# **Coal Mining in NSW**

# **Background information**

Coal is NSW's largest export. The value of coal exports rose from \$3,853 million in 2002-03 to \$12,898 million in 2008-09, whereas the next largest export (aluminium) was worth \$2,058 million in 2008-09. The largest importers of NSW coal are Japan (54.5%), the Republic of Korea (16.5%), Taiwan (12%) and China (4.7%). Coal mining generated \$1,226 million in State royalties in 2008-09.

Coal mining is mainly concentrated in the Sydney-Gunnedah Basin within the State's five coalfields: Hunter; Newcastle; Gunnedah; Western; and Southern. A further two mines are located within the Gloucester Basin north of Newcastle. A mine has also recently been proposed for the Oaklands Basin southwest of Wagga Wagga. 15,387 people were employed in the coal mining industry in June 2008.<sup>3</sup> The degree to which this industry stands to be affected by the Commonwealth Government's recently announced Resource Super Profits tax is a matter of current debate.

Coal mining in NSW is regulated by the <u>Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979</u> (NSW) and the <u>Mining Act 1992</u> (NSW). Two environmental planning instruments under the <u>Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979</u> (NSW) apply to coal mining: the <u>State Environmental Planning Policy (Major Development) 2005</u>; and the <u>State Environmental Planning Policy (Mining, Petroleum Production and Extractive Industries) 2007</u>. These instruments regulate the impact of coal mining on such matters as: Aboriginal culture and heritage; noise levels; air quality; water quality; and groundwater. Nonetheless, negative environmental and health impacts from coal mining remain important issues in the public debate.<sup>4</sup>

# **Parliamentary Material**

## **NSW** legislation

Coal mining is regulated by the following legislation:

Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979;

Mining Act 1992; and

Mining Amendment Act 2008.

A Public Consultation Draft of the <u>Mining Regulation 2010</u> has recently been released. This is intended to replace the <u>Mining Regulation 2003</u> under the <u>Mining Regulation 2003</u> under the <u>Mining Regulation 2003</u>.

On 31 December 2008, a Ministerial <u>Determination</u> was made under section 283(5) of the <u>Mining Act 1992</u> to alter the ad valorem coal royalty rates.
