ANSWER:

This question should be referred to the Minister responsible for the management and enforcement of fishing under the *Fisheries Management Act 1994*, the Minister for Agriculture and Western NSW.

QUESTION

6. How many meetings have been held with the Minster responsible for Fisheries to try to progress this issue?

ANSWER:

There have been multiple meetings between Fisheries and Aboriginal Affairs officials.

QUESTION

7. Are you aware the state government has agreed for the NSW abalone industry to increase its 100-tonne annual quota, while continuing to prosecute Aboriginal people trying to feed their families and communities?

ANSWER:

This question should be referred to the Minister responsible for the management and enforcement of fishing under the *Fisheries Management Act 1994*, the Minister for Agriculture and Western NSW.

QUESTION

8.The NSWALC has called on an immediate moratorium on prosecuting Aboriginal cultural fishers and develop reforms to ensure Aboriginal cultural fishers are protected from prosecution, do you support this call and what is your office and Department doing on this issue?

ANSWER:

QUESTION

ANSWER:

This question should be referred to the Minister responsible for the management and enforcement of fishing under the Fisheries Management Act 1994, the Minister for Agriculture and Western NSW.

QUESTION

Pandemic

10. What was the role of Aboriginal Affairs in assisting to develop the Community Emergency Response Plans for Covid-19?

ANSWER:

Aboriginal Affairs NSW has a role in the development of Community Emergency Response Plans. During emergency responses, Aboriginal Affairs NSW co-ordinates responses across government and ensures government hears and responds to Aboriginal voices, needs and aspirations.

During the pandemic Aboriginal Affairs NSW achieved this by hosting weekly Aboriginal community response group meetings with both Aboriginal and government leaders, including NSW Health, to discuss local and regional approaches and emerging issues for communities.

In 2020 Aboriginal Affairs NSW supported 18 communities to develop their Community Action Plans, with allocated roles and responsibilities. Encouragingly there are now 24 Community Action Plans for NSW that are managed and reviewed monthly through the Local Emergency Management Committees.

Aboriginal Affairs NSW continues to work with local and regional emergency management committees which manage and support locally based responses to keeping communities stay COVID safe. It's regional staff are members of, and active participants in, local and regional emergency management structures along with other agencies such as NSW Health and community leaders.

QUESTION

11. Should Emergency Response Committees have a dedicated position for Aboriginal community members and Aboriginal Health Services?

ANSWER:

Aboriginal Affairs NSW supports Aboriginal community organisations and leaders to be involved in the emergency response structures to ensure their voices are heard by government.

A number of local emergency management committees include Aboriginal organisations, such as the Local Aboriginal Land Council, Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services and individual community members, to work alongside government agencies that include Aboriginal Affairs NSW, NSW Police, Local Government, Local Health District, Resilience NSW and Regional NSW.

Since the beginning of the Delta outbreak Aboriginal Affairs NSW has hosted place based community meetings across NSW to listen to local issues and collaborate on solutions. This includes in the Central West, Illawarra Shoalhaven, Newcastle and Moree Plains LGAs.

QUESTION

12. What representations have been made to relevant Ministers to ensure such representation is mandated?

ANSWER:

The emergency management approach which has been supported by Aboriginal Affairs NSW has been inclusive of community with community and government working shoulder to shoulder, and mandating roles has not been required.

As the response devolves from a pandemic into the endemic phase, the lessons learnt from this outbreak are being noted. This includes representation on the emergency management committees, to prepare for any future needs.

The involvement in these committees should be open to representation from leaders in the local communities with the most relevant organisations given the ability to determine for themselves if they wish to be on the committee, rather than having a mandated position.

QUESTION

13. What representations have been made to Federal Ministers to express concerns about the failure to ensure the vaccination of vulnerable Aboriginal communities in Western NSW prior to the Delta outbreak?

ANSWER:

The COVID health response is being led by the Minister of Health, including supporting vaccinations. This question should be referred to the Minister of Health and Medical Research.

QUESTION

NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act

14. How often does the Minister meet with the Registrar?

ANSWER:

Answer provided by Registrar –

Weekly. The Registrar attends the weekly Minister-Deputy Secretary meeting. Ad hoc meetings occur as required.

QUESTION

15. How many Land Councils are currently suspended?

ANSWER:

Nil. The *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983* does not have provisions to 'suspend' Aboriginal Land Councils.

QUESTION

16. How many Land Councils have improvement orders?

ANSWER:

Four (4). The councils being:

- Moree Local Aboriginal Land Council
- Gugin Gudduba LALC (near Kyogle)
- Condobolin LALC
- Merrimans LALC (South Coast/Bega)

QUESTION

17. What support is given to the Land Councils who are under investigation or suspended?

ANSWER:

Appointed administrators to Aboriginal Land Councils exercise all of the functions of the council and operate in accordance with their instrument of appointment. As per other corporate settings, appointed administrators to Aboriginal Land Councils 'step into the role and functions of the council' to act in the best interests of the council, its partners and creditors.

Appointed administrators to Aboriginal Land Councils work with their members to return the council to comply with the *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983* and to fulfil the council's statutory obligations. The Aboriginal Land Council and its Board continues to operate and conduct business-as-usual during an investigation.

QUESTION

18. What is the average time Land Councils are suspended for?

ANSWER:

Where an administrator has been appointed to exercise all of the functions of the council, the average time under administration is 18 months.

Note: The *Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983* does not have provisions to 'suspend' Aboriginal Land Councils.

19. What is the current budget of the Office of Registrar?

ANSWER:

The FY2020-21 Budgeted recurrent expenditure for the Office of the Registrar is \$2.402m. This is up from the prior year FY2019-20 actual recurrent expenditure of \$2.175m.

QUESTION

- 20. How many FTE positions in the office of the Registrar?
 - (a) How many staff are devoted to compliance?

ANSWER:

Fifteen (15).

(a) There are currently five (5) positions dedicated to compliance.

QUESTION

Local Decision Making

- 21. What is the status of the OCHRE local decision making evaluation stage 2?
- (a) Will the evaluation report be made publicly available?

ANSWER:

The evaluation of Local Decision Making is being conducted by the Centre for Aboriginal Economic Policy Research. While the COVID-19 pandemic adversely impacted the evaluation throughout 2020 and 2021, the evaluation team have progressed, adapting the methodology to suit participants while adhering to restrictions, in particular the need to avoid travelling to Aboriginal communities.

b) The NSW Government recognises and respects that information collected, findings and recommendations from the evaluation belong to members of the participating Aboriginal communities. As with The First Three Years 2016-2018 *OCHRE* evaluation, reports from the current Local Decision Making evaluation will only be made publicly available with the approval of those communities involved.

- 22. How many Regional Alliances are currently signed off?
 - (a) How much funding have these Alliances received 2020/21 financial year?

ANSWER:

There are eight (8) active Aboriginal Alliances. They are Murdi Paaki Regional Assembly, Three Rivers Regional Assembly, Riverina Murray Regional Alliance, Barang, Illawarra Wingecarribee Alliance Aboriginal Corporation, Western Sydney Regional Alliance, North Coast Aboriginal Development Alliance and La Perouse Aboriginal Community Alliance.

(a) In 2020/2021, \$1,431,283 was received by the Alliances to support Local Decision Making operations and capacity building. In addition, \$249,458 was paid to support the delivery of priority projects across 5 Alliances.

QUESTION

23. How many people are employed in Regional Alliances across the State?

ANSWER:

Each Alliance is responsible for their own structure and operations, as a result each Alliance individually negotiates their funding schedules, including employment of positions.

QUESTION

24. Who pays those employees?

ANSWER:

Each Alliance pay for their own employees either directly as an employer or via their nominated auspice using funding allocated under Local Decision Making or other funding sources including commercial contracts.

- 25. How are Independent Facilitators selected?
 - (a) Are they contracted?
 - (b) What is their period of appointment?
 - (c) How are they renumerated?

ANSWER:

The appointment of an Independent Facilitator must be approved by the Lead Negotiators for the NSW Government and Regional Alliance as well as Aboriginal Affairs NSW as the overall coordinator for Local Decision Making.

- (a) Aboriginal Affairs NSW Contract Agreements are used to engage Independent Facilitators.
- (b) The contract agreement period is for 12 months, with the possibility of extension based on individual need.
- (c) Aboriginal Affairs NSW has a *Scope of Work Independent Facilitator Local Decision Making Accord Negotiations Policy,* that details the scope of work. In accordance with an executed Aboriginal Affairs NSW Contract Agreement, Independent Facilitators are paid on completion of delivery of work and provision of an invoice.

QUESTION

- 26. Is there formal registration and records of disputes kept by Aboriginal Affairs?
 - (a) How are Dispute Resolution Contact Officers appointed?
 - (b) Are they employees of Aboriginal Affairs?
 - (c) If not, how are they contracted?
 - (d) How are independent Arbitrators appointed?

ANSWER:

Aboriginal Affairs NSW, Local Decision Making has a Dispute Resolution and Loss of Faith policy publicly available on the website

(https://www.aboriginalaffairs.nsw.gov.au/media/website_pages/working-differently/local-decision-making/about-local-decision-making/LDM-Dispute-Resolution-and-Loss-of-Faith-Policy-MAY-2018.pdf.) Standard records management practices apply.

(a) Aboriginal Affairs NSW in consultation with the Alliance appoint Dispute Resolution Contact Officer based on the advice contained in the policy. Both parties (the regional alliance and NSW Government) need to nominate representatives to work directly with the Dispute Resolution Contact Officer to form a Dispute Resolution Contact Panel for that region. One member of the Dispute Resolution Contact Panel must be Aboriginal. The Contact Officer and nominated representatives should be agreed to by both parties at the

- inception of the process and documented in the Accord Negotiation Protocols for that Local Decision Making region.
- (b) In some circumstances, where appropriate the Dispute Resolution Contact Officer may be an employee of Aboriginal Affairs NSW or other NSW Government agencies.
- (c) Where the conflict or dispute cannot be resolved by the methods offered in the Policy, or they do not cover the situation that has arisen, the situation may need to be referred to outside models of resolution.

If the complaint is related to a particular government agency, it is suggested that notifier/s make a complaint directly to the agency, giving them a chance to address concerns. Advice can also be sought from the Deputy Ombudsman (Aboriginal Programs) who is equipped to deal with complaints from parties who feel they have been treated unfairly or unreasonably by state government agencies.

(d)

Where the circumstances warrant, and the parties are unable or unwilling to resolve the issue, the Dispute Resolution Contact Officer may suggest that the conflict or dispute be referred to an Independent Arbitrator.

The independent person or body who takes on this role as arbitrator will need to be negotiated between the involved parties. Arbitrated resolutions, and the circumstances leading up to them, should always be fully documented in writing. The Dispute Resolution Contact Officer will take responsibility for this. An arbitrated resolution may be necessary when there is cause for disciplinary action for breaches of the Local Decision Making process, funding agreements or employment codes or when a party either indicates or formally communicates Loss of Faith.

Aboriginal Land Agreements

27. How many agreements have been made?

ANSWER:

The negotiation and administration of Aboriginal Land Agreements is the responsibility of the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces and the Minister for Water, Property and Housing. This question should be referred to the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces and the Minister for Water, Property and Housing.

ANSWER:

The negotiation and administration of Aboriginal Land Agreements – including expenditure and costs of the program – is the responsibility of the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces and the Minister for Water, Property and Housing. The question should be referred to the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces and the Minister for Water, Property and Housing.

QUESTION

Roads to Home Program

29. What is the current status of the \$55 million Roads to Home Program?

ANSWER:

The Roads to Home Program – including expenditure and costs of the program – is the responsibility of the Minister for Water, Property and Housing. This question should be referred to the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces and the Minister for Water, Property and Housing.

QUESTION

Mei-Mel

30. What is the current status of negotiations for the formal hand back of Mei-Mel to the original owners?

ANSWER:

The Minister for Energy and Environment, Minister Kean, has the responsibility for managing the handback of Me-Mel to the Aboriginal community. This question should be referred to the minister for Energy and Environment.

the future site and use of Willow Grove. Further details are available on the Create Website, and community members had until 15 November 2021 to apply.
