given the current circumstances relating to COVID-19, the Department is considering the location and format of school visits and support to ensure alignment with the Government's public health advice.

The MGT is currently embedded in seven secondary schools: Swansea High School, Francis Greenway High School, Wingham High School, Woolgoolga High School, Bowraville Central School, Alstonville High School, Macksville High School. The Department chose these schools based on datasets on stage 5 achievement, stage 6 mathematics participation, Tell Them From Me Survey

- and HR data on teachers who have approved to teach mathematics by school, as well as the geographical location of successful MGT applicants.
- (m) The Best in Class Teaching Unit sits within the Educational Services Division of the Department and reports to the Deputy Secretary, Educational Services.
- (n) The work has commenced and the Best in Class Teaching Unit teams meet regularly.
- (o) The Best in Class Teaching Unit teams meet regularly to develop appropriate support for schools.
- (p) Each Best in Class team has been set up to best meet the needs of students, teachers and schools. The first tranche of HSC professional learning and support is available to all teachers of the selected HSC courses across the system. This is currently focused on sharing and deepening practice for teachers in their subject area, rather than at a school level engagement. As such, this aspect of Best in Class will be working with groups of teachers identified by their subject, inside and outside of their schools, rather being deployed to a particular school. This allows the work to target improvements in teaching of the curriculum, concentrating and sharing expertise in teaching within and across HSC courses.

The MGT started working in schools at the start of the school year and will be teaching 40 per cent of the time and the remaining time will be mentoring and delivering professional development to the mathematics department of the school they are embedded in. The five MGT Trainers also have a responsibility to support the local cluster of primary and secondary schools in their area.

These approaches allow a subject focus, utilising different ways of engaging with schools and teachers depending on school and student need.

- (q) The Best in Class Teaching Unit HSC program will deliver a sequence of development activities for HSC teaching in core subjects that allows teachers of that subject to accessing ongoing and responsive support. It is intended to include face-to-face (when possible post-social distancing requirements) and online support material.
 - The MGT is embedded in the school and will have ongoing contact with the teachers in the school. The five MGT Trainers also have a responsibility to support the local cluster of primary and secondary schools in their area.
- (r) The support for schools, delivered through the Best in Class Teaching Unit, is expected to be ongoing and responsive. It will include provision of face-to-face and online support material. This support is available for principals and teachers.

The MGT is embedded in the school and will have ongoing contact with the principal in the school. The five MGT Trainers also have a responsibility to

- support the local cluster of primary and secondary schools in their area and will be working closely with the principals at those schools.
- (s) The Best in Class Teaching Unit is in the early stages of piloting programs. Currently, there are no special education teachers in the taskforce. The Department will progressively roll out a broader Best in Class Teaching Unit program and further information will be provided in due course.
- (t) The Best in Class Teaching Unit is in the early stages of piloting programs. Currently, there are no ESL (English as a Second Language) or EAL/D (English as an Additional Language or Dialect) teachers in the taskforce. The Department will progressively roll out a broader Best in Class Teaching Unit program and further information will be provided in due course.
- (u) The Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) publishes high quality research and guidance in key areas of effective teaching practice. The Best in Class Teaching Unit will help teachers across NSW to engage with effective and evidence-based teaching practice. This could include the CESE's published work and teaching methods, as well as other evidence-based sources.

New Teachers

882. What support is offered to first year teachers including relief from face to face teaching and mentoring programs?

Beginning Teachers Support Funding is provided by the NSW Department of Education to schools to support the beginning of a teacher's induction and professional development.

Since 2014, additional funding has been provided to schools to support all permanent beginning teachers for the first two years of their first permanent appointment.

From Term 1, 2017, the Department extended the funding to eligible temporary beginning teachers.

In 2020, the Department provides \$14,481 to schools for each eligible first year permanent or temporary beginning teacher. This funding is designed to support beginning teachers for four school terms and is costed as being equivalent to two hours per week release time for the teacher, and an additional one hour per week release time for an expert teacher to provide practice-based mentoring support.

In 2020, schools with eligible permanent beginning teachers in the second year of teaching will also receive \$4,375 for each permanent beginning teacher. The second year funding is costed as being equivalent to one hour per week release time for the beginning teacher.

First and second year funding for eligible permanent teachers in part time appointments is paid on a pro rata basis according to the number of days of their appointment.

The funding can be used flexibly to meet the individual needs of the beginning teacher. However, it is anticipated that these funds will primarily be used to provide regular release time for the beginning teacher as well as an experienced teacher to provide mentoring support.

All Roles Flex
