Costing assumptions used:

The additional places will commence in January 2012.

On average, an additional 2.4 classes in each of the nine high schools will be created, with each class comprising 25 places, based on the average class size for high schools. One additional teacher is required for each class. There is a possibility that less teachers will be required if the reduction of students from a non-selective school results in that school requiring less teachers, though this is considered unlikely.

The Department of Education and Training has advised that the average salary per high school teacher is \$86,968 plus on-costs of 37.3%.

Additional administration costs are estimated at \$68k per annum. The administration costs are difficult to estimate as it is not known whether, for example, any of these schools will require additional support staff.

Costs are escalated at 2.5% p.a.

The additional places may increase the cost of the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS), which will have an ongoing Budget impact. If the student becomes eligible for subsidised travel after accepting a place or is currently eligible for subsidised travel but will travel longer distances, the cost of the SSTS will increase. However, an accurate estimate of the increased cost of the SSTS cannot currently be determined.

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
